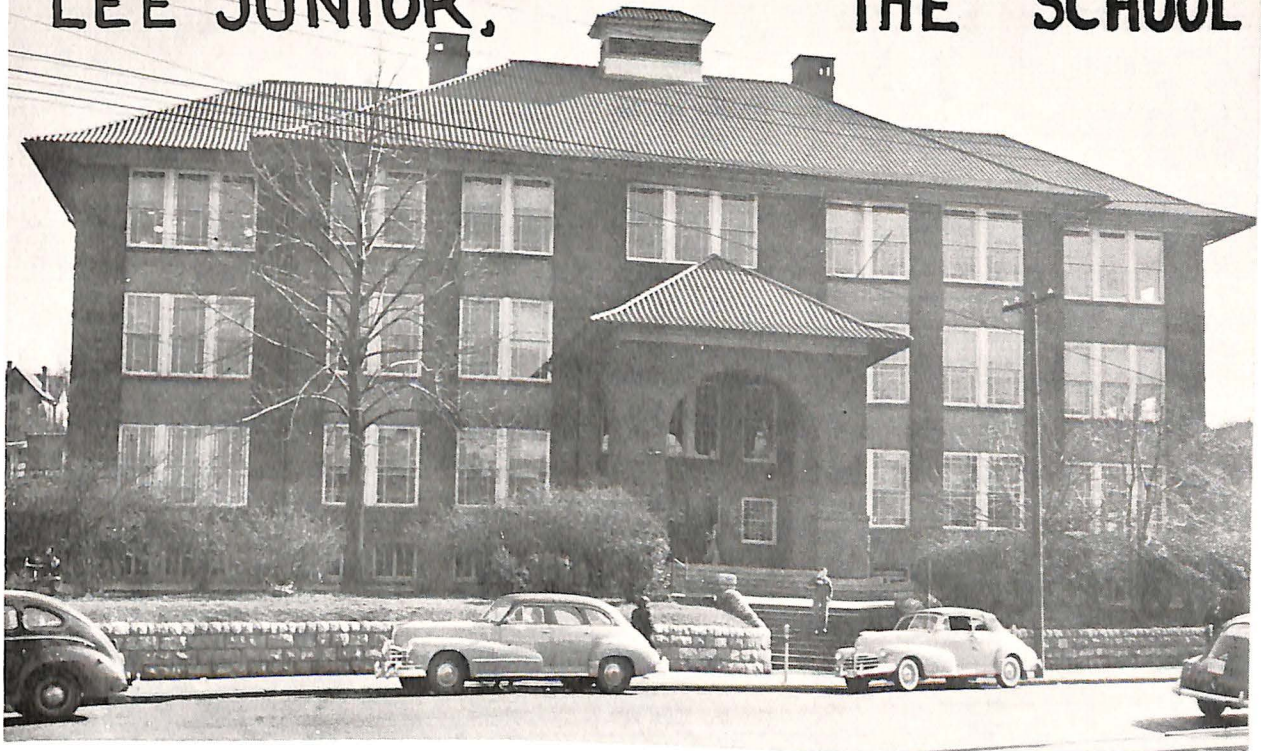

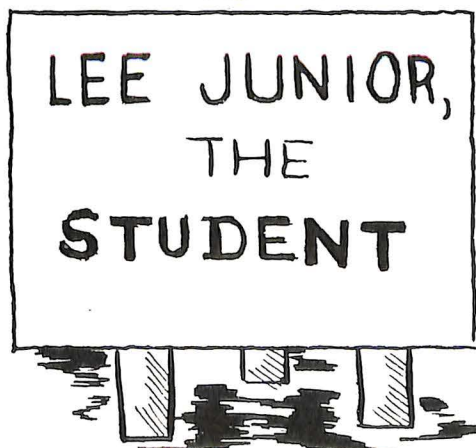

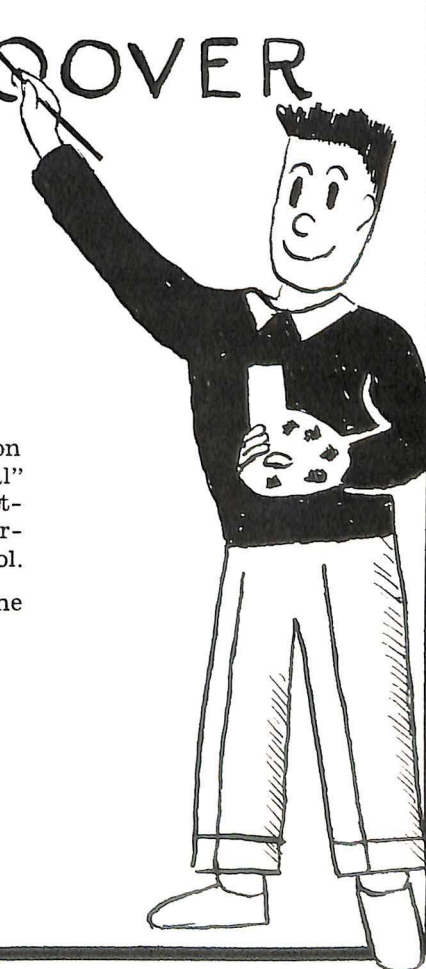




# DEDICATION TO MISS H. MAE HOOVER

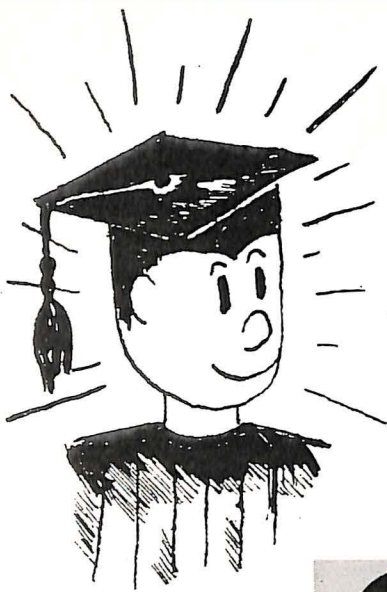

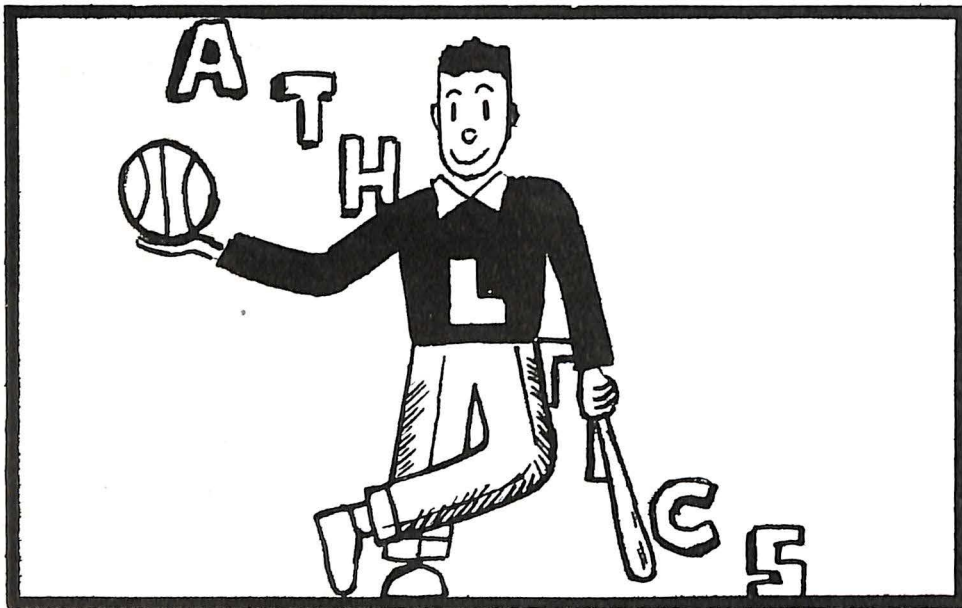

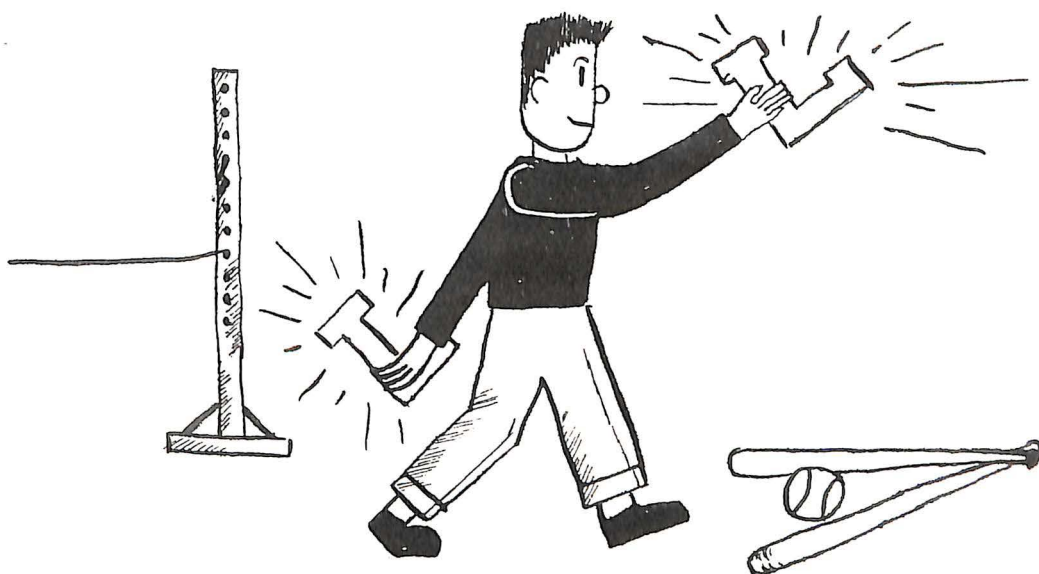

Have failed or passed us by.

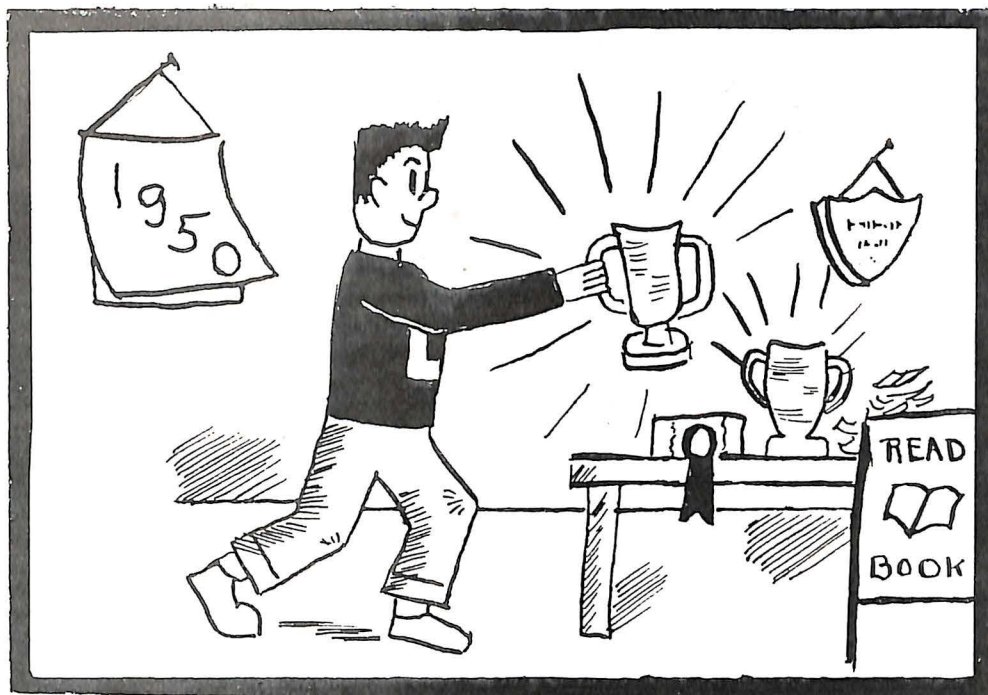
So we say good-bye, Lee Junior,

She'll be successful someday; a real celebrity!



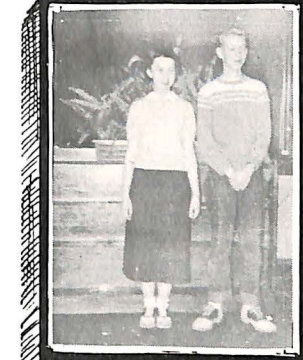

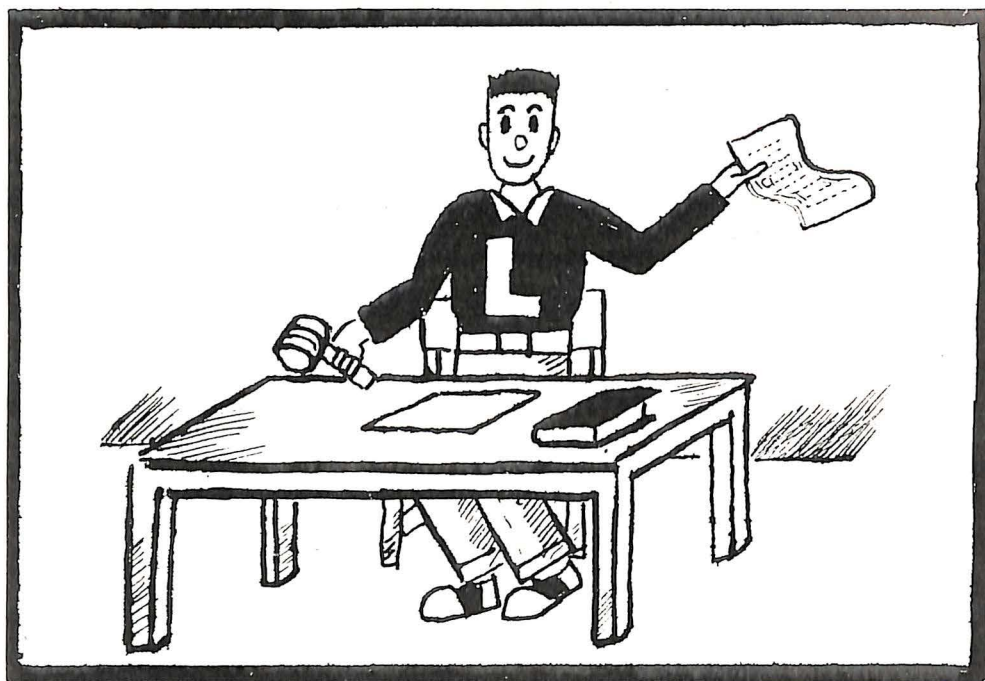
