### FAREWELL ADDRESS OF THE CLASS OF 1937

Friends and Fellow Classmates:

In the fall of 1933 the present Senior Class entered William Fleming as the first Freshman Class in the history of the school. At that time we were a group of ninety, but we have since decreased to the number of forty. The process of meeting new friends and entering into a new field of learning seemed vague to us, but we managed to go merrily on our way. During that first year we presented a three-act play, "Mrs. Tubbs of Shantytown", and the proceeds were given to the athletic fund.

In the fall of 1934, we came together again with practically the same enrollment, and the road to knowledge seemed smoother to us. We had the honor of being the first class to have a party in the auditorium. (Incidentally, we do not think our conduct deprived other classes of the same privilege.)

Fifty-four Juniors gathered in September of 1935 to form one of the most outstanding classes of Fleming. We remember Ira Peters as our class president and Charles Harris as "The Pampered Darling" (in the one-act play of that title given by the class and directed by our sponsor, Miss Elise Barnes.)

The ship of the Junior class, having set sail in September, docked for the Junior-Senior in the high school auditorium, May twenty-third. The deck was crowded with Senior mates, Commander Nininger, Faculty skippers, and Junior sailor boys and girls. Silver anchors and ships decorated the windows and vine-covered walls. During the evening the ship's "Log" was presented. The evening ended with Seniors and Juniors singing "Shipmates Forever" as we sailed happily away upon new voyages, graduation and Senior-hood.

In September, 1936, Charles Harris was chosen to lead the Senior Class through the best year of its school life, with Charles Crouch, Janie Pedigo, and Christine Saul as helpers. Miss Barnes was again elected our sponsor

Our class is very proud of the accomplishments we have to our credit. Ours is the first to complete a four-year course at William Fleming and the largest class to be graduated from this school.

We have seen the newspaper, "Colonel", begin its life successfully with outstanding Seniors on its staff and we have the pleasure of being the first class to edit the Senior issue of the COLONEL as our annual.

We have seen the school building enlarged and new courses added to the curriculum

Louise Gay, Katherine Moore, Lois Webb, Ralph Bowles, Charles Crouch and Carl Payne have made such outstanding records in athletics that their records will remain long after their graduation.

As we Seniors set sail together on greater seas we proudly point to the "log" of our high school days and commend it to you as an inspiration for your successful voyages.



THE COLONEL



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


### Football

- Sept. 1, 1936—Coach S. P. "Pete" Brewbaker started his long and patient task of fitting a football team for William Fleming High School. The first few weeks were very hard, with long workouts and a few plays which were gradually increased in order to be whipped in shape by the first game.
- Sept. 25—The first game with Bedford was a struggle between two teams of equal strength. The ball surged back and forth in midfield. Neither team threatened to score, and the game finally ended with a scoreless tie.
- Oct. 2—The Colonels left for their second battle at Radford. The team showed an improvement against its second opponent, but was offset by inexperience and lack of weight. At the end of the final quarter the score read 21 to 0 in favor of Radford.
- Oct. 17—The Colonels were a downcast crowd of boys on this day because of the loss of their quarter-back and co-captain, Harold Bower, ineligible because of the age limit. The team showed scrap under the leadership of Spencer, holding the favored Vinton crew to a scoreless tie.
- Oct. 9—The squad journeyed to Pearisburg on this date. This game was the scene of a fierce struggle, with both teams fighting courageously to a final 0-0 score.
- Oct. 23—This contest with the Jefferson Jrs. broke the scoreless "jinx" when Spencer made the first touchdown, to which Bowles added the extra point. Jefferson made a counter but missed the extra try, leaving the score 7-6 in favor of Fleming.
- Oct. 30—The Pulaski team was host for the Colonels. The Colonels, outnumbered in pounds, fought bravely, but lost to their opponents 32-6. Spencer made the lone touchdown of the game for the home team, but was injured. Harris replaced him.
- Nov. 6. The Colonels also met another heavy team when they were the scoreless victims of the Low Moor team. Harris got off several good punts but the game ended 26-0.
- Nov. 20—The last gridiron struggle was with Blacksburg. The team improved greatly during the season but lost the final game despite the touchdown made by Oxley, who had a very good pass-receiving record for the season. The score was 20-6.

The Colonels were led through their 1936 season by Captain Charles Crouch on the field, and Coach Brewbaker on the sidelines. Coach Brewbaker, although losing several of his first-string men, had a very successful season. Crouch was one of the most outstanding players of the team and finished his third year of football in high school.






### Girls' Basketball

Junior Varsity competition in the county meet revealed promising material for future track teams at the school.


While track events for girls are limited to the less strenuous events, much interest was developed for the county meet, which was decisively won by the Fleming girls.

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




