














Spirit Week The Days














Spirit Week The Parade






























Masquerading the Night Away

Students proceed to cram as much as they can into the two days of freedom.













Although many students saw Sunday as an end to their weekend, break, or fun, Sunday was really the beginning: the beginning of a new week, new experiences, and new adventures.












perspective helped capture the larger of creatures.







Riding to Cure Diabetes Juvenile Diabetes Research Fund

The Juvenile Diabetes Research Fund (JDRF) is a worldwide organization helping to fund research for treatment options and cures for Juvenile Diabetes around the world. Diabetes is an autoimmune disease that affects children and adults of all ages; it destroys the insulin-producing cells of the pancreas. Due to the attack on insulin in the pancreas, people with Juvenile Dialetes have to take daily insulin supplements to make up for their body's inability to produce it. The JDRF holds a series of bike rides around the country to help fund the curing of Dialetes.

Jack Kiser and his family took a trip up to Death Valley, California for the "JDRF Ride to Cure Diabetes". The race is a one day race, but the trip lasted from Thursday to Saturday. Jack said, "I decided to do this ride for Diabetes because my sister has Diabetes and I don't want her to have to worry about it anymore". The "JDRF Ride in Death Valley is a 102.79 mile bike ride, with an elevation of 1,335.3 ft. I really had to work toward this goal, considering it was 117 degrees on some places of the race course". The high temperatures of Death Valley are around 120 degrees, so during this ride it wasn't even at its high. The ride can make a huge impact on people's lives in many ways. "It changed my outlook on how drastic this disease really is", said Jack. The JDRF bike rides happen year around and will continue throughout the entire year. Avid bike fanatics around the world get prepared by training for their bike ride many months before the actual race. "Itrained all summer long, and worked really hard to get prepared for helping the cure". Jack stated.

The JDRF provides local Cycling coaches to help prepare for this intense like ride. Jack says, "The advice I would give to someone liking this race in the future would be that if you want something, go get it, period." This bike ride can be a great experience for anyone who wants to achieve the goal of helping find the cure of Diabetes, one pedal at a time.









Theater Arts

Theater Arts is a returning feature to the curriculum after a two year hiatus. This course aids students down a path of self discovery through the course of multiple published works and exercises involving facial expressions, movement and line memorizing techniques. The students worked on various forms of expression starting the year with improvisation, clown and mime skits and preparation for both VSHL One-Act and Forensics Competition.



RECOGNITION. The cast of the competitions piece "1 Bring You Flowers" gets recognized at an assembly. The cast placed 3rd at regionals after coming in 2nd at Districts. Mercy Plumb(9) played the Nurse, Ottilia Walker(12) played Faye. Anthony d'Alelio(12) played Jim, Garrette Johnson (12) ran the lighting. Lauren Chapman (11) was the stage manager/student director. Holly Poole(12) ran the sound. and Julia Ferguson(12) moved set and Mrs. Sandra Gotschal was the faculty director and sponsor.

MEASUREMENTS. Brice Reid (11) focuses in on the saw in the technology education room. When the occasion called for it, students were required to alter the saw to adjust the cut. Different saws can cut wood differently. A circular saw cuts the wood at an angle, a table saw is used to cut thick pieces of wood, and a band saw cuts primarily curves into the wood.

CONCENTRATION. Jonathan O'meara (12) and Hunter Barker (10) concentrate as they use a belt sander to smooth wood in shop class. The key to proper sanding technique was to always sand with the grain so as not to compromise the quality of the wood. Besides learning proper techniques when working with wood, students were taught to use a variety of tools that will add to their repertoire of life skills.
























Students learned that research and development were key components to being successful in this class. SMOOTHING. Austin Amos (10) sands down a piece of plywood. He would later alter the dimensions of the plywood to turn it into one of their various projects. Plywood was used in technology education because it was inexpensive and flexible which made it much easier to work with



MITER-SAW. Jayce Taylor(9) saws a piece of wood in half. Later the wood would be sanded down and sized to fit into the clock he was making. A miter-saw was used to make crosscuts in the wood which were incorporated into the frame of the clock.





AUDIT. Hunter Barker (10) listens to Mr. Rawlings as he tells the class what they are going to do for that day. Each day when the students came into class they were informed about what they were going to do. Mr. Rawlings was technically a middle school teacher who was transferred over from the middle school to teach at the high school. He was a valuable asset to the technology education aspect of the school and students enjoyed having him teach them the principles of wood shop.



EXPECTING. Graves (10) concentrates on the teacher's example project. Students had to make a cube inside of a cube. Holes were drilled through the sides of a wooden cube and then another instrument was used to sand down the inner portions of the cube until it formed yet another cube. It was an interesting feat to accomplish since the inner cube was facing the opposite direction of the main cube. Even though this was a difficult task it was reached.



CASTING. Edwin (10) begins a seemingly complicated project which can only take a full hour and a half block to finish. Most of the beginning projects were uncomplicated but as the students grew in expertise and experience they were allowed to attempt more projects that required greater knowledge of the assignment and the skills they had learned. Block scheduling was an advantage in this class since it gave the students more time to spend on their projects in one sitting.




ATTENTIVENESS.

Technology Education

T echnology is a class that is useful to every student in the high school. Mr. Sousie and Mr. Rawlings teach the technology classes. Also available is wood shop. The classes made basic woodwork items such as a cube. Then next project was more difficult. The students had to construct clocks.

Drawing was meticulous, but required in order to create an accurate impression of an object. 






SEARCH. Ryan Hunter (9) completes a health worksheet during his freshman health class. Each student in the health class had to complete worksheets for every unit.










LISTENING. Mrs. Long's psychology class attentively listens while she explains family behavior. A wide variety of topics help students to learn about society, norms and behaviors.






Burton and Governor's School






Extracurricular Cohesion Clubs and Activites






PIRATES.










Melding of Cultures




