
#### From One Comes Many





















### Virginia's First Junior AFROTC Comes To Fleming

One of the fifty Junior Air Force Reserve Officers' Training Corps in the United States brought military life to Fleming's campus. Several of the boys in uniform were seen every morning and afternoon raising or lowering the flag in formal procedure. On Fridays the four squadrons dressed in Air Force attire while alternate squadrons saluted while raising the flag. During the week Lt. Colonel Umphress and Sgt. Rutherford explained Air Force material and mechanics to the boys and drilled them on correct marching procedure. The color guard displayed the United States flag during the national anthem at basketball games. In a spring assembly on the football field, A, B, C, and D squadrons competed to decide which had the best ability to stay in step.





















Fred Weaver drives opposition in bid for a pin.





















# Parades, Basketball And Football Games Highlight Band Activities





The band played at all home football games. This year's drum major was John Wilkerson. Providing music for pep assemblies and home basketball games was the pep band, a branch of the concert band.
















Sabre Staff Keeps Up With Events


