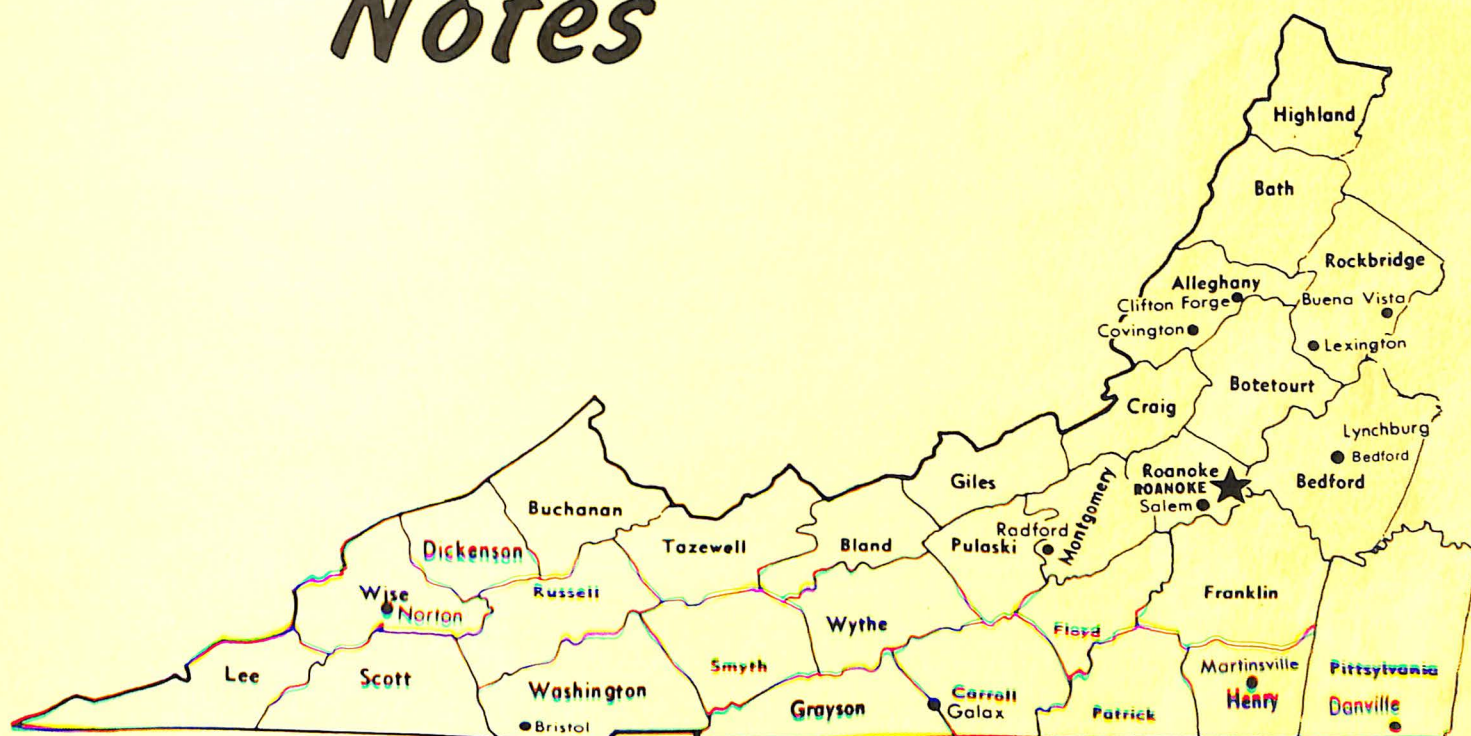

Some important matters will be brought up for discussion at our August meeting. Please try to attend.- August 18, 1:30pm in the Auditorium, main Roanoke City Public Library.

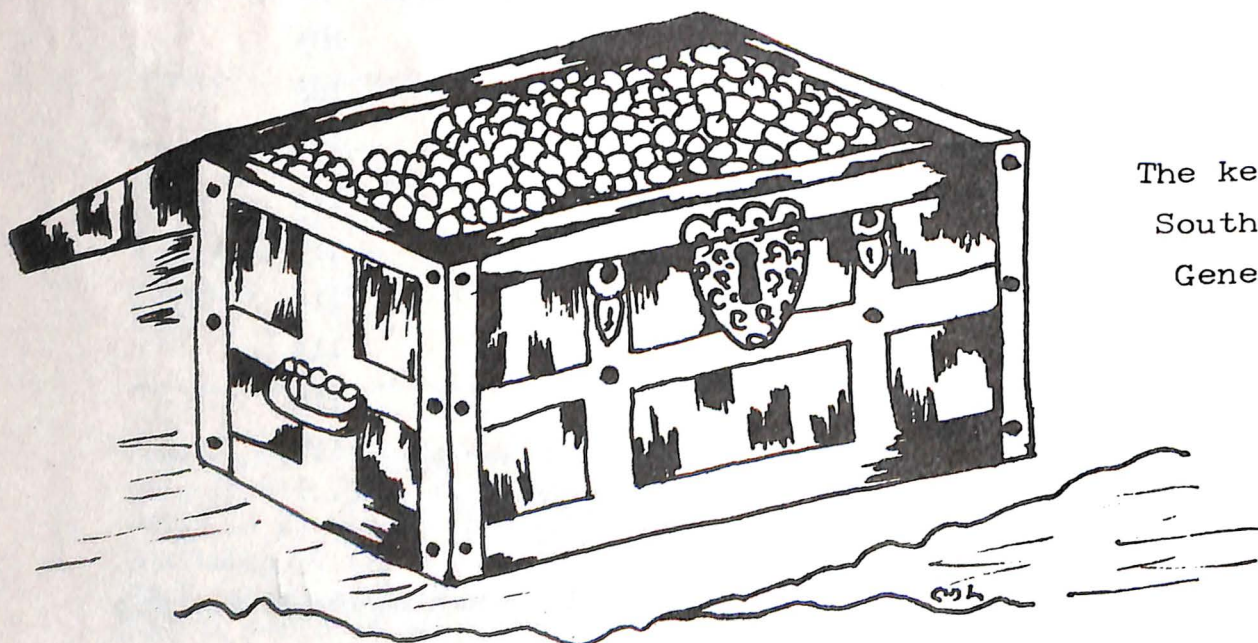

WILLIAM WEAVER IRONMONGER

In the early 1800's and through the Civil War years Rockbridge County had the reputation of being an agricultural area, but it also had considerable industrial activity. The mining, smelting, and forging of iron was one of the big businesses of that time. Some of the names in this business were Maybury who had a furnace at Vesuvius, Virginia, Jordan (of Lexington interest), McCormick (the Cyrus McCormick family), Weaver, Anderson (who ran Glenwood furnace), and Davis. At least one of these, William Weaver, kept good records and appears to have filed all the letters that he received. He was also involved in court cases which were duly recorded. His records now reside in the libraries of Duke University, University of Virginia, and the Wisconsin Historical Society McCormick collection. My brother and I have some remnants of his papers and the court records are in the Rockbridge and Augusta Court Houses.

In 1811 one William Wilson built Union Forge on Buffalo Creek near its confluence with North River, now Maury River. Three years later he sold it to a partnership consisting of Thomas Maybury of Botetourt County and William Weaver of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. They changed its name to Buffalo Forge and began operations with Maybury at the Forge, where he served as ironmaster and bought slaves for the labor force. Weaver remained in Pennsylvania where he was a member of the Pennsylvania legislature (1818-1820), had a cotton mill business, and was settling up his father's estate.

Maybury had his problems, the forge was not making a profit, he could not acquire satisfactory slaves, and had to repeatedly ask Weaver for more money. In one of Weaver's letters to Maybury he requested that he, Maybury, not mention slaves in his letters, apparently it would have been embarrassing for the Philadelphia resident to be known as a slave holder. In 1823, William came to Virginia and assumed direction of the forge operation. The partnership was dissolved, though not to Maybury's entire satisfaction, but he remained in the iron business and became the operator of the Catopaxi furnace at Vesuvius, Virginia. Under Weaver's management Buffalo Forge was a success and he admitted that it made some money. He was 42 years old when he came to Virginia, and seven years later he married a Philadelphia widow, Elizabeth Newkirk Woodson. They had no children but he seemed to have had considerable feeling for his nieces and nephews. In family correspondence and conversation for three generations he was affectionately, or perhaps respectfully, referred to as "Uncle William". How he became interested in Virginia is not known. Klaus Wust in his little book about the Dunkard pioneers tells how Alexander Mack helped found settlements near Winchester and in the Claytor Lake area. Alexander Mack was William Weaver's grandfather. One would like to think that young William was entertained with grandfatherly tales about Virginia and the mineral wealth in its mountains, thus instilling an interest that he was able to follow in later life.

As the forge prospered Weaver acquired more iron properties. He obtained the Aetna and Retreat furnaces, through the Maybury partnership, large acreage in the Buffalo Forge area, and the Bath Iron Works at the upper end of Goshen Pass.

In 1819, a stone house was built near the forge by Thomas Baggs. Weaver purchases this and used it as his residence. He later added to it, more than doubling its size. The forge industry was as near self sufficient as possible. To operate the forge large quantities of charcoal were needed, so, over the years he purchased most of the western slope of the Blue Ridge from Glasgow to

Buena Vista. Horses and mules were needed to haul the charcoal, and pig iron, so farm land was acquired to raise feed and large stables were built. There were slaves to be fed, so land was devoted to the raising of food for humans, a sewing room was put into use, and numerous cabins were built for slave quarters. In addition to the usual farm and forge buildings there were two mills, a harness shop, blacksmith shop, carpenter shop, icehouse, office building, dairy, carriage house, the company store, an up and down saw mill, and thousands of acres of land.

The Bath Iron Works had a similar development except that in addition it had mines and furnaces. The story of Bath Iron Works is well documented by Dr. Thompkins and others.

Weaver had his ups and downs with his family. He was one of ten children so he had many nieces and nephews and he brought several of them to Virginia. There is a poignant letter from his sister-in-law complaining about his treatment of her sons. William Weaver's brother had died leaving in William's care his two sons and a sum of money for their upkeep. The mother complained that he had taken them to Virginia and this would not have been their father's wish, they were not being educated properly and they were "being used to drive negros or any other menial task". She also stated that if he had any sense of justice he would act toward them as an honorable man should do. I do not know what was done or how the boys turned out but there is an audit of the trust fund account when they reached their majority and the remainder of the fund plus interest was given to them. Weaver made an arrangement with Davis (a nephew) and Jordan to run the Bath Iron Works. The works were not as profitable as Weaver thought they should be so he tried to regain control of them. There followed a lengthy law suit which, fortunately for posterity, has, by way of depositions, furnished a wealth of data regarding the operation of forges and furnaces, but it caused bitterness in the family. When his wife died (1850) Weaver asked a Davis, either his sister or niece, to come and run the household for him. The lawsuit in which Abram Davis was involved caused so much unpleasantness that the arrangement was untenable. He then asked Emma Gorgas Brady (a niece) and family to come. They came and this arrangement worked well because they stayed on and eventually inherited a large part of the estate. Will Rex a great nephew helped at Buffalo Forge and Aetna and ran the store. Charles Gorga, a nephew about the same age as Will Rex came to Virginia and was put in charge of the Aetna furnace. Charles courted and married Anne Sisson, a prominent old maidish lady of that section, and Weaver gave them the furnace works there as a wedding present. Charles soon contracted pneumonia and died. Will Rex attended the funeral and reported the happenings to his uncle. The old man listened and then commented, "Anne Sisson got my furnace damn slick, didn't she?" Incidentally Weaver apparently never tried to reclaim that property. Another nephew John Weaver Dannenhour worked for a while at Bath Iron Works but did not stay in Virginia. A niece married one of the Jordans, she died and he married another niece. C. W. Newkirk who was referred to by Weaver as his nephew also worked at Bath Iron Works, but he was probably his wife's nephew or son by her first husband. In his old age William Weaver received a letter from Abram Davis seeking reconciliation on the Bath Iron Works affair. The letter was quite emotional in content and Weaver must have made a favorable response because an entry in the Buffalo Forge journal on September 5, 1852, notes "Davis of Mississippi called on Mr. Weaver today".

Among the depositions is one about a slave named Harry Hunt. Because of his skills Hunt and his family had been moved to Bath Iron Works to help Davis and Jordan. Weaver considered it a loan and they felt that he was their property. On Christmas Eve Weaver sent an overseer with horses to bring him back to Buffalo Forge. He arrived there after dark and quietly loaded Hunt and family and started back toward Lexington. They became lost in a snowstorm and spent the night at a farm house, arriving at home the next day. I have not been able to

retrace their route, but travelling at night, by horse, in a snowstorm, from the upper end of Goshen Pass to Lexington would be a trip to remember. When asked why he chose such a time to pick up Hunt, the overseer replied that Mr. Weaver had told him to.

Weaver had a strong sense of responsibility to his slaves. He once considered selling his iron interests and moving to Mississippi and one of the reasons for not doing so, was that he did not want his people to be sold. His records show very few sales of slaves and these few were usually the result of extreme provocation. In his will he mentioned that he did not want his estate broken up because of his people. He stated, "as I have kept the bulk of my estate partly to provide for the comfort of my servants, I desire that they shall be treated with kindness and humanity". In the 1820's he set up an incentive work system for his slaves. This was not original with him. He probably got the idea from Oxford furnace, for he had purchased slaves from that business when it ceased operations and the system had been in use there. Certain norms were set for the various tasks and the slaves were paid for their accomplishments above the norms. They could use the money as they saw fit, and some purchased vacations, at 50¢ per day a man with \$10.00 could have a 20 day vacation. One man had a savings account in a Lexington bank. There is a story that he had a bet with another slave about the account and had his owner withdraw it temporarily so he could show the money and win the bet.

While many of the slaves had special skills which determined the type of work that they did in regard to the forge they were frequently two talent people performing other jobs such as carpentry, farm work, and wood cutting. It seemed that everyone did a stint at wood cutting. There was one man of the John Henry mold, named Garland Thompson. It was said that he would loaf around until Friday and then go out and cut his week's norm of wood by Saturday noon. Once when the "paterollers" broke up a party in the slave quarters, people dived out the windows and back doors but Garland strode out the front door and none dared to stop him. Many of the slaves remained at the forge after the civil war as freedman and some of their decendents still live at Buck Hill and Glasgow. This is not to say that there was just one big happy family. There were whippings and slaves did run away. During Hunter's raid some of the most trusted slaves left, and most of the others were taken to the remote "Mountain Farm" until the raiders were gone. Weaver's wife, Eliza, was very strict and was feared by the slaves. Two generations later a visiting black asked if old "Miss" still walked in the big house. It was customary for owners of slaves to rent them out to people who had need of laborers. It was also customary for a slave who did not want to go to a certain place to say so to his owner and he usually would not be sent to that place, and there were those who did not want to work for William Weaver.

The forge work was hard and had an element of danger. There were four fires and two hammers. The hammers consisted of iron heads, weighing 2 to 5 hundred pounds, mounted on wooden beams. The hammers were lifted and dropped by the water wheels. The iron heads struck on large anvils set in the floor. Men would heat the pigs of iron with charcoal and then bring the 100 pound pigs glowing hot to the anvil to be pounded by the hammers. The process produced from the brittle cast iron a form of iron called wrought iron which was strong, tough, and almost rust proof. Some of this iron was used locally but most was shipped downriver to markets in Lynchburg and Richmond. Until the canal was built there was a landing at the mouth of Buffalo Creek where boats were loaded and tied up until North River became full enough to float them downstream. This landing also served as a shipping point for people as far away as Lexington. The "boatyard road" went out Houston Street and twisted across the hills to the mouth of Buffalo Creek. The canal later furnished much more dependable transportation. It was not possible to maintain continous operation at the forge,

the water wheels and machinery were made of wood and had limited utility, so there was down time for repairs. There were droughts when there was not enough water to run the wheels and there were planting and harvest times when all hands were needed on the farm.

Weaver was an innovative farmer. He was one of the first in the area to use gypsum fertilizer and he converted one of his mills to grind it, but he may have been over-cautious when he tested Mr. McCormick's reaper. He decided that it would not work on his hilly farms, years later the reaper was used on those hills.

As one looks at his record he appears to have been an astute business man and indeed he amassed a considerable fortune for his day. He also made many bad contracts and was either suing someone or being sued most of the time that he was in Virginia. There was a suit to settle up with Maybury. In the 1820's he and a man named Doyle built Bath Iron Works, their contractual relationship changed several times and finally ended in a lawsuit. This was followed by the Davis and Jordan suit and he had one over a property line in the Glasgow area which could have been avoided if a clear deed had been written.

His wealth was legendary, but journal entries and records of his estate settlement tell the sad story. His nephew-in-law was his executor and as he handled the estate he put part of the money into tobacco which was burned in Richmond, the rest was in confederate money, and then the slaves were freed. DCE Brady was left with large land holdings, the forge, and no capital.

During Weaver's last illness his doctor stayed at his home, and incidentally was remembered in Weaver's will. Weaver died on March 12, 1863 at the age of 82. He does not come across as a man with many friends and we have no record of his religious life, but accounts of his funeral tell that a large number of people attended. He was buried in Falling Spring Cemetary one mile from his home.

By a gentleman from Henry county, we are informed of a very melancholy accident which happened there some time since, viz. Mr William Hunter, in going out one morning, to hunt took a favorite son with him, was about 16 (or 10), they had not proceeded far before they spied some turkeys on the side of a ridge; the father told his son to stay where he was and hide, till he went on the top of the ridge to intercept the turkeys if they proceeded that way, but the lad, not obeying his father crept after him some considerable distance, and got into the top of a tree which was full of leaves. The old man on his return, seeing something among the leaves of the tree which he took to be a turkey, fired, and observing it to fall went to pick it up, but to his great astonishment and grief found it to be his son.

AN ANCESTOR PROBLEM

John Billington, who, with wife Eleanor and two sons, came on the Mayflower in 1620. In 1630 John Billington was hanged at New Plymouth for killing one John Newcommon with his blunderbuss. My Derthick line proved quite good also - only a preacher that was kicked out of his church in Colchester and went West. Dodge - not bad either - only a Tristram Dodge caught stealin' sheep on Block Island. My Bliss, Welch and Sabin lines also proved to be very good. But then I came to the Billingtons and to John Billington of the Mayflower - the first New England murderer. The 'black-sheep' of the Mayflower - now mine.

Analysis

This murder by John Billington worried me a great deal until I researched the history of the Pilgrims and learned how they got to New England. The solution then became quite simple.

Solution

Now - when the Mayflower sailed for the New World it was supposed to go to Virginia. John Billington expected to land in Virginia. Instead they dumped him up there in New England among all them 'Dam Yankees'. He got made about it and finally shot one of 'em.

John Billington started the Civil War - NOT John Brown!

GILES COUNTY, VIRGINIA

The ancestry of Giles County goes back to the "original shire", now county, of Northumberland from which 116 counties were derived (see page 9, A HORNBOOK OF VIRGINIA HISTORY published by the Division of History of the Department of Conservation and Development, 1949) However for those searching public records, and/or other, for the early settlers of Giles County the records of the present day counties of Botetourt, Bedford and Franklin, Virginia, and Greenbrier, West Virginia, contain information of some families that later migrated to Giles County or sired some that came to Giles County, remembering that Giles County was in the very early days a part of Botetourt County as was Greenbrier County.

Botetourt County was formed in 1770 from Augusta County. It's southern boundary followed the then colony (now state) lines of North Carolina and what later became Tennessee from the Blue Ridge Mountains to the Mississippi River, and the northern boundary extended from the Blue Ridge Mountains at approximately the present town of Buchanan or at the James River and apparently following the course of the James and Jackson rivers a ways then on a direct course in a northwestwardly direction across present day West Virginia, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Wisconsin to the Mississippi River. The public records of Botetourt County from it's beginning are in good condition in the County Clerk's Office in spite of the fire that destroyed most of the Courthouse building a few years ago.

From Botetourt County came the short lived Fincastle County, which was formed in 1772 and dissolved in 1776. The county seat was in present day Wythe County at a community known as The Lead Mines located a short distance south of Fort Chiswell on U.S. Highway Route 52. The records of old Fincastle County are stored in the Montgomery County Courthouse in Christiansburg but it is said that they are in such bad shape, mostly illegible, that searching them results in little if anything.

Bedford County was formed in 1753 from Lunenburg County. Some Giles County early settlers are known to have resided in Bedford County but most of them settled in that part that became Franklin County.

Greenbrier County, West Virginia, was formed in 1776 from Augusta County, Virginia, and it's records are intact in the County Clerk's Office in Lewisburg. As that area of Giles County on the northwesterly side of New River downstream from The Narrows, or Falls, where the river cuts through the Peters and East River mountains, was in Greenbrier County until Monroe County was formed from Greenbrier County in 1799. Thus the records of the early settlers of that area of present Giles County are in Greenbrier and Monroe counties, West Virginia.

The first white settlers in Giles County were the Porter family. The only known record of this family being a grave marker found at present day Glen Lyn for a Mary Porter which read "killed by Indians, Nov. 28, 1742". This grave marker was found by the John Toney family that settled at this site in 1780. It is believed that the next white settlement was at Gunpowder Springs, now Eggleston, by Adam Harmon early in 1749, and that he was followed by Philip Lybrook who settled at nearby Gunpowder Springs in 1750.

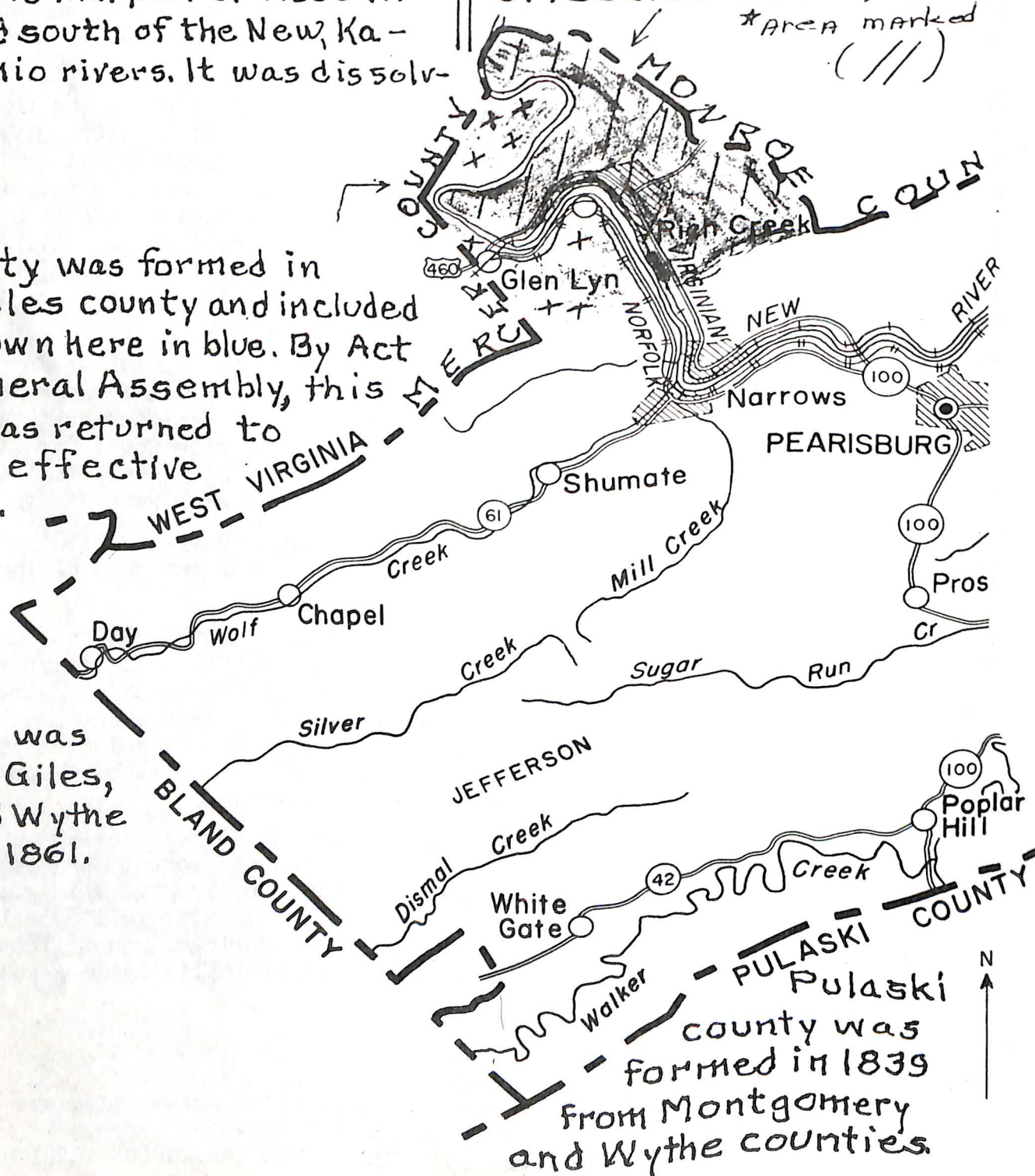
Monroe county was formed 1799, extending westward the Va. General Assembly, in red* was added to Giles effective Feb. 2, 1820.

This book is an attempt to unify information from several sources, on the early settlements of the area that was Botetourt County, Virginia. In 1782, the county was much smaller than at its formation, just 12 years earlier. In 1782 it encompassed areas now in the Virginia Counties of Alleghany, Bath, Craig, Floyd, Giles, Montgomery, and Roanoke; in West Virginia, Monroe. Names of the settlers in this area are from records of 1740 through 1795.

The land records have been researched and abstracted. These records include deeds of Augusta and Botetourt Counties, Surveyors Records, Wills, Land Tax Records, etc. Many of the records came from Kegley's memorable "Virginia Frontier" and Chalkley's "Records of Augusta County, Virginia."

The settler's names are listed in alphabetical order, following each name are the date of his death, his wife's first name if it is known, and his place of residence, if outside the area.

Below each settler's name is this information: the source of the information; the date; the number of acres; its location; also how it came into his possession, or to whom it was conveyed. The alphabetical list consists of more than 1500 names from Abbot to Zimmerman.

This book is a valuable resource for all libraries and researchers. A gift copy of the book from the author has been given to the Southwestern Virginia Genealogical Society, and it has been placed in the Virginia Room of the main Roanoke City Public Library by the Society.

Henry C Banks born 24 July 1839 believe in N.C. He is believed to be part Cherokee; enlisted in Confederate Army 1862, part of Co K 25NC.; married Laura Andrews (spelling may varie Anders, Sanders, etc) about 1863-64. They had seven children: Margaret, Harriett, Gus, John, Douglas, Polly or Mary, Clara. His wife Laura is also believed to be part Indian. Henry enlisted at Democracy, NC Where is Democracy? When and where was Laura born? When and where did she die? Who were her parents, brothers and sisters? Who were Henry parents? Brothers, Sisters?

James Jackson Massey born 21 March 1880, believe in Buncombe Co, NC, or Green Co, Tenn. James was one of 4 sons born to Mary Massey. Family tradition says Mary was not married when the boys were born, but it is possible she was. Her maiden name may have been McCoy.
