More than a hundred parents attended the first meeting of the Parent-Teacher Association of the new Grandin Court School last night.


They met in the "multi-purpose" room of the school at 8. Mrs. Edward Game, chairman of the constitution committee, read the document. She was elected president of the organization.



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#### CONSTITUTION OF THE GRANDIN COURT PARENT TEACHER ASSOCIATION

#### Article I

Name; The name of this association shall be the Grandin Court Parent Teacher Association a local unit of the Virginia branch of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers.

#### Article II

Objects: The objects of this association shall be to promote the welfare of children and youth in home, school, church and community: to raise the stendards of home life: to secure adequate laws for the care and protection of children and youth; to bring into closer relationship. the home and the school; and to develop between educators and the public, united efforts to secure for every child the best advantages in physical, mental, social and spititual education.

#### Article III

Policies: The purpose of this association shall be educational. This association shall be non-commercial, non-sectarian and non-partisan. This association may cooperate with other organizations active in child welfare. This association shall not seek to direct the administrative activities of the school or to control its policies.

#### Article IV

Membership and Dues:

Section 1. Dues

The annual dues shall be all inclusive for membership in the National Congress, the state branch and the local unit. The dues shall be fifty(50) cents per capita. Five(5) cents per capita of this amount shall be the national portion, ten(10) per capita shall be the state portion and the balence per capita shall be the local portion.

Section 2: Membership.

Any person interested in the objects for which this association is organized may become a member upon payment of dues as here to fore provided.

#### Article V

Officers and their Election:

Section 1. Officers.

The officers of this association shall be a president, a first vice president, a second vice president, a third vice president, a recording secretary, a corresponding secretary, a treasurer, a historian and a parliamentarian.

Section 2. Blection

The officers of this association shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting. Nominations for officers shall be made by a nominating committee of five members elected by the association one month prior to the election of officers. Additional nominations may be made from the floor at the time of the election. However, if there is but one candidate for any office, by motion from the floor, the election may be by voice.

Section 3. Vacancies in office.

A vacancy occuring in any office shall be filled by a vote of the members of the association at the next regular meeting. Due notice of such an election shall be given. A nominee shall be selected by the executive committee or by the nominating committee elected when the vacancy occurs.

#### Article VI

Executive Committee: The executive committee of this association shall be the officers and all standing committee chairmen.

#### Article VII

Duties of Officers:

Section 1. President.

The president shall preside at all meetings of the association and perform all duties incumbent upon the office. The president shall be a member, ex office, of all committees except the nominating committee.

Section 2. Vice Presidents.

The vice presidents shall act as sides to the president and shall perform the duties of the president in the absence of that officer in their designated order. Section 3. Recording Secretary.

The recording secretary shall keep a record of all meetings of the association and of the executive committee, and shall keep a list of the members of the association.

Section 4. Corresponding Secretary.

The corresponding secretary shall carry on all correspondence for the association and shall attend to all notices of meetings. Section 5. Treasurer.

The treasurer shall receive all moneys of the association, shall keep an accurate record of receipts and expenditures and shall pay out local funds only as authorized by the association. The treasurer shall make a monthly report to the association and a full report at the annual meeting. The treasurers accounts shall be audited annually.

Section 6. Historian.

The historian shall compile and keep a record of the activities and achievements of the association.

Section 7. Parliamentarian.

The parliamentarian shall express an opinion on points in question when requested to do so by the presiding officer. The presiding officer shall then state the decision rendered by the parliamentarian.

#### Article VIII

Meetings: ings:

Section 1. Time and Place.

A regular meeting of this association shall be held on the second Wednesday of each month at 3:15 at the school unless otherwise provided by the association or executive committee. Three days notice shall be required for a change of date. This association shall have at least nine meetings annually.

Section 2. Quorum.

One fifth of the membership of this association shall constitute a quorum.

#### Article IX

Amendments: This constitution and its by-laws may be amended at any time at any regular meeting of the association by a two thirds vote of the members present and voting, provided notice of the proposed amendment has been given at the previous regular meeting.

#### Article X

Rules of Order: "Roberts Rules of Order, Revised" shall govern the rules of this associaty in all cases in which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with this constitution and those of the state branch and the Mational Congress.

#### 'MENDMENT I

for purpose of group life, health and accident insurance only and for no other purpose, any child attending the schools of the City of Roanoke shall be a member of this association provided that the parent or guardian or othe person actually supporting such child is a member of this association. This action is to include all members active and inactive. School secretaries and nurses may participate subject to the same conditions as teachers and students.

#### Article I

#### Standing Committees:

Section 1. Such standing committees may be created by the executive committee as may be required to promote the objects and interest of this association. Section 2. Standing committee chairmen shall be appointed by the president.

Section 3. The standing committees shall consist of the following:

Budget Hospitality

Health and Pre-School

Welfare Membership

Publicity and Magazine

Sefety Study Group Fine Arts

Program

Room Mother

Grounds and Recreation

Insurance Section 4. Duties of Chairmen.

1. Program:

The chairman of the program committee shall be the first vice president. This committee shall develop a year's program which shall interest the members of the association in the child and all his needs and in the problems of the school as they develop.

2. Membership:

The chairman of the membership committee shall be the second vicepresident. The committee shall endeavor to enroll as members, all fathers, mothers, teachers and other interested pearsons in the school district.

3. Welfare:

The chairman of the Welfare committee shall be the third vice pressident. The committee shall handle all welfare work in connection with the students in cooperation with the principal.

4. Insurance:

The chairman of the insurance committee shall be the recording secretary. This committee shall attend to all matters relating to any group life, health and accident insurance of the association.

5. Publicity and Magazine:

The chairman of the publicity and magazine committee shall be the corresponding secretary. This committee shall attend to all publicity of this association and to subscriptions to magazines.

6. Wospitality:

The hospitality committee shall develop a spirit of friendliness among members. This committee is responsible for having the room prepared for meetings.

7. Budget:

The budget committee shall study the finances of this association and make plans for securing the necessary funds to meet all budget requirments.

8. Study Group:

The study group committee shall plan study groups as outlined in the Parent-Teacher Manual or as problems present themselves to this association for study and discussion.

9. Room Mother:

The room mother committee shall work in conjunction with the publicity committee. It shall provide a close contact with the parents and the teachers of each room.

10. Grounds and Recreation:

The grounds and recreation committee is responsible for this association's interest and perticipation in the supervision of the school grounds. This committee shall work in cooperation with the city recreation department in all phases of child and youth recreation, especially in much planned activities as Helloween.

11. Safety:

The duty of the safety committee shall be to encourage and stress safety measures for the entire school district, in the homes and at the school.

12. Health and Pre-School:

The health and pre-school committee contacts mothers of all new incoming students in an effort to explain the five point health plan and program. This committee shall also work to arouse interest in the development of good health programs in both the school and the community.

13. Fine Arts:

The duties of the fine arts committee shall be to encourage a greater knowledge and appreciation of all the arts. This committee shall endeavor to extend to the members of the community an enthusiastic interest in the arts.

#### Article II

Annual Meeting: The annual meeting of this association shall be held each year in May.

#### Article III

Term of Office: Officers shall serve for a term of one year and shall serve until their successors are elected and installed. No officer shall be eligible to the same office for more than two consecutive years.

# Grandin Court School Gets Photostatic Copy Of 'America' in Author's Own Handwriting

A photostatic copy of the national hymn, "America," taken from a yellowed, blue-lined sheet of paper bearing the words of the hymn in the handwriting of its composer, was presented the Grandin Court Elementary School yesterday.

The gift was made by Miss Ruth Williams, music consultant for public schools here during

a meeting of the school's PTA. She owns a copy of "America" written in fine script by Dr. Samuel Francis Smith, a Baptist minister, who composed the stanzas in February, 1832. Miss Williams' copy is one which Dr. Smith made the same year at the request of

Mrs. Daniel White of Newton Center, Mass., Miss Williams' grandmother.

In its original form, the hymn contained five verses, but the third was subsequently dropped and in the copy which Miss Williams has only

four verses appear. Dr. Smith, who later became professor of theology at Newton Theological Seminary, was a graduate of Harvard in the class of Oliver Wendell Holmes, 1829.

His hymn, beginning "My Country, 'Tis of Thee," was first published in Mason's "The Choir" in 1842 and was first sung in public at the Park Street Baptist Church, Boston, on July 4 of that same year.

### Grandin Court Patrons View New School

One of the City's newest schools, the Grandin Court School, held an open house last night to show the public its modern equipment and facilities.

A special program was presented by pupils of the school before parents and patrons toured the building. Under the direction of Miss Ruth Williams, school music consultant, the following program was held in the auditorium:

"Spring Song," girls' chorus; a folk dance by pupils in the third grade; flute selections by fourth graders and "Firemen's Dance" by fifth and sixth grade pupils.

A movie of activities at the school since it opened Jan. 22 was shown in the film room and refreshments were served by the school's PTA.

Cornerstone for the structure was laid last Dec. 17. It is on an 11-acre site bounded by Spessard Ave. and Spring Road, S. W., and contains 12 classrooms, eight of which are in use now. All classrooms will be utilized at the beginning of the fall term, according to Miss Lucy Buford, principal.

The building, similar to the Huff Lane School, cost approximately \$293,000.

### The History of the Grandin Court P.T.A. for the year 1951-52

In the year 1951-1952 the Grandin Court P.T.A. has held eleven meetings since its constitution was adopted and the officers elected on March 12,1951.

Its membership has increased from 81 charter members to 340 members at the time of the first annual meeting.

The treasurer has collected \$170.00 in dues and \$1022.83 has been raised by contributions, bake and T. shirt sales, solicitation and a county fair, making the total receipts for the fiscal year \$1192.83. The budget has been met and a total amount of \$1029. 50 has been spent. When outstanding commitments have been paid, a balance of approximately \$75.00 will be carried over for the next year.

After paying the state and national dues, the association has accomplished the following:

Served refreshments at the open house.

Sent two boys to the Safety Patrol camp in 1951 and will send two more this August.

Bought 18 slickers and hats for the patrol boys.

Entertained the faculty and new members.

Furnished the principal's office and the clinic with draperies.

Purchased 12 music stands for the band.

Outfitted the boys' chorus with collars and ties.

Put top soil in the gardens.

Provided clocks for all classrooms that did not have them.

Held two pre-school clinics and plan to have a party this month for the preschool children.

Entertained the fathers of the P.T.A.

With the aid of several individual contributions, sponsored a sandlot football team.

Cooperated with the city recreation department on Halloween.

With the help of various members assisted in the transportation of pupils on different occasions.

Sent the president to the state convention and delegates to two district meetings.

and other organizations.

Through the assistance of individual members, provided benches for the grove and roses, trees, shrubbery and vines for the grounds.

Contributed to the National Founders Day Fund and the Mental Hygiene Clinic.

Attempted to further the safety of the children by arranging for a gravel walk to be laid on Spring Road and for school manikins to be placed on the highway.

Gave money, new and used garments to the Needlework Guild and the Shoe Fund. Christmas baskets were sent to several school families.

Will give a Bible and will contribute to the faculty fund to purchase draperies for the school library.

The Association has cooperated in all ways possible with requests from the Central Council of P.T.A. in Roanoke, civic organizations and the Board off Education.

# "What You Are Speaks So Loud I Cannot Hear What You Say"

What does my religion mean to me? you ask. It means the fulfillment of an inborn urge to rely on a higher power for guidance and courage.

Such an urge comes as naturally as the love of truth and honesty and decency inbred from a Mother's love and care, the rich inheritance of a Christian home. A frequent and periodic consciousness of communion in thought with God, a daily practice at morning or evening, and preceeding the need for guidance on special missions or undertakings, should be the reg-ular habit and practice of one with this conviction of reliance and of faith.


As a child I heard the story of an old colored Mammy who said, "I keeps in constant touch with the Lord. I asks His approval of every act—when I pick up a broom to sweep the house, when I stop work to fix up to go to Church, for everything I do I asks His approval."

Maybe the old Mammy called on the Lord too much and pestered Him with too many little things, and was quite childlike in her use of prayer, but at least her attitude was right.

I have recalled this story a hundred times, and I trust I have emulated her under proper circumstances. We all do well to keep the humility and simple faith of childhood, and to be conscious that we have strength therein, recognizing the significance of Christ's meaning when He said, "A little child shall lead them."

I believe if a man can keep this constant consciousness of the reality of Divine approval, He will attain a certain measure of that power of goodness which will premeate his personality and radiate wholesome influence with his associates. Often we do as much good by what we are as by what we say. Emerson put it, "What you are speaks so loud I cannot hear what you say.'

## 'Mother Patrol' May Be Established by PTA

The Central Council Parent-Teacher Association discussed the possibilities of a "mother patrol" for school children during its meeting this morning at the Appalachian auditorium.

Dr. Margaret Glendy, safety chairman for the group, presented the idea of having two mothers at each school for three or four hours each day to supplement the school boy patrol.

In other cities where this is carried out, Dr. Glendy said, the mothers are paid \$50 a month, wear a uniform and replace policemen. They may take the numbers of speeding cars but may not make arrests, Dr. Glendy said. Members at the meeting thought the mothers should have a whistle, too.
Individual PTA presidents

voiced a complaint that many

of the policemen assigned to watch traffic near the schools are often absent during a crucial time of the school day - it's opening-because they must appear in Police and Traffic Court. Patrol mothers would be helpful at this time particularly, some of the members believed, but they doubted the wisdom of eliminating police protection at school crossings.

The group decided to take the question of traffic mothers for discussion before the individual PTA's and brin gback reports at the next Central Council meeting.

The report of Radio Chairman Mrs. Blair Pitzer announced that a Founder's Day broadcast consisting of a skit and music will be given over WSLS Feb. 12 at 1:05 p.m.

Guest speaker at the meeting was Mrs. Helen Killinger, supervisor of public health nurses here, who reported on the health work done with the school children during 1951.

Mrs. Killinger said that 721 visits were made to the schools by the ten nurses, 1,282 conferences were held with teachers, 1,215 inspections of children made by the nurses, 11 special clinics held in the schools, 1,255 dental corrections made and 351 eye corrections made with the help of the local Lions Club. Mrs. Killinger said that 13,413 children were examined by nurses or teachers.

It was announced that a meeting for pre-school clinic chairman and health chairman of PTA's will be held Feb. 12 at 10 a.m. in the School Administration Building library.





There were four study group sessions held during the year and the last one on March 20, was a luncheon with Mrs. Simpson speaker. They were all well planned and well attended. Mrs. Rawley Turner was appointed chairman of Jubilee Belles and Mrs. Chas. Dunn was named Scout Organization Chairman to represent our area.

At the Founders Day meeting held in February the First Vice President, Mrs. W. F. Mason gave a brief history. Judge Pate was scheduled to speak, but due to illness was unable to attend. Mr. Hull substituted. A nominating committee was appointed. Central Council requested all units to send in ideas for a combined TV program and this was carried out. Our unit also helped with the March of Dimes drive. Mrs. Harold Farris, Civic and Legislative chairman planned and directed our units partication.

March, a joint meeting was held at Woodrow Wilson Jr. High School with Wasena, Virginia Heights and Woodrow Wilson PTA's. On March 2, the PTA had a carnival at the school. Mrs. Ronald Britton engineered this successful event in her usual efficient way. The patrons and faculty contributed enthusiastically also. This was cur biggest event of the year.

In April, Rev. Harry Y. Gamble, our guest speaker was called out of town, and was unable to be with us. The Girl Scout Troop with Mrs. Everett Morton, leader and

sponsored by our unit, was recognized. A skit was presented and refreshments served. Your FTA organized and staffed the first polio clinic on April 26; 272 inoculations were given, collecting \$195.00. Mrs. Rawley Turner, chairman, with the assistance of Miss Brown did a very efficient job. The second polio clinic was held on the 23rd of May with 199 inoculations given and \$156.00 collected. Mrs. M. D. Vaughn, treasurer, was our representative at the District meeting held in Cloverdale on the same date.

During the year all Central Council meetings were attended except two. Your president, vice president, principal and others attended the school board meeting held at Grandin Court School regarding "excessive spending on frills." Throughout the year your PTA unit has helped to supervise pupils attendance at plays and musical events, furnished transportation when necessary, worked the insurance for pupils, organized and staffed the pre-school clinic, supported the Needlework Guild and supported the Sgt. Cooper Memorial Fund to send two boys to Safety Patrol Camp. The room mothers, with Mrs. Herbert Kurshan, chairman, gave several parties for the pupils.

Your PTA neeted \$627.95 from the carnival and \$154.53 from the rummage sale; alloted \$499.53 to be spent for two blackout curtains, 30 youth dictionaries and \$100.00 for library books. It has met all of its obligations both financial and otherwise.

In May your president appointed a six member committee to represent our area on the Citizens Advisory Committee for a proposed bond issue. Our year's work will be completed on May 31 with a music Festival at 7:30 p.m. Mrs. Settlemire will present the girls chorus and Mr. Robt. Griffey, the orchestra. On June 5 there will be an officer-teacher luncheon at the Candlelight Club.

For the first time there will be a graduating exercise for the two sixth grades A pleasant surprise awaits you so please support the children with your presence by being with us that night.

I feel we have had a good and fruitful year. I have enjoyed working with you all. The staff has been tops in their enthusiastic support and the cheerful and willing help of our Miss Brown, the splendid cooperation of each patron, teacher and Mrs. Weaver has made the work much lighter and the time has flown. I cannot close this without a word of praise too, for the fine spirit shown all of us by our cafeteria staff and our faithful custodial staff.

Thank you for the opportunity of serving as your presiding officer and I am sincere in saying that I am looking forward to again working with you through another year. This year has truly been a rewarding one.

### Historian

THE DUTY of the historian is to compile and keep a record of the activities and achievements of the association and to make historical facts available on request to officers and chairmen—local, council, district, region, and state.


These are the chief responsibilities of the historian:

- 1. To act as custodian for all records and other materials pertinent to the history of the association. It is especially important that early records be kept intact. The following details should appear in a permanent record:
  - a. Name of association, date and place of organization.
  - b. Names of organizers, with photographs if possible.
  - c. Bylaws adopted at the first meeting.
  - d. List of first officers and committee chairmen.
  - e. List of special activities carried on during the early years.
- 2. To compile and keep a record of current association events and activities, to be presented in the form of an annual history. These details should be included:
  - a. Names of officers, chairmen of committees, and delegates.
  - b. Program and study group outlines.
  - c. Activities and projects carried on during the year.

- d. Special business activities, such as amendments to bylaws and creation of new committees.
- e. Social and entertainment affairs of importance.
- f. Annual budget.
