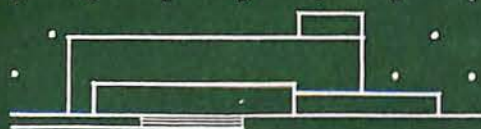

## FOREWORD

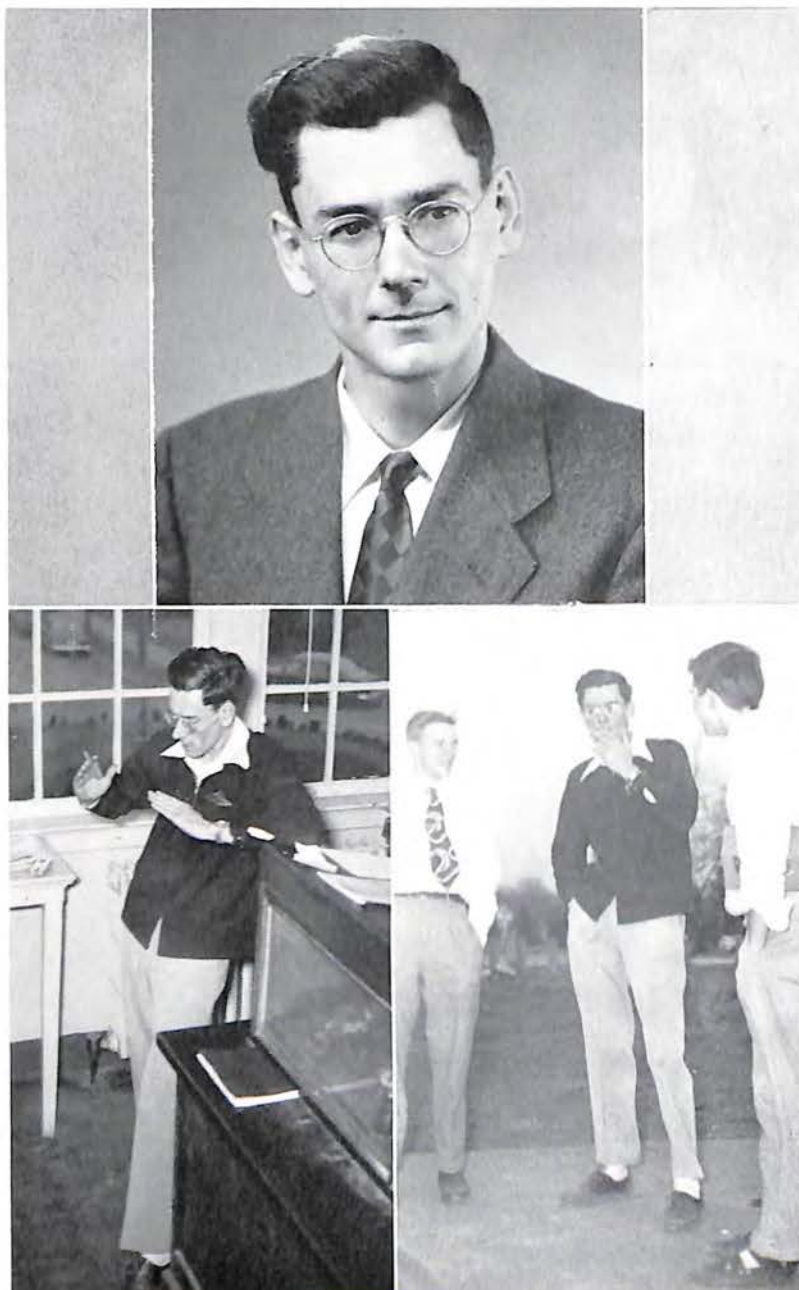
The varied phases of our schoolwork and activities bring us into contact with many tangible things that may always be remembered.

But it is written, "In the day when ye shall have eaten of all these fruits, ye shall surely be driven forth from the land." Now, I say unto you, they must depart thence, to go each a separate way, to lands they know not of, to do they know not what.

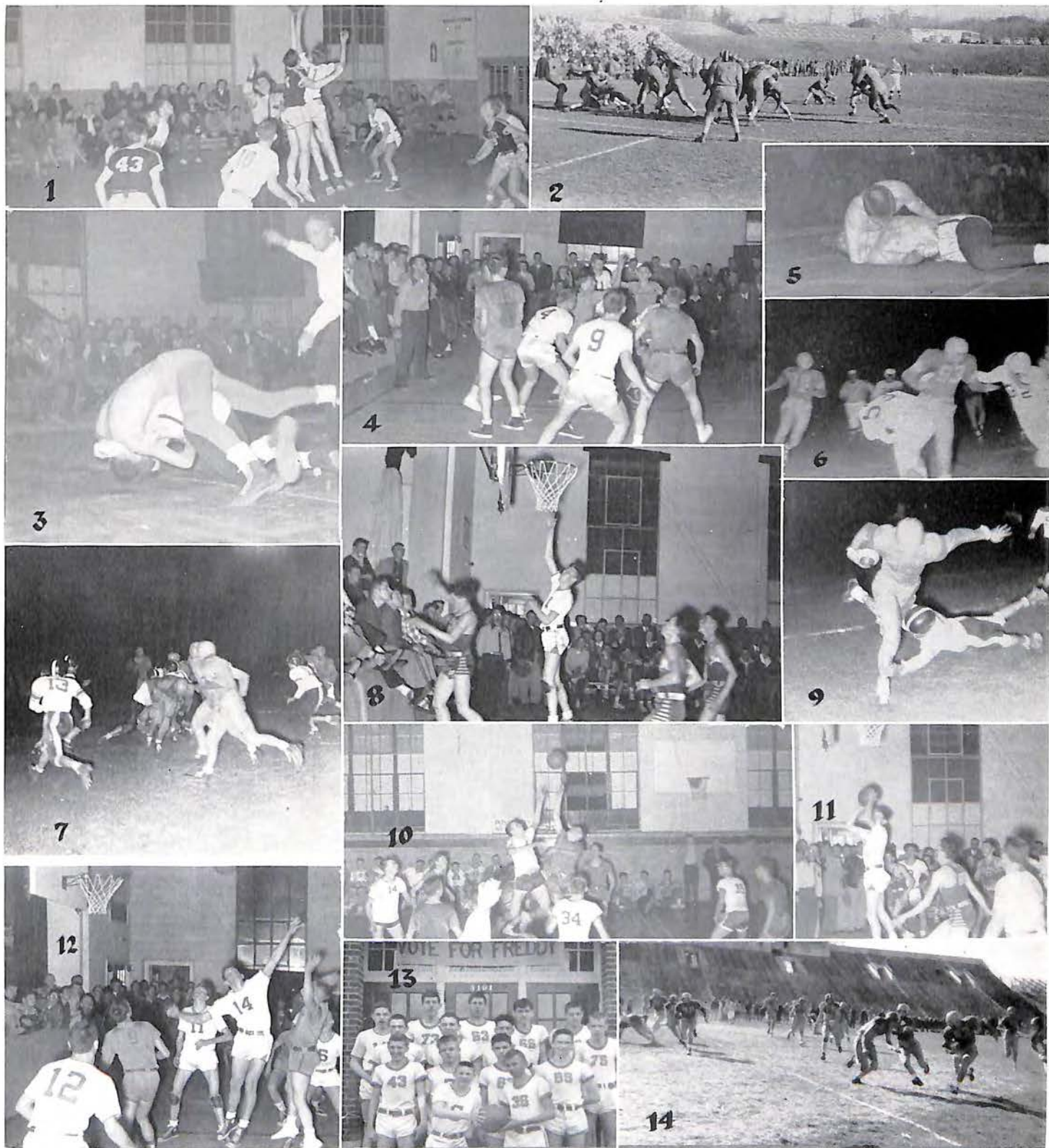

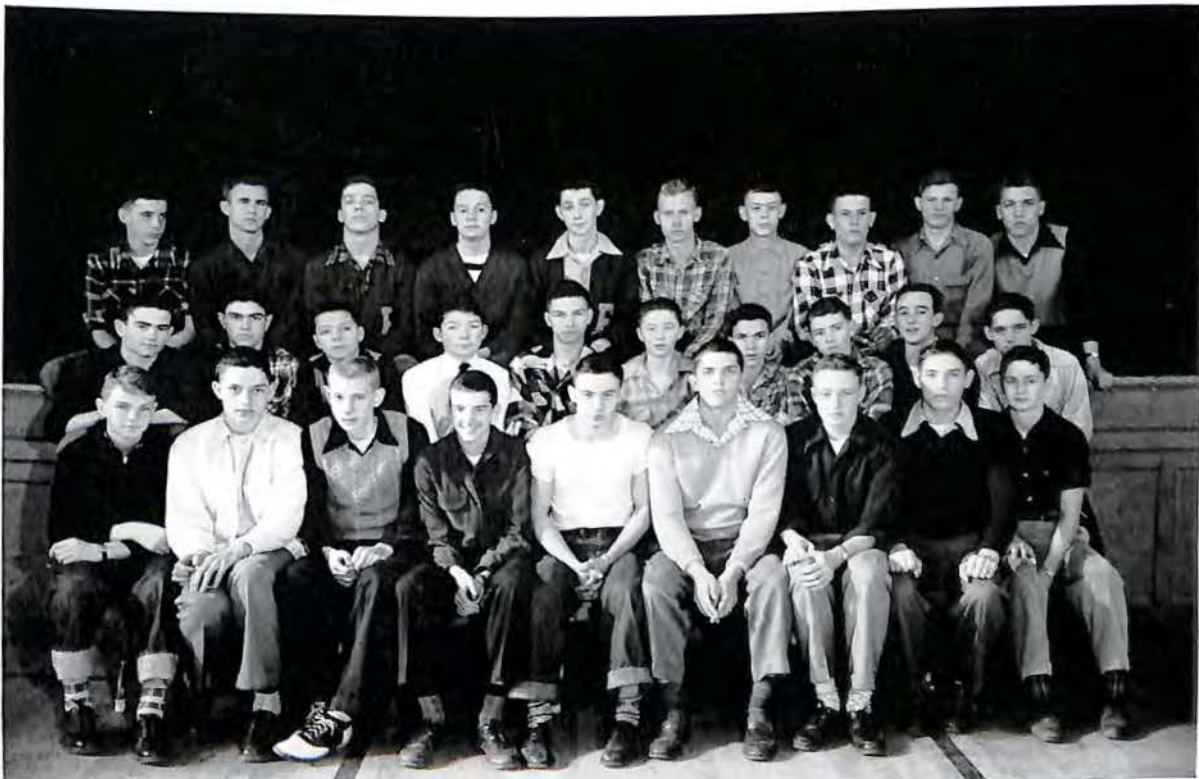
The Junior Hi-Y for the second year at William Fleming has done well under the expert leadership of Mr. O. S. Garber, faculty adviser.

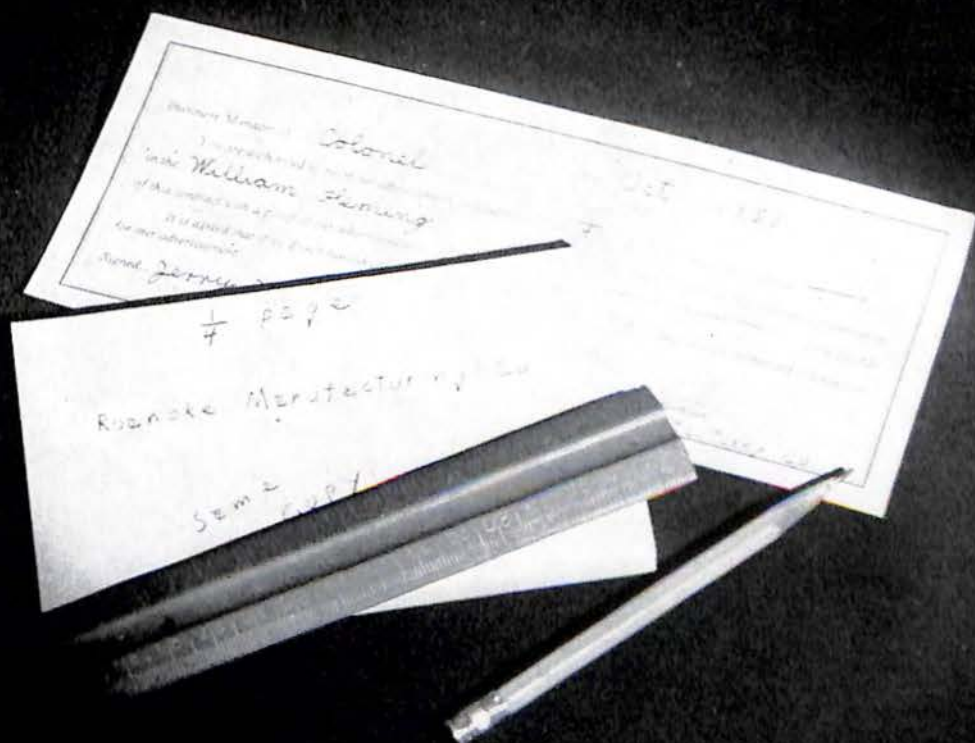
Each spring the Speech Department presents its annual play, usually some time in May.

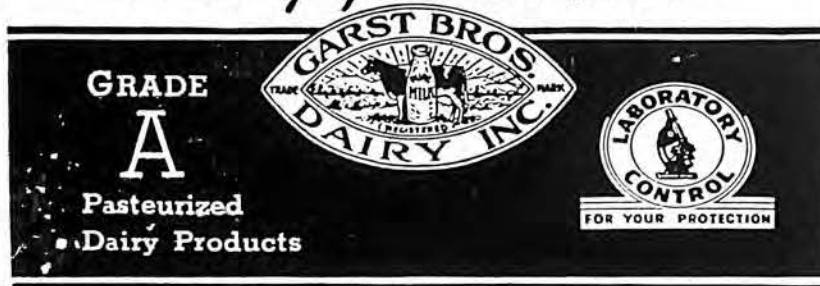


