
Three hundred and eighty eight graduates contributed to their share of fame.

"I have played well and so has the team. But, there is always room to improve and perfect," said DJ Jones(11). However, none of their success could have been possible without all of their hard work and endless dedication




The junior varsity squads were without a coach, which resulted in strong teamwork and cooperation among all the cheerleaders. Captains provided leadership in practices and performances.


















To enhance their foreign

with new restrictions



On July 1, the Virginian government voted to restrict teenagers by putting forth a set of new driving laws. From then on, students would not be allowed to acquire their learners' permit until the age of 15 and six months: students would then keep it for a whole year, and would not be able to obtain their driver's license until 16 and six months. In addition, students under the age of 18 would not be allowed to drive between the hours of midnight and 4a.m. Furthermore, they could not have more than one passenger in their vehicle if they were under 16 and no more than three if under 17. These changes especially affected students taking driver's ed, as well as students that could not take the class as a result of the new laws.

The outcome of these changes were both appreciated and loathed. Ashley Castro(10) said. "Not as many people can drive at earlier ages, so they need to get rides [from others] more often, but with the other law, they can't get the rides they need because there would be too many people in the car." There were a number of students that were unable to get their drivers' license as sophomores. Jeanette Bowman(10) said. "They had no right to change the law. I was really looking forward to driving."

On the other hand, some had mixed thoughts, or approved of these congressional movements. A driver's ed student. Phil Hartman(10), whose age at which he could drive was not affected, said. "If you're an irresponsible driver, you're going to be irresponsible no matter how many kids you have in your car," but also said. "I think it's probably not a good idea to be out there after midnight even if we could, because of all the drunk drivers." Despite the new restrictions, he said.
