



"Cæsar, thou art powerful yet" also applies to those murdered, who in the year of 1944 give strength and inspiration to the entire world. It was Lincoln who said, "That we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain . . . that government of the people, by the people and for the people shall not perish from the earth."


Freedom of Speech


The Nazis and their kind abhor the word "freedom," for to them it means fear; in action, death.


