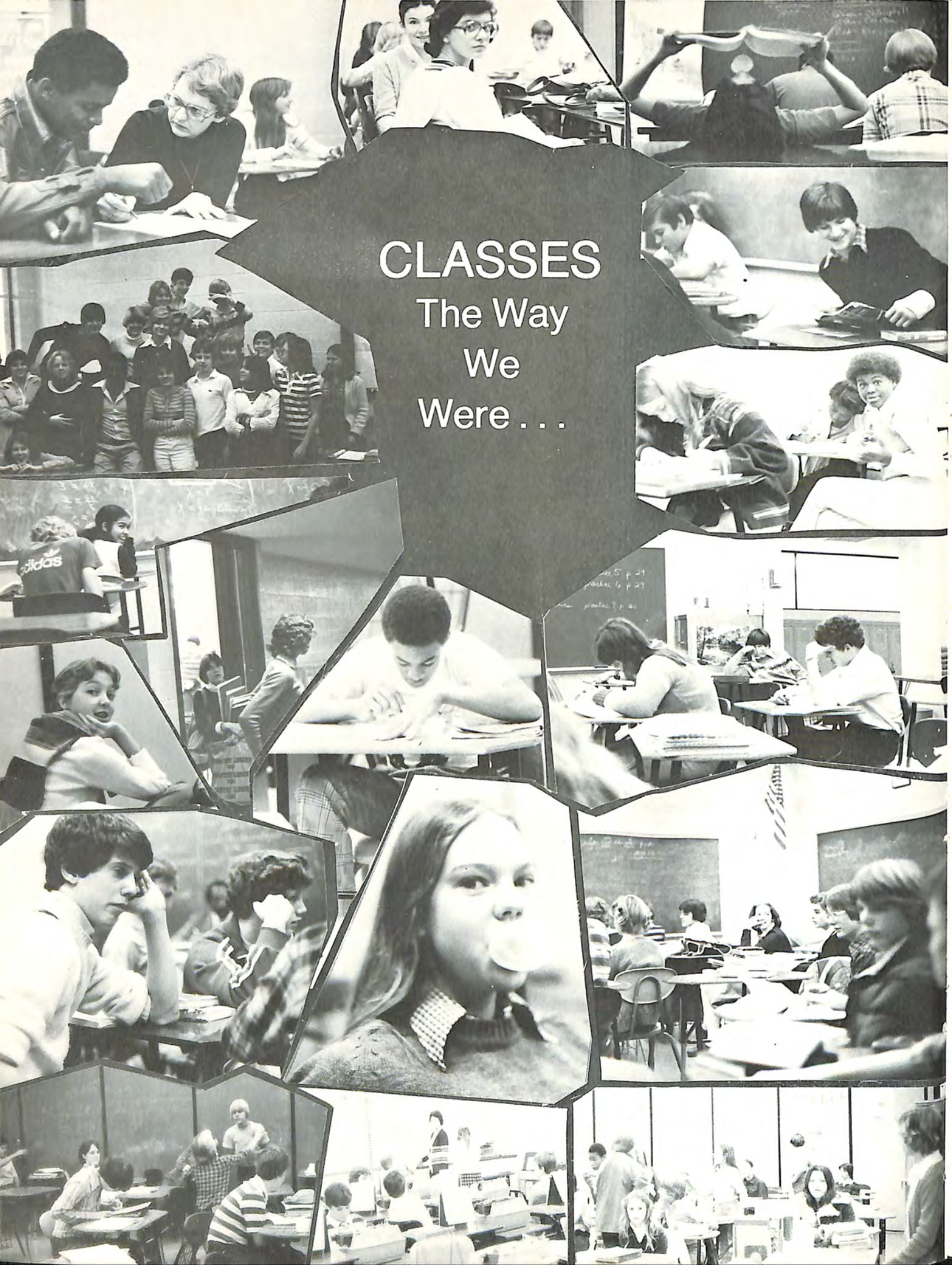




Caring isn't confined to the classrooms.

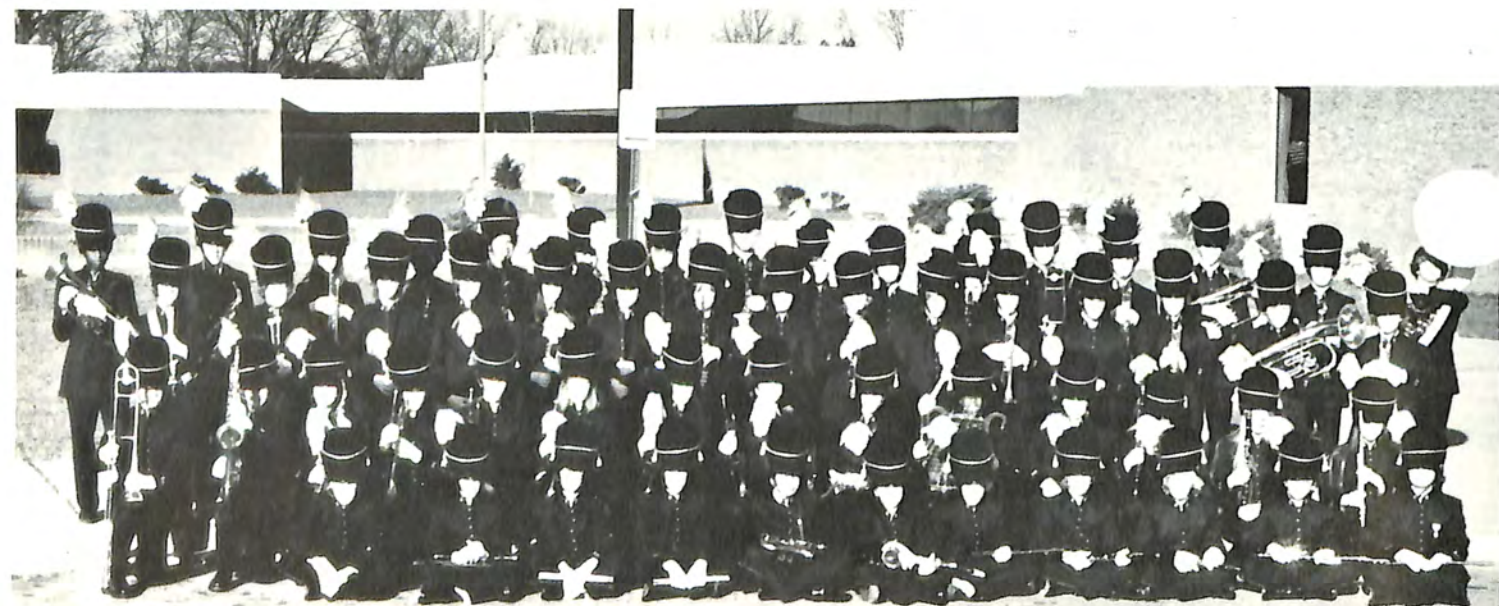
