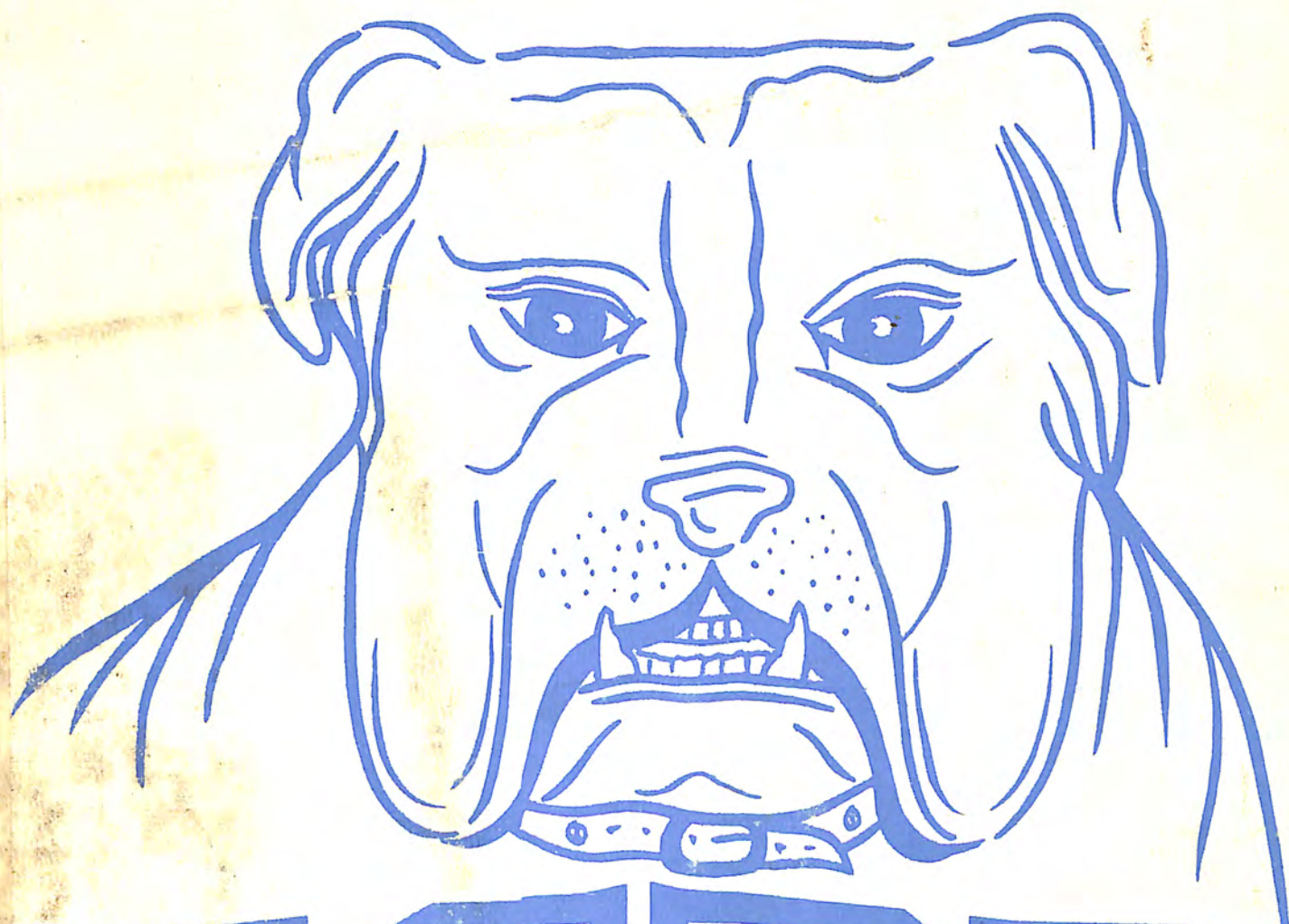

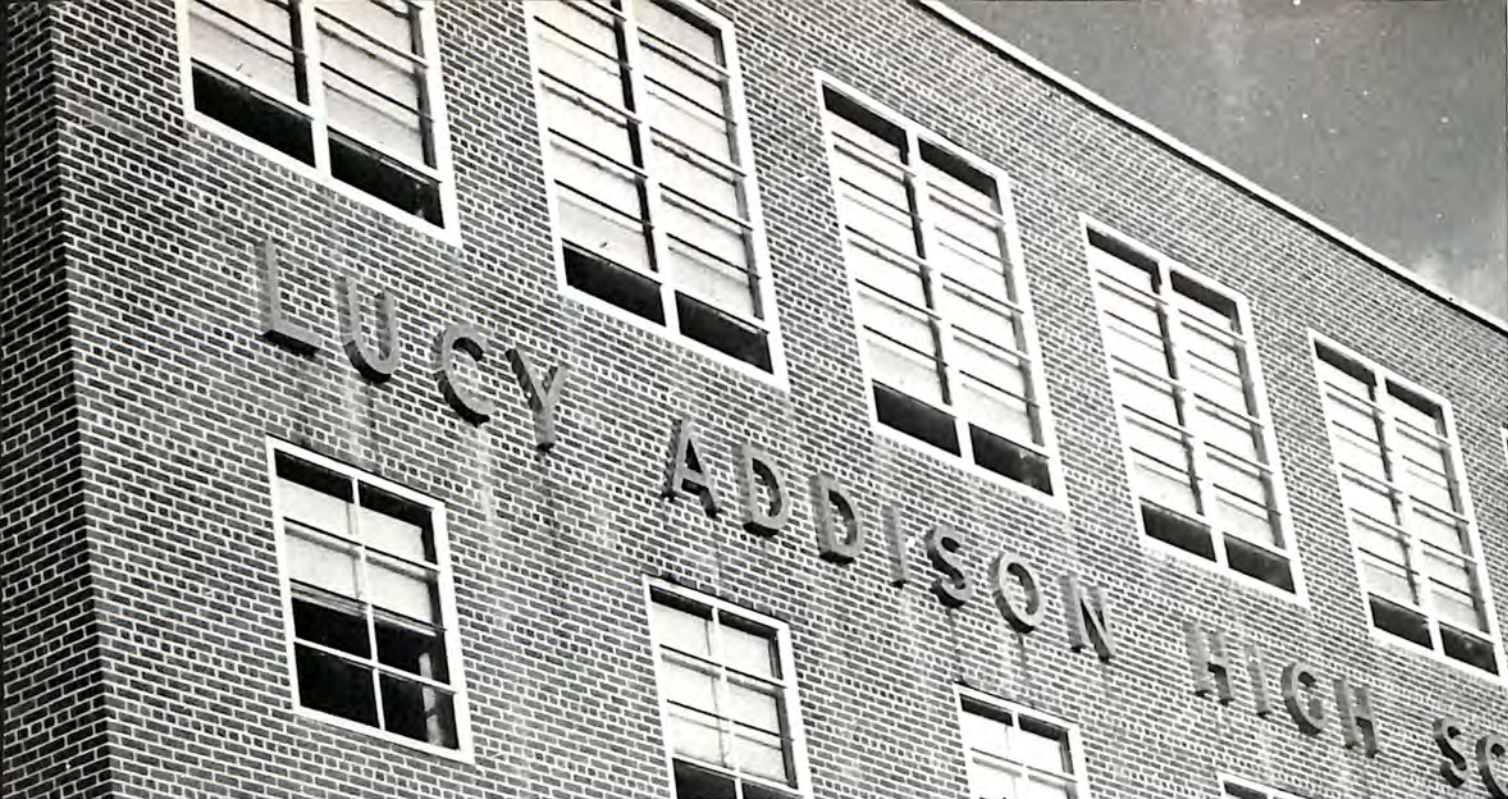

During the first two decades of this century, the name of Miss Lucy Addison was a legend in Roanoke. In addition to the recognized and respected place in the community as an educator, many parents or their children had been pupils of this able teacher.

Miss Addison was born in the small community of Upperville, Virginia, on December 8, 1861. She had to get up at 4 a.m., catch a ferry and do part-time work after school in order to keep up her attendance.

She graduated from Cheyney Teacher's College in Pennsylvania, which at that time was a private Quaker School.

The year 1898 saw a new school being built in Roanoke. This school was named the Fifth Ward School or Gainsboro as it was later called. Miss Addison became the assistant principal under R. E. Harth. In 1916 Harrison School was built. Addison High School had its start in Harrison School, September, 1918, by offering one year of high school work. In 1924 the high school was accredited by the State. Miss Addison retired from the Roanoke School System on October 20, 1927. In September 1928 the new high school was opened with an enrollment of 571 pupils and 25 teachers. The present Booker T. Washington Junior High School was the first Addison High.

The reason Miss Addison was honored is recorded in the school boards records. It is as follows: "Miss Addison has the distinction of having taught in the Roanoke School System longer than any other teacher, and who as principal of Harrison School, organized and developed the high school." Lucy Addison High School was named for this pioneer teacher. She died in 1937 in Washington, D. C.

Addison has progressed to the extent that it now has become a potent factor in developing worthwhile citizens whose influence is evidenced in the economic, social and cultural life of the community.

He attended Virginia State College for four years, Hampton Institute for a summer, University of Virginia for several courses, and received his Masters Degree from Radford College.

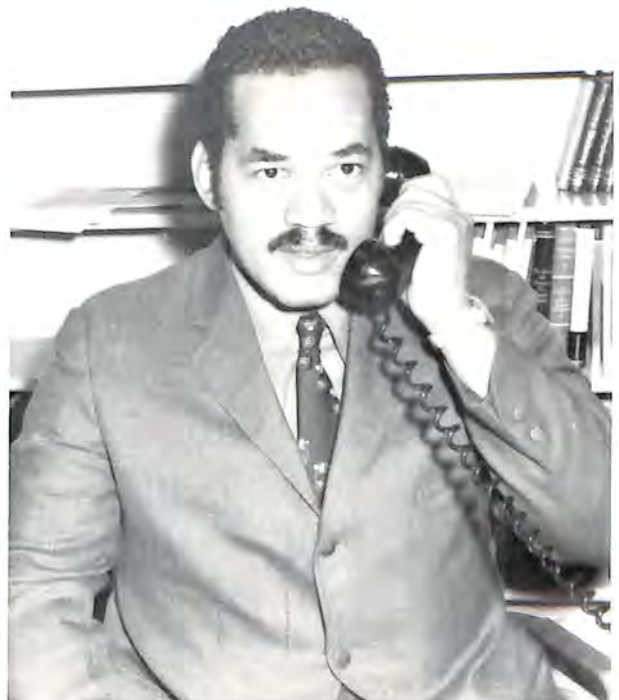

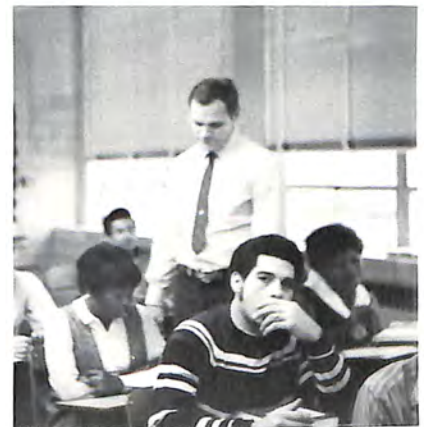

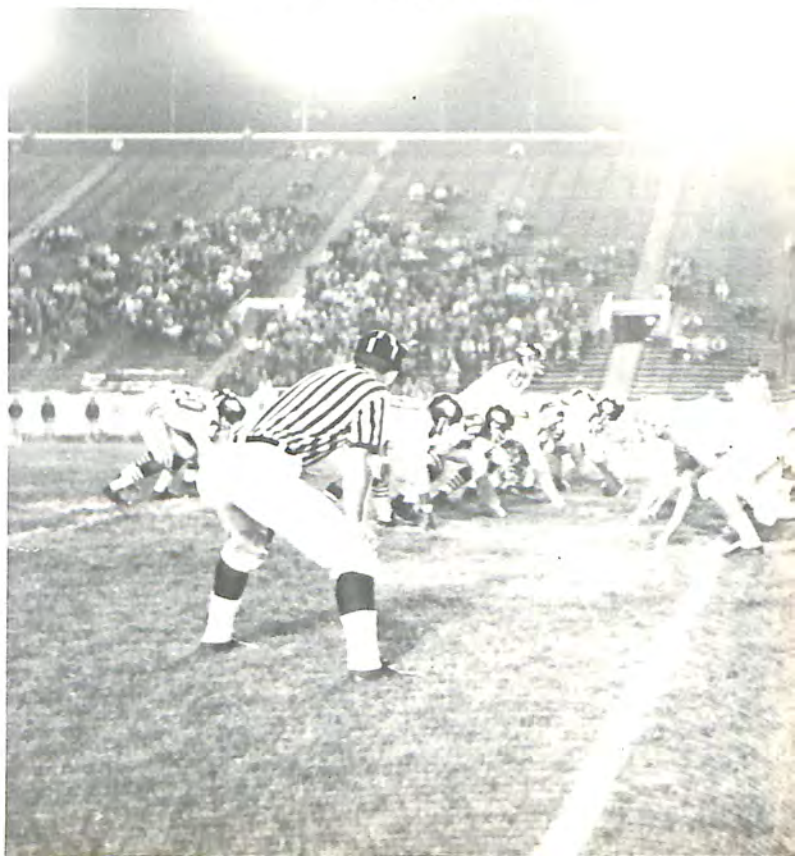
The Mighty Bulldogs of 1971
