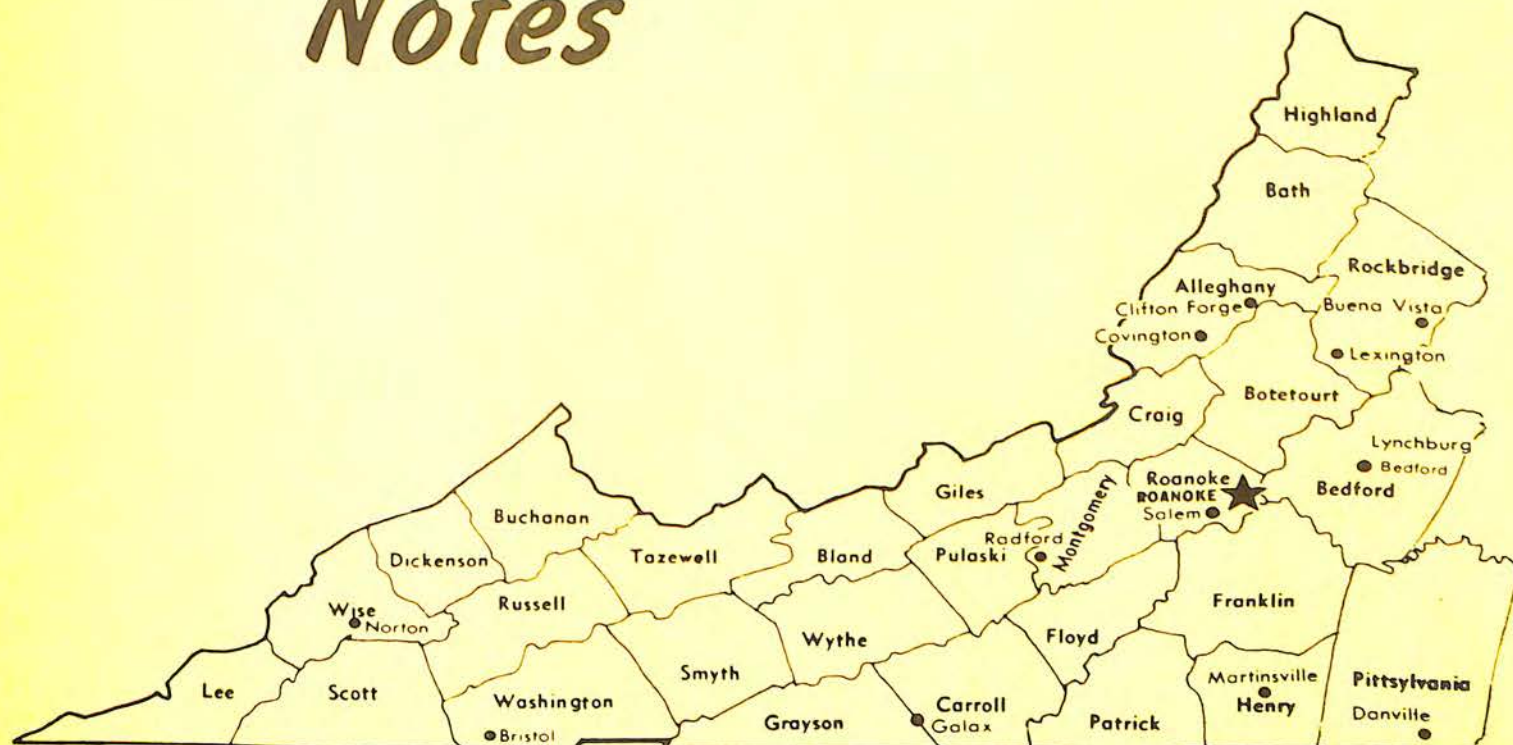

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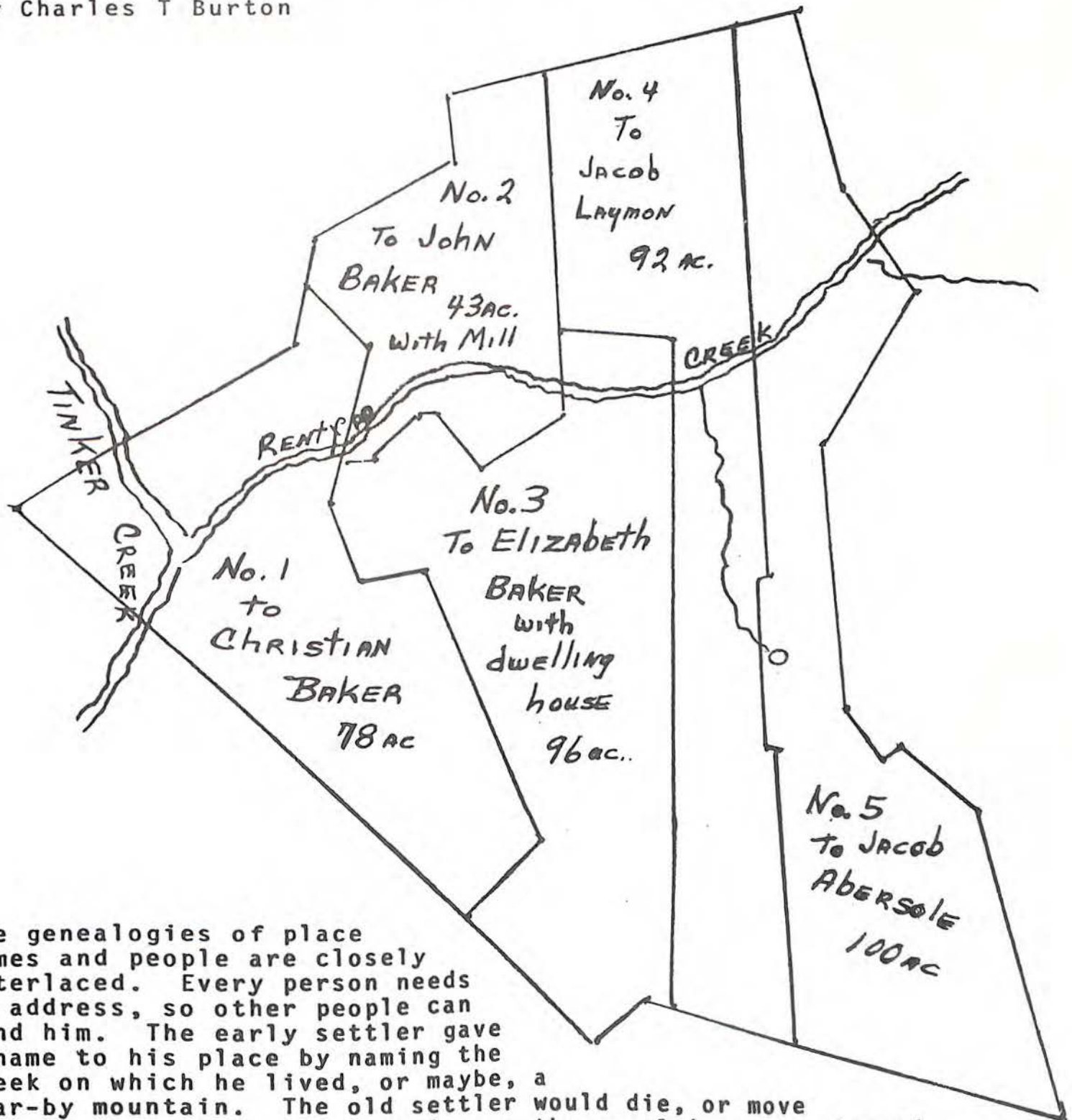

GENEALOGY OF PLACES AND PEOPLE

The genealogies of place names and people are closely interlaced. Every person needs an address, so other people can find him. The early settler gave a name to his place by naming the creek on which he lived, or maybe, a near-by mountain. The old settler would die, or move away; new people would come in, so the people's names changed, and in like manner, the place name sometimes changed.

The sketch, above, will help me tell you about my place, and it's genealogy, and the genealogy of it's people.

I live on a small corner of the No. 1 lot, which is on State Route No.

799. My mailing address is Troutville, Va., Route No. 2, Box 111, zip 24175. When the first white man came to the area, there was no Troutville, roads, mail routes, or zip numbers.

One of the first white settlers, in this area, was Stephen Rentfro, who gave his own name to the creek that flowed through his land. We are not sure how the Tinker Creek got it's name. One theory being, it was named for one of Rentfro's sons, who had the first name of Tinker.

James Cole came about the same time as Rentfro, and on 20 Sept 1745 staked out 400 acres at the intersection of Rentfro and Tinker creeks. This was pateneted to him, and he made improvements on it, as was required. It was an ideal location to build dams to provide power to run mills. The improvements made by Cole, may have included a dam. The place then became known by the name, Cole's improvement on Rentfro Creek.

On 14 Apr 1752, Cole sold to George Robinson. As far as we know, Cole never lived on the land, but Robinson and his family made it their home. George was a capable and industrious man, and trusted by the others who were coming to take up land, near by. He became Justice of the Peace in 1753, and Captain of Foot in 1754. He died in 1763, and by his will, conveyed the place to his two eldest sons, James and Samuel. They, and their wives, on 11 Nov 1770, sold to Thomas Madison.

Both the County, and the Parish of Botetourt were formed in 1770. The Parish Church was soon established in the county seat, Fincastle. Rev. Adam Smyth was transferred, to become the Rector. A large tract of land was acquired from Joseph Cloyd, for a Glebe. A Glebe was land owned by the Church, on which the Rector could live, and work to support himself and family. However, there were no improvements on the Cloyd tract, so the Vestry asked for permission to sell it, and purchase land with improvements. Mr Madison convinced them, that his tract on Rentfro Creek had improvements and was the tract they should purchase. In 1777, the General Assembly authorized the sale of the Cloyd place, and the purchase of Mr Madison's. So, beginning in 1777, Mr Madison and the Vestry considered the tract we are talking about, by the name "The Glebe."

Radical changes took place during and after the War. Property that formerly belonged to the King, and the Church, became the property of the Commonwealth of Virginia. Until a new constitution was written, and new laws passed, it was anybody's guess, who owned what. Evidently Madison had never been paid for the land, for, at his petition, the General Assembly, on 5 July 1784, ordered that a grant issued to him, for it. It seems, that this was never done, for we see that on another petition the Assembly named trustees, who were to make a deed to convey it to the rightful owner. No deed of this nature has been found, but on 14 Feb 1795, he conveyed The Glebe, now said to contain 404 acres, to Christian Eversole.

Eversole lived in Maryland. His son-in-law, Henry Baker, came on the land, to live, and to care for it. Eversole died in 1805, and by will, devised an half interest, of this land, to Baker; who, by 1811, had purchased the other half from the other heirs, and thus became the sole owner.

Henry Baker died in 1837, and the tract was divided between the heirs. Some didn't like their parts, so a second survey was made on 23 April 1838. The plat at the beginning of this article, was taken from that survey. At that time, this place was known as both The Glebe, and Baker's Mill; and also Glebe Mill.

Now, let me comment, briefly on each of the partitioned lots.

Lot No. 1, was 78 acres, and went to son, Christian Baker. This was the lower part, and lay on both sides of Tinker cree, and included the mouth of Rentfro Creek. The surveyor sometimes called Fentfro Creek, the Mill branch of Tinker Creek. As I said, my home is in the extreme northwest corner of this lot. Being raised to the miller trade Christian soon built his own mill and mill dam, on this part. The neighborhood, then, began to be called Glebe Mills, with the "s". The home he built, at this place has been lately remodeled and restored and is now the home of Mr Lawson. Christian used the power from his dam, not only to grind grain, but also to card wool, and later, to run the flake hominy mill. As a child, my mother remembered the flood waters that washed out this lower dam. It was never rebuilt. The flake hominy mill was moved to the upper building and was operated by the power from the upper dam, for a number of years.

Lot No. 2, was 43 acres, "including the mill" and went to son John Baker. He was not much interested in the milling business, so sold this part to other heirs and in-laws, and is said to have gone to the State of Ohio, and never returned. After some shuffling and moving of division lines, among the kinfolks, John Layman was the owner of 74 acres, which included the mill. He had possession of the 74 acres for about 20 years, and built the dwelling house that stood across the creek from the Mill. Mr Layman sold to the McClures in 1863; and they in 1873 sold 12 acres of it, including the mill and dwelling, with other buildings attached, known as Glebe Mill, to my great-grandfather, Giles S. Thomas. Then his son, my grandfather, CB "Fal" Thomas, purchased 5 acres, that adjoined the 12 acres, and was the northwest corner of Lot No. 1. When Giles died, Grandpa bought out the other heirs, and became the owner of the Glebe Mills tract, but continued to live in the house he built on the 5 acres. After the death of Giles, the dwelling on the 12 acre part was used for several years as a canning factory, and then just for storage, until it began to decay, and became unsafe, and had to be torn down. That was a sad day. Grandpa hired Mr Goad, a neighbor, who came with his mule, to remove the logs, one by one. This was in the nineteen twenties. A little later, I will tell you a little more about the mill building.

Lot No. 3, was 96 acres, and was assigned to the widow, Elizabeth Baker; containing the dwelling house and old burying ground. The dwelling was only about thirty-five yards from the Mill. I remember the outward appearance; it was two full stories tall, with a large chimney in the center, and another on the right end. The lags had been covered with clapboards, and was always kept whitewashed. On it's front, facing the mill, were four small windows and the door; just a plain wooden door, nothing fancy. The front porch was small. The ground sloped away, so the steps to the porch were long, maybe thirteen or so. On each side of the steps were stubs of large locust trees, whose

tops had been removed to protect the house. Each tree was covered by climbing ivy vines with red trumpet-shaped blooms. I was never inside the house, but my mother spoke of it as being plainly decorated, and like the outside, nothing fancy. She was fascinated with the unique stairway to the second floor. It was very narrow, with a door at bottom and top. You entered near the large fireplace downstairs, made two turns and came out near the fireplace upstairs. Thus, the stair circled the chimney. It was thought by the latter owners, that the left side of this house with the central chimney, was built by George Robinson, or his sons. For so was the tradition passed down. After the Bakers made this their home, it remained in the hands of their descendants, until it was torn down. Henry Baker's widow died in 1841, and their unmarried daughter, Elizabeth, lived there, until she died in 1870. By her will, she conveyed to her niece Sarah L Baker who soon married Abraham W. Peery. From Peery, ownership went to their daughter, Bessie, who married a Mr Long, who replaced this stout old home with a more modern bungalow, built on the same foundation, in the nineteen twenties.

Lot No. 4, was 90 acres and went to Jacob Layman. Lot No. 5, of 100 acres, went to Jacob Eversole. These last mentioned lots were higher up the creek, and, as far as I know, had little to do with the industry and business of the lower parts.

Now, let me tell you about the last days of the Glebe Mills building. Yes, it was still known as Glebe Mills, even after the lower dam went out. My Grandfather had brought his saw mill from the woods and geared it to the water power; and also built a box factory, where thin wooden boards were cut and nailed into boxes and crates.

I have saved the most interesting part, at least the most interesting, to me. I am told that the early pioneer, who wanted to build a dam, felled trees so they lay across the stream, some eight or ten feet apart. The space between was then filled in with rocks and dirt. This dam was also used as a way of crossing the stream, because whatever the power was used for; the crossing was needed. The contour of the ground, a short way upstream from the mill site, indicates that such a dam existed there. There is evidence that the area above this dam filled up with mud, so that the dam at this place was useless. The new dam was further up stream, and was constructed of hewn timbers anchored to the rocks by iron rods wedged into holes drilled therein.

The water flowed swiftly from the dam, along a ditch, called a race, to near the mill building. Then it entered the trunk, a trough supported on heavy wooden post-legs. The trough, or trunk, made a U-turn over the 18 foot high water wheel. In this way the water, after it had rode the wheel down, would flow under it as it continued back to the main channel of the creek. Flowing under the wheel, would add just a little to the horsepower developed.

The mill, itself, was of brick, about thirty-five feet square, and you might say two and a half floors tall. The top floor was the same size, but the slope of the roof limited the head room at the eaves. One floor was about twelve feet above the other. There were two out-

side doors. Each was in two sections, so that one half could be opened and the other remain shut. The door at the back, opened onto the ground, or lower floor. The front door was on the main, or second floor. The walls of the first floor were twenty inches thick, and above that, sixteen inches. The windows were small, and of two six-pane sashes each. There were three on the end with the wheel, five on the other end, four on the lower side, and two on the front.

About half the lower floor was used for storage of supplies and equipment, that would not be harmed by dampness. The other half contained wooden cog wheels, large and small, belt wheels, large and small, and other machinery. The top floor was solely for the storage of grain before grinding.

The second floor was truly the central part of the operation. The north corner was partitioned off for an office, and contained a small fireplace in the corner. As you entered the front door, from the loading dock, around the wall, in a clockwise direction, there was Mr Baker's flake hominy mill, then the cleaning machinery; then one of the stone burr mills, then along most of the back wall was the Genuine Japanese Silk Bolting Machine, that Grandpa installed a short time before he closed the mill to public grinding. Along one of the office partition walls was a large bin for the bulk storage of the finished flour. Between this bin and the Bolting Machine was the machine to power-pack flour into barrels, for shipment; one hundred and ninety-six pounds to the barrel. In the center there was the stairs, leading down; the one leading up, was in the left corner of the back wall. In the center, by the stairs, was the biggest and best burr mill.

Now, come along with me as my Grandpa took me on my first guided tour. He no longer ground for the public, but did grind for himself. On this tour, we ground some whole wheat midlings for the hogs. I was only about five years old, but I was a part of the operation. I have always been interested in all kinds of machinery, so this day is a high-light in my memory. I was lifted up so I could stand in the window sill, and watch as he explained, and showed me how to start the mill. The water gate was cranked open to just the right spot, until the water got the wheel turning at a pretty good speed, then closed to another spot where the speed was just right. As the wheels, inside and outside, responded to the power of the water, the floor shook, and the air was filled with groans and growls; but that was as it should be. We then went to the mill that was in the middle of the floor, and opened a little door that allowed a trickle of wheat to go into the top. As the ground feed slid down the chute, Grandpa caught a little, for testing between thumb and forefinger. After the adjusting wheel was in exactly the right position, I was again lifted so I could catch some of the feed in my hand. It was explained to me that a good miller checked the feed this way pretty often to be sure it was fine enough and was not too fine and not getting too hot. At that age I was anxious to know all about everything, and I believe Grandpa was happy to tell me. He turned the Cleaning Machine on for just a little, so I could see how it worked, how the fan blew away the chaff and dust, how the three trays, each with different size holes, shook back and forth as the grain passed along. First the

small holes allowed the fine dirt and dust to fall through. The next tray had holes a little larger, to let the smallest grains to through. The next larger holes would let the nice fat good grains to onto the conveyor belt to the storage bin. Anything too large to go through any of the holes, went on over and fell into the box to be thrown out. He didn't start the flake hominy mill, but did show me how it worked. The bottom of the machine was round and slits with sharp cutting edges similar to a hand shredder I had seen used in the kitchen, to shred cabbage for slaw. When the softened corn kernels entered, wooden paddles turned and pushed them over the cutting edges, which sliced them into very thin slices. These slices were then dried in the sun and stored. Grandpa said sometimes these slices were toasted in the oven and became corn flakes. For the next several years, if anyone asked what I was going to be when I grew up, the answer was sure to have been, a miller.

I wanted to tell you these things while I still remember them, well. That thing called Progress has removed so much of what used to be. In Robinson's time, the public road forded the Renfro Creek just above the division line between Lots No. 1 and 2; and the mill was reached by a lane that ran between the mill and the Robinson home. When it was decided to bridge the creek, the public road followed the mill lane, past the house and made a sharp turn back to the creek. In the early nineteen hundreds, the roller mill was developed, which turned out more flour with less power, so the days of the old rock burr mills were numbered. So repairs were not kept up on dam or mill. In 1919, the upper dam went out; the old shingle roof of the building began to leak, the woodwork began to rot, and the bricks began to crumble in places, making it unsafe for the sightseer, and the livestock that grazed around it. After some of the machinery, and fine lumber was removed, charge charges of dynamite were placed at it's base, and Glebe Mills died. that was a sad day in the nineteen thirties.

Several years after the building was gone, the road was changed again, so that it now passes directly over the spot.

The spot of land will remain forever; the names man assign to it change; the names of the people who pass by change; the names given the place and the names of the people live on only in the memory.

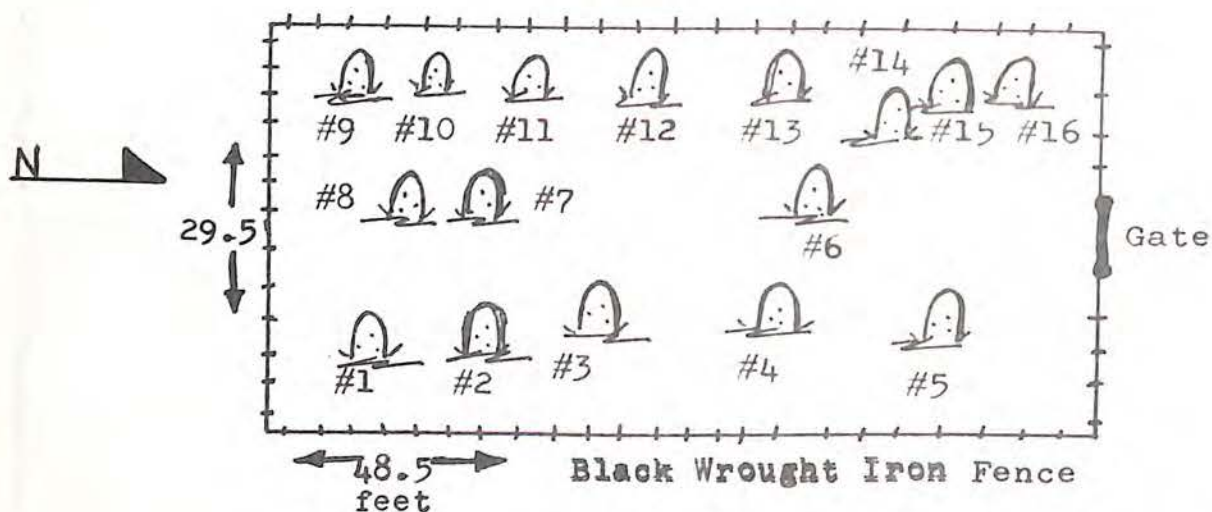

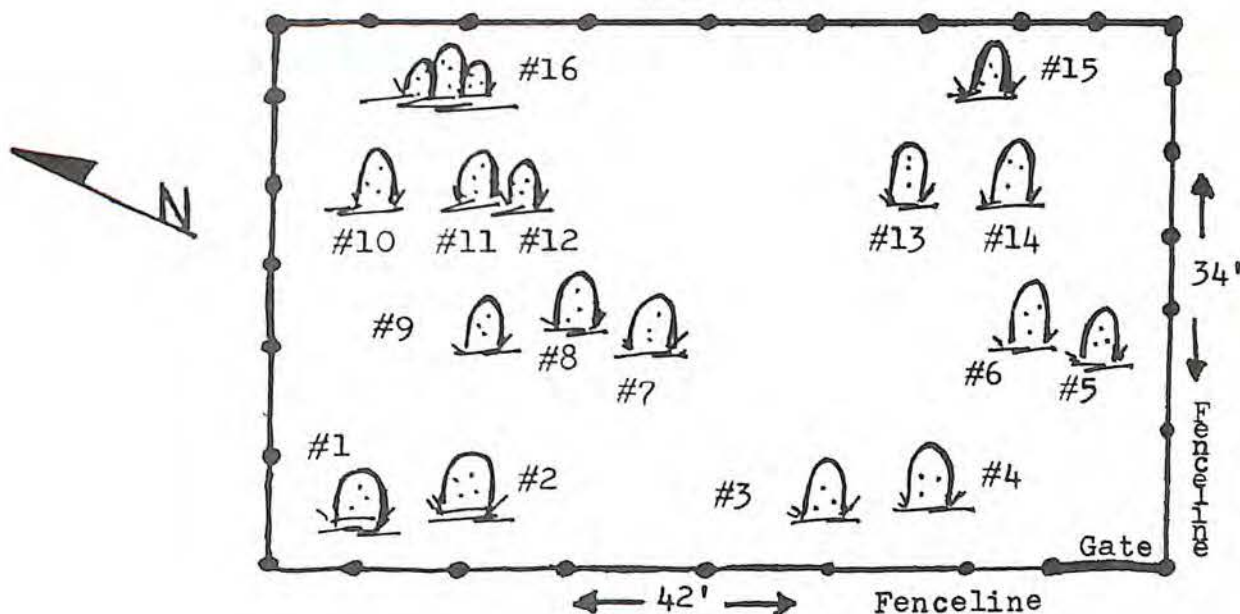

"John Brickey came from France with his wife about the year 1680 A.D.

His children were John, Jarard, Jinny, Mary and Peter. John had all daughters. Jarad had one sone, John who died without children.

Peter married Winifred Lucas and had Jarard, John, Temperance, Winifred, Peter, William and Elizabeth."

The Brickey descendants are located in most of the states of the U.S.A. Those migrating from Virginia to another state and their descendants will cary a prefix of the state's two letter abbreviation before their index number.

There were Brickey Revolutionary War Patriots. Peter was too old to serve. He received a citation for patriotic services for furnishing supplies to the militia. William, Peter's son, was a "fifer" in the army. He was present at the surrender of Cornwallis. He received a pension of \$50.00 annually in his old age. Peter, the son of Jared and grandson of Peter 1st, served in the Botetourt County Militia on two occasions. His second wife received a land grant in Kentucky. Gerard Jr., son of Jared and grandson of Peter, served in the Revolutionary Army and was listed in the 1840 census as having received a pension.
