

The gridmen then traveled to Halifax County to play in a closely contested


game, until the last 59 seconds. Then with some lucky calls by the officials, the Comets made a touchdown to win.



























The wrestlers got off to a good start by overcoming Pulaski County in the opening match. The "matmen" dropped the next three matches, by close decisions.










However, the Grapplers came back winning five of their last eight matches. The Knights defeated E. C. Glass, a team expected to have a chance at the district crown.









Even though the Disaster Day is a serious matter, the students look forward to their participation in the drill.





Prom Night Arrives






FAREWELL























New Teachers Impressed With CS







Basics Lacking

Despite the fact that "new math," supposedly based on the teaching of mathematic principles, came to elementary schools in the sixties, there still seemed to be inefficiency among students in this area.

Math was not the only area in which fundamental skills lacked, however. In the sophomore class spelling seemed to be the problem; whereas, the senior class had more trouble along the line of vocabulary.

Many teachers, not only at Cave
Spring but in other schools as well, expressed concern over definite reading deficiencies on all levels of education, Experimental programs were blamed for
these deficiencies. Some Cave Spring
teachers believed that students were
taught by more than one approach, which
confused the students.

Though basics were lacking, teachers believed an upward trend of better education would result in the long run.

Teaching: Form of Friendship

Many teachers looked upon teaching as a form of friendship, incorporating the learning experience with a congenial atmosphere.

Through a friendly atmosphere, teachers hoped to encourage learning in their students, desirous that this situation would make the student more open in expressing his problems. Encouraging openness was the basis for aiding students.






















Officers of the FHA "do their thing" whether it is sewing, cooking, or fashion design.






