As Juniors, the heralds for the 1964 Class were Joyce Finney, Sonja Hall, Sharon Edwards and Patricia Jones. We were very honored when Diane Carter won the title of Miss Homecoming. Our class officers were: President, Thornton Smith; Vice-President, Charles Hurt; Secretary, Bettye Holland; Assistant Secretary, Carol Brown; Treasurer, Lois Dooley; Chaplains, William Terry and Narcissus Miller. After working hard for two years Toni Divers, Sonja Hall, Brenda Jones, Lois Dooley, Rebecca Brandon, Mary Crenshaw, William Welcher, Joyce Bolden, Patricia Randolph, Gwendolyn Brown, Sandra Johnson, Bettye Holland, Mary Powell, Carol Brown and Mary Roseborough were inducted into the National Honor Society. We were very proud when Sonja Hall was elected secretary of the state S. P. A. We had several juniors, become officers in the S. P. A., President, Jerry Thornhill; Vice President, Sonja Hall. Sharon Edwards, Cordelia Boland, Barbara McClarrin and Diane Word placed in the Science Fair.

The Junior-Senior Prom with the theme "These Precious Moments" was a great

success. The preparations were wonderfully carried out by Carol Brown, Christopher Stewart, Billie Bumpers, Rita Petty, Joyce Finney, Bettye Holland, Johnella Terry, William Welcher, Frances Reeves, James Hurt, Carolyn Toney, Ikey Ogden, William Terry, Narcissus Miller, Brenda Robinson, and Delores Ferguson.

Finally the glorious day arrived when we were seniors. We carefully elected our officers: President, William Terry; Vice-President, Narcissus Miller; Secretaries, Diane Word and Patricia Jones; Treasurer, Lois Dooley; Chaplain, Jimmie Rhodes. Lois Dooley was selected as "Miss Addison". Carolyn Toney was crowned "Miss Homecoming" and Johnella Terry was a runner-up. Sonja Hall won the Voice of Democracy contest and Sharon Edwards won third prize. Richard Turner was voted all Western Defensive tackle. William Terry was voted all-District Quarterback. Jimmie Rhodes and William Terry were Co-Captains of the football team.

Class Prophecy

The look of success mirrored on his face is bolstered by the \$50,000 check Gwendolyn Brown, president of the National Teachers of America, turned over to him an hour ago at a luncheon attended by such educational luminaries as Alvin Thompson, Robert Walker, Richard Carter, George Williams, Raymond Banks, Rufus White, George Gates, Marilyn Dudley, William Terry, Freddie Mills, Samuel Terry, Willie Mae Couser, Rita Petty, Rebecca Brandon, Carol Brown and Kathryn Jumper.
