The Sodalitas Latina was organized four years ago by Miss Annie Cook and since that time it has grown to be one of the school's most prominent clubs.



HAMPTON 26-ANDREW LEWIS O



Lynchburg 14-Andrew Lewis o




Girls' Basketball
