Bailey illustrated his talk with stories of great people. 116, 1948: Pan American Day was observed with Miss Glass as guest speaker, "23, 1948: A night program given by Miss Hurley and the Glee Club 130, 1948: The Hobby Program was broadcast by efforts of Mr. Bowman, Mr. Foster, Mr. Stone and was enjoyed

throughout the auditorium.

- May 7, 1948: .Skit on Good Manners by the Home Economics department. Clothes worn by participants were made in class.
- " 14, 1948: A Talent Show, coached by Mrs. Jefferson and Mrs. Bailey, consisting of talent from this school was original enjoyable.
- " 28, 1948: The choir and Glee Club gave the final program of the year under the direction of Miss Hurley.
- " 27, 1948: Fashion Show by Simplicity Pattern Co.; Lee home economics classes modeled the iresses.

And to Mrs. Mary Arthur for her willingness, efficiency, typing of manuscripts and supervision of accounts.


