

#### GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH IN THE VIRGINIA ROOM

If you've ever read any of the numerous books that have been written on how to trace your family history, you have found in most of them a chapter on using the library during part of your genealogical research. If you have not read them, you should. THE RESEARCHER'S GUIDE TO AMERICAN GENEALOGY, by Val D. Greenwood; TRACING YOUR ANCESTRY, by F. Wilbur Helmbold; FUNDAMENTALS OF GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH, by Laureen R. Jaussi and Gloria D. Chaston; SIMPLIFIED GENEALOGY FOR AMERICANS, by Kay Kirkham; and BUILDING AN AMERICAN PEDIGREE, by Norman E. Wright, are just a few of the many "howto" books that will help you, not only in using a library, but in all phases of your genealogical research.

Not all libraries have a separate genealogical department, but if you should live near a library that does have one, you should take advantage of its sources.

The Roanoke Public Library's Virginia Room houses an excellent collection of historical and genealogical information relating, not only to Southwest Virginia, but to the entire Commonwealth of Virginia, and the surrounding states. Special funds have been established by organizations and by individuals to help provide a large proportion of the money used in acquiring additional material for the expanding collection. One such fund, established by the Southwestern Virginia Genealogical Society, has been added to not only by the society, but by individuals who have wished to contribute.

The Virginia Room collection consists of more than books; information can also be found in the form of pamphlets, microfilm, microfiche, maps, newspapers, and personal papers. These various forms contain church records and church histories, biographies, printed genealogies, state and county records (marriages, wills, deeds, tax lists, etc.), cemetery records, ship passenger lists, histories of surnames, heraldry, patriotic societies, Revolutionary War and Civil War histories and records, state and county histories, and census records.

With that many subjects to choose from, one of the basic tools that will help you locate books on a particular subject will be the card catalog. Each book is catalogued, with a card filed under the author's name and under various subjects covered by the book. For instance, if you are looking for a book on the Davis family, the cards for books with material on this family will have the heading DAVIS FAMILY in red capital letters. Information on a particular county will be headed with the name of the county in red capital letters; i.e., BOTETOURT COUNTY, VIRGINIA - MARRIAGES.

Another basic tool is the bibliography of genealogies. Three of our most widely used bibliographies are Stuart E. Brown's VIRGINIA GENEALOGIES:

A TRIAL LIST OF PRINTED BOOKS AND PAMPHLETS, Robert A. Stewart's INDEX TO PRINTED VIRGINIA GENEALOGIES, and Marion J. Kaminkow's GENEALOGIES IN THE LIBRARY OF CONGRESS.

Earl G. Swem's VIRGINIA HISTORICAL INDEX is a 2-volume set that will probably be found in many genealogical libraries around the country. This index is an excellent guide to the references found in the following:

THE LOWER NORFOLK COUNTY VIRGINIA ANTIQUARY
TYLER'S QUARTERLY HISTORICAL AND GENEALOGICAL MAGAZINE

VIRGINIA MAGAZINE OF HISTORY AND BIOGRAPHY
WILLIAM AND MARY COLLEGE QUARTERLY, 1st series and 2nd series.

All of the publications listed above can be found in the Virginia Room.

Our church records include parish records of the early Episcopal Church, which was the established church in Virginia until the late 1700's. There are also histories of the various denominations, including William Hinshaw's 6-volume set of ENCYCLOPEDIA OF AMERICAN QUAKER GENEALOGY.

The collection of individual genealogies in the Virginia Room is expanding. Some of these volumes have been published, others are simply typewritten copies of family memoirs, still others are bound copies of family group sheets. Collective genealogies in this collection include John Bennett Boddie's HISTORICAL SOUTHERN FAMILIES, Zella Armstrong's NOTABLE SOUTHERN FAMILIES, George N. MacKenzie's COLONIAL FAMILIES OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, Frederick A. Virkus' ABRIDGED COMPENDIUM OF AMERICAN GENEALOGY, and James Savage's GENEALOGICAL DICTIONARY OF THE FIRST SETTLERS OF NEW ENGLAND.

When checking for Revolutionary War records of Virginians, you will need to look at REVOLUTIONARY WAR RECORDS, VIRGINIA, by Gaius Marcus Brumbaugh, HISTORICAL REGISTER OF VIRGINIANS IN THE REVOLUTION, by John H. Cwathmey, VIRGINIA SOLDIERS OF 1776, by Louis A. Burgess, and LIST OF REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIERS OF VIRGINIA, by Hamilton J. Eckenrode. The Virginia Room also has the DAR PATRIOT INDEX and volumes 1-166 of the DAR LINEAGE BOOKS.

If you are a student of the Civil War period, you will find a good collection of histories of campaigns and battles, personal narratives and diaries, the OFFICIAL RECORDS OF THE UNION AND CONFEDERATE ARMIES IN THE WAR OF THE REBELLION, and, on microfilm, the INDEX TO THE COMPILED SERVICE RECORDS for Virginia soldiers in the Confederate Army.

Virginia's census records of 1790 and 1800 were destroyed. The 1790 census returns were substituted by tax lists from 1782-1785 for most of the Virginia counties. These lists are found in a volume titled HEADS OF FAMILIES AT THE FIRST CENSUS OF THE UNITED STATES TAKEN IN THE YEAR 1790 - RECORDS OF THE STATE ENUMERATION: 1782 to 1785, VIRGINIA. Tax records for those counties not included in this book are found in Augusta B. Fothergill's VIRGINIA TAX PAYERS, 1782-1787.

Genealogical Research in the Virginia Room - continued

In the Virginia Room we have all of the Virginia census records on microfilm from 1810-1880, and 1900. The 1890 census for most of the states was destroyed by fire. Indexes for the censuses from 1810-1850 are on hand, and for the 1900 census, we have the Virginia Soundex. It wasn't until 1850 that the census records gave the name and age of every person in a given household; before 1850, only the name of the head of the household was given, with other members of the family arranged by sex and by age groups.

In our vertical file collection, which is arranged alphabetically by subject, will be found anything from newspaper clippings on old houses and communities, to bible records, cemetery records, or papers on various families. Other sources in the Virginia Room that are used, particularly for local history, are gazetteers and business directories, Roanoke City directories from 1888 to the present, local newspapers on microfilm, and scrapbooks of newspaper clippings.

For anyone needing vital records of Roanoke County, a visit to the court house in Salem is suggested. Likewise, a visit to the Roanoke City Municipal Building is necessary for records of Roanoke City residents.

Just as our collection includes compiled court records and histories of counties in Virginia, we are beginning to branch out in obtaining compiled records and histories of surrounding states and their counties. Our indexes to the censuses of other states now include Ohio, Kentucky, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Pennsylvania, Maryland, and Indiana.

One source that should not be overlooked is the genealogical periodical. THE GENEALOGICAL HELPER, NATIONAL GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY QUARTERLY, and the AMERICAN GENEALOGIST, just to name a few, publish material pertaining to the entire country. For Virginia there are the VIRGINIA GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY QUARTERLY and the VIRGINIA GENEALOGIST. Through subscriptions and through the Southwestern Virginia Genealogical Society's exchange with other societies, the Virginia Room receives genealogical publications from all over the United States.

With the cost of gas going up, it is not always possible to travel to various parts of the country to do research. More people are turning to correspondence for answers to their problems. The staff of the Virginia Room is unable to do genealogical research. We will, however, answer requests for specific information, if given a full name, an approximate date, and a county. If a reference from a particular volume is requested, we will be glad to check the reference and send a xeroxed copy of the record. If more detailed research is desired, members of the Southwestern Virginia Genealogical Society will answer requests, or the name of a researcher will be given to you.

The Virginia Room is open from 9-5, Mondays - Saturdays, except Wednesdays, 12-5. We have microfilm readers, a microfilm reader-printer (25¢ per sheet), and a xerox machine (15¢ per sheet). If you have an opportunity to visit our Virginia Room for research, we encourage you to do so. We will be glad to help you.

VINCENT HOBBS, SR. Immigrant Ancestor of Nanetta Hotchkiss Hobbs

Vincent Hobbs, Sr., who was born ca 1720 in England or possibly Wales, arrived in America in 1735 at Dover, Delaware with two brothers, William and Beale. He settled near Hagerstown, Md. Vincent married Mary Shelby. Family tradition says she belonged in the family of Evan Shelby, Sr. who also settled in this area of Maryland. My research has found no proof of this. There may have been other Shelbys near who were related in some way to the Evan Shelby, Sr. family. Evan Shelby family was from Wales (Cardiganshire).

Vincent remained in Maryland until about 1769 when he and his son-in-law, John Benham who married Vincent's daughter Mary, went to the Holston region of Southwest Virginia. John Benham built a fort there. Vincent settled his family near Abingdon in what is now Washington County, Virginia and he died in 1804. He also made a settlement in Turkey Cove in Lee County about 1780, but Abingdon people claim he and his wife are buried in unmarked graves near their town. In any case, his children (10) were born and reared in Maryland before the move to southwest Virginia.

The date of Mary Shelby's birth is thought to be ca 1725. The only Mary Shelby I have found was born in 1735 in Maryland and she married Adam Alexander in 1752. (See papers "Search for Mary Shelby" - my notes sent to Southwest Virginia Historical Society, Wise, Va; Washington County Va. Historical Society, Abingdon, Va.)

Children of Vincent Hobbs, Sr. and Mary Shelby Hobbs:

1. James went to Missouri

2. Abner settled on the Collins river in middle Tennessee and later went to Missouri

Vincent Jr., noted Indian fighter, later went to middle

Tennessee but never married

4. Thomas wounded in expedition against the Cherokee Indians and was in the Revolutionary War

5. Mary who married John Benham

6. William killed in an ambush by Indians on the Kentucky side of Cumberland Gap

7. Ezekiel, my connecting ancestor

9. Rachel who married John Russell

10. Rebecca who married William Blanton.

The above are children as listed in DAR. They do not list Job, Joel, Hannah, or Ruth. Job, born 1759 died 1861, served in the Revolutionary and when he applied for his pension in Madison County, Arkansas in 1859 he stated he was 100 years old. He was a Baptist preacher and it is said he lived to be 102. He said his father was Vinson (sic) Hobbs and mother Ruth Thomas and that he was born in Frederick County, Virginia. Otherwise,

the names of the children are the same (except for the ones not mentioned in the DAR) as given by him in his pension papers. Revolutionary War service listed for Vincent Hobbs, SR. by DAR papers of Mrs. Mary Cecil Estes, Pennington Gap, Virginia, descendant of John Russell and Rachel Hobbs Russell (daughter of Vincent Sr.): Fought in Battle of Point Pleasant; private in Captain Daniel Smith's Co. In the defense of Fort Chiswell appears the name of Vincent Hobbs.

Ezekiel Hobbs, son of Vincent Hobbs, Sr.:

Ezekiel Hobbs had 22 children. All are mentioned in the will along with two grandchildren. The will, on file in Abingdon, Va. (Washington County) is dated 11 November 1831 and probated 27 July 1835.

Ezekiel (born 1762) was born before the Hobbs move to Virginia so he was born in Maryland. Family papers give two birth dates - one of 1753 and one of ca 1762. He was 72 plus when he applied for a Revolutionary War pension in 1834. He entered service from Fincastle County in 1776. You will note this would make him only 14. This makes the earlier date of 1753 more likely but brings us the question of whether the last of his children were not step children, perhaps his last wife's by her first marriage. In the will they are listed after "my remaining children" and they seem to have names much different in nature from the first group of children.

Ezekiel served under Captain Fulkerson and Colonel Christian; later under Captain George Adams and Major Daniel Smith and last under Colonel William Campbell. After service he returned to his home on the North Fork of the Holston River in Washington County near Abingdon, Virginia. He died June 13, 1835.

Mrs. James Hobbs of Pikeville, Ky. who sent the information on Ezekiel is the wife of James of Pikeville who has a chain of variety stores in the area. He is a descendant of Ezekiel through Ezekiel's son, Shelby Hobbs. According to their information, Ezekiel was married three times and his last wife was Elizabeth Lilly Hobbs, whom he married on or about 27 July 1803. Since my ancestor Nathan, brother of the above Shelby is mentioned in the first group of children and was born in 1790, Elizabeth Lilly was not his mother and I do not know now who his mother was. She may have been a Blubok (Blubaugh) since they were neighbors of the Hobbs in Virginia and two other Blubaugh girls married Hobbs. Elizabeth Lilly, third wife of Ezekiel Hobbs was born ca 1785, place not known. Ezekiel and Elizabeth were married in Washington County, Va.

Nathan Hobbs was born in Lee County, Virginia on 2
November 1790. He died on 1 September 1862 and is buried in
Morristown, Tennessee. He married Mildred Hargis who was the
mother of his 12 children. (This information is from Miss
Hattie Hobbs, deceased 1970, of Morristown, also a descendant
of Nathan.) Nathan is listed in the 1850 Lee County, Virginia
census with his second wife Ozina and some of his children
still at home, including my great grandfather, Creed Fulton
Hobbs, then 16 and Miss Hattie Hobbs' grandfather, Allan Wylie
Hobbs, then 18 and brother of Creed. Nathan was postmaster
at Rose Hill, Virginia 1835-1842. The home to which he moved
later in Morristown, Tennessee was still standing in 1967. My
grandfather dated a picture of the home with him (William C.G.
Hobbs) standing in front along with his wife and their only
other grandchild in 1927 and said the house was then over 100
years old. There were Hobbs in that area at this time and the
home could have belonged to a relative originally. It is said
to have been the first frame dwelling in the area, the rest
being log, and was supposedly a large plantation. Nathan
became a Methodist minister in later life and he is said to
have married a third time to a Mrs. Carriger. (1976 note W.H.T. - Believe his third wife was Mrs. Ozina King Carriger.)

Dr. Creed Fulton Hobbs, son of Nathan Hobbs, was born 1834 in Lee County, Virginia and died 14 October, 1876. From the Mormon Church Library records: Hawkins County, Tennessee marriages - Hobbs, Creed to Josephine S. Lee 2 May 1859; Hobbs, Creed to Sally Quary 14 September 1861 (Sally died 14 May 1876). Sally Quary Hobbs was born probably ca 1835-40, in Lee County, Virginia since her father, Robert Quary, is there in the 1880 census with one of her children after her death. Dr. Creed Fulton Hobbs was a physician in St. Clair, Hawkins County, Tennessee and family tradition states he performed the first abdominal operation in Southwest Virginia.

William Carroll Graves Hobbs, son of Dr. Creed Fulton Hobbs and Sally Quary Hobbs, was born in St. Clair, Hawkins County, Tennessee on 6 April 1864 and died 15 September 1930. He attended medical college in Tennessee and for a time practiced with his uncle, Dr. William Augustus Quary, before taking up the study of law. He was a prominent attorney in Lexington, Kentucky, and the family home was at 426 North Broadway, a half block from Transylvania University. He was a judge and also served in the Kentucky State Legislature 1895-1900 and 1916-1918. He married on 23 April 1890 Emma Caroline Stephenson who was born 20 February 1867 and died 6 February 1949.

See: Tice Families in America Vol. II published 1972 by Chedwato, Middleboro, Massachusetts for L. G. Tice family; Book by James Strode Elston, Vol. I published 1947 by Tuttle, Rutland, Vt., also has Tice Family. Tice married into the present day family.

Note: This history continues into the present generation.

WILL of CHRISTIAN KUNTZY, deceased 1774

I Christian Kuntzy of Alsace Township in Berks County being at this time very old and weak in Body yet God be thanked of good Understanding & Memory do hereby make my Last will and Testament in Manner following. Firstly It is my Will and I bequeath to my Wife Sarah Kuntzy my Cloathes Press with all things therein contained, her Saddle, a Tea Kettle and Utensils thereto belonging, and an Iron Pot, to do therewith as she pleases.

I give and bequeath to my wife Sarah Kuntzy yearly every year during the Time of her natural Life on my present Dwelling Place Five Pounds current Money of Pennsylvania which my Son David Kuntzy his heirs Executors Administrators or Assigns shall pay to her, together with all the following Articles herein mentioned, to wit, One Cow to be kept for her in Summer in Pasture and in Winter in good Fother & Stabling, also a good Riding Mare to be kept in the same Manner for her; the Cow my Wife may take from among my Cows, but the Mare shall be provided by my Son David and his Successors; the Third part of the Garden, a Row of Apple Trees in the Orchard to be chosen by her yearly, good Bedding Cloathing and Shoes as much as is neccessary to be provided for her, good and sufficiant small cut Fire Wood to be delivered at her House, fourteen Bushels of good Wheat to be hauld to the Mill for her as she wants it and the Meal to be brought to her House, on fatt Hog of an hundred Pounds Weight and in age and Sickness she shall be supplied with medicines and good Attendance, and the new House on my Place shall be kept in good Repair for her Dwelling during such Time.

3dly I give and devise to my son David Kuntzy all my Land and Plantation where I live in the Township and County aforesaid adjoining the Lands of Jacob Lansiscus and Henry Schmeck to have and to hold to him and his Heirs and Assigns for Ever Upon Conditions that he his Heirs Executors Administrators and Assigns shall be obliged to observe and fulfill all the above Bequests to my Wife.

4thly And Whereas I have appraised such Land to him Five Hundred Pounds Current Money of Pennsylvania whereof he shall have an equal Child's Share, and he hath already paid the Sum of Two Hundred and twelve Pounds and seven Shillings current Money of Pennsylvania; He shall therefore pay the further Sums following, to wit, forty two Pounds four shillings and six Pence to my Son Jacob Kuntzy, twenty Pounds in Two Months Time and Twenty two Pounds four shillings and six Pence in five years Time.

5thly And to my Son Abraham Kuntzy the sum of twenty Pounds in on Year ans the Sum of twenty two Pounds four Shillings and six Pence current Money in six Years.

6thly And to my Daughter Magdalena the Sum of twenty Pounds in two Years and the Sum of Twelve Pounds four Shillings and six Pence in seven Years.

7thly And to my son Christian Kuntzy the Sum of twenty two Pounds four Shillings and six Pence in three Years Time.

8thly And to my Son Henry Kuntzy the sum of twenty Pounds in four Years and

the Sum of twenty two pounds four Shillings and six Pence in eithe Years and to my Daughter Catharina and to my Daughter Maria the Sum of five Shillings current Money each, they having already received their portion of the Land.

9thly And to my Grandchildren Johannes Kuntzy, Jacob Kuntzy and Catharina Kuntzy Chaildren of my Deceased Son Johannes, The Sum of forty four Pounds and six Shillings at such Time when each of them has arrived to the Abe to twenty years to be divided in equal Shares amongst them. Their Brother Henry has recieved his Share of the Land.

10thly And all such Sums of Money above bequeathed which my Son David Kuntzy shall be allowed him after my Decease in Payment of the Land devised to him.

11thly My Will is that my Executors shall divide all the Residue of my moveable goods into ten equal Parts between my Wife and Children, the four Children of my Son John Kuntzy deceased shall receive their Father's Share according (illegible) be true Interest and Meaning hereof.

Lastly I ordain nominate and appoint as Executors of this my Will and Testament my trusty Friend Martin Orner of Chester County and my Trusty Friend Conrad Preiss of Berks County and I do hereby make null and void all Wills by me heretofore made and declare this to be my last Will and Testament and to other in Witness whereof I have hereunto set my Hand and Seal. (Illegible) This twenty fourth Day of March 1773.

James Bohon was my 2nd grt. grandfather and I have collected considerable information on him and his ancestors. He was a soldier in the confederate Army and his military service papers show that he died July 17, 1864. The name of his wife (above) is also an error. James C. Bohon married Sarah Frances Owens, June 30, 1853, Roanoke, Va. He was still married to her at the time of his death. She later remarried to George W Lloyd about 1869. I don't know how or why the name of Maria Bohon is given as his wife's name on the death record. This James C Bohon was the grandson of Thomas Bohon and Elizabeth Clark who came to Botetourt Count about 1824. The name was originally spelled Baughan or Boughan. They were from Culpeper Co., Va.....Mrs Barbara Thorn, 1607 Orchard Hts. Rd. NW, Salem, Oregon 97304

(Note: The death could have been reported to the county on Aug 1 by a member of the family or a neighbor. And how many knew what 'consort' meant? Remember the early court records can be wrong - especially the vital statistics.)

BOOK REVIEWS

THE DIARY OF HENRY BOSWELL JONES OF BROWNSBURG (1842-1871)

Captain Henry Boswell Jones of Whitehall near Brownsburg, Rockbridge Co. was born in Madison, Virginia in 1797 and moved there in 1832 where he lived until his death October 1, 1882. He married Sally Withrow, daughter of Henry Withrow of Lexington, Virginia, whose family occupied one of the most historic homes there, "Alexander-Withrow House". Three children were born to the couple, David William and John Henry Bowell, Leonora Boswell Brown. One son attended Washington College, the other, Virginia Military Institute. Both fought for the Confederacy and took over the plantation after the passing of their father, while Leonora married a medical doctor of her father's old hometown, Madison, Dr. William Aldred Jones.

H. B. Jones kept a diary from 1842-1871, which reveals the life of a very public spirited man. His many accomplishments are shown from the pages of his diary kept religiously at the end of each busy day. This diary belongs to the Rockbridge Historical Society and can be found in the files of the Society now kept in the new library of Washington and Lee University. The diary was sold to the Society in 1970 by Mrs. Henry Jones, the granddaughter-in-law of the

The entries in the diary give a good picture of farm life in Rockbridge for thirty years. Some of his many activities were model planting, running a saw mill, flour mill, a country store and public hauling. In politics he was a local Magistrate, Judge of the polls, Surveyor and Keeper of the local roads. His community services were numerous, he helped build New Providence Presbyterian Church, the Manse, the saddle house and landscaped the yard. He served as deacon, elder, and superintendent of the Sunday School. He was president of the County School Board, and founder of the Rockbridge Agricultural Society. In the War of 1861 he was Captain of the Home Guard.

A few entries of his diary: 1842, May 6\_"I am sherring sheep and will go to the forge for iron." June 15\_"Frances Wright has gone to witness at Waynesboro the wedding ceremony of her cousin, Caroline Gulley to a Mr. Wallace of Albemarle". 1863, July 14\_"I finished sewing buckwheat today and received word from John saying he was the only one of his company alive and safe. 1869, April 26\_"My dear wife Sally died this day at 2 P.M........She would have been 68 next July......1871, October 1\_\_"This day I am 74 years, am still able to ride horseback to church. I have not missed a Sabbath day school this year."

The book has 126 pages, hard cover, index footnotes and photographs. A copy has been placed in the Virginia Room of the Roanoke City Public Library, a gift from the author to the Southwestern Genealogical Society. #### WILLIAM PRESTON and the ALLEGHANEY PATRIOTS

William Preston was born December 1729 at Newton Limavaddy, Londonderry County, Northern Ireland. He was the son of John Preston (\_\_\_\_\_1747) and Elizabeth Patton (1700-1776). "When Captain James Patton (William's uncle), received an order from the Council of Virginia Colony in 1737 for land beyond the mountains he planned to bring over a shipload of relatives, friends and servants to settle the land and came asking John Preston to accompany him to America as a shipwright. For Preston's services Patton promised 4000 acres in Virginia. "A descendant recorded that "Preston did not hesitate." John and Elizabeth with their only son, William, and three daughters, Lettice, Margaret and Ann left Ireland forever.

The ship Walpole brought the Pattons and Prestons to Virginia, arriving 23 August 1738. The land beyond the mountains was Augusta County. William Preston grew to manhood fighting in the French and Indian War. When the American Revolution began he was already a leader in his region, having served as militia commander in Botetourt and Fincastle counties and in the House of Burgesses. Among the many Alleghaney Patriots were the names, Boyd, Buchanan, Cloyd, Christian, Crockett, Fleming, Henry, Lewis, McGavock, Montgomery, Pendleton, Robertson, Russell, Washington and others.

William Preston married Susannah Smith, daughter of Francis and Elizabeth Waddy Smith, on July 17, 1761 by the Reverend Patrick Henry probably at St. Paul's Anglican Church. William and Susannah were the parents of twelve children, Elizabeth, John, Francis, Sarah (Ann), William, Susannah, James Patton, Mary, Letitia, Thomas Lewis, and Margaret. William Preston died in his fifty third year and was buried in a plot a few hundred yards from his home, Smithfield, Fincastle County, now Blacksburg, Virginia. The Prestons intermarried with the families of Breckenridge, Brown, Campbell, Carrington, Floyd, Hampton, Lewis, McDowell, Marshall, Peyton, Randolph, and Watts.

Every person who has ever relied on the National Archives for research assistance should be aware of an alarming recent development which is seriously threatening your ability to do organized research in the future:

The new Administrator of the General Services Administration (GSA), taking advantage of the law which makes the National Archives and Records Service a branch of GSA, has issued orders to disperse many of the collections now housed in Washington and send them to the regional branch closest to their source of origin. This means that searchers in military or immigration or similar collections of records will have to pursue the data all over the country in assorted regional offices, many of them already ill-equipped to service the many researchers who would now be seriously augmented in numbers.

In the opinion of many knowledgeable people, including members of the Citizens' Advisory Council to the Archives, this misguided move must be stopped or our National Archives will cease to be the great central resource for genealogists, historians, and authors, that it has always been.

Some of the important collections are already being processed for dispersion.

Many of us are addressing individual letters of protest to David Rubenstein in the Office of Assistant to the President for Domestic Affairs and Policy, The White House, Washington, DC 20500. Letters may also be sent to your Senators [Washington, DC 20510] and to your Congressmen [Washington, DC 20515] to make known your views on this matter.

Whatever you can do to disseminate this information will be appreciated by every American concerned with the future of the National Archives and Records Service.

## Archives Dispute Goes to White House

General Services Administrator Rowland G. Freeman III, the former Navy admiral who is pressing ahead with his plan to reorganize the National Archieves, has been attacked by his foes on a new flank: the White

Until recently most of the controversy was confined to the chandeliered Archivist Reception Room at the Archives on Pennsylvania Avenue, or Freeman's ornately paneled conference room at GSA headquarters across town.

Now, in an effort to get Freeman's boss, President Carter, to intervene, historian John Hope Franklin, head of the 15,000-member American Historical Association, and the two most recent chief archivists have taken their grievances to domestic policy chief Stuart Eizenstat's office.

The academicians and scholars are upset by Freeman's announced intention of shipping hundreds of thousands of cubic feet of historical records from the overstuffed Archives headquarters in the Federai Triangle to roomier regional centers throughout the country.

The admiral says the shift will make better use of expensive storage space and also "bring history to the

But his critics say Freeman's plan, if carried out, will make archival research much more difficult and, in some cases, render it impossible.

"It's the craziest thing I've heard of," says historian Franklin. "People ask me, 'What the hell is going on at the National Archives?"

According to one participant, the delegation to the White House told Eizenstat aide Al Stern that Freeman was bypassing professional opinion in making decisions about the Archives. The group focused its criticism on the shifting of records as proposed by Freeman, the participant said.

Stern's only reaction, according to the source, was to ask for more information about the controversy, and it was subsequently sent to him.

Last week a group of local historians and archivists formed an Emergency Committee to Preserve the National Archives. The new group's letterhead already includes the names of well-known scholars, including William Appleman, new president of the 8,000-member Organization of American Historians, and Herbert Gutman, one of the leading experts on the slave experience in the South,

In yet another example of the anti-Freeman offensive, James B. Rhoads, who resigned as archivist last summer, has gone public with a frontal attack on his former boss.

"I am convinced that there is a real very danger that in the course of a fe wmonths he [Freeman] may undo the work of three generations of professional archivists who have built possibly the finest national archives in the world," Rhoads said in a recent talk to archivists and historians.

The focus of the controversy now has shifted to the imminent selection of a successor to Rhoads.

Freeman, echoing criticisms made by the General Accounting Office and a House subcommittee, has claimed that the Archives, which is responsible for more than 3 billion documents ranging from the Declaration of Independence to canceled Treasury checks, is paralyzed by mismanagement an drefuses to adopt current, more efficient techniques of record keeping.

But because Freeman stresses management talent as his No. 1 prerequisite in a new archivist, his critics fear he will choose someone who will treat the Archives less as a national cultural institution than as a balky bureaucracy in need of modernizing.

At an all-day session today in Freeman's conference room, an advisory selection committee will hold its last session before sending names of qualified candidates on to a GSA panel, which will make the final recommendations to Freeman.

But there are fears among committee members that the selection process is not working. "I see decisions be ing made [by Freeman] in a way that will drive off good candidates," said one member. . . Frankly we have been disappointed in the number and quality of candidates."

#### History of house

The first section of the Alexander (Adam Hance) House was built in 1810. As it stands today, the 12-room structure is now a two-story clapboard building with chimneys of brick and native stone. The rafters over the log section are fastened together with wooden pegs.

We received a correction to the Roanoke County Death Register which is on page 11 -- The early Vital Statistics were very haphazarded -- So, just because they are court records, don't say that "it" is true --- I have found too many errors in these records. Remember that these records had to be copied into the register and mistakes could be made and were.

A copy of the original of the 1850 Russell County, Va, Mortality Schedule will be placed in the Virginia Room and a copy will be sent to the court house of Russell County.

PLEASE read the letter from the National Genealogical Society and write to your congressman. We(VAN) cannot express our opinion as a society but our members as individuals can and should. For myself, I agree with the letter.

The 1979 index was mailed and late -- have a very good excuse -- had facial surgery and could not wear my glasses, plus the holidays. I would have made a very good impressionist painter -- could see the forest but not the trees.

- 1. Please type, if possible, on 8½x11" paper, single space, with minimum margins of 1" on all sides and headings patterned on those in this issue. PLEASE use a dark ribbon and CLEAN keys, mail in large manila envelope if ready to publish. If handwritten, please write plainly or print. If you feel you cannot type well, please type the material with double space. Please read the material over before sending it and check all dates.
- 2. Give source of material. Original documents where found, type, number of page, etc. We cannot print material from printed source unless we have permission from the author.
- 3. Deadline for submitting material is the first of the month previous to the month of publication.
- 4. Material contributed will not be returned unless accompanied by a stamped self-addressed envelope.
- 5. We welcome all family histories (may have to be edited due to space) copies of court records, Bible records, etc. That little bit of information may be of help to someone. Of course, we cannot promise next issue publication.
- 6. On family histories, our policy is to print prior 1900 -- much as we would like to carry forward the modern day generations it uses too much space.

NOTE: We cannot vouch for the accuracy of the material submitted to us or that the "translation" of the original document is true. If you have read such material, you can understand.

#### QUERIES:

- 1. Unless queries are to be used as fillers, submit one at a time. Since this is a quarterly, queries not used when originally submitted may become dated and of no value to the writer.

- 3. Be sure your query makes sense. Don't abbreviate (we will) or over simplify. If longer than 50 words, we will edit.
