The football team ended the season with a 4-5-1 record. They were a little slow getting started, but once they got together, they proved to be dynamite! The Staunton game was among the best because the entire backfield scored. The kicking game was handled by the sophomores as Donnie McAllister kicked off, averaging 43 yards a kick. Punter Robert Vaden averaged 36 yards a punt, and W. D. Thacker was nine for fourteen on extra points. The team. numbering 42 players with eleven seniors, fourteen juniors and seventeen sophomores, was extremely dedicated, showing up in great numbers at practice and summer camp. Bob McClellan, sports writer for a local newspaper, spoke at the football banquet which climaxed the season. At this affair the coaches selected Paul Moock, who was an offensive and defensive standout, the most valuable player. Kent Bradley won the coaches award, Alphonso Preston was chosen unsung hero and Kent Bradley, Ike Tate and Ed Harper received tri-captain awards. First year men were given letters, second year men got letter jackets and third year players received certificates. In the Shrine Bowl game Bill Williams was selected "Outstanding Back" and Paul Moock won best defensive player. Although the season ended in November, the players continued to keep in shape by participating in a winter program. By March the guys were shaping up for next year with spring football conditioning. The football mood was catching on fast.







for championship.














Senior Officers Coordinate Senior Activities

The senior officers have done a big job, but none of it would have been possible without the cooperation that they received from their fellow class members.






