### PROPOSED REVISIONS TO BY-LAWS OF VIRGINIA FEDERATION OF WOMEN'S CLUBS

### ARTICLE I—NOMINATIONS & ELECTIONS

Sec. 1. (last sentence) Should a District fail to elect its member at its District Meeting. the appointment shall be made by the District President.

revision-Strike out entire sentence.

Sec. 2. (first sentence) Nominations for Third Vice President, Director of Juniors, shall be made by a nominating committee consisting of a Junior member from each District elected by the Junior delegates in attendance at the District Meeting.

revision-strike out period (.) after "meeting" and insert comma (,); add "and one mem-

ber elected by the Junior Executive Committee who shall be chairman.

### ARTICLE II-TERMS OF OFFICE

Sec. 1. (second sentence) No officer shall serve more than two consecutive years in the

revision-strike out period (.) after office and add "except the Treasurer, who may be elected for two additional consecutive years." (Those elected prior to 1960 shall not be affected by this ruling.)

#### ARTICLE III—VACANCIES

Sec. 3. Any member filling a vacancy in office shall be eligible to re-election provided that she shall not have served longer than thirteen months in office. Those elected prior to 1957 would not be affected by this ruling.

#### ARTICLE V-DUTIES OF OFFICERS

The Third Vice-President, Director of Junior Clubs, shall serve as liaison officer between the Junior Clubs of the Federation, and shall promote and stimulate the objectives of the Federation among Junior Clubs. She shall appoint the Junior Editor of the Virginia Clubwoman subject to the confirmation of the Junior Executive Committee.

### ARTICLE VI-POLICY-insert as new ARTICLE VI

Sec. 1. The policy of the Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs shall be determined by the Constitution and By-laws, by action taken by the delegate body at the Annual Meeting of the Federation and by resolutions adopted in convention action.

Sec. 2. Responsibility for carrying out the intent of adopted resolutions devolves upon the President of the Virginia Federation, the Federation Chairman to whose work it is germane, the Federation Chairman of Legislation, corresponding District Chairmen and the member clubs.

All subsequent Articles shall be renumbered to include new ARTICLE VI.

### ARTICLE VI-DISTRICTS (to become ARTICLE VII)

Sec. 4. (paragraph 2—sentence 2) By similar procedure, the Juniors of each District shall elect a Junior District President, a Vice-President, and a Secretary-Treasurer or a Secretary and a Treasurer.

Sec. 5. (last sentence) Members who are serving as chairmen in the Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs shall be entitled to vote.

RESOLVED, that the Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs urges careful study of the problems of the aging on the community level and action toward meeting the needs of this group.

2. Mandatory Requirement for Salk Vaccine

WHEREAS, the Salk vaccine has proven so successful in controlling poliomyelitis, and

Whereas, many children have yet to receive this vaccine; and

WHEREAS, because of this neglect these children are subject to the crippling effects of this

disease and even death;
RESOLVED, that the Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs urges that the present vaccination requirement for all pre-school children be extended to include the necessary Salk vaccine shots as a requirement for school entrance.

3. Treatment and Care of the Mentally Ill

WHEREAS, the providing of treatment for emotionally disturbed and mentally ill children and adults constitutes a major health problem requiring improved and expanded facilities of Mental Hygiene Clinics, Mental Hospitals, and rehabilitative services, as well as an accelerated research program on the causes and cures for mental illness;

RESOLVED, that the Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs urges that additional financial support be made available to enlarge the services of the Mental Hygiene Clinics where needed,

and to make these clinical services available to all parts of the State; and

RESOLVED, that club members visit mental institutions, study their needs, investigate the program of rehabilitation for patients preparing to return to their communities, and lend their support to the expansion of after-care treatment facilities for the released patient; and

RESOLVED, that the Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs reaffirms its interest in further improving conditions in the Mental Institutions and advocates necessary appropriations for the purpose of providing sufficient personnel therefor and the improvement of their salary scale and working conditions, in order to insure the level of care and treatment which should be given to patients, and an accelerated research program on the causes and cures for mental illness.

4. Safety

Whereas, failure of drivers of motor vehicles to accept and live up to the legal and moral responsibilities inherent in the operation of a motor vehicle results in a heavy toll of highway accidents; and

who are incapable or unwilling to drive safely;

RESOLVED, that Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs endorses improved and more rigid licensing standards and procedures which will permit on our roads only those who are competent drivers, who obey the laws and rules of the road and respect the rights of others.

If the customer loses both his keys, the only recourse is to call in a locksmith and have him drill into the box, Miller said.



### PROPOSED RESOLUTIONS TO BE PRESENTED TO THE CONVENTION

### 1. CONTROL OF HARMFUL EFFECTS OF RADIATION

WHEREAS, radiation has become instrumental in the improvement of health, welfare and productivity of the public when properly utilized; and

WHEREAS, it may impair the health of the people and the industrial and agricultural potentials of the State if improperly utilized; and

WHEREAS, medical authorities have pointed out the need for regulation and safeguarding of radiation hazards;

RESOLVED, that the State of Virginia be urged to encourage the constructive uses of radiation and to control any potentially harmful associated effects.

#### 2. SPECIAL EDUCATION IN VIRGINIA

WHEREAS, the Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs supports the development of adequate educational facilities for the handicapped; and

WHEREAS, this will mean an even greater need for qualified teachers and supervisory personnel;

RESOLVED, that the Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs continue its support of scholarships for those interested in furthering their career in special education in Virginia; and

RESOLVED, further, it supports the securing of a department of Special Education in a qualified Institution of Higher Learning in the State of Virginia.

#### 3. TWO-YEAR COLLEGE AT THE LOCAL LEVEL

WHEREAS, the increasing population in our country and the consequent expanding chrollment in our Institutions of Higher Learning have strained these facilities to the limit; and

WHEREAS, the enrollment is expected to continue to grow; and

WHEREAS, the Council on Higher Education has recommended the establishment of two-year colleges at the local level, in an attempt to remedy the situation; and

WHEREAS, the development of two-year college programs at the local level appears economically sound and feasible;

RESOLVED, that the Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs lend its support to the establishment of these local colleges, and urges the General Assembly to carry out the recommendation of the Council on Higher Education.

#### 4. YOUTH CONSERVATION

WHEREAS, the Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs is deeply interested in the welfare of youth, in causes of behavior problems, in the early detection of trends toward delinquency, and in the prevention of delinquency, and believes that added emphasis should be placed upon prevention;

RESOLVED, that the Federation advocates a positive approach to the problems of youth; that its member clubs study conditions in the home, the school, the church, and the community which are conducive to the development of sound, wholesome youth; and that they lend their support to the efforts of the community agencies to strengthen the mental, spiritual, and physical development of all children.

### 5. JUVENILE COURTS — DETENTION, PROBATION AND PAROLE SERVICES

WHEREAS, adequate detention, probation, psychiatric, psychological and parole services are necessary for the successful functioning of the Juvenile Court System; and

WHEREAS, in Virginia such services are not always provided in a measure commensurate with the need; and

WHEREAS, children are being committed to jail because of insufficient detention services and inadequate supporting services in contravention of the law and to the physical, mental, and moral detriment of such children; and

WHEREAS, children paroled from State custody are not receiving necessary supervision and assistance by either juvenile courts or welfare departments;

RESOLVED, that the Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs urges its member clubs to examine the conditions which prevail in their communities in regard to the treatment of children before the court; that they lend their support and influence to the improvement of services to children locally and on the State level; and that they encourage the development of regional detention facilities where adequate local facilities are non-existent.

### 6. WHITE HOUSE CONFERENCES ON CHILDREN AND YOUTH AND THE AGING

WHEREAS, the problems of the care of children and of the aging population deserve our active and most sympathetic consideration; and

WHEREAS, the President has called Conferences to study these problems in which many of our members will participate; and

WHEREAS, in the pre-conference studies, the actual sessions, the reports and the recommendations from these conferences there will be much of value to guide our work on these problems in local communities:



# Considering **Parent Period**

**School Board** 

Should Roanoke city school teachers have a certain part of their working day set aside for conferences with parents and students?

This is a question currently under study by the city school administration. Supt. E. W. Rushton is expected to report at Monday's City School Board meeting with a recommendation on what should be done.

The teacher - parent conferences and how (or even if) they should be provided became a

should be provided became a discussion point at the last board meeting.

Board member David H. Burrows told the group that it had been brought to his attention that "there have been occasions when a teacher couldn't be contacted after (regular school) hours . . . we need a period when parents and children can see the teacher."

Citing a section of the spe-Citing a section of the special covenants of the city's contracts with principals and teachers which says the school day "shall be from 8:30 a.m. to 3:15 p.m. or equivalent hours," Burrows suggested the problem of a conference period might be taken care of by extending the hours until 4 p.m.

This would call for teachers to work a seven-and-one-half hour day in the schools instead of the present six-and-three-quarter hours.

The extra 45 minutes provided by such a move, the board was told, would serve as a conference period. If a teacher had no parents or students to see, the time could be used for other activities within the school.

Finally, the board did agree o delete the sentence in the contract covenants dealing with a teacher's hours. But no de-cision was reached on what should be used in its place.







The 13th Virginia District YMCA Model General Assembly of youth legislators convened Thursday night at the Virginia State Capitol at Richmond, with delegates present from Hi-Y and Tri-Hi-Y Clubs in high schools across the

Roanoke's delegates from the Jefferson Hi-Y Club of Jefferson High School were Robert W. Young, Robert C. Mottley Jr., William Edwards, Peter Munger, Steve Hodges and Lewis McNeace Frank Giannitti represented William Fleming High School, Jefferson's advisers were M. G. White and C. Lewis Pitzer Jr.

The Youth House of Delegates, under its speaker, David Vaughn of Norfolk, and the Youth Senate, under its president. Robert W. Young of Roanoke, discussed and acted on 57 bills proposed by the various delegates. Of these bills, two-thirds eventually passed.

The bill introduced into the House of Delegates by the Jefferson Senior Hi-Y Club was to impower the State Water Resources Board to provide for the cooperative development of municipally owned watersheds located in county areas. Cities, counties and the state would equally share the cost of such development, and benefit accordingly. Through the pursuasive efforts of the Roanoke delegates, this bill passed both houses and was approved by the youth governor, Douglas C. Arthur of Strasburg.

Joint sessions in the House chamber convened to hear an address by Gov. J. Lindsay Almond Jr. and to transact of ficial business.

A number of real senators and delegates were present to aid the Assembly in the procedure. These included Del. Charles E. Green Jr. of Bedford.
