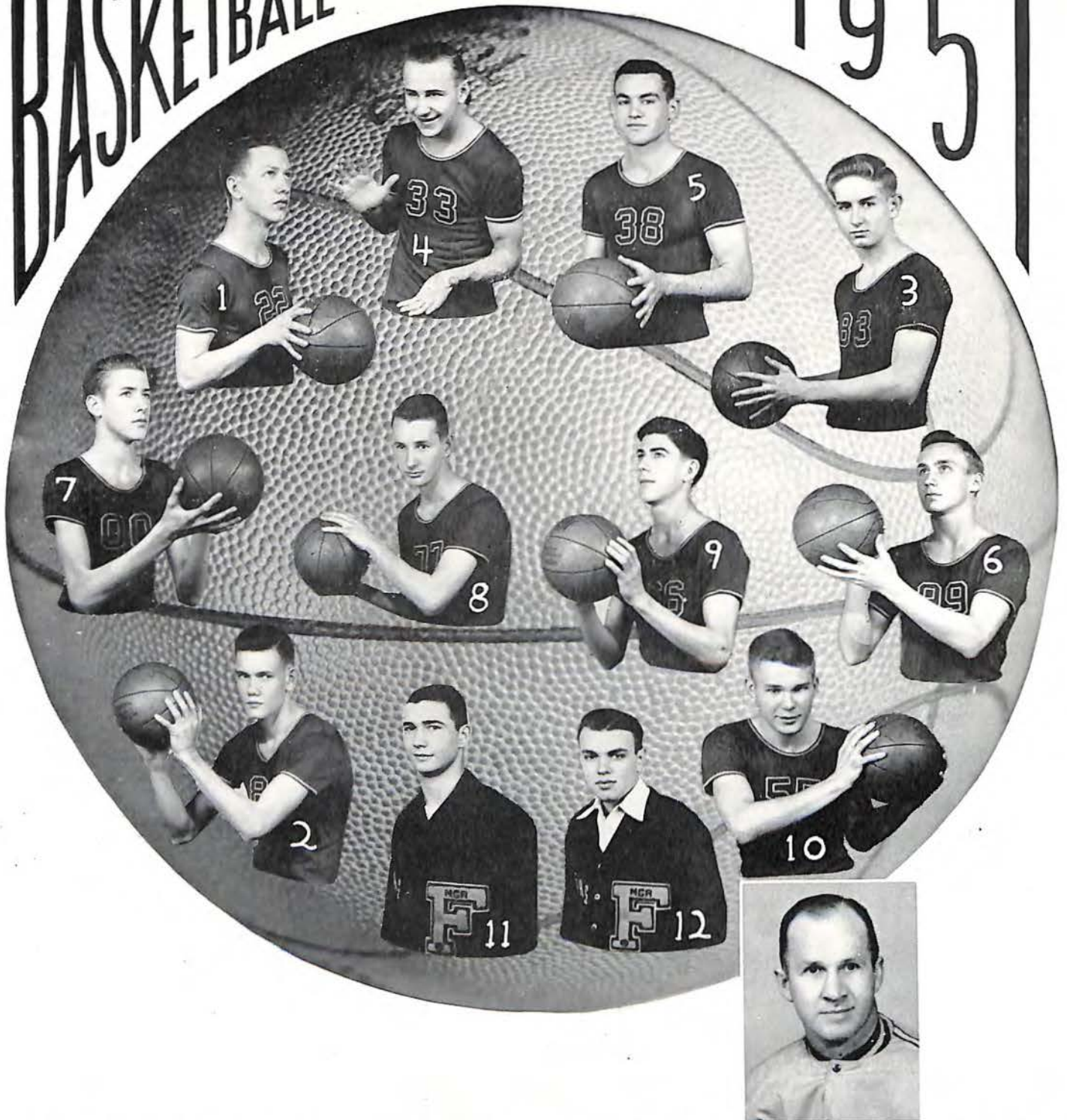

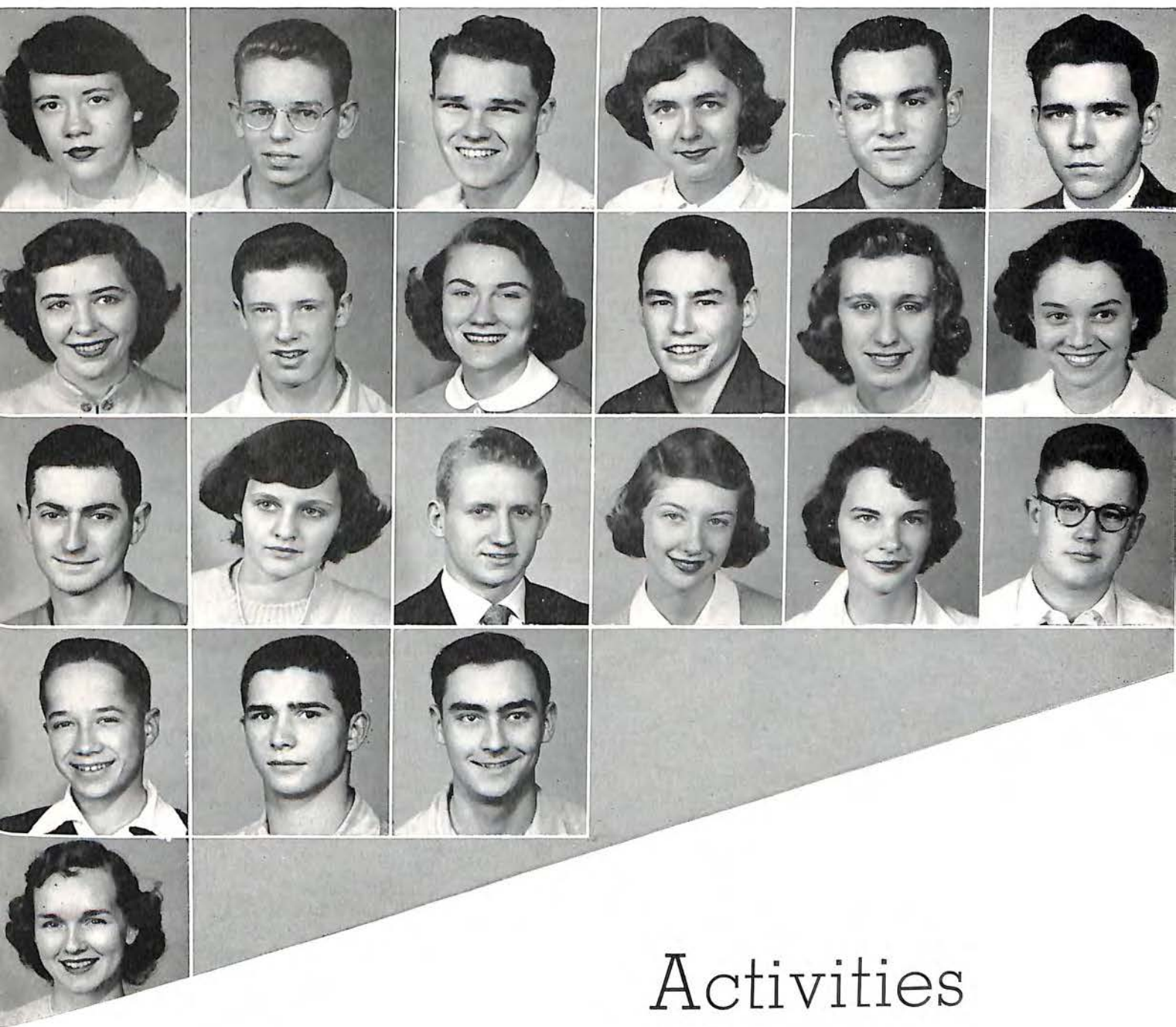

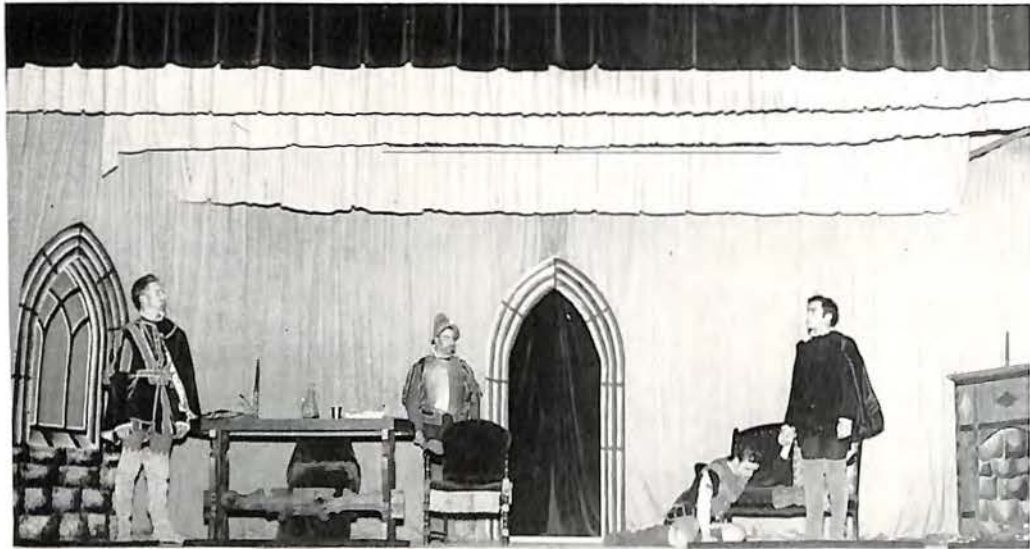

The Passing Show

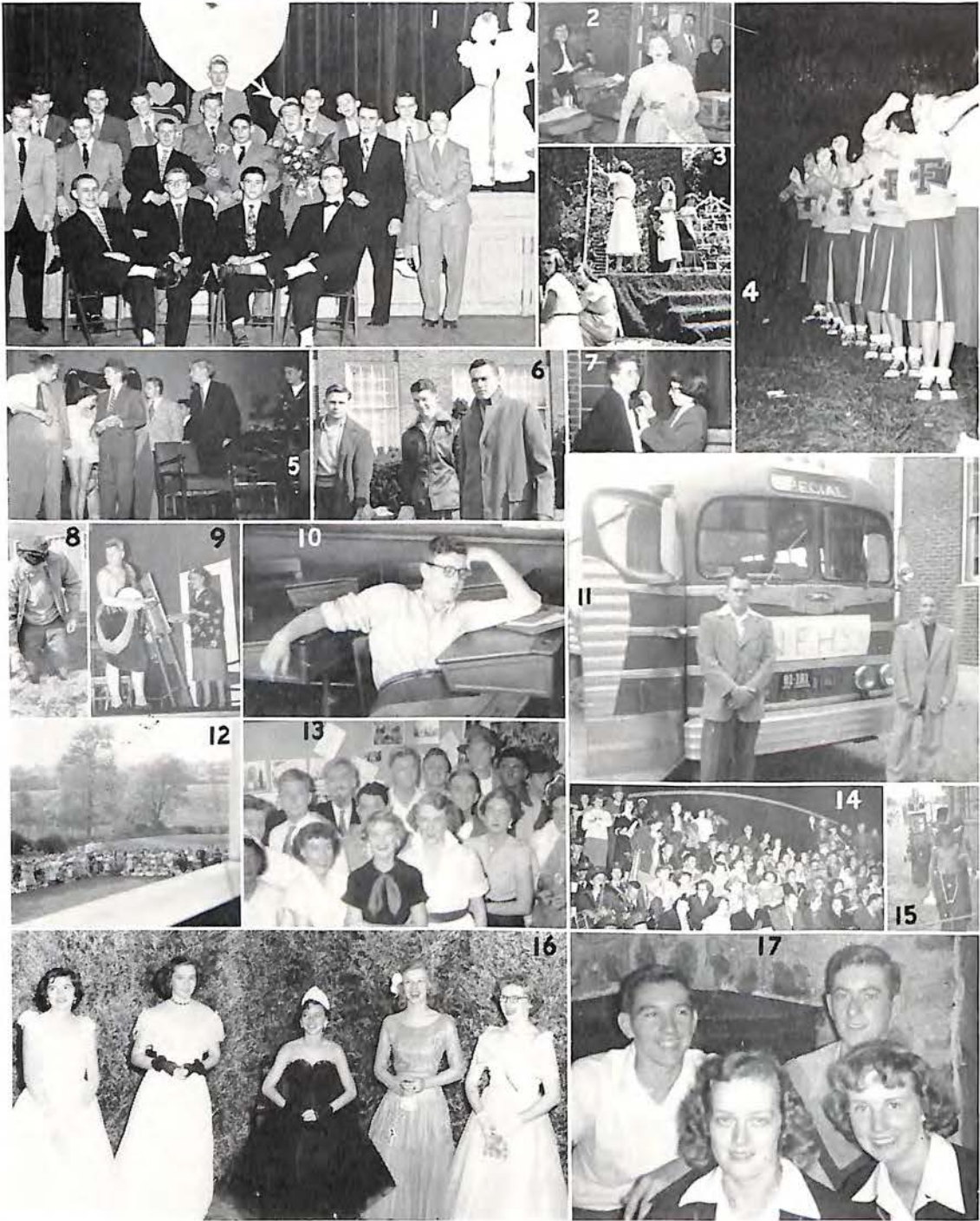
