
To The Senior Class of 1949:

**CLASS HISTORY
OF '49**

In the fall of '44 and '45, two groups of promising students, full of enthusiasm and extreme ideas mounted the steps of Addison, on the road to success. These students had attended Gainsboro, Gilmer and Harrison Elementary Schools. Under the supervision of Mrs. Austin, Mrs. Thompson, Miss G. Brown, Mrs. Scott, Mr. Jones, and Mrs. Cothran we immediately were curbed and directed into the right channels.

The seniors of '49 entered Addison High with their hopes high for success in the coming years. We soon found out however, that we would have to work hard if we were to obtain our goal. This goal was to finish high school and meet the future more prepared. We were new and inexperienced when we entered high school and were regarded by the rest of the school as, "The Green Freshmen." However, we did not find our freshman year so very confusing even though we had new schedules and routine things to learn. We caught on quickly to these new ways and adapted our old ways to the new ones of our school. We were a joyous group and from the very first participated in the many events and activities of the school. Lucy Stockton turned our freshman year into an eventful one when she was crowned "Miss Homecoming."

In our sophomore year, we possessed an eager desire to rise to a higher level of education. From a selected group of talented actors and actresses, we presented a comedy, "Make Room For Rodney" sponsored by Mrs. Hazel Thompson. In this same year, we were fortunate in acquiring a new principal, Mr. H. D. Carpenter, Jr., one who has done much in the improvement of our school. James Owens joined us in the year of 1947 from Winston-Salem, North Carolina.

Here we are-Juniors. Realizing that our high school days were coming to an end, we attacked our duties efficiently and zealously. Seeing a necessity for improving better relationship between Carver and Addison, we sponsored a Mock Wedding. A member of our class, Mary Johnson, was the bride. We gave a most successful Junior-Senior Prom. The decorations were breathtaking, the music of the "Morocco Swingsters" divine. And oh what lovely dresses. In our Junior year we missed several old faces. Many of our classmates did not see the value of completing their high school education; consequently, they failed to return.

As seniors, we entered school with a new dignity befitting our classification. At this time, we became organized and elected our officers. They were: Clarence Ford, as president; Sylvester Byers, Vice president; Lillie Patterson, secretary; Bernice Randall, assistant secretary; and Junius Gaither, treasurer. We selected our class advisers. They were Mr. Toles, Mr. Spencer, Mrs. Robinson, Miss Thompson, and Miss Hackley.

The Dramatics Club presented a three-act comedy, "Wild Ginger." Ludie Saunders, a senior, played the leading role. Other seniors in the play were Maxcine Gravely, Billie Jean Gregory, Milton Page, Alfred Smith, and Clifford Spencer.

Ludie Saunders was elected President of the Student Council and Bernice Randall, Parliamentarian. Benjamin Robertson and Ludie Saunders were delegates to the State Student Council Association in Newport News. Benjamin Robertson was elected president of the N.A.A.C.P. and Maxcine Gravely, secretary. Billie Jean Gregory was crowned "Miss Homecoming."

Wanting to look over our early memoirs of our high school, we decided to publish an annual. Smiles will always come to our faces when we remember that Jack Hylton won first prize in the Health Week Contest; Mary Johnson and Lillie Patterson participated in the Oratorical contest; and Leroy Logan, Raymond Ross, Elwood Toney, Robert Brown, Lawrence Hylton, Nathaniel Fairfax, and Payton Holland served their country well.
