My fellow-Virginians of the Class of 1936 of the Jefferson Senior High School:

You have followed a natural impulse in devoting this issue of your magasine to "achievement". Like your football team in the weeks that precede your great game, you have been in training. The contest is about to start; you want to win.

You will define achievement, of course, ere you seek it, and you will clarify that definition every year of your lives. In the end, I think, you will find that real achievement does not consist in making a living but in finding a way of living. That means the employment of your aptitudes and the development of your finest interests to the maximum in the circumstances of your individual life. Count Keyserling told me once that he thought one must start out by recognizing the things one could not change. "They constitute," said he, "ninety per cent. of the conditions of life; yet within the scope of the things we can change, there is infinite opportunity, just as, in the marrow range of sound covered by the twenty-siz letters of the alphabet, there is gibberish—and Shakespeare." I think he was right, but I am sure you can find happiness and soul-satisfying achievement within the realm where each of you has—we know not why—some special ability. Seek that way of living. The raking of money and the winning of fame ought to be nothing more than the by-products of doing the things in which one is interested.

You cannot get to the top of Mill Mountain at a single leap, but you will not fail to get there if step follows step. Do not be disheartened because, when you start, the first step seems short and progress is slow. Great apportunities will some, but only because you have made the most of the small apportunities. The person who soclects the leaser apportunity, waiting for the larger, nower has it; he who does a small job to the best of his ability devolops the ability to do a larger job.

You belong, I believe, to as fine a generation as Virginia ever has preduced. The difficulties that you encounter, though real and sombre, are small compared with those your grandfathers overcame after the war between the states. Like mist on the Blue Ridge, those difficulties will disappear in the sumlight of honest effort. Make the effort—and leave the rest to God and time!




The Jefferson Sophomore Class, 1935-36

Representing a greater number of students than either the Junior or Senior Classes at Jefferson this year is the last of the Sophomore Classes.





Jefferson Student Government

In 1928 the faculty and student body of Jefferson united to organize a Student Government which consists of a Prefect and a Student Council. The purpose of student participation in government in Jefferson High School, as is stated by the Constitution of the organization, is to promote the idea of self-government among its members and to create in the student body a deeper sense of responsibility. In the Prefect Council are vested the legislative, executive and judicial powers of the organization while the Student Council acts as an advisory body and is a medium between the Prefect Council and the students themselves.

The work of student government at Jefferson High School is not limited to fostering a spirit of honesty and promoting better citizenship. Each year the members work upon various projects. 



The Senior Hi-Y


The chief purpose of the Hi-Y is to create, maintain and extend throughout the school and community higher standards of Christian character.

The Junior Hi-Y Club




Martha Washington Literary Society

Each girl tries to earn twelve points in a session in order to receive a monogram. 1935–36 marks just one more milestone in a successful M. W. L. S. career.



It also presented to the student body an assembly showing the types of programs given in the literary society. The programs consisted of talks, debates and musical selections by the members, with an occasional outside speaker.


The year's activity was climaxed by the selection of the literary team on which J. L. S. members secured positions as debaters, public speaker, reader and speller.



Junior World-News

(Published Daily by Students of Jefferson Hi)

On October 28, 1921, the Junior World-News came into existence with Robert Loebl as the first Editor-in-Chief.

It meets now as a class every day, and is organized as a regular paper with an editor, assistants and other representatives.

The Junior World-News offers journalistic training that cannot be derived from any other publication. Only one hour is given to collect the news and prepare it for print. All types of writing are offered, such as news stories, feature JUNIOR WORLD-NEWS STAFF

stories, headlines, and leads. This organization necessitates quick thinking and accurate interpretation of true facts. No better training can be given to the mind than newspaper work, even though it be on a small scale.

For fifteen years the Junior World-News has served first, to let the public know of the activities of high schooi; second to create a stronger "School spirit"; third, to give the students an interesting and instructive paper; and fourth, to teach interested pupils some of the fundamental principles of newspaper work.





Quill and Scroll

Ten years ago at the Iowa University, the Quill and Scroll, an international honorary society for high school journalists, was founded. The society was formed for the purpose of recognizing the talents of high school writers, and of encouraging others in the journalistic field.

In 1929, a chapter of this honorary society was formed in Jefferson Hi. The membership was based on the improved writing of members of the staffs for the school publications. One has to be a Junior or Senior, have a good scholastic record, and be dependable in character to hold membership in the society.

This year's club, which has enrolled a large number of Juniors, has among its members representatives from the four Jefferson High School publications. There are two editors from the French paper. 


The Wisehefu Club






Robert's hobby is athletics, and he spends his leisure time reading sports stories. He has brown hair and gray eyes which set many a feminine high school heart a-flutter.

THE MAGICIANS' FOOTBALL SEASON

The Magicians of Jefferson High, twentyseven strong, finishing the season of 1935, left a record that only we of high school understand. To the average person the record is the number of games lost and won, the number of points scored by their team and against their team. For him, we give the following

Jefferson High had scheduled for its 1935 season ten games, the final to be played against Hampton in Norfolk on Thanksgiving morning. Hampton canceled this encounter several days before it was to be played.

In the other nine games played, the Magicians won five and lost four, and they scored ninety-one points which was over double the fourty-two scored by their opponents. At the end of the year, when the "All-State" high school team was picked, it was learned that Floyd Davis was scheeted as first string center, and Robert Neet, John McGinnis, and Ed. Short were given honorable mention. This satisfied most all of our loyal supporters.

RADFORD FALLS IN FIRST GAME

JEFFERSON PRESSED TO DEFEAT RADFORD, 6-0

The above streamer head line was carried in the morning paper after the hot Saturday afternoon of September 21. This was the first game of the season for the Magicians, and although a larger score was expected, a win was a win no matter what the score was. The game was not at all impressive, and many a fan left disappointed because he had not seen a better brand of football played.

The coaches and players themselves noticed the difficulty, and two weeks of hard work was put forward to improve both the game and style in which it was played. On October 4, the Jeffs lined up against the Justices of John Marshall in the Capital City on a hot afternoon.

Converting the breaks of the game into touchdowns, the John Marshall lads turned back the lighter but no less scrappy Magicians 13 to 7. The Jeffs did not look even the ghost of the team that had taken to the field a few weeks before against Radford—Now they had organization—they were a team, working as one body.

Although they were out-weighed, the Jeffs put up a strong bid to go down before a stronger Richmond team. The Magicians tried 23 tosses, completing 7 for a total gain of 51 yards. The Justices tried four to complete only one for a gain of 12 yards. Jeff-crson lost only 10 yards on penalties to the 20 yards lost by Richmond. Fumbles, however, lost the game for the Roanoke boys, one of which gave the Justices a touchdown.

This game was fairly expensive, in that it cost the Magicians Bunk Gibson, their first string passer—via, the broken wrist route. On the following Saturday the Jeffs re-

On the following Saturday the Jeff's returned to home grounds to romp over the Wolverines of Andrew Lewis High, Salem, 20 to 0 in a repitition of what had happened the year before, but by a greater margin. The '34 score was 7-0.

The Magicians allowed their old rivals a net gain of only two yards, with Sam Kaplan and Willard Kiser backing up the line. Bob Blanding led the scoring attack with a pass to Neel in the opening quarter that clicked, and another pass in the last quarter to Capito that scored, however, a few minutes before, Blanding scored himself with a smashing play over right tackle.

On the following week-end a tilt scheduled with Clifton Forge was canceled, and one with William Fleming was substituted. The Jeffs took an easy 26 to 0 victory. The Fleming eleven was completely outplayed in the first half, and the Magician varsity piled up 20 points.

Coach Hurt sent in a string of reserves who scored after a hard fight, but in the latter part of the fourth quarter Fleming opened a drive down the field that rolled up three first downs and was still going strong when the final whistle stopped them on the Magicians 12-yard line. The backs were of course, outstanding, since the line had no real trouble in holding the Williamson Road boys in check.



The Magicians went into West Virginia on the following Saturday to trip the Beavers of Bluefield, 13 to 0, the Jeffs swept to their victory in the new municipal stadium. They pushed over a touchdown early in the initial period and a second, later in the final quarter to take charge of the scoring for the day and assume complete mastery of the Beavers.

Bluefield's famous running attack bogged down against the hard charging Roanoke line. The Beavers scored only two first downs with passes, and at no time did they register as much as ten vards on a rushed

On the following Friday which fell on November 1, the Magicians went to Charlott-esville to meet the Class "A" Football champs of '34, Lane High. Lane struck a tartar in its quest for another title when they bowed before the Magicians, 7 to 6 in a hard fought battle.

After a nip and tuck fight in the first quarter, the Jeffs returned in the second to launch a 45-yard drive to a touchdown with Elliott carrying the ball. A fake placementand Stiff scored the one point which later spelled victory for the Magicians.

Early in the final quarter Deane, for Lane, charged thirty yards through tackle. After the Magicians line held twice against their plunges, the Charlottesville lads took to the air for a short pass and a touchdown. Harris'

try for the extra point failed.

This game was probably the ruination of what had been one grand ball club, Earl Capito, who had been on the receiving end of so many winning passes was eliminated because of the age limit. Sam Elliott fast running back and hero of the game, was tackled off sides and cracked his knee on a bench or water bucket. This put Sam out of the Magician line-up for the rest of the season. It was not known at the time, but Sam Kaplan, the Jeffs "Field General," received a blow on the head that caused a slight concussion; this put Kaplan out of the game for the rest of the season. Floyd Davis, the Jeff's center, was also taken from the game when he was stiff-armed in the face. All in all, this really ruined the football team for the rest of the season.

Proof of this statement can be seen in the result of the Danville game on the following Saturday. Danville scored in the first quarter to beat the Magicians 7 to 6. It took the Jeffs three quarters to get started, but before they could add another touchdown to the one Neel scored in the last few minutes, the final whistle sounded.

The Magicians were scheduled to win this game. Some say they knew this and that is what caused their defeat. The real cause was

the loss of three experienced men.
The Crimson Wave of Petersburg came to Roanoke on the following Saturday, and Iefferson entertained them in a sea of mud. Petersburg was known to be strong and to have a very swift passing attack, but, in consideration of the condition of the field, little but straight football was played.

Three periods went by before Petersburg's fullback, Moss, scored. This touchdown was the result of a 59-yard march down the field.


Floyd Davis for Jefferson and Captain Boisseau of the Crimson Wave shared honors

for outstanding work.



Wright blocked a punt for Jeffer-son, and Mosely scored. The Hilltoppers outplayed their traditional foes from the start of the game, but tailed at half time, due to the alert following of the ball by the Magicians who converted two fumbles into a touchdown in the second quarter.


