
changed. "I'm less shy now and I think I'm more grown up. My view on the U.S.A., has changed. I think it is a great country with a lot of possibilities," she said.


Unfortunately, Katie wasn't the only senior who has experienced a rough time during her teen years.

The three most popular colleges that students applied to were Radford University, Virginia Tech, and Virginia Western Community College. "I plan to go to Virginia Western for a little while then go onto


Virginia Tech later on," said loy Robbins (12).























On top of the physical pain was the emotional pain from not being able to participate in games and team events. "Not being able to finish out the season











students to the festival, only one remained to take students back to the high school. Those who remained watched other bands perform while waiting for their rating.




