




merous civic groups.





We have an excellent athletic program beginning with football in the fall and ending with baseball and tennis in the spring.


Homecoming, dances, hops, plays and many other activities are participated in by the majority of the student body.

The combined efforts of the creative writing class, and the art department plus student contributions from the school at large made this year's **Acorn** magazines outstanding in quality.



The club organized a dramatics club which acted out various stories and presented them to the children at various homes and hospitals.



The Jefferson Choir has approximately fifty members and is under the supervision of Mr. Ronald Skeens, a newcomer to the Jefferson faculty.



At Christmas time, the band participated in out of town parades. They took part in the annual Christmas Parade in Roanoke.







Jefferson's football team didn't have a winning season this year, but the boys all developed skill by working hard and by the end of the season they had won two games and tied one.


On this year's team were a number of good juniors who will be coming back next year with high spirits to work hard and play their best for Jefferson High School.




