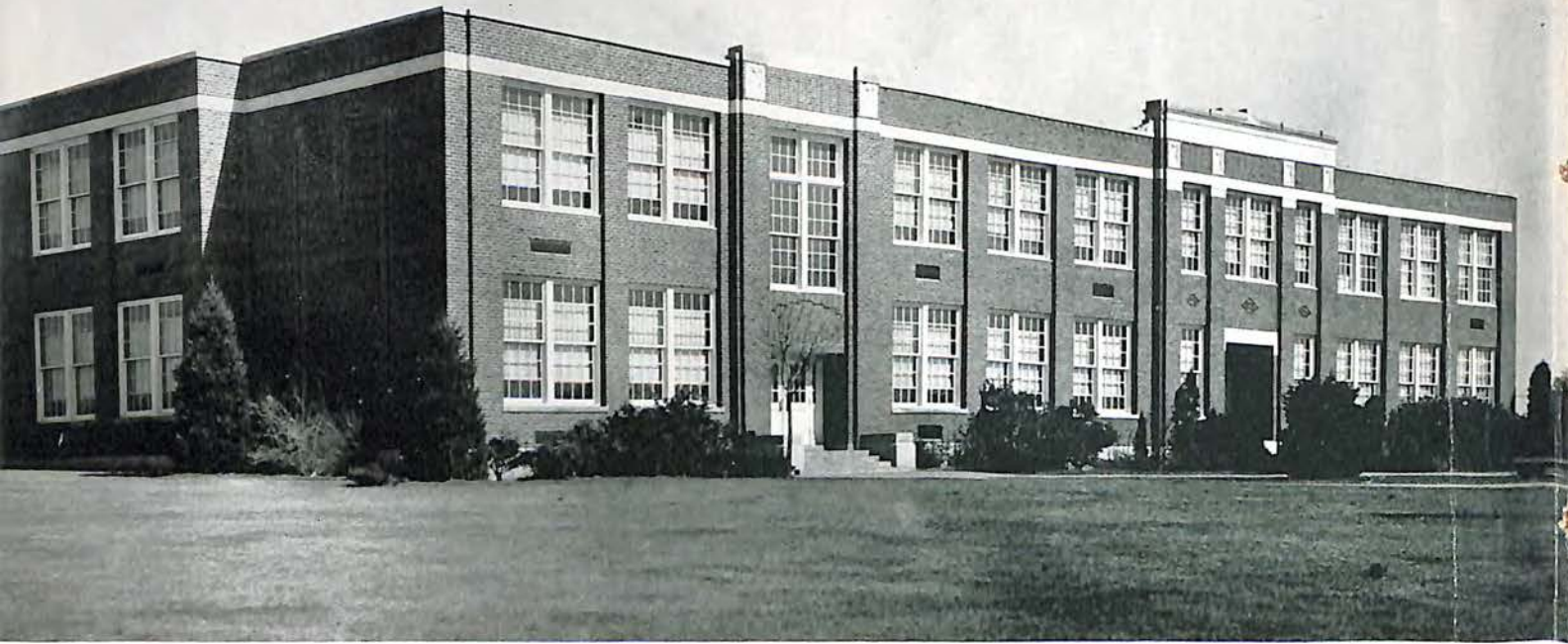

It was Lincoln who said, "That we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain . . . that government of the people, by the people and for the people shall not perish from the earth."

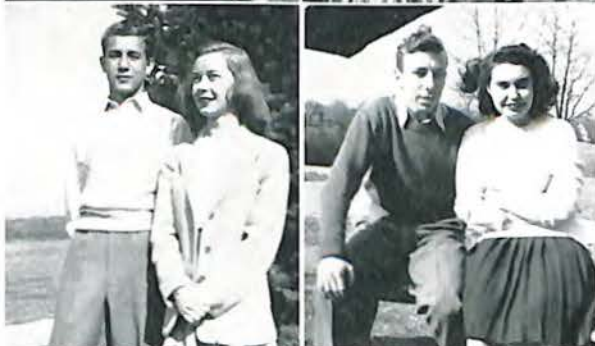

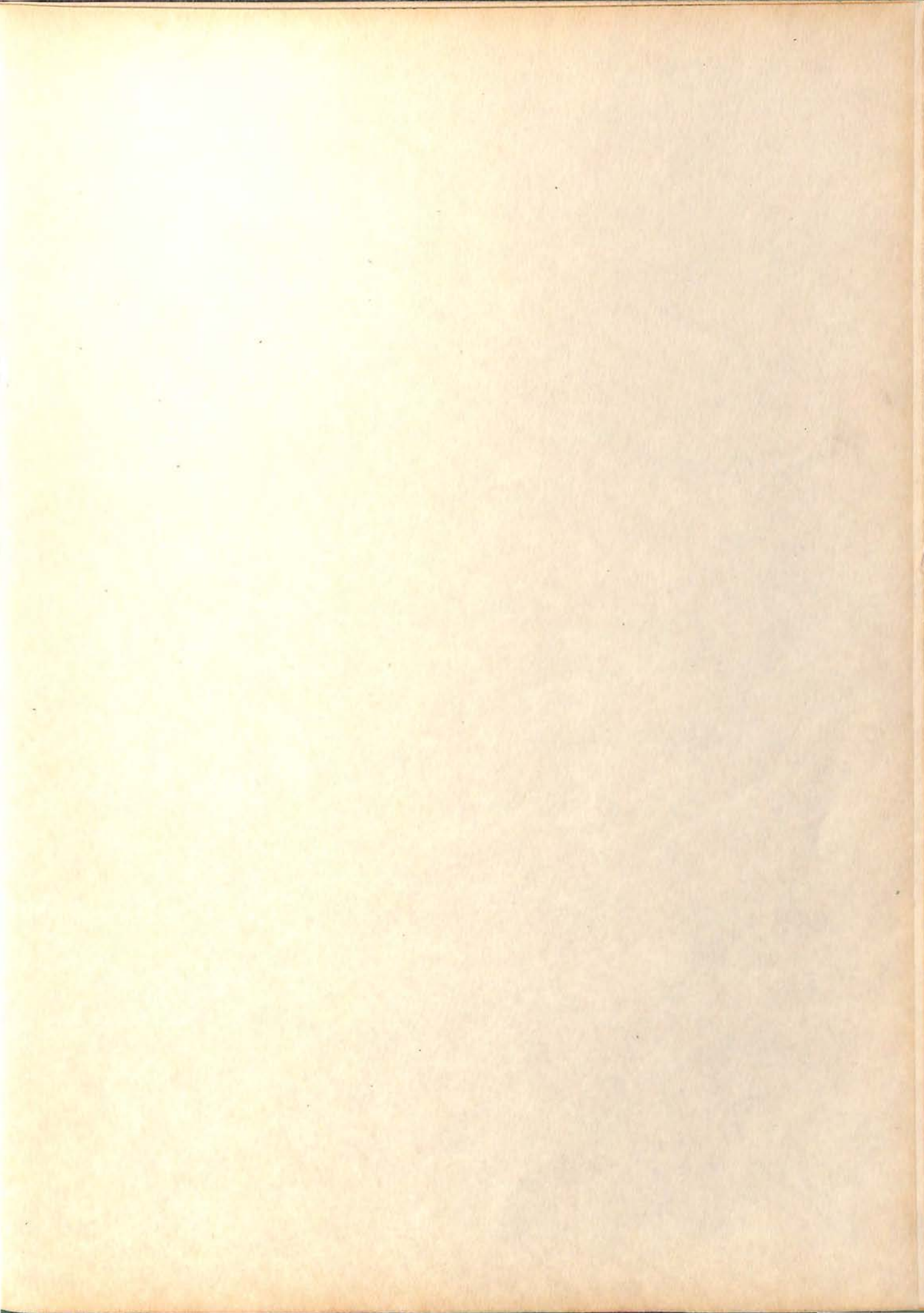
