











status of "banner" society. Later in the year a student tutoring service was sponsored, programs were sold at home football games, and the annual banquet for installing new members was held in the Masonic temple.





Colonel Staff Records Year's Events



















Badminton became a new indoor sport for the girls as the year grew short. A badminton tournament was held in the gym and girls from all grades participated in this fast moving game.




