


Scenes From Highlights of the School Year


profile, or a gaping countenance, or, perhaps, an ungraceful stoop that is the agony of the victim and the pride of the candid addict.







Excitement reigned during the game played with the Lorraine Shop, as some of the players on the visitors' team played on our team in previous years.



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
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
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
