




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
### **FOREWORD**

Now, I say unto you, they must depart thence, to go each a separate way, to lands they know not of, to do they know not what.





Christmastime when we exchanged gifts and ate at the S & W, plus all the trips.


We hope the teams have enjoyed us as well as we have enjoyed yelling for them. To all


# THE SHOW IS ON! . . .

## THE SHOW IS ON! . . .



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
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
