"I WAS INELIGIBLE TO WRESTLE LAST year because of a VHSL rule that directs if a student athlete goes from parental custody to guardian custody and switches districts (in this case, from Roanoke City to Roanoke County), you cannot participate in any sports for 90 days. They call these 90 days a 'grace period.'

My brother took full custody of me last year and he resided in Roanoke County. I started attending CSHS on October 28th. The end of my grace period was February 5th, but the wrestling conference tournament was February 4th. If I had come to Cave Spring just one day earlier, I would have been able to compete in the school season. Honestly, it was heartbreaking letting something you love so much go for a year. I used to consider leaving Cave Spring in order to wrestle at my previous school, Patrick Henry. However, I always came back to the idea of sitting out for a year because my new teammates were my family.

I didid help coach during that period, which was definitely a big change in what I was used to. Some of the guys took me seriously and others knew this was my only alternative rather than actually wrestling. I didn't have to do this, but I chose to so I could better myself and my teammates. As the year went on, I strengthened my ability to coach. Being on the outside, yelling at people rather than being yelled at, is better for sure, but it's frustrating at times when you want to be on the mat.

This experience made me appreciate my opportunity to wrestle. Life has its trials that test you. That was definitely a hard time in my career, but lalways knew it wasn't forever and that everything happens for a reason."

It took practice, practice and more practice. l used to get up at $5: 45$ most mornings to put on a full face. In a way, that improved my abilities.

I am selftaught and do not like makeup YouTubers or Instagrammers. I find their videos biased, misleading and overall lacking in creativity. The biggest life lesson I learned has to be never to take life for granted. People in Africa were more thankful for what little they had than the millionaires in America who just want more. "MY DAD CAME TO ME WITH THE
IDEA for the robotics program about five years ago. He heard about it from a work colleague who runs a team down in Christiansburg. He asked if I wanted to start a robotics team at school and, since there were not many academically-focused teams at our school, I decided to start one up. We started meeting in my basement in eighth grade, with just three or four members. Since then we've picked up more people, and last year we became an official school team and have competed on state level.

When we integrated with the school, our team increased in size to 13 members. Before that, having a person for each position was a little rough. We needed people to create a 500 -page notebook as well as code a robot, build a robot and then go to outreach.

At a competition, the judges look through your notebook and read all your detailed notes, which explain how everything is built. Our coders design the robot in a program called 'Inventor,' so we can plan ahead in the hopes of making as little mistakes as possible when we build. In coding, we work with Java script, which is a more advanced program than what is offered through school. It helps when we have to set up objects for different parts of the robot. You have to work through specific tests to find different angles the robot has to rotate to, and it's a bit of trial and error. In the end, there's a bit of luck in getting the code to work.

During competitions, the robots have to perform various tasks. In past competitions, we've had to pick up balls and put them into five foot high containers. The robot had to launch the ball, lift it up and then put it into a container. We've also had to climb up a hill made with bars sticking out of the path. That was a rough competition.

Working with the robot and designing ideas to complete a task will help greatly me in my future with engineering."

My grandfather taught my dad and uncle the skill when they were growing up. My dad always worked beside his brother in the woodshop. They completed everything from playing with small projects to building houses. My dad built parts of the house I live in now.

I've taken a woodshop class every year. They had some challenging aspects, but most of the activities they had us do I had done before. My least favorite part of the classes are always painting; I prefer staining.

At home, I spend a couple hours a week woodworking. I make a lot of pens because people at my church ask me to make them as gifts for friends and family. From start to finish, it takes about 30 minutes to turn a pen. I have even sold a couple to my friends. My favorite wood to work with for my pens is olive because it is not too hard to cut and finishes really well.

I also like to make household items, like paper towel holders and desktop stands. The most impressive object l've made is my workbench. It has spots cut out for all the tools I use and is custom built for me.

I really like using my band saw to cut curves and angles on both wood and metal. My favorite thing about woodworking is that you get to give something shape and make it your own. It's not something you buy in a package. Instead, it's uniquely yours."
