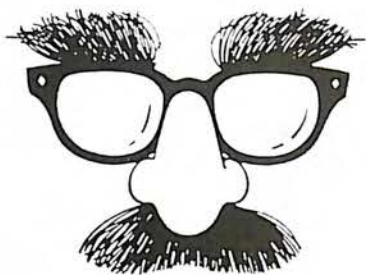

us who wore costumes!

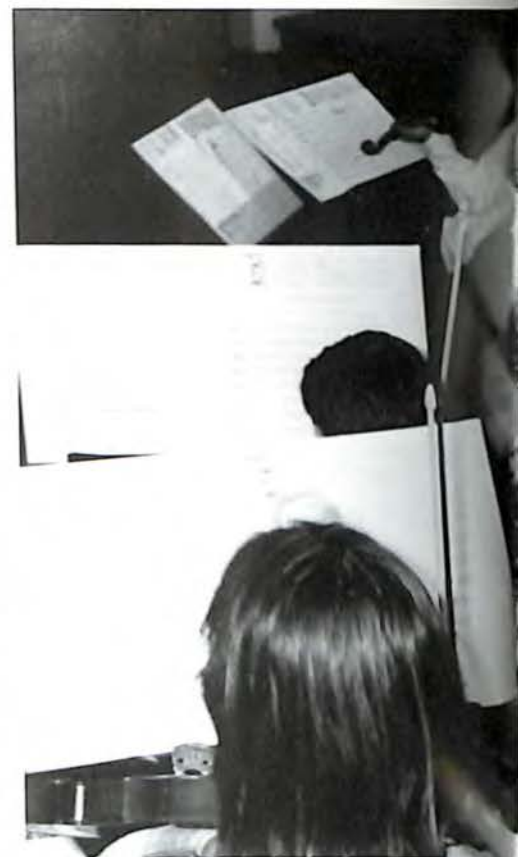

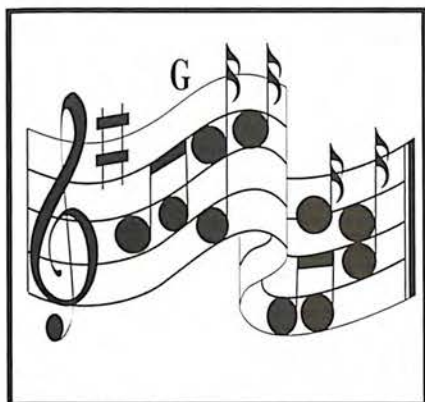

The eighth grade Tag team of Simmons and McLeod produced all of the first place winners in the science fair.



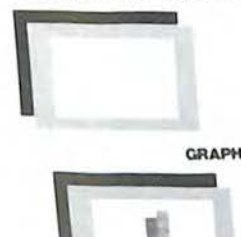
REFRESHING SCIENCE FAIR COMPETITION

Seventh grader, Bradley Witt won first place at Jackson for his interpretation of "Dare to Dream Your Dream." His drawing was entered in the city and he won second place.

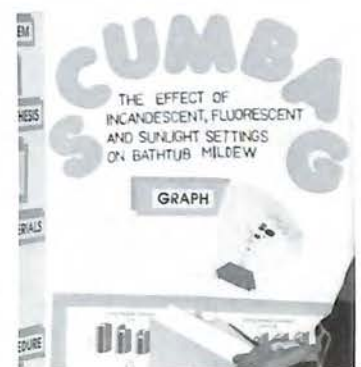

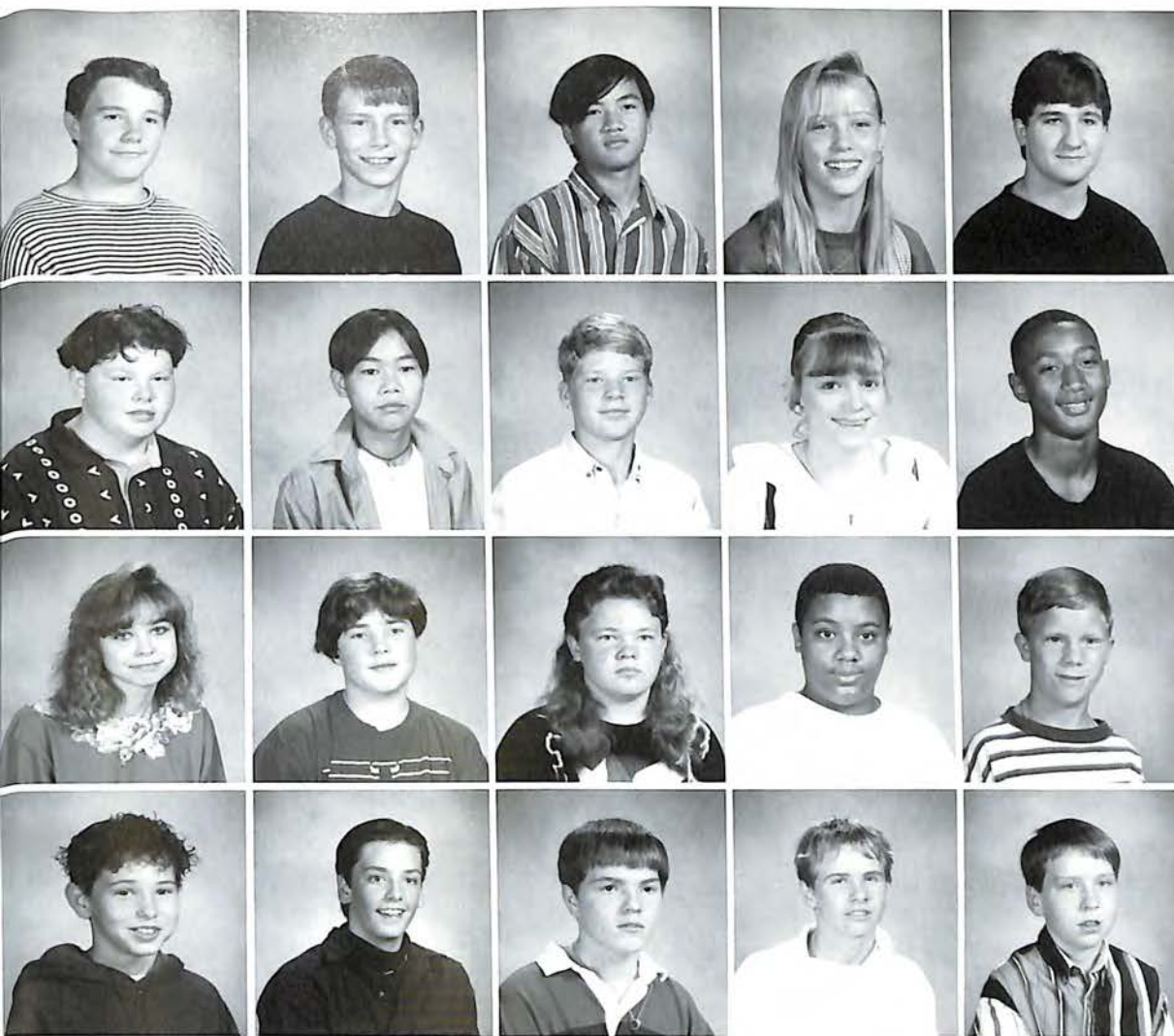

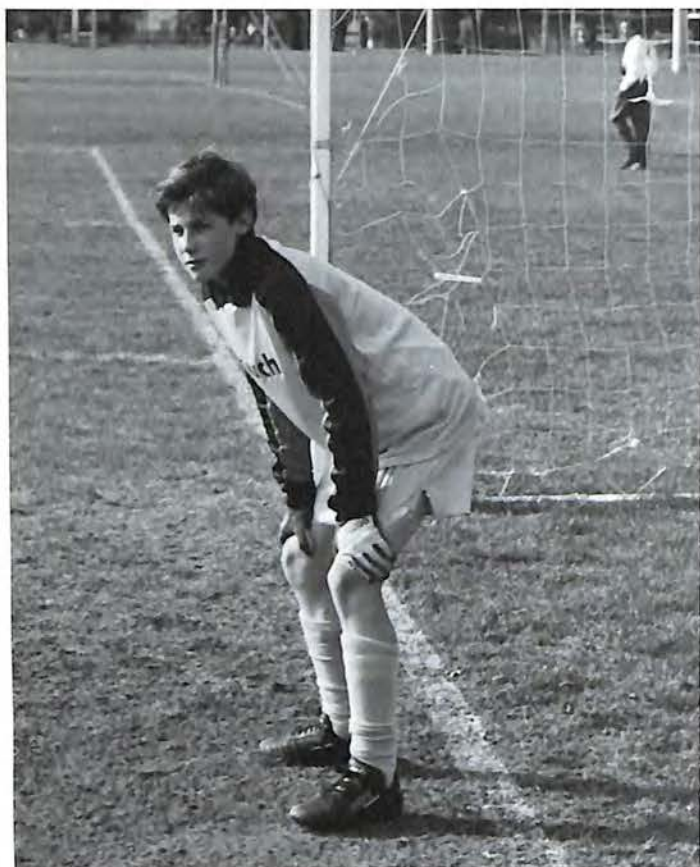

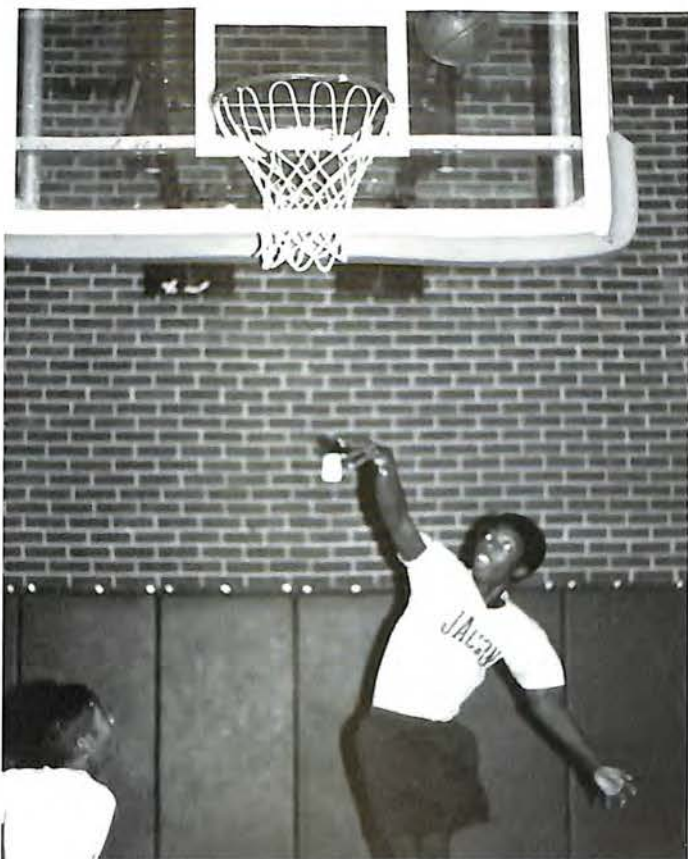

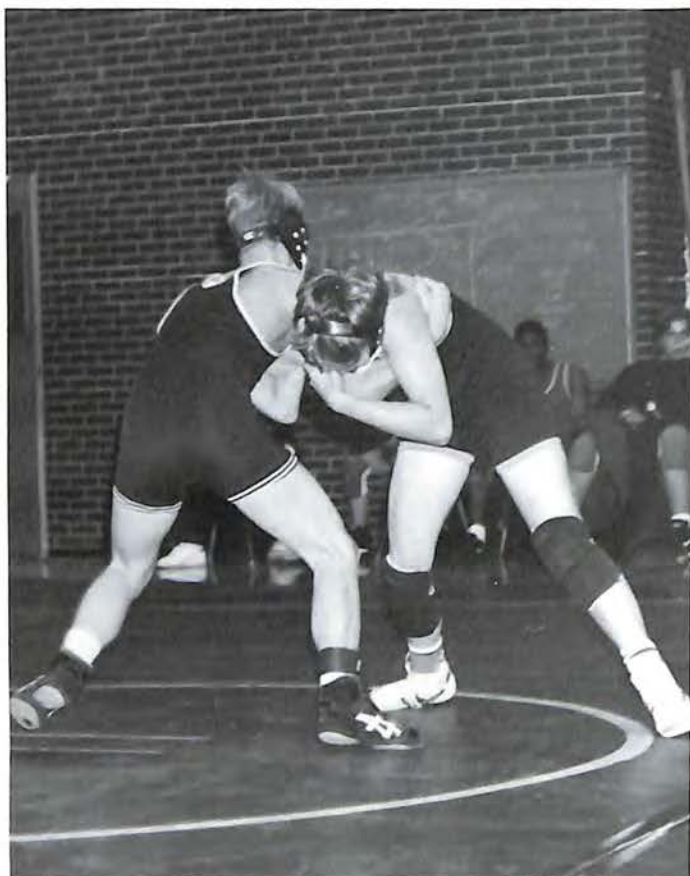
Scoring Points With A New Team

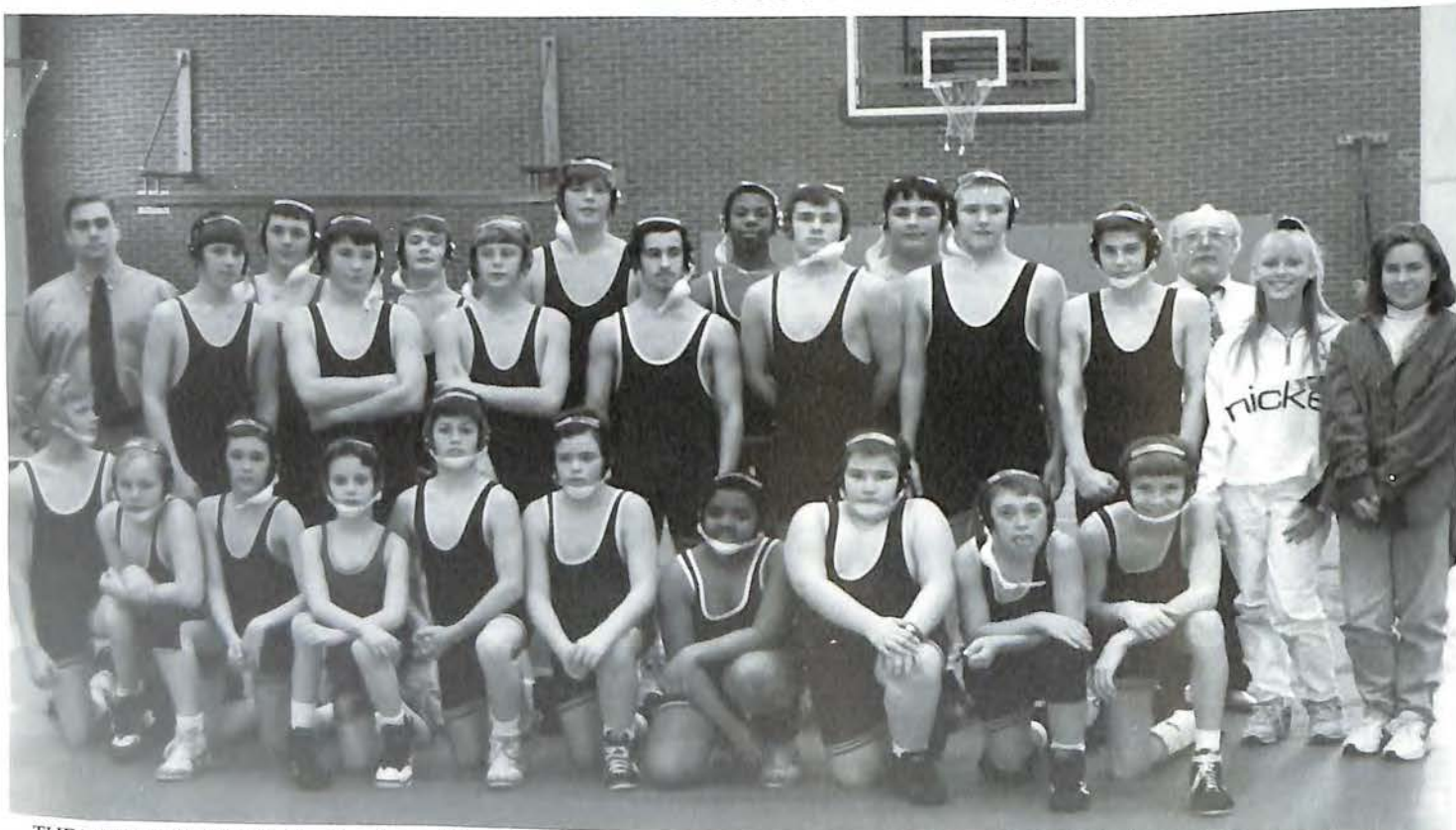

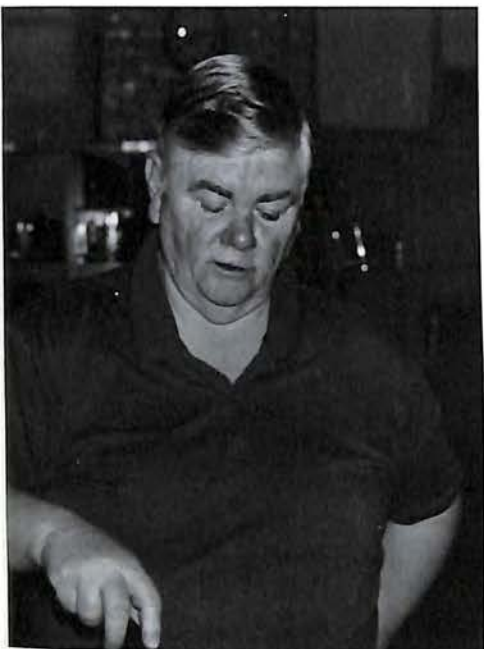


Sponsored by seventh grade teacher, Jill Hanes, the Pep Squad is a source of pride at Jackson.

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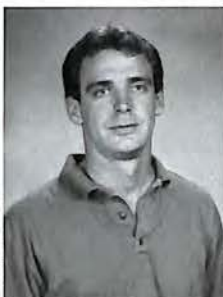

No, the gymnasium and auditorium will remain. However, the front of the school will be replaced and the new school will face Montrose Avenue instead of Ninth Street.



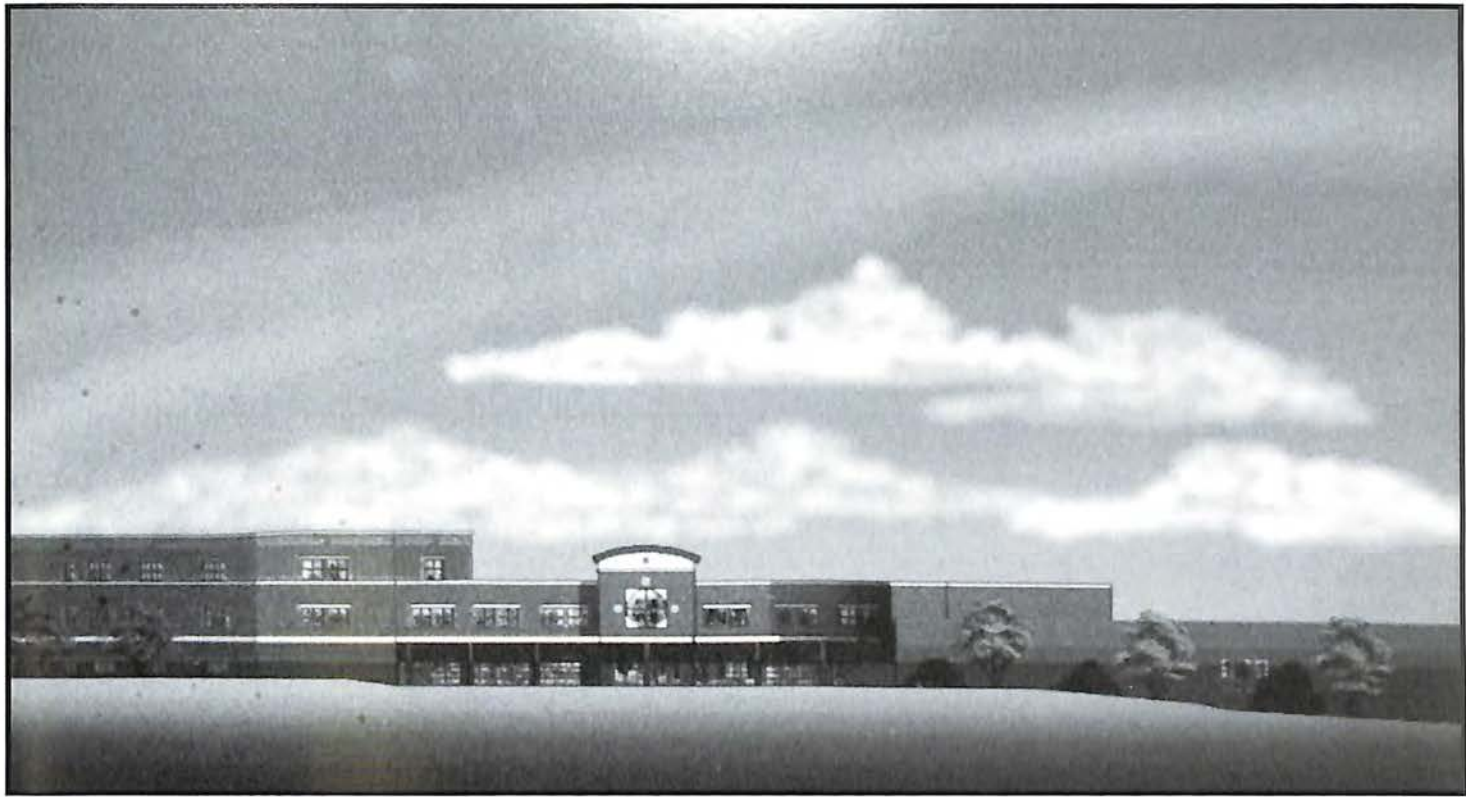
Architects have designed a magnificent new Stonewall Jackson Middle School. The construction is set to begin in the summer of 1995 and is scheduled to be completed by the fall of 1996. For financial reasons and modernization, the original 1923 and 1927 construction will be torn down and rebuilt, however, the present gymnasium and auditorium will remain. Approximately 5.25 million dollars was allocated to this project after the city of Roanoke passed a bond referendum in November.

The new school will face Montrose Avenue. This change was made as a safety measure in order to provide a bus lane with the least amount of traffic, located for the first time, in the front of the school. As an added bonus, the existing trees on Ninth Street will not be harmed.

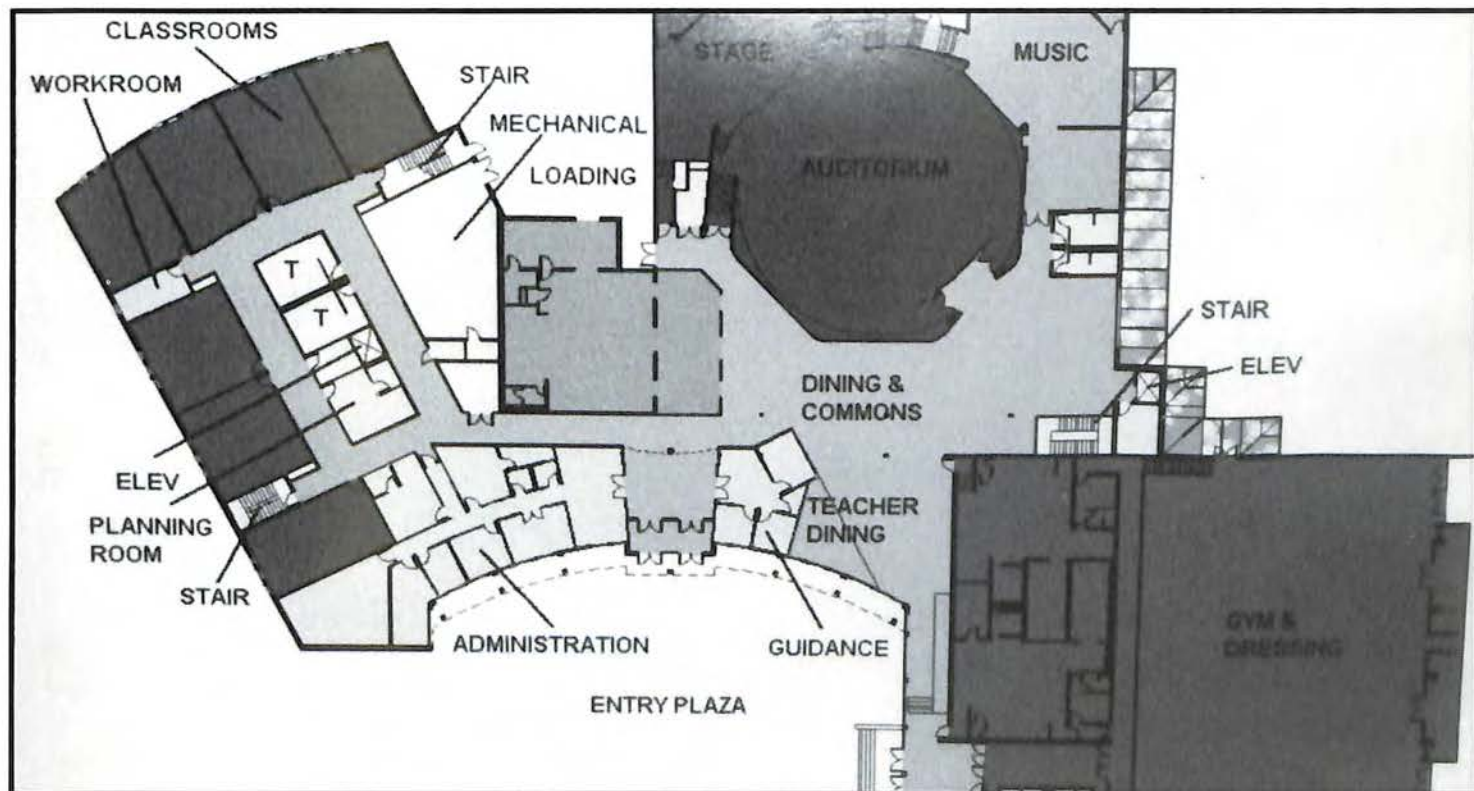
The design of the school that is visually appealing. Its style is traditional yet modern. It will meet all the new safety codes

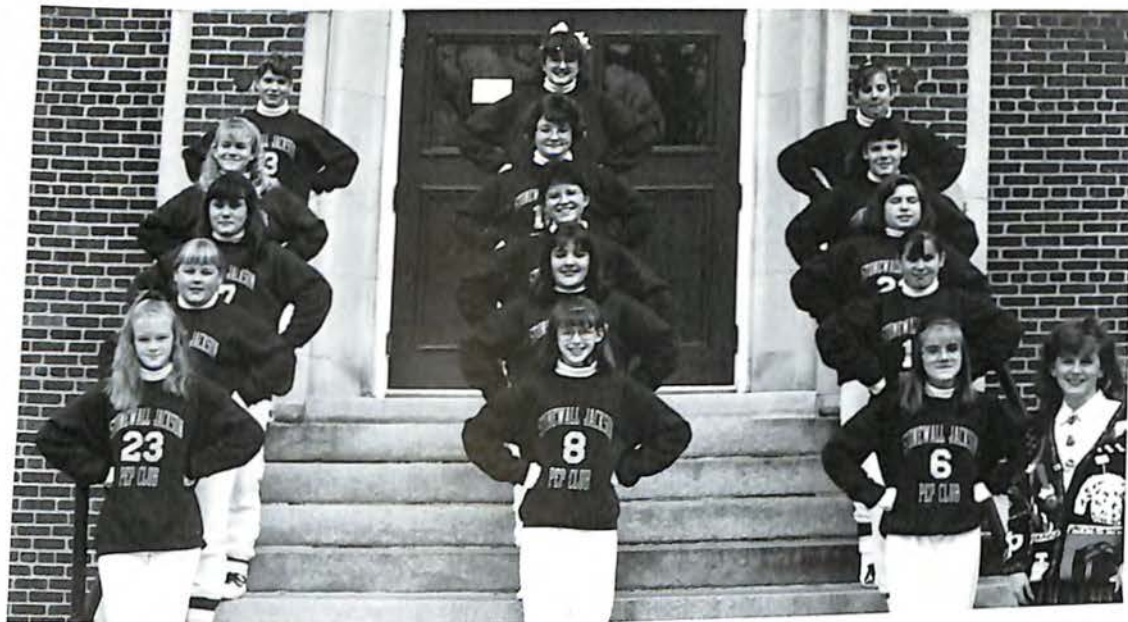
Stonewall Jackson's history for he came back to become principal after having gone to school here as a young man as did his mother.
