John Fitzgerald Kennedy 1917-1963

During his brief term as President of the United States, Mr. Kennedy did much to promote the growth and progress of our nation. He established the Peace Corps, negotiated peace terms with Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev, erected a partial nuclear test ban treaty, and exhibited great dedication, courage, and devotion to duty when he presented his policies regarding civil rights, taxes, and medical care for the aged.

All shall long recall Mr. Kennedy's famous inaugural address on January 20, 1961, when he said, "Let every nation know, whether it wishes us well or ill, that we shall pay any price, bear any burden, meet any hardship, support any friend, oppose any foe, to assure the survival and the success of liberty." These were not just words. They symbolized a genuine conviction.

On this same occasion, people around the nation witnessed Kennedy's plea to his fellow Americans, which was, "Ask not what your country can do for you---but ask what you can do for your country." Having struck a gentle cord on our heart strings, these immortal words shall forever ring in our ears to remind us that every American shares in the responsibilities which safeguard peace and freedom.





The Cross Roads Mall has been a large asset with its voluminous shopping possibilities. Many of the large downtown stores have branches here.




The Shrine Bowl Parade was quite a thriller for the cheerleaders. They proudly rode through the streets of Roanoke, representing their school well.




