## Egg-Drop-A-Rama <br> by Eddie Feinour

December 2nd was not an ordinary power line repair day for the APCO employee who transported Mrs. Foard's and Mr. Whitt's physics classes to a height of 33 feet in his "cherry picker" repair truck.

The truck was used for one of Mrs. Foard's favorite annual class experiments: the infamous
"Egg Drop." The students are presented with the task of creating a protective casing for their raw egg. The egg must survive a free-fall drop of 33 feet and achieve the fastest possible free-fall speed.

The best drop is the one closest to the exact speed of gravity on an object ( 9.8 meters per second). Timekeepers on the ground recorded the amount of time elapsed from when each contraption is released from the dropper's hands. Three timers were used for each drop and the averages were taken.

Creative students devised ingenious methods of protection for their delicate and fragile eggs.
"I think students enjoy tests in which they don't necessarily have to think on paper and can take time to come up with 'off the wall' ideas," said Russell Turner.

When basketball practice began in October, there were great expectations for the 87 88 PH squad. There was size, quickness, depth, character and experience. Four top players from the ' 87 regional championship team returned, but the team was to face the toughest schedule in the school's history The question was: Could these players, with all of this apparent talent, get together and be come a serious group of winners? Indeed, at the start there were doubts.
There was a great deal of anticipation in the weeks prior to Patrick Henry's opener against Franklin County. For the first time ever two nationally ranked high school basketball squads would face of off in our home gym. Everyone wondered exactly how good we really were as PH , ranked 22 nd in the USA Today poll, prepared to combat the 23rd ranked Oak Hill Academy and their star Orlando Vega.

Could PH compete with the best in the nation? YES! our team electrified the record setting crowd and humiliated Oak Hill with brilliant teamwork, tenacious defense, and an awesome running game. In the end PH established themselves as a national powerhouse as they "kicked butt" by a 31 point margin.

As Christmas break rolled around, the Patriots were ranked second in the state and 11th in the nation. Another series of tests were upcoming however, as our team headed into the comperitive Arby's Classic Tourney in Bristol, Tennessee

The opening ballgames turned out to be easy ones for the Patriots as they buried Sullivan Central of Tennessee and Sumpter South Carolina by large margins. In the semifinals our squad was forced to face Brunswick High School and their All-American, small forward Bryant Stith. PH proved that one man cannot beat five as we dumped the eventual Virginia AA State Champs and ended their 33 game winning streak.

In the finals, Coach Woody Deans and the gang faced Griffin High School from Georgia. Griffin Sophomore forward, Darrin Hancock had been lauded as the best sophomore in the nation by several recruiting analysts. On paper this looked to be another extremely tough game, but again PH prevailed by more than 20 points. We tallied what turned out to be the only loss of the year for this fine Georgia team as they went on to become the Georgia AAAA State Champions. This was the first of several titles we would receive in the months ahead. We now had an 8-0 record and felt invincible. Unfortunately, overconfidence shook the "invincible" Patriots like an earthquake. On Janvary fifth PH and inter-city rival William Fleming played their first of five seasonal meetings. This first encounter turned into a disaster for the Patriots. We could not get any breaks, and the teamwork was just not there. Fleming used an annoying stall game to hand us our first and last setback of the
year.
Rather than demoralizing our team, the loss sparked a fire inside of us. We were the better team, we knew that, we just needed to work harder. The practices got tougher and more intense. We realized that pride was on the line with the district race. We raced passed weaker district foes, and prepared for our mid-season meeting with mighty Dematha High School of Maryland.

It was billed the "Roanoke Rounball Classic" and 9,632 tickets were sold to see the finest high school basketball ever in the Roanoke Valley. PH , now ranked 12 th in the Country, and legendary Dematha ranked 13th, squared off in an intense hard-fought game which ended victoriously for the Patriots.

A remarch with Fleming was next. We had won our last six games and this time we were ready for the Fleming stall. Patience proved to be the key as we again asserted ourselves and ended up with a victory.

PH completed their regular season with an outstanding record of 20-1 and a tie for the District lead. Because of the tie, a third PH-Fleming game was forced to decide the RVD regular season crown.

With a spot in the regional tourney already clinched, PH played for pride in the RVD tournament and walked away with that crown as well.

Regional play was next. This time it was do or die. In the first round unheralded Poromac

High School was our opponent. We dogged them by more than 20 points as the intensity rose. This forced a fifth and final meeting with the William Fleming Colonels. The winner would travel to Richmond, Va., for the State AAA Championship. We defeared Fleming for the fourth consecutive time and proceeded to the regional final against Heritage High School of Lynchburg. They, too, went down as PH clinched, for the second year in a row, the Northwest Regional Championship.

The state tournament - the long awaited "big time" was finally here. Our opening round opponent as Petersburg High School, a run and gun team with excellent outside shooters. Run and gun was exactly what they did, but it wasn't the wisest type of play to use against a team like ours. They just couldn't match up.

We won the opener and set up a meeting with the topranked team in the state Indian River High School and Alonzo Mourning. Mourning was called the greatest high school player and had been compared to Kareem AbdulJabbar. The Braves were ranked 5th nationally by USA Today.

This was the first game of the year we were picked to lose. More than 1000 loyal Parriots made the journey to the state capital to see this game. It turned out they were not to be disappointed. The Patriots
scored the first ten points of the game and Indian River never came any closer than a seven point deficit to the Patriots.

The final game of the year was next. The State Championship. Win or lose, we would be through for the year. We were told we were only as good as our final game. We were to play Robert E. Lee of Springfield for the title. Lee was a huge underdog, but they played with heart and ran off of picks for deadly point shots. Lee put up a great fight, but when it was all said and done, the PH Patriots had won their first ever state basketball championship, and the first for Roanoke since 1970.
There were many reasons for our great success in '88. First of all, the players. There was uniform talent and our guys complemented each other. Percy Covington was probably the most underrated player that we had. He was the floor leader at point guard, and even more, is a super person. People made this team.

Three other starting seniors were Curtis Blair, Melvin Davis, and Russell Turner. Blair was an All-Region selection, Covington All-District, and Davis and Turner were second team All-District. Juniors Bernard Basham and George Lynch were key performers, to say the least. Basham was called the best sixth man in the entire state, and possessed excellent rebounding skill.

The cover is a silk screened process on purple in a Smyth binding with Purple 350 applied $100 \%$. The cover design was created by Senior Mike Lichenstein who also designed division pages. Eight pages within the first signature were done in 4 -color, all prints being submitted as C . prints. Talton-Colortronics of Winston-Salem, NC, developed and printed most color photographs. Some color work was done by photo processing at Schaffer Shoe Repair, Towers Mall, Roanoke, Va. All of the photographs, both black and white and color, were taken by the photography staff. Black and white prints were finished in the staff darkroom. Films used were T-Max and VPSII. Approximarely 9,000 black and whire phorographs were taken, and less than 100 color photographs.

Primary typeface used was Serif Gothic and headlines were ranging in size from 24 to 60 pt. Body type was primarily 10 pt., and captions were primarily 8 pr. Emphasis was boldface. Opening section and divisions used 48 pr. Letraser type.
