## CLASS HISTORY

In the fall of 1952, approximately one hundred ninety-eight exuberant and bewildered boys and girls sauntered up Park Street Hill to the new Lucy Addison High School. After a tour of the new building, midst much confusion and awe, we met our home room teachers, who have directed and guided us thus far. Many of our students selected and participated in many activities, including the choir and band.

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
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
