Historical Note

The First Baptist Church of Roanoke Virginia, beginning September 30, 1867, has had an extensive, century-spanning tenure of providing for the Black, Baptist Christian community of Gainsboro. As the first Baptist church in Roanoke and an integral part of Roanoke's Black history, it has been a spiritual home for many generations, with doors wide open to the minority community that established it in times when other doors were closed.

Its history began in a dwelling on Hart Avenue, Northeast, Big Lick, Virginia, before services were moved to an old hall, then to the church's first house of worship, built on Diamond Hill. The first pastor, Rev. Edmond Johnson, served the church for fourteen years (1867 to 1881), with membership increasing at a rapid pace that eventually pushed the First Baptist Church to purchase a brick church from St. John's Episcopal Church, which was moving from Old Lick to New Lick, for \$800 in 1876. The second pastor, Rev. Moses Johnson, had a short, one-year-long administration wherein the church paid off its debt of \$600.

In 1898, under Rev. Richard Jones who served from 1882 to 1904 (twenty-two years), the beloved "Old First" was built on the corner of Jefferson and Patton Avenue, Northeast, costing \$25,000, which was majorly paid off in the remaining years of Rev. Jones's pastorate. Other additions under Rev. Jones included the purchase of the church's own cemetery, the church's first organ, and the arrangement of the church's first choir.

Succeeding Rev. Jones in 1904, Rev. W. R. Brown saw the construction of pews in the balcony, the building of a parsonage on Patton Avenue, other renovations, and a cancellation of the church's

remaining \$5,000 debt from the construction of Old First. In 1915, Rev. E. E. Ricks began his time as pastor, and through his influence, Mr. Andrew Carnegie gifted the church with the installation of a \$2,500 pipe organ. Other changes were made during Rev. Ricks's time, including the installation of a steam heating plant, hymnals for the pews, individual communion service, envelope system to support individuals' gift giving to the church, and electric lights under the balcony and in the Sunday School room.

After Rev. Ricks came Rev. A. L. James, a much beloved figure in the history of the First Baptist Church. Coming to the church in October of 1919 and remaining until 1958, his extensive, over forty years of service, make for a long list of accomplishments. These accomplishments include but are not limited to: stained glass windows installed, purchase of a lot adjoining the church building, business office opened and a secretary employed, Parish Hall built, the first black Vacation Bible School (instituted in 1924), first equipped playground for black children in connection with the Vacation Bible School, noonday prayer meetings beginning in 1927, support of a missionary in Africa under the auspices of the Lott Carey Foreign Missionary Board, provided scholarship for a native African student by the church junior organization, the Busy Bee Club, published the church's only newspaper (The Church News, which was one of the first black newspapers in Southwestern Virginia, with the first saved copy in this collection being from May of 1933), and more.

In 1959, leadership was transferred to Rev. E. L. Green, who remained pastor until September of 1966. 1961 was the year the "New Church Fund" was established, and the church began to prepare for a new building, and another parsonage was bought and paid for. Also happening that year, the Day Nursery and Kindergarten was organized, and a bookkeeping and audit system went into effect.

On October 21 of 1968, the eighth minister, Rev. David Lee Collins, was installed. His time was brief, as he died suddenly in 1970, but in that time he led the church in discussing a site for the new church and guided the Bible Band Circle to launch the First Baptist Food Bank for the depressed people of the area. In 1974, when Rev. Kenneth B. Wright took over, he followed in the footsteps of 1882-installed Rev. Jones and the new church was built on Wells and Jefferson, costing more than \$1,000,000. The building was dedicated on June 20th, 1982.

In 1990, the "Old First" building was registered as a Virginia Landmark, and gained a position on the National Registry of Historic Places. Work began on turning the building into an arts center. Five years later, on Saturday, April 22, 1995, it burned.

There were several days of back and forth on the possibility of saving it before a Roanoke Times article published on the 29th urged for an investigation of the fire. President of the Historic Gainsboro Preservation District at the time, Evelyn Bethel stated that community suspicions of arson (due to the presence of an broken window) and the perception that officials had been quick to suggest the building be razed necessitated that steps be taken to ease fears and ensure the safety of future community establishments. The next day, the Roanoke Times reported that two boys, 16 and 11 years

old, had been linked to the church fire. Later documentation states that they set it alight with two wine bottles filled with gasoline, and the sudden heat had led to them breaking a window in order to escape.

In June of 1996, the church itself decided that the remains of the building should be razed. Unincluded in these records, but available with a search of "Old First Baptist Roanoke" and a click into the Virginia Tech's online library pulls the testament of one Evelyn Bethel, who opposed the razing of Old First, even after it had been decided and done.

Scope and Contents:

- The First Baptist Church Collection is composed of one (1) box, consisting of twenty (20) folders. Within these folders is a collection of official documents, programs, booklets, news clippings, newspapers, a book enclosed in an envelope, a hymnal, etc.
- This collection contains historical documents from the First Baptist Church of Roanoke, including documentation from the National Registry of Historic Places, copies of The Church News, a compilation of works from the Rev. A. L. Jones, a hymnal, church service programs, important news clippings dating back to 1929, etc.
- The records date from a church service program from 1927 to a newspaper clipping from 2017.
