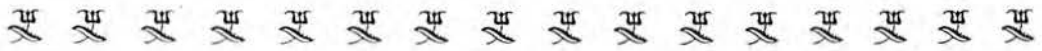

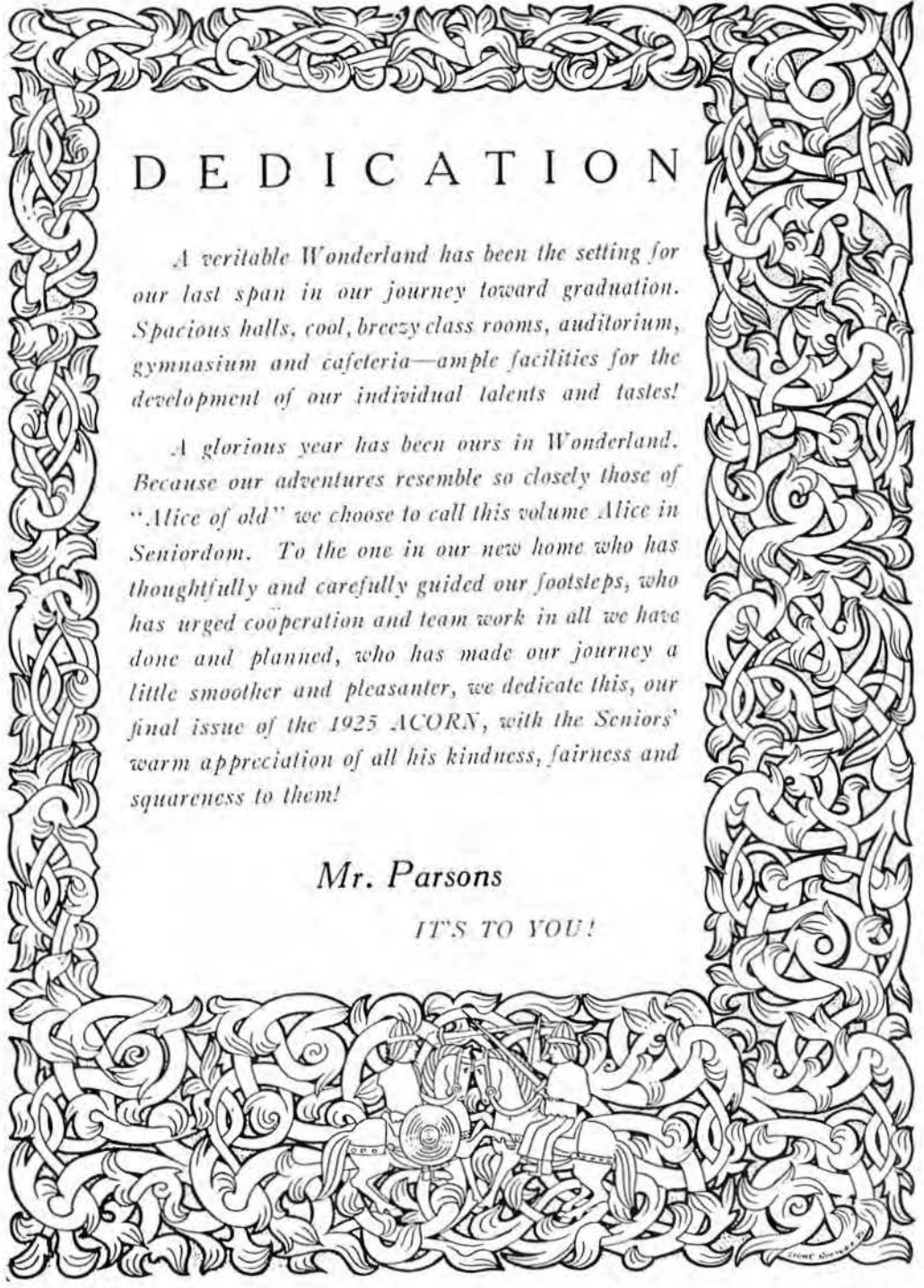
DEDICATION

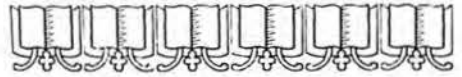

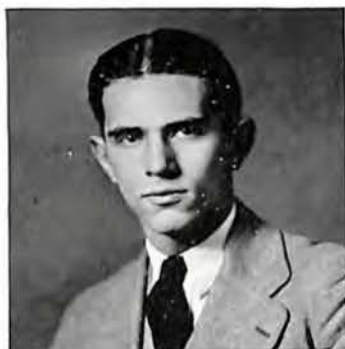

To begin student coöperation properly the Coöperative Council was organized by the school and student coöperation is now an assured thing for many years. Altogether, the year of '24-'25 has been a howling success and to the Class of '25 credit is due. A high precedent for succeeding years has been set. '25 has proved a wonderful trail breaker, and now many years of brilliant achievement and fame are in store for Jefferson Hi!

ALICE: And, therefore, I'm fresh and beautiful! Why don't you sleep more?

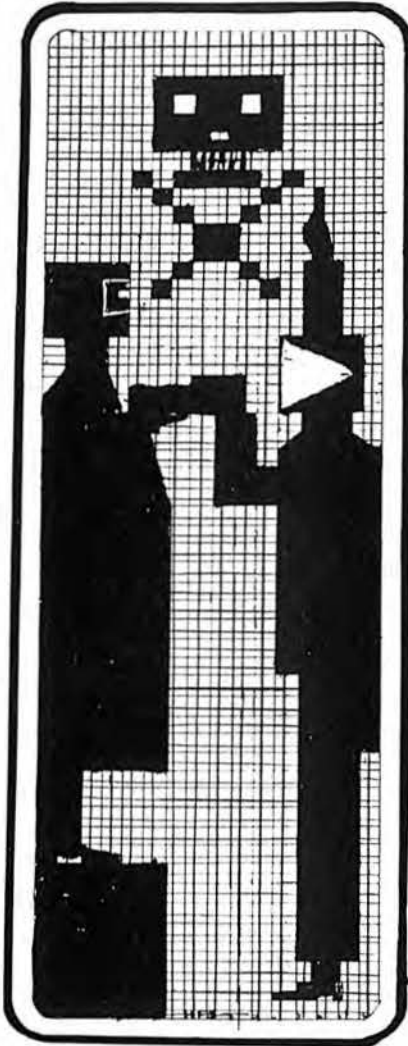
DORMOUSE (*sleepily*): Sleep, more beauty, more—that's the life!

Football

FOR the third consecutive year, Roanoke annexed the State football title when she defeated the Woodrow Wilson eleven of Portsmouth 3-0. The 1924 season marked the peak of progress so far when, by defeating Portsmouth, she won the High School Title, defeating Fishburne 33-0, she won the "Prep" School State Championship and by defeating Virginia High of Bristol 13-7, she won the High School Title of Tennessee. Bristol was the second high school to score on Roanoke in three years. Hi also defeated R. M. A. 33-0; S. M. A. 14-6; Covington Hi 48-0; Lynchburg Hi 16-0. Only one game was lost and that to V. P. I. Goblets 20-0. Roanoke scored 160 points against opponents, while only 34 were scored against her. By available records, in sixteen years, Roanoke has scored 2,301 points against 741 for opponents' scoring, and has never forfeited a game.

Eighteen were awarded letters. The Lions Club also presented them with gold footballs. Those receiving them were Day, *Captain*; Taylor, Fitzpatrick, Bailey, Hill, Wimmer, Simmons, Gilbert, Barnes, Bishop, Looney, Moore, Moody, Shickel, Marsh and Staples, *Manager*. Most of the credit for this year's winning team goes to "Tuck" Carleton, himself a football star and "grad" of Roanoke. Much to our sorrow, "Tuck" will not be with us next year.



Track

FOR the fifth consecutive year Al Stone, Jr., has been made coach of the Track Team and under his most competent tutelage the promising material at his disposal bids fair to annex their fifth successive State Championship. In Captain John Thompson, Looney, Simmons, Britts, Howbert, Ould, Shure, Sanders, Eddy, Bell and a host of others, Hi has a Track Team that should have most High Schools outpointed.

Va. Tech. Fresh. vanquished Roanoke by only 5 points while the first year men of W. & L. were pushed hard to win by a meagre point and a half. In the Bluefield College Tri-State Meet Roanoke won over all High Schools competing and came within three points of having as large a score as Bluefield College herself and will certainly hold her own at the U. of Va. Track Carnival.

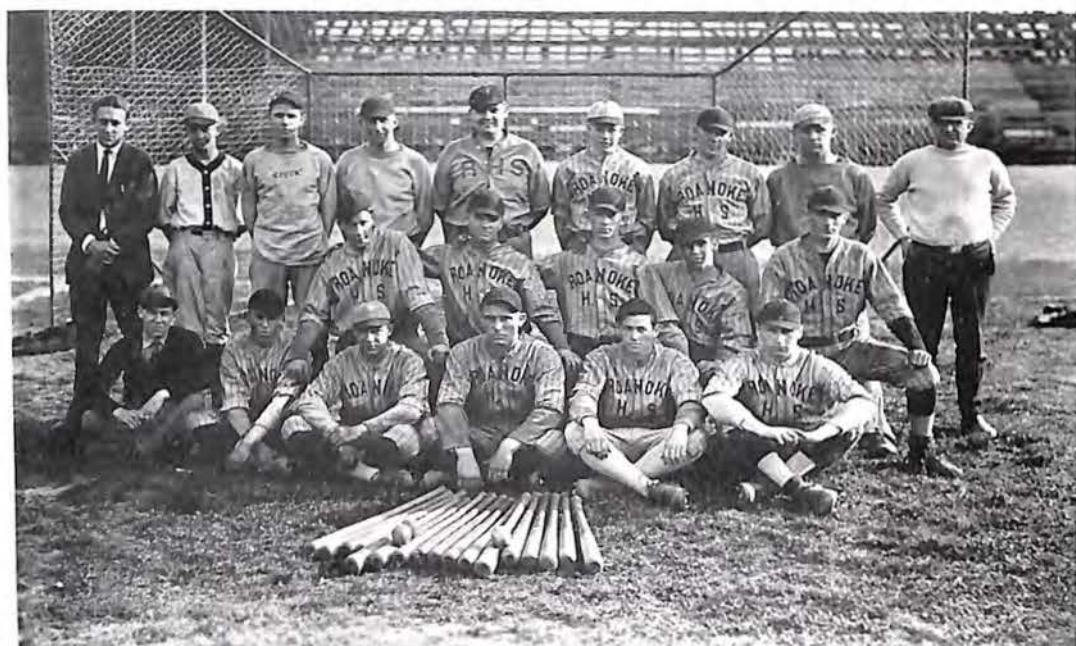
Manager Sanders' judiciously arranged schedule has helped the team greatly and he himself strengthens the team greatly as a pole vaulter and broad jump man.

Looney (*Captain*), Barnes, Gilbert, Moore, Bishop, Fitzpatrick, Rice and Marsh, *Manager*, received letters.
