


J. V. FOOTBALL



The F.H.A. is composed of girls who are interested in bettering their career in homemaking, both for present and future purposes.


These girls have learned the importance of a well functioned home, of sewing, cooking and of all phases of food preparation. Each of these factors contributes toward making the home a better place in which to live.
