

#### CASSEL BIBLE

Contributed by Colonel William Preston Chapter NSDAR Roanoke, Virginia

The Bible offered to the National DAR Museum (Nov 6, 1964) by Anne Shelor Kennett, past regent of the Colonel William Preston Chapter, DAR, and her sister, Kathleen Shelor Bibb, was printed in Edinburg, Scotland in 1752 by Adrian Watkins, His Majesty's Printer, making it a quarter of a century older than the Declaration of Independence. It was imported by the Cassel family which had come to Philadelphia in 1686 on the "Jefries" after a voyage of seven months. They had come in response to the invitation of William Penn who, knowing of the miserable political conditions in Germany, had gone there to seek settlers for his Pennsylvania colony.

The original owner of the Bible was a young girl, Deborah Cassel, a fifth generation American, who was a war prisoner with her parents in Philadelphia when the British occupied the city. It was in her possession there when the Declaration of Independence was signed and when the Liberty Bell was first rung. During the time that the British held the city the Cassels were forced to burn their mahogany furniture to provide fuel for heat.

Across the Delaware River, three miles from Philadelphia, in Gloucester, N.J., lived John Banks, son of Capt. Richard Banks, who in September 1776, at the age of 19 years, followed the example of his father and joined Washington's Continental Line. In December of 1776 John Banks was stationed in Bucks County, Pennsylvania, and there first saw General Washington. John Banks was in one of the many crafts of various types in Washington's famous Christmas night crossing of the Delaware, and participated in the taking of the 900 Hessians at the battle of Trenton December 26, 1776, and went with the army to Princeton where the Americans won another battle.

Later, on March 9, John Banks was taken prisoner by the British. His Captain (John Cozens) was also taken prisoner. Both were detained three months in Philadelphia, at that time occupied by the British. On June 17, 1778, the prisoners were taken by water to New York City. The British evacuated Philadelphia the next day, following the news that France had become an ally of the colonies. Three weeks later, July 7, 1778 there was a prisoner exchange, and John Banks returned to his home in Gloucester, N.J. On July 13, 1778 he and Deborah Cassel, of Philadelphia were married. It is probable that the young couple had met during peaceful colonial days and had found a way to continue their romance while both were war prisoners in Philadelphia.

During his eight tour in the Continental Army John Banks was made a sergeant, and his last military service was in guarding the salt mines on the coast of New Jersey.

After their marriage Deborah (Cassel) and John Banks lived in Gloucester, N.J., but later, hoping to acquire a large tract of land for their heirs, they emigrated southward, stopping for a time in Frederick County, Maryland, then in Shenandoah County, Va., and then moved on to Montgomery County, Va. Land was cheap here, and Deborah found that she

could buy a farm with one of the handsome coverlets she had brought with her from Philadelphia, as the settlers there had never before seen such fine handiwork. It is said that in this way she bought farms for several of her children.

Wherever they went Deborah took with her the Bible which had been a present from her parents. Attesting to the care which she gave it, is the original leather binding which is still intact although the Bible has been in constant use for about 210 years. It contains records of the births of the twelve children of Deborah and John Banks as well as other family information.

Ruth Banks, daughter of John and Deborah Banks, and great grandmother through their mother, of the donors of the Bible, was born in New Jersey August 23, 1783.

Mary Abagail Banks, daughter of John and Deborah Banks, also great grandmother of the donors of the Bible, through their father, was born in Montgomery County, Va., March 25, 1798.

The said Arthur Roberson being duly Summoned & appearing The Court Proceeded to the Examination of divers Witnesses as well in behalf of the Commonwealth as the said Roberson & it being Proved he has shewn a Friendly disposition to America. The Court are of Opinion that the said Roberson be Acquitted.

The said George Elliott & Walter Lamb being duly Summond & not appearing the Court Proceeded to the Examination of divers Witnesses as well on behalf of the Commonwealth as the said Elliott & Lamb Whereupon they are of opinion that the said Elliot & Lamb comes under the Act of Assembly & that it be Certified to the Governor & Council agreeable to the said act. (signed) John Salmon

MB 5, p 274: Apr 13, 1857: Patrick Lynsky an alien who has lately arrived in the United States and desirous of being naturalized a citizen therof this day appeared in court and in pursuance of the Act of Congress made oath that he intended to become such citizen and renounce his allegiance to his sovereign.

"Community at the Crossroads" is more than the study of the village of Bonsack. It contains a wealth of information on the Valley settlers who came into Virginia with English, Scotch Irish, German and German-Swiss heritage. Some of these family names were: Bonsack, Cook, Crumpacker, Davis, Gish, Harshbarger, James, Layman, Lunsford, Moomaw, Murray, Smith, St.Clair, Stoner, Wood, Woodson and many other related families.

The book is well documented from many sources; books, church records, court records, interviews, maps and newspapers. Family cemetery records of the Bonsack Cemetery - new and old plot; Cook, Gish, Moomaw, Smith and St. Clair are included. There are 48 illustrations, including old photographs, homes and others.

From the New Frontier (1749-1800) Augusta and Botetourt Counties, Bonsack's beginnings (1800-1850), the coming of the railroad, War, Reconstruction, and Bonsack's Boom (1851-1900) into the 20th Century, an era of change is discussed in Community at the Crossroads. # THE BRICKEY HERITAGE by

## Raymond L Brickey

From early researchers and the OLD BRICKEY BIBLE recently presented to the Virginia Room of the Roanoke City Public Library, Roanoke, Va, Jean Bricquet was the progenitor of the Brickeys in the U.S.A. According to the 1815 Brickey Bible" "John Brickey came from France with his wife about the year 1680 AD. His children were, JOHN, JARAD, JINNY, MARY and PETER. John had all daughters. Jarad had one son, John, who died without children. Peter married Winifred Lucas and hadJARAD, JOHN, TEMPERANCE, WINIFRED, PETER, WILLIAM and ELIZABETH."

The Brickey descendants are located in all of the states of the USA. Those migrating from Virginia to another state and their descendants, will carry a prefix of the state's two letter abbreviation before their index number.

There were Brickey Revolutionary War Patriots. Peter was too old to serve. He received a citation for patriotic services by furnishing supplies to the militia. William, Peter's son was a "fifer" in the

army. He was present at the surrender of Cornwallis. He received a pension of \$50.00 annually in his old age. Peter, the son of Jarad and grandson of Peter 1st, served in the Botetourt County militia on two occasions. His second wife received a land grant in Kentucky. Gerard, Jr, son of Jared and grandson of Peter, served in the Revolutionary army and was listed in the 1840 census as having received a pension.

The BRICKEY HERITAGE contains 458 pages, well documented (copies of many original documents included) and completely indexed. There are copies of some pages from the old Brickey Bible. A FRONTIER MURDER
by
Theodosia W. Barrett

"One of the most intriguing and complex murder cases in the early history of Southwest Virginia was perpetrated September 27, 1817 at Dickensons Ford on Clinch River near where Russell and Tazewell Counties meet. Abner Vance committed the murder. Lewis Horton was the casualty." The sector of Clinch Valley was an isolated, unique and scenic locale in the 1700s. Very few settlers dared to invade the Cherokee-Shawnee hunting grounds before the Revolutionary war. Many of the permanent settlers arrived in the late 1700s. They were a mixture of Scot-Irish, Dutch, Germans and possibly others. They were attracted to the remote southwest Virginia for various reasons.

The pioneers coped with the hardships and privations of frontier living in a remarkable manner. By combining their skills by 1817 the wilderness had been transformed into a progressive community of picturesque plantation homesteads.

Lewis Horton was a descendent of two early Clinch Valley families, the Hortons and Kendricks from Stafford County, Va. There is no known record of Abner Vance's coming to Clinch Valley. He married into the Howard family, who was a prominent early family. He had eleven children. Abner Vance, according to Russell County Court records was an esteemed citizen, Baptist preacher, poet, Indian fighter and long hunter, fought a losing battle through a series of trials to save his life.
