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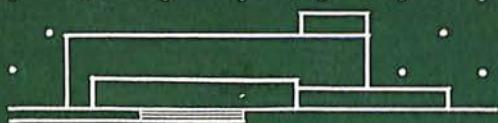

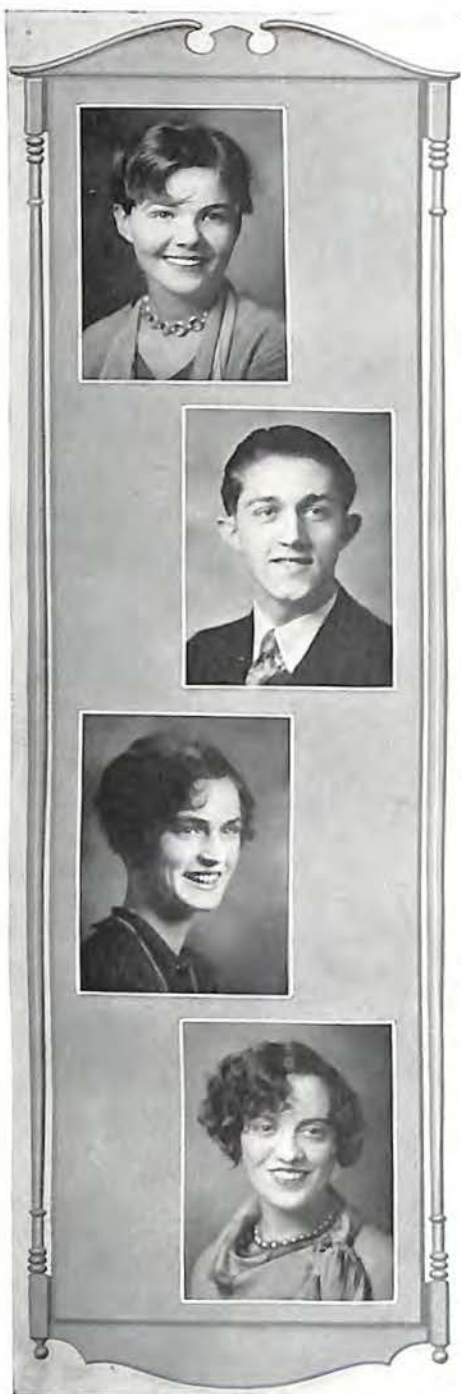

Numerous class meetings were held, at which times the business of collecting dues, selection of the class ring, and representation in various activities was carried on.



Plans for the Annual were made. Kidd's Studio was again awarded the contract for the pictures. Class dues were decided upon, and the announcements selected.

During all this time a high scholastic standing was maintained.

It is not boastful to say that each class has certain outstanding characteristics as well as marked accomplishments, and this Class was no exception. They seemed to show a paternal affection for the lower classes in guiding them onward by setting the proper example.

Student Participation in Government still remained as the most outstanding activity of the Class and the school. This Class is proud of the fact that student participation was so successful during its years in High School.

In Dramatics, certain members of the class displayed unusual talent. They were well represented in the various stage productions. Much credit is due the committee, Miss Hayward and Miss Black in selecting and directing the class play, "Nothing But the Truth." The Class anticipated an unusually successful production.

As the time grew shorter until commencement, plans for that memorable occasion were made. The Class decided to have an outside speaker, with the necessary students taking a small part in the exercise.

Through all our failures and successes, Mr. Parsons stood by us. His kind advice and supervision helped us through. The Class is deeply indebted to him for his interest and helpfulness.

At last the dream of graduation became a realization. We were to accept our diplomas with the feeling that the three years spent in High School were not in vain.

It was with a feeling of exuberance, and yet reluctance, that we thought of leaving that dear old place and the teachers who had helped us to prepare ourselves for the problems of life afterwards.

The vision faded. The objects in the room became visible to the middle-aged man seated comfortably by the now dying fire. Pleasant memories those—sleep, and dreams—.

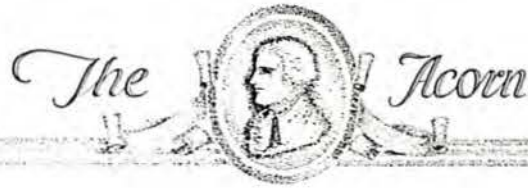
Ruth and C. K.? Their mansion looms up over the wooded hill in front.

STUDENT PARTICIPATION IN GOVERNMENT

At the beginning of the fall term of 1928, there were many minor details to be attended to before our student government system could operate on the highest degree of proficiency. The main ideas and outlines were carried over from the spring term. To us were left, as organizing work, the election of the Student Council, the election of the Sophomore members of the Prefect Council and the installation of all the officers of Student Government. These projects were speedily accomplished, the most noteworthy event being the installation of officers, which was performed before the entire student body, and which was a very impressive event, indeed.

Student Participation, like every modern accomplishment, benefited by its most excellent and swift organization, and it once settled down to a steady working plane. 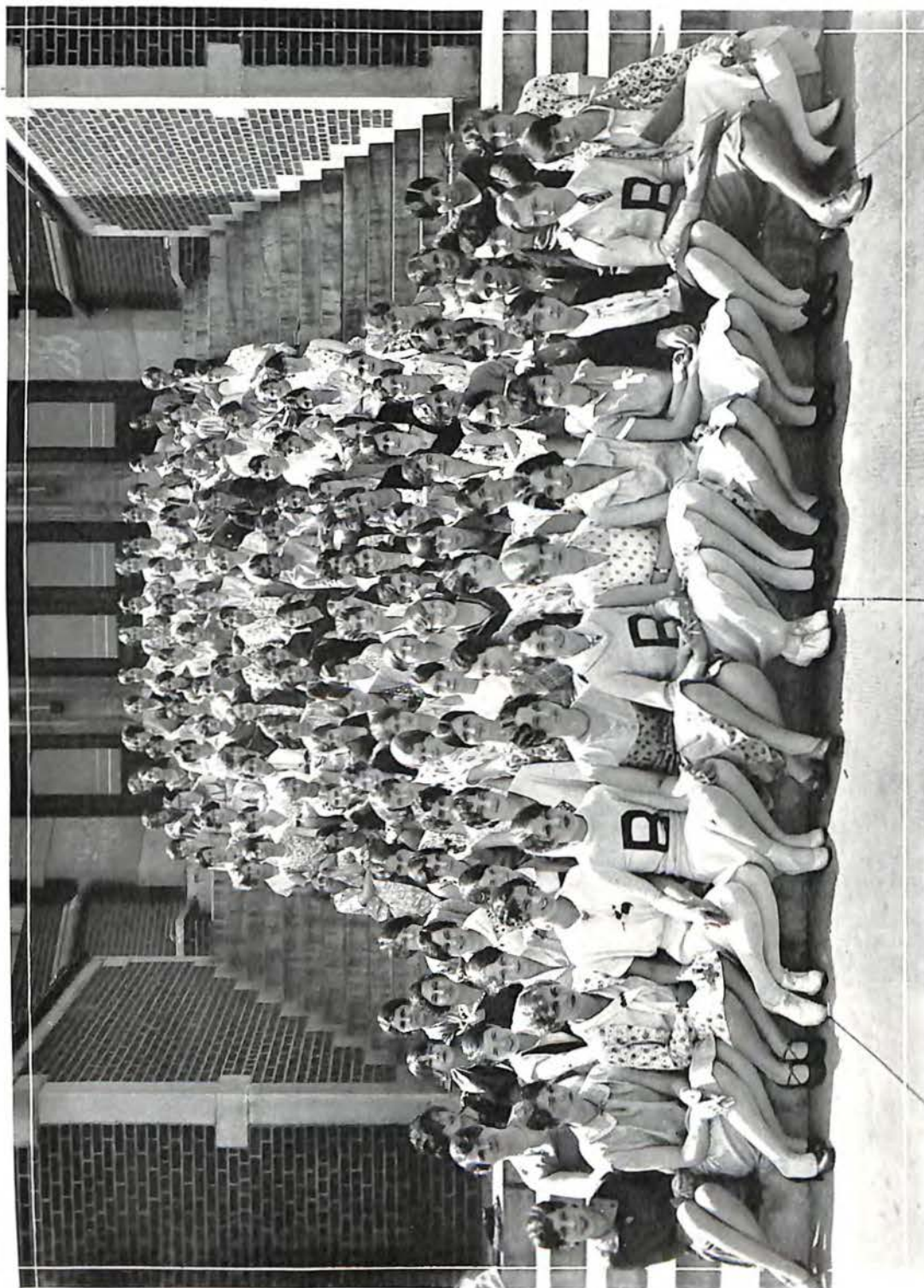

Through the production "Bab," the Club realized enough money to meet the expenses of the Club, and to send delegates to conferences both in Lynchburg and at Rockbrook.

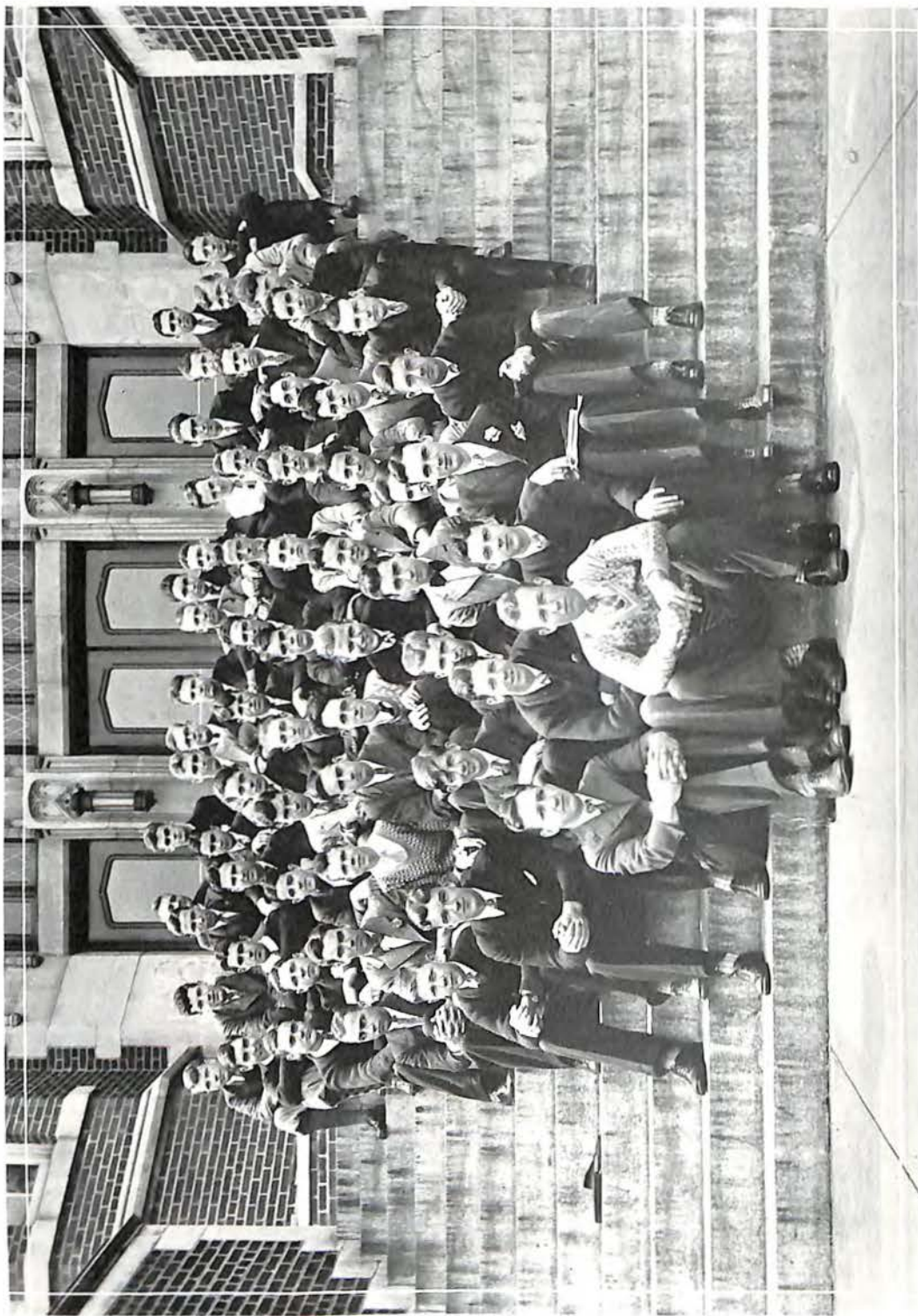

Literary society work is necessary training for any career a girl may choose.

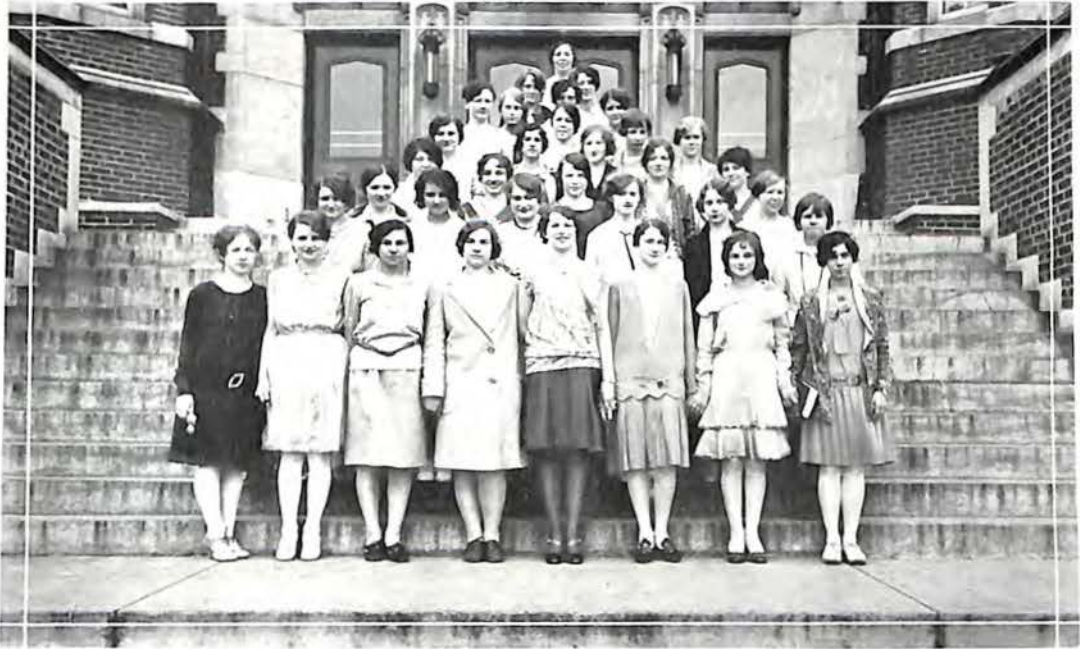

Miss Page Harrison has entered in the activities of the Club with zeal, and has helped our Club to a huge success.

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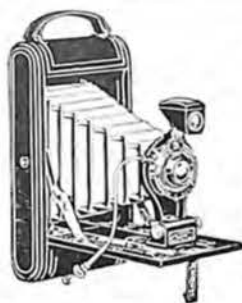
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
