


CLAUDIA IRENE ANDERSON




IRIS MILDRED BARKER




CLYDE IVAN CHAMBERS

Jefferson News

Jefferson's long felt need for a school publication that would reflect the current interests of the student body has been successfully met in the *Jefferson News*. For a number of years a class published a daily column in the local newspaper, but this did not satisfy the demand for an annal of school events prepared, read, and supported by the students.

The *Jefferson News* is a new school activity that began last fall when the first issue was published on November 12th. Since that time twenty issues, the year's quota, have been published at specific intervals. The publication of the newspaper is regularly the undertaking of the newspaper journalism class, which is open to students showing writing ability. The class meets daily, with the class hour being proportioned between journalistic study and publication of the newspaper.

From the class the staff—editor, associate editor, news editors, feature editors, columnists, sports editors, reporters—are chosen. During the year twenty other persons who have displayed ability in journalistic writing are selected from the student body. The staff acts as a "clearing house" for all news received from students, while each staff member also has as a part of his responsibility a definite

"beat" which he must "cover" weekly. In this manner an effort is made to contact every student and department at regular intervals.

Two thousand copies of the first issue of the newspaper were distributed free to the students and in the junior high schools, while a third of the school subscribed immediately thereafter. At the beginning of the spring semester a subscription drive was held and the student body reacted favorably to the publication by raising the number to over 900 weekly subscriptions. On the eleventh issue every copy was sold and the presses reprinted all extra edition to meet the demand. An average of 1,100 copies were printed each week.

The newspaper met with unexpected success at the Columbia Interscholastic Press Association at Columbia University when it took third place honors in national competition with over 2,000 other high school newspaper publications. At the time of the convention only five issues of the *Jefferson News* had been completed!

The business staffs of the two school publications, the *Jefferson News* and the *Acorn*, have been coordinated this year into one staff under the direction of a student manager of publications.

With the aid of the start already made, the *Jefferson News* will undoubtedly do bigger things next year. Plans are already underway to begin publication earlier in the year and continue them at more frequent intervals.



Jefferson Student Government

Upon entering Jefferson, all students become fellow members in a student government organization headed by the Prefect Council with the Student Council as an intermediary between the Prefect and the students. The Prefect Council has the supreme legislative, executive and judicial powers of the organization.

In addition to acting as a centralizing agent for the school by coördinating the various phases of school life, the Student Government Organization carries many projects to completion during the year. Among others were such things as organizing two new clubs for high school, the Monogram Club and a chapter of the National Honor Society, arranging for music in the cafeteria during lunch hour, and sponsoring a dance and a play. The Speech Department

The Department of Speech includes courses designed to provide a knowledge of and proficiency in public speaking, debating, oral reading, spelling, and dramatics, which includes acting and producing. This year the department has been enlarged to include special classes in each subject. These were for those who wished to specialize in a certain phase of the work. This year the debating class has presented an assembly, and sent a team to Charlottesville. The public speakers, both boy and girl, were awarded Class A championships in the State Contest. In spelling, the State Championship was won by the High School Representative.

The dramatic classes have been divided into Expression, Stagecraft and Play Production. A student is required to first take Expression. This gives him a basic knowledge of the subject. After that he advances to the Stagecraft course, where he learns such things as costuming, set designing, and the building of sets. The most advanced class is the Play Production class for it deals mostly with acting. Included in this course are voice and diction, make-up, and interpretation of the drama. In this class the students learn cuttings from plays and these are given for





a group of students, for Parents' Night, and before outside groups. Several one-act plays and a three-act play, "Lady Spitfire," were given. The Department as a whole presented several assemblies, a member of which won the best assembly trophy. One of the most outstanding presentations was the play, "Moor Born." This play was sent to Charlottesville. The climax of the year's work was a four-act play "When Knighthood Was in Flower." This was a historical play and presented excellent opportunities for the pupils to apply their knowledge in costuming, make-up, set designing, and acting. There were two casts for this production. This was to give more students a chance to test their talents.

The courses in dramatic art serve as a laboratory workshop for all students who are seriously interested in any of the theatre arts. The aim is to emphasize actual theatre practice and to assist the student in arriving at theories of acting and production through careful study and practical experience. The success of the Expression Department plays show that the aim had been completely accomplished.

This department is under the most competent direction of Miss Black, who has not only directed and produced the majority of plays and stunts at high school, but also has given the expression, stagecraft, and play production students some invaluable training.





Fleur-de-Lys

The Fleur-de-Lys Club has for many years served the purpose of binding together the many French classes into a single whole where good fellowship prevails. In line with this aim, two delightful parties were given: The first, an open house, at the Y. W. C. A.; the second, a lawn party, at the home of Frances Rosenberg. In addition, it has presented an assembly, a radio program, and a library exhibit.

1936-1937 marks another milestone in the progress of the M. W. L. S.






The Band

The Orchestra




The Season




Basket Ball



Track



Track is on the upswing! This year we won two meets, and next year . . . well, let it prove itself, and it will. Under the sympathetic and competent coaching of Mr. Craft, Mr. Hurt, and Mr. Platt, interest was aroused in sufficient quantities to cause us to really try. Despite this there has been an increasing number of boys interested in this form of running in the last two years. It has provided excellent training for the distance men on the track team, and gives an opportunity to those desiring and enjoying this form of recreation. The team this year was under the direction of Mr. Benner, vocational teacher here.

The only run of the season was an intramural event held between the halves of the Jefferson-Lynchburg football game. The two mile course contained two hills and various surfaces. The time was very good considering the course and the weather. The race was won by Harvey Pillow, with Grover Liggan and Millard Long in the place and show positions. This was almost a reversal of last year's race, in which Liggan took first and Pillow second. A loving cup is given the winner each year and his name engraved on it. An engraved medal was also given each man placing.

With this foundation, cross country should soon become popular with the students. It is hoped that next year it will be possible to schedule meets with outside teams and thus improve ours. It would make it more interesting to all concerned, and it is certain that Jefferson could make an excellent showing in this sport, judging from past performances.




