Hopkins, Hanes Differ Over School Law

Compulsory s c h o o l attendance the Hopkins-Hanes campaign.

Leigh B. Hanes Jr., the Republican candidate, said Virginia's industrial development efforts are being handicapped with North Carolina advertising that it has one.

William B. Hopkins, Democrat, disagreed.

The compulsory school attendance issue was raised by Hanes in his prepared speech.

It came in listing six steps which, he said, Virginia can take in strengthening its public education system and thereby make the state more attractive in the South's competition for

disagreed.

HOPKINS ARGUED that it would be unwise, at this time, to try to get a compulsory school attendance law through the legislature because of the row it would create.

The cause of industrial development would be hurt, Hopkins said, because out-of-state industrial leaders looking for new plant sites now feel Virginia has solved its school integration problems.

Hopkins said he visited the Department of Conservation and Economic Development in Richmond Tuesday and learned that during the past few months it has received more inquiries about locating plants in Virginia than ever before.

The two candidates in their first campaign appearance together spoke at a meeting sponsored by the Williamson Road Woman's Club. It drew 34 persons, including the candidates and newspaper and television reporters covering the Hopkins-Hanes campaign.

localities, including some in Southside Virginia where feeling over school integration is the strongest, have enacted their own school attendance laws.

He declared that local control is the best at this time.

BOTH CANDIDATES, in arguing the wisdom of a statewide school attendance law, ruled out debate on other aspects of the errow Commission program during their campaign.

But during a short question-and-answer period both candidates expressed reservations over the wisdom of tuition grants for par-ents who do not want to send their children to public schools.

Hopkins said the tuition grants "will bear watching" because experience may prove that this phase of the Perrow Commission program is "economically unsound."

Criticism of the tuition grants came first from Mrs. Hazel K. Barger, the moderator, who declared they enable "parents to send their children to private schools on our tax dollars."

Mrs. Barger, a member of the Republican National Commit-tee, said she is sorroy that Roanoke's two House mem-bers—Del. Julian H. Ruther-foord Jr. and Del. Kossen Greg-ory—are unopposed for re-elec-tion. They are Demograte. tion. They are Democrats.

"I'm trying to get somebody to be a write-in candidate," Mrs. Barger added.

Barger added.

Hopkins in his prepared remarks said he does not contend the Perrow Commission program solves all of Virginia's school problems but it is "the best under present circumstances."

"I feel that primary consideration on school legislation at the next session should deal with increasing the salaries and retirement benefits of our teachers—which I favor and favor wholeheartedly," the Democratic candidate declared.

Hanes also declared the next General Assembly should "strengthen the teacher's position." He advocated improving

strengthen the teacher's posi-tion." He advocated improving the standards of the profession, strengthening teachers' employ-ment security, and "backing them to the hilt" on disciplinary prob-lems.

HANES SAID Virginia should advertise that it is solving its edu-cational problems because experi-ence of other states has proven educational facilities attract in-

educational facilities attract industry.

The Republican candidate said his campaign will center around two ideas. One, the people of Virginia are its most important resource. Second, service to the people, regardless of their politics or station in life, is a state senator's most important task.



Navy Man Is Speaker On Convention's Last Day

Until he was five years old,
Allen R. Bosworth had never sat

Since then he's been a seaman
in the Navy, news editor of a

Museum Director and Woman Who Tested Fallout Shelter at VFWC Convention

Life in Shelter Not 'Unbegrable'

She doesn't look like a pioneer. Her skin is smoothly tanned. Her blond hair peeps from beneath a perky flowered hat, and her slim figure is shown off in a tailored gray suit with crisp white collar.

Yet this woman, Mrs. Thomas A. Powner of Windsor, N.J., is

just as much a pacesetter as her sisters of covered wagon fame.

For two weeks last August, Mrs. Powner and her family lived in a 8x9 - foot fallout shelter . . . first first for Americans.

The experiment was planned by civil defense of-ficials and the

Vecellio Powners were asked to serve as guinea pigs by Dr. Jack Vernon, associate professor of psychology at Princeton University, where Powner, a teacher was taking special work

In Roanoke Tuesday to address the annual convention of the VFWC, Mrs. Powner said

her first reaction to the proposal was "No!"

"I was frankly skeptical," she says, but after talking to Dr. Vernon, I realized someone had to do it."

to do it."
So, equipped with the bare necessities, the couple and their three small children got ready for their "first." The little Powners ranged in age from Scott, then 5½, and Tory, 3½ to baby Hilary, 23 months.

bors were told that the family was off for a vacation. (Some vacation, says Mrs. Powner), and only the couple's parents were in on the secret.

Into the shelter, they took a complete supply of canned food, 38 gallons of water and three changes of clothing for each. For the children, a favorite toy or security blanket was added.

Elympichings were stark. There

security blanket was added.

Furnishings were stark. There was only one bunk, two extra mattresses, a folding table and two folding chairs. To keep themselves occupied, the family brought along an adequate supuly of books, a word-game and a deck of cards, but they soon fired of cards. tired of cards.

Life without electricity is unimaginable to the modern world, yet the Powners found ways to do without. Light was furnished by 150 millamp flash light bulbs and candles. "It was very dim all the time," the housewife says, adding that reading was sometimes a strain times a strain.

Food was prepared in a chafing dish with a candle beneath.

For the first few days, the family was busy re-arranging the room, trying to create more floor space by shifting cartons. Their chief worry was not knowing what each day would bring, but the experience was never "unbearable."

"unbearable."
For Mrs. Powner, a miscalculation of time was the worst
blow. She figured one day ahead
of time, but her husband corrected the error. The knowledge
left her "very depressed."

I. Emphasis on the Symbols of American Heritage

WHEREAS, Love of our country, pride in our heritage, and devotion to the ideals of government on which it was founded should be nurtured in succeeding generations by an awareness of the significance of the historic documents and symbols of our government, and of the places identified with the lives of American pioneers and statesmen, therefore

RESOLVED, That the General Federation of Women's Clubs expresses its belief that American citizens should be reminded of the debt we owe to our historic past by:

- A Proclamation by the President of the United States establishing an annual "Great Seal Day" in recognition of the importance of the Great Seal of the United States of America as a symbol of our government;
- Appropriate ceremonies held at national monuments and shrines;
- 3. Improvement of the means of access to national shrines in order that visits to those areas be encouraged.

II. Peaceful Use of Antarctica

WHEREAS, The Secretary of State has historically denied passports to persons who knowingly assist the International Communist Movement; and

WHEREAS, In June 1958 the United States Supreme Court ruled that the Secretary of State has no statutory authority to deny passports to communists even though the Secretary has grounds to believe that such persons were going abroad for the purposes of engaging in activities that would advance the International Communist Movement; therefore

RESOLVED, That the General Federation of Women's Clubs actively work for immediate legislation in the United States Congress which would authorize the Secretary of State to deny passports to persons who engage in activities calculated to further the International Communist Movement.

IV. The Abolishment of Pornography

WHEREAS, The Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation has stated that American morals are besieged today by an un-

principled force in the spread of obscene literature through the means of films, decks of playing cards, photographs, "comic" books, salacious magazines, certain paper-backed books, phonograph records, and pornographic materials; and

WHEREAS, This practice is robbing our country of decency and serves as a seed-bed for delinquency and sex deviation among juveniles and depravity among all ages; and

WHEREAS, Unspeakably vile material is being sent unsolicited through the United States mails into homes and is sold openly elsewhere; therefore

RESOLVED, That the General Federation of Women's Clubs strongly urges its member clubs to use every available means to combat obscenity and pornography by programs of cooperative community action based on:

- Education of the public as to the extent of the problem and the effects on society of obscenity and pornographic materials.
- Participation by citizens in the program of action of the United States Postmaster General. This includes placing promptly in the hands of the local postmaster, either personally or by mail, any objectionable or pornographic material received through the mails, with the special precaution to save all materials including the covering envelope.
- Cooperation with law enforcement agencies in the prosecution of those who violate the laws and ordinances dealing with pornography and obscenity and by studying municipal ordinances and state statutes and urging the strengthening of them when needed.

V. Indian Affairs—Termination of Federal Services

WHEREAS, It is the conviction of the General Federation of Women's Clubs that termination of government services and trusteeship of Indian land is not at present in the best interests of the Indian people and should not take place until the Indians are fully prepared by education and experience to manage their own affairs and take their rightful place in the larger American society; and

WHEREAS, It is the further conviction of the General Federation of Women's Clubs that the Indian tribes themselves should be allowed to determine when they are ready for termination of government protection; therefore

RESOLVED, That the General Federation of Women's Clubs urges a re-statement of Federal Indian policy to replace the termination policy which would prematurely take from the Indians the safeguards they need.

WHEREAS, No appropriation has been made for carrying out this study and investigation; therefore

RESOLVED, That the General Federation of Women's Clubs urges Congress to appropriate the funds necessary for the Secretary of the Interior to accomplish this program at the earliest possible date.

WHEREAS, The standard of health in the Indian population living on reservations in the United States is far below that of the general population; and

WHEREAS, The latest report of the United States Public Health Service attributes this low standard of Indian health in large measure to lack of sanitation facilities and unsafe water supplies on Indian reservations; and

WHEREAS, The 86th Congress has passed the Indian Sanitation Facilities Bill which authorizes the United States Public Health Service to provide sanitation facilities on Indian reservations in cooperation with the Indians themselves; therefore

RESOLVED, That the General Federation of Women's Clubs urges the Congress to make adequate appropriations to enable the United States Public Health Service to construct sanitation facilities and provide safe community and domestic water supplies on Indian reservations in accordance with the provisions of the law.

VIII. Indian Affairs—Economic Opportunities For Indians

WHEREAS, The establishment of industries on or near Indian reservations and the development of the natural resources of the reservations for the purpose of providing year-round employment for Indians near their homes have been the goals of the Federal government, the Bureau of Indian Affairs, and the Indian tribes themselves in recent years; therefore

RESOLVED, That the General Federation of Women's Clubs pledges continuing encouragement and support of such industrial development programs and urges the Congress of the United States to continue to pursue these programs for a realistic economic stabilization.

IX. Care and Rehabilitation of Drug Addicts

WHEREAS, The declaration of the Congress of the United States, the United Nation's Commission on Narcotic Drugs, and the National Research Council, is that narcotic drugs should not be used to gratify addiction; and that in the treatment of drug addiction methods of ambulatory treatment and open clinics are not advisable; and

WHEREAS, It is realized that the sale and use of narcotic drugs should be strictly limited to medical needs and that experts in treatment of narcotic addiction have repeatedly emphasized that most addicts cannot be treated effectively and rehabilitated unless required to submit to legal restraint in closed institutions; and WHEREAS, The General Federation of Women's Clubs is in opposition to proposals which advocate experimentation with established facilities for legalized distribution of narcotic drugs to addicts for maintenance of their addiction; and

the United States, particularly in those states where there is rigid enforcement of severe and mandatory laws, which has resulted in a marked reduction of drug addiction and in deterrence of unlawful sale of narcotics; therefore

RESOLVED, That the General Federation of Women's Clubs strongly urges compulsory hospitalization for addicts where facilities are available in the effort to cure, to rehabilitate, and to prevent further addiction; and further

RESOLVED, That the General Federation of Women's Clubs urges the Congress of the United States to maintain the provisions of the National Narcotics Restriction Act of 1956.

X. Ethics in Radio and TV

WHEREAS, The General Federation of Women's Clubs is deeply concerned with:

- Practices such as payment to disc jockeys or program directors to induce them to perform certain individual musical works, or pressure exerted by or on broadcasting or recording personnel to perform or record certain categories of music, thereby denying the American Public the privilege of choosing the programs and individual works it wants to hear;
- The difficulty in fixing responsibility for these conditions; and

WHEREAS, We recognize that certain irregularities recently uncovered are revolting but not representative of the entire radio and TV industry; and

WHEREAS, The Radio and TV Codes of the National Association of Broadcasters outline high ideals in their regulations which have not always been faithfully followed in the past but we are cognizant of some improvement in adherence to the Codes; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the General Federation of Women's Clubs urges that the Federal Communications Commission consider license renewals of radio and TV stations every three years with examinations and hearings at the site where the local license is held; such action being necessary in the area of discipline within the industry; and further

RESOLVED, That the General Federation of Women's Clubs urges the National Association of Broadcasters to enforce the Radio and TV Codes with increased vigor and tempo, in order to assure the American Public a greater number of wholesome radio and television programs.

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
Roanoke Women Are Registered **Parliamentarians**







Dr. Murray said "great impetus" is being given to public education, Mrs. Bailey writes, with the government contributing twenty per cent of its budget to schools. It exercises strict control through inspection and required use of gov-ernment textbooks, he is re-ported to have said.

He added that the Mexican

He added that the Mexican student, when properly fed, is intelligent, interested and enthusiastic scholastically.

Dr. Letty explained the "strong nature" of the government with one party in control, "thus providing a continuity of operation and stability."

Strength, he is quoted as saying, is derived from organized labor, agricultural workers and government employees, Mexico's

government employees. Mexico's attitude, he said, is to maintain peace with all countries and its relations with the United States are good although it has refused to engage in a mutual defense program with this country.

Dr. Smith, Mrs. Bailey writes, declared Mexico's economy stable with a strong currency; that officials of the Bank of Mexico are good financial technicials granted a free bond in more than of the strong bond in the strong free hand in monetary affairs by the government.

The country's budget is within five per cent of being balanced, he said, and added "Mexico is in a hurry to achieve and if private enterprise doesn't act, the government will move in." It already owns the railroads and telegraph and is purchasing U.S.-owned electric power.

Dr. Terrett said Mexican art reflects the country's history; its folk art reflects the country's beauty. The government supervises museums and restorations.


