NEW PARTNERSHIPS ANNOUNCED

Roanoke City Public Schools are pleased to announce the establishment of three new school-community partnerships.

West End United Methodist Church has formed a partnership with Hurt Park Elementary to assist in tutoring students in reading and math skills.

Dominion Business Schools has joined with Addison Junior High School to concentrate on tutoring students in reading and math skills, providing assistance as needed for the Career Awareness Unit, conducting an essay contest for Black History Month and participating in the Lucy Addison Day Program.

C & P Telephone will present a series of seminars, titled Choices, to ninth graders at Breckinridge, Addison and Jackson. The program is designed to demonstrate how business, education, community, and individual resources can be utilized in a cooperative venture to convey to students the relevance of education in preparation for adult life.

BUSINESS PARTNERS HONORED AT ANNUAL CHAMBER DINNER

Roanoke City Public Schools honored four Roanoke City businesses at the Roanoke Valley Chamber of Commerce's annual dinner meeting on January 5.

The businesses were presented with plaques for their support of public education through their school-business partnerships.

The four partnerships are: Central Fidelity Bank with Jackson Junior High School; IBM Corporation with Lincoln Terrace Elementary School; Dominion Business School Inc. with Addison Junior High School; and Arby's Restaurants with Preston Park Elementary School.

Partnerships are based on a mutually beneficial exchange of resources between the business and the school.

Business involvement and cooperation in public education endeavors is vital to the economic and social stability of the Roanoke Valley and the school system's goal

of providing quality education for our youngsters.

FOREST PARK TESTS HOMEWORK HELPLINE

Forest Park Elementary School students and their parents are being encouraged to take advantage of The Homework Helpline.

By providing this homework-by-telephone assistance, the teacher-volunteers hope to assist students in building good study habits and to increase their desire for learning. The volunteers won't give out a direct answer to a homework question. But instead will guide the student to the solution to the problem.

In addition, the telephone service is being used to refer parents and students to free neighborhood tutoring.

The phones lines are staffed 4:30 p.m. to 7 p.m. Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. Helpline phone numbers are 981-2285 and 981-2343.

NEW PROGRAM BUILDS MATH SKILLS

The FARM, a hands-on, manipulative-based math program is an exciting, relatively new program for kindergartners and first grade students.

The curriculum gives students experience in receiving information through all their senses by being actively involved.

The activities provide students with practice using objects in ways which will lead to the understanding of mathematical skills such as place value, decimals, multiplication and division, graphing, story problems, measurement, and geometry.

The FARM presents sorting and counting activities in a way that will teach needed skills from all math areas.

With the activities being manipulative-based and independent of math notation, they provide concrete models which match the abstract, numerical ones. That eliminates re-teaching time.

The presentations of the lessons for the program are unique. Each

chapter revolves around a story or poem being read aloud to the students, depicting the main character's newest dilemma and eliciting possible solutions.

The stories, involving a circus and farm theme, are written to capture student interest and enthusiasm, as well as provide an intriguing continuum among activities and math areas. Student participation with concrete models reinforces the action and decisions of the story line.

The expansion of the program to almost all kindergarten classes and a pilot program for first graders speaks to its success.

PERFORMING ARTS IN A COLORFUL SPLASH

Children ages six to 12 are invited to attend five performing arts programs to be held at Mill Mountain Theatre at Center in the Square.

The series, Rainbow Splashes, will be held on one Saturday each month through June.

Mike Seeger, a singer/musician, kicked off the series on Feb. 27 with a folk singing program.

On March 12, the Southwest Virginia Opera Society featuring Ross Rosazza performed.

The Roanoke Symphony String Quintet with conductor and pianist Victoria Bond will entertain the youngsters on April 16 with musical solos and discussion on the various musical instruments and the music itself.

On May 28, the Roanoke Ballet Theatre dancers will display their talents through performing classical and contemporary ballet.

To conclude the series, actors from the theatres production of "Cotton Patch Gospel" will perform excerpts on June 4.

Tickets for each performance are \$1. Information on the availability of the tickets can be attained by calling 342-5790.

WRITING CAN LEAD TO READING

A new program titled <u>Writing to</u>
Read is based on the premise that
kids can learn to read by first
learning to write.

Although there are 26 letters in the alphabet, the English language is based on combining 42 sounds or phonemes into words, (for example, dan and tan).

Students learning to read by this method begin to write phrases and sentences as they hear them and see them on the computer. No attempt is made to correct spelling or punctuation at this point.

As students work more and more with books, the book spelling becomes more apparent and dominating. And the students begin a self-editing process as they write.

Then, they move into the next stage of intermediate story writing, they create compound sentences and more consistency with book spelling.

In the last stage, students move into more complex, sophisticated story writing and use correct book spelling.

The program incorporates a multi-model approach using visual, auditory, and manipulative techniques as students rotate through five learning stations using language arts machines. This process provides immediate feedback as they work at the listening/computer station for reinforcement of the sound/word at the typewriter or word processor learning station.

Some teachers have modified the plan by using the HBJ Reading Series and the Writing to Read program as a supplemental technique.

ROANOKE CITY SUMMER SCHOOL

Roanoke City Public Schools are offering summer school programs at both the elementary and secondary levels. In this edition of ABC you will find a listing of the options available for your child.

PRE-SCHOOL

The division's Chapter 1 program is offering a summer program for Chapter 1 children who will be entering school in kindergarten or the first grade in the fall of 1988. Eligible children are those who are or will be five years old on or before Dec. 31 for the kindergarten level and six years old for the first grade level.

The summer program is designed to help children get ready for school. Some of the activities planned include language arts, mathematics, field trips, group experiences and show-and-tell time.

This program is offered at no charge to parents and transportation will be provided.

The program begins on June 27 and will end on July 29. Hours are from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Lunch will be served daily.

Early childhood classes will be held at the following four Chapter 1 locations:

- *Forest Park will serve Westside and Oakland.
- *Hurt Park will serve Highland Park and Lincoln Terrace.
- *Northwest will serve Preston Park and Round Hill.
- *Fallon Park will serve Morningside and Virginia Heights.

SUMMER STARS

Chapter 1 students in grades 1 - 6 can register for this free

program that will begin on June 27 and end on July 29.

The Summer Stars Program is designed to give individual attention to students who need extra help in the areas of mathematics and/or reading. Special materials and computer instruction are used to help students become better prepared for the regular school year in the Fall.

Reading and mathematics curriculum specialists and teacher aides will work with the students on a one-to-one basis as well as in small group sessions.

Roanoke City Public Schools students in grades 4 - 9 for the 1988-89 school year who are academically talented and highly motivated are invited to attend the 1988 Summer Honors Program scheduled for July 5 to Aug. 5.

Tuition for one child is \$100; \$150 for two children; and \$180 for three children. Some financial aid may be available.





We are looking forward to our trip to the Municipal Building to see our government in action. Hopefully we will observe courtroom procedures.




We would like to welcome Martha Copeland to the sixth grade at Grandin Court. Martha comes to our school from Westside Elementary.






Brian Whitaker, Derek Cunningham, and Brandon Urick (4th grade).

This brochure is designed to help parents who cannot be home with their children before and/or after school. Children left alone may have to deal with fear, boredom, loneliness, and household mishaps as well as with emergencies such as injury or fire. The success of coping in this situation depends on good preparation of parents and children through:

- Communicating—talk and listen to your child.
- Being consistent—in discipline and in expectation.
- Keeping rules simple and few—write them down and display them.
- Assigning kid-sized chores—use lists with steps involved.
- Reviewing expectations regularly.
- Showing interest and reassuring your child.
- Letting your affection show.

PARENTS MUST PRACTICE

with their children to assure that children *know* how to handle situations which include:

- Keeping a list of important emergency numbers
- Using a list of VIP numbers
- Using the key to get in
- Where to put the key
- How to report in or use a contact system when the child gets home



- Is your child fearful of being alone?

- Does your child usually make wise choices and use good judgment?
- Can your child use time wisely in your absence?
- Is your child generally dependable?
- Can your child handle self-care responsibilities appropriately in your absence?
- Have you arranged adequate support systems for your child?
- Have you organized the home structure for easy management by your child?
- Do you have an arrangement or the flexibility to get immediate attention to your child when necessary?









This booklet, <u>Summer "At Home" Learning Opportunities"</u>, is sent to you as a service by the Roanoke City Public Schools. It offers some practical suggestions on ways to keep your child's mind and body active and alert this summer.

Learning and language are natural parts of life. The activities that follow offer ways you and your child together can explore and develop these necessary keys to a successful life.

Remember, this booklet is just a starting point--let your mind and imagination soar--discover the many ways you can help your child learn and grow this summer!

WHO? You, your child, your family, your friends

WHAT? Using experiences that come your way

WHEN? Anytime

WHERE? Anywhere

WHY? Because you are your child's first and most

important teacher

HOW? Read on



READING

BE A MODEL!

- > Help your child see how important reading is in your daily life. Encourage her/him to see how much fun reading can be and to discover the world of opportunities that opens up through a love of reading.
- > READ TO your child. Children cherish time spent together. Let your child READ TO YOU. Discuss the stories you read.
- > Take your child to the LIBRARY and explore all it has to
 offer:

*Books *Tapes *Videos

*Magazines *Newspapers *Special programs


Bring home lots of things to enjoy before the next trip.

- > As a special treat, buy your child a BOOK. It doesn't have to be expensive to be treasured.
- > Share things that you read at home. Mail and recipes interest most children. As you go along, many things will occur to you.
- > Reading is a gift that no one can take away. Help your child develop a love of reading. As a life-long habit, it can bring success and pleasure.

LISTENING

BE A MODEL!

- > As often as you can, pay close attention when your child asks questions or shares something with you.
- > Set aside a special time each day, even if it is only five minutes, when you can read aloud to your child.
- > If your child asks for a favorite story to be read many times, please remember that this may be very boring to an adult but it makes children happy AND helps them become better readers.
- > Play rhyming games. See how many words you can find to rhyme with bus, car, park, or any word you choose which fits with what you are doing at the time.
- > Sing songs. Recite nursery rhymes, poems or TV jingles. Share games like "Ring-around-the Rosie" and jump-rope songs. Get your child to sing with you and to share with other children.
- > Teach your child to follow directions. Start with one thing:
 "Please take these spoons to the table." After a day or two
 add something like: "Take these spoons to the table and put
 them next to the plates." Later add a third direction.



TALKING

BE A MODEL!

- - *WHAT would YOU do if you had this happen?
 *Did you LIKE the story? Why? Why not?
 - *What is another way this story could END?
- > Listen to what your child has to say about the stories, shows and movies to know if he/she is understanding and enjoying what you are sharing. Things that are 'too grown-up', or hard to understand, can upset children.
- > Talk about things that happen around you:

 *In your home *In stores

 *In your neighborhood *In traffic

 Point out things you think are interesting. Name things like flowers, trees, and animals. Talk about what you are going to do tomorrow.
- > Ask lots of questions. Try to get your child to ask lots of questions. Answer as many questions as you can, and work with your child to find answers to questions you can't answer.



THINKING

BE A MODEL!

- > SHARE IDEAS, thoughts, and feelings with your child. Make it easy for your child to share the same with you.
- > Let your child MAKE SIMPLE CHOICES: "Do you want to: *order chocolate OR strawberry ice cream?"

*wear shorts OR jeans?"

- *spend your money for this OR that?"
- > Ask your child to HELP PLAN and take some responsibility for: *a picnic *a trip *a party *a special meal *a shopping list *mending something
- > Explain SAFETY RULES about: *swimming pool *crossing streets *strangers. Ask questions about the rules to see if child understands. Make up problems using the rules and let your child tell you what she/he would do.
- > Read SIGNS with your child, have him/her tell you what they mean: "What do you do at an EXIT?"
- > Be free with PRAISE when you approve of your child's actions or choices. Explain your reasons when you feel a situation could have been handled differently.



MATH

BE A MODEL!

- > In the kitchen, let your child help by:
 - *MEASURING, stirring, pouring for you when you cook.
 - *DIVIDING fruits, vegetables, or pies in halves, quarters..
 - *Making the RIGHT NUMBER of sandwiches.
 - *CLEANING UP afterward.
- > At the grocery store, talk about:
 *SHAPE and SIZE: "Is this box round or square, big or little?"
 - *NUMBER: "We need three yellow apples. Get them, please."
 - "What can we buy for a quarter? A dollar?" *MONEY:
 - "What costs more (or less)? An apple or a lemon?"
- > When you are walking or riding together:
 - *COUNT yellow cars, cats, street signs, anything that will interest your child.
 - *Talk about HOW LONG you think the trip will take, HOW FAR it is in blocks or miles? WHAT TIME you expect to get home.
- > Draw a CLOCK for your child with hands showing time for a favorite TV show. Mark a special day on a CALENDAR and count the days as they go by.



PLAY

BE A MODEL!

- > Being <u>outside</u> is the greatest thing about summer for most children. Make sure your child doesn't get TOO HOT, TOO TIRED, TOO MUCH SUN. All of these can make a child very fussy or ill.
- > PLAY GAMES with your child when you have time; (Explain and follow the rules):

 *Hide and Seek *Dominoes *Easy board games
- > Make it easy for your child to use some ART SUPPLIES:
 *Pencils *Paper *Crayons *Scissors *Glue *Tape.
 This gives a child "something to do" that is both calm and creative. "Making a picture" of something your child has enjoyed, wants to do, or imagines gives him/her another wonderful means of self-expression.
- > Make SIMPLE PAPER BAG PUPPETS for plays and make-believe.
- - > Toys, games and art materials need to be PUT AWAY, TOO.





What Phone Friend Is.

Phone Friend is a free program being offered by the Roanoke Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross. It is there for your children to call should they not be able to reach you. Sometimes they may need a special friend to help them through scary moments, loneliness, or to tell them what to do if the pet gets sick, or if they hear strange noises in the house.

What Phone Friend Isn't..

Phone Friend is <u>not</u> a crisis hotline, but our volunteers can quickly help your children should they call us first in an emergency. Nor is Phone Friend intended to replace YOUR instructions to YOUR children. We just want to be there when your child needs someone to talk with.

Hours of Operation..

Our hours of operation are from 2:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. We may, in the future, look toward expanding our hours of operation, but we must first be able to deliver a quality Red Cross program during the most critical time period we know of - - that is, the time from when your children are dismissed from school until the time you can come home.

Who's Answering the Phones?

Our Phone Friend telephone lines will be staffed by well-trained Red Cross volunteers who have a special interest in children and their safety. These volunteers will have ready access to all local emergency resources in case there is a problem more serious than loneliness, fright, or a need for information.

What Can Parents Do to Help?

You can support the program by sharing this information with your children, and by explaining the purpose of Phone Friend. By placing the Phone Friend sticker on the telephone, your children will always be able to call us for a listening ear. We encourage responsible use of the telephone and ask that you train your children to know what numbers to call for other emergencies, such as fire, police or rescue squad dispatchers. We also suggest that you post all emergency numbers by the telephone. For children calling outside the Roanoke area, our toll-free number is: 1-800-354-3388.


