



The purpose of this yearbook is to help you recall, many years from now, the numerous and varied experiences of your stay at Fleming.


The administration, the classes, the sports, the dramatics, the activities—they are all here.

The traditional and colorful Junior-Senior Prom climaxed the year's activities.










the boys' prose finals are held to find a reader for Fleming in this group.


The purpose of the Library Club is to broaden interest in reading and to train students who are interested in library work as a career.






## The Passing Show




