SEARCHING IN VIRGINIA

These comments on Virginia will concern mostly the early period and counties, the counties where it is difficult to get records and the southwest area where many of our ancestors ended up after generations of slow movement across the state from a beginning in Henrico and other original Shires.

On July 30, 1619 Virginia had called to order, a group from which the newly-elected Burgesses from each town, hundred or plantation would form the first representative legislative body in the New World. The Royal Governor was Sir George Yeardley and after the necessary preliminaries he established a precedent for future American legislatures - he appointed two committees to study and recommend action on those parts of Virginia's Great Charter of 1618 dealing with land. Most of the laws in existence were adopted - fines were payable in tobacco and labor; every householder was supposed to reserve a barrel of corn for each person living on his land, and this corn was to be sold to the Virginia Co. of London or exchanged for needed products. Land was the first thing of record in Virginia and the product thereof - tobacco - the second and because of these items we have records to help trace our ancestors. Also, we have the "head right" - 50 acres for each person transported to the new land - but this was highly abused and many names on the lists should be questioned, especially dates shown as arrivals. Again, there are the Land Patents, but these too must be considered carefully as often times a Patent was not recorded until many, many years after settlement so do check these for names and dates.

THE HANDY BOOK FOR GENEALOGISTS by the Everton Publishers, Inc., which is practically a necessity for any researcher, gives the various counties, when they were formed and from what and usually what records are available and where you may write for them; therefore, rather than go into that phase, I thought it might be of help to tell you a little about where you CAN NOT GET RECORDS and some of the TYPES.

The following will be information regarding "losses" of records in Virginia counties.

<u>Appamattox</u>	Lost a number of records in an 1892 fire.
<u>Buchanan</u>	Had a total loss of records in 1885. Some deeds were brought in and re-recorded in an effort to replace records.
<u>Buckingham</u>	Suffered a loss by fire in the Civil War period and again in 1869. There are a few records available in the Huntington Library in San Marino, CA.
<u>Caroline</u>	Records destroyed in 1836 and again in the Civil War, with the exception of a few which are mostly Mutilated.
<u>Charles City</u>	Most records lost when they were scattered during

during a rainstorm following a raid on the Court House by Federal troops. Some were returned by local citizens but many remain lost.

- Dinwiddie Some records destroyed in 1830s and again in 1864 but not as extensive as might be imagined or suggested.
- Elizabeth City Has had several destructions of records but the Vestry Parish Book survives.
- Gloucester Practically no early records - before 1821 that is - but the Abingdon Parish records from 1678 have been published.
- Hanover This, like many of the counties around Richmond, sent their records to Richmond, supposedly for safe keeping during the Civil War, and all were destroyed in the great fire which raged through the city. Actually, only a few Virginia county records were destroyed by the Federal forces. There are a few original volumes which had been transcribed and retired and which were not among those destroyed by the fire. Personally, I have found it very difficult to get any information from this county.
- James City The original of so many counties. The spot from which many very early settlers left to move up the JAMES for new and virgin land for their crops. Practically no records - only those which can be picked up from the references to James City in other records and the Williamsburg and Bruton Parish Records.
- King William Only 17 will books saved - all else was destroyed by fire in 1885.
- King & Queen All destroyed in a Reconstruction fire with the exception of a few very early records.
- Matthews All destroyed except a few fee books and some records dating after 1890.
- Nansemond TOTAL destruction in 1866. Try surrounding counties for possible records.
- New Kent Records destroyed in 1787 and 1865. St. Peter's Parish records survived.
- Prince George Most destroyed during the Civil War but the Register of Bristol Parish is available. Also, Dr. Benjamin B. Weisiger, III of Richmond has assembled some old records into two Volumes - #1, RECORDS 1733/1792 and #2, WILL & DEEDS 1713/1728 and both are very good.
- Prince William Some records destroyed but more here than in most of the "burned out" counties.

Stafford Very few early records with the exception of deeds and St. Paul's Parish records.

Warrick Records destroyed in Civil War and earlier. Very few surviving fragments but these are indexed.

The above list certainly does not give you ALL the lost records in ALL the various counties but may give you an idea of some of the places where records are not available.

In working with any of these shown counties, be sure and check your HANDY BOOK anyway to see what is shown and also it never hurts to try sending a request for a record - with the SASE of course - because you just might be lucky and get a favorable answer!

I believe most of us who have done any research have a special place we like to work - Henrico is my favorite Virginia county because it is the first where some of my ancestors settled in 1635/6. There is a surprising number of existing records for this original Shire and I have two books, again by Dr. Weisiger, which he has published on this county, from some of the records not previously in print and which I hope every library would get, if not now on shelves. These are inexpensive books but very easy to work with and contain many early records. These books are COLONIAL WILLS of HENRICO CO., VIRGINIA - Part One 1654/1737 and Part Two 1737/1781.

As the settlers started moving further and further up the James, more and more new counties were formed from this parent county. There is a published record of "500 Pages Census of 1850, HENRICO COUNTY and CITY OF RICHMOND" - 1981, which is a prime source for the capital city of the Commonwealth and its neighboring county, which shows the place of birth of all the persons listed, and hence a migration pattern can be seen for many of the families. If working in this Henrico area always remember to check Chesterfield, what records you can find for Charles City, those for Prince George, Dinwiddie, Albemarle, Powhatan, Goochland and Lunenburg. It has been said before, but I will again repeat - a person could have lived in the same place, not moved an inch and still be recorded in three or four counties - check them all.

Moving yet further along we have many early settlers whose descendants can be located in Halifax taken from Lunenburg in 1752 which then included the present Pittsylvania, Henry and Patrick; with Halifax surrounded by Mecklenberg, Charlotte, Campbell and the State of North Carolina. Halifax was, and I trust still is, a very cooperative county as far as the clerks are concerned and I have even had them go out of their way and beyond what might be expected of them in actually searching records to be of help.

At this point I would like to mention three of the above cited counties which have history books written about them and ask that you use with caution. The first is Campbell with the well known and greatly used CAMPBELL CHRONICLES and FAMILY SKETCHES by Ruth Hairston Early. This book and HISTORY OF HENRY COUNTY, VA. by Judith Hill are both reprints of early issues and then there is HENRY and PATRICK COUNTIES by Pedigo which is almost a copy of Hill's book. As in all family histories and genealogies there are of course some excellent items and there are some gross errors which have really fouled up a number of Virginia family

lines. I have in my files a letter from a now elderly woman who knew one of the authors when she was in her 80s and writing one of the above books and she stated if this author did not find the persons who could tell her about the family or families she intended to write about she put down what she thought to be the information. DO NOT use information in these mentioned books unless you double check with other sources such as court records. This situation can be said to exist for many area histories and family genealogies.

THE BEVERLEY and BORDEN PATENTS of Virginia have many, many names shown which will be very familiar to those searching in Augusta, later in Bote-tourt which was formed in 1769 from Augusta and then Fincastle which was discontinued in 1777, with Montgomery and Washington Counties picking up at 1776/7. This now brings us down into the southwest corner of Virginia, where many of the descendants of those real early Virginians settled, some stayed and are still names well known today in the area. There is one definite pattern I might mention and that is - Bedford/Campbell families joined with Washington/Montgomery/Lee/Russell and all those southwest area families - many of them in the late 1700s and very early 1800s - and in doing your research you will often find an alignment of names indicative of this pattern.

We have now crossed the state from the James on the coast to the far southwest corner and for any or all of the counties there is one source I would especially recommend that is the ENCYCLOPEDIA of AMERICAN QUAKER GENEALOGY by William Wade Hinshaw. Even though you may feel certain an ancestor just could not have been a Quaker, look at these records anyway; you never know what you may find and these records are fantastic. Also, do not forget Hening's LAWS OF VIRGINIA.

Personal research in court houses is, of course, the most desirable method but often impossible; next is that in libraries; and the last but often most necessary kind, to get a record, is by mail. Some court clerks are very cooperative and others are often almost insulting. One well known county in southwest Virginia calls people like us "head hunters" and turns our inquiries over to a "genealogist for hire" or sends the request back. Some sources we never hear from even though we all know to send the self addressed, stamped, return envelope for a reply. If you do not hear - try again. After all, you are asking for public records and if you are willing to pay a fee to get them you should at the least be given the courtesy of a reply, and put that in the second letter of inquiry - many times it works! Do not, of course, ask these people to do research for you but if you have a date or even a close approximate date, names and type of instrument wanted, you are entitled to consideration.

Now the final and probably the best source for materials is the VIRGINIA STATE LIBRARY at Richmond. It is my understanding that they have called in all loose records from counties across the state so they may be made available for research. If you do not find what you have been looking for in an individual county by all means check this invaluable source. It will usually take some time to get an answer to a request and an equal amount of time to get the copy of the instrument if they have it, but it is well worth waiting for, as I believe most will agree! I hope there will be an item or two in these notes which will be of help to those who may be searching for some answers to problems. Many people say Virginia is a very difficult state to research but I have found it

most interesting and not really too hard and I have also found there are many things available with worlds of information for the searcher - it just takes time and patience, so good luck and good hunting in this area of first importance in our country.

(editor's note: The Virginia State Library information is incorrect on the county's loose papers. The loose papers of the counties are being put on microfilm with the original being sent back to the counties. If the papers are at the State Archives - in most cases - you have to get permission from the County Clerk of Courts to look through the documents - which is not easy. There is a great wealth of information at the State Library and Archives. The Library has published indexes and books on the material there - write Virginia State Library, Richmond, VA 23219 for brochures on publications and information on research in the Library. ps. I forgot to ask if the microfilm is available at the Library -- it is available at the court houses.)

The following letter, printed in the Lynchburg Press on October 12, 1821, sheds light on the conditions in the southeast part of Montgomery County ten years before that area became Floyd County.

To the honorable JOHN FLOYD,

SIR—The high esteem in which your talents and virtues are held in this part of the country, has induced one of your constituents, with deference and respect, to address you through the medium of a newspaper, believing it to be the surest means of producing the effect intended. I have not the honor of being personally acquainted with you, but your acknowledged abilities and patriotism, shall plead my excuse, were any necessary. This part of the country, perhaps is as little known to you, as any section that you represent, although in your native county, (Montgomery,) and at no greater distance from your residence than twenty miles. We the good people, living on the waters of Little River and its tributary streams, southeast of the Pilot Mountain, have been chained in the grossest ignorance and superstition, ever since this country has been settled: and, sir, I must inform you that the prospect for an amendment, is as distant now as it was forty years ago. These facts you cannot be stranger to, when you reflect on the little scisms that exist between this section and the centre of this county. It is but few among us who know the proper course, or by means means or way, a Post Office is to be established; and their use is so little known, that no exertion has been made until lately to get them among us. We are neither a wealthy or very commercial people, but we can read the newspapers, which will not only improve but interest, and naturally inspire the people with thoughts of their own—Give them an opportunity to judge of the duties they owe themselves, and the authorities who govern. The advantages of a post office to those whose business may incline to a foreign market, or where the consumption is not adequate to the quantity raised or manufactured, is certainly of the greatest importance. It has frequently happened, and not unfrequently to myself, that letters written four or five months, have lain in the post office at Christiansburg, (which is twenty-seven miles from a large portion of this part of the county) of the greatest magnitude to my business.—I therefore, sir, in the name of the people, your constituents of this neglected and despised section of your own

county, request your aid in promoting the establishment of a post office, a continuation of the mail, that goes from Franklin Court House to Giles Court House, which would not be more than six or eight miles further; to leave Franklin Court House, thence by Goodson's, where an office may be established, thence to Helms' or Boon's, near the west fork of Little River, thence to Christiansburg, on the route it now goes. You have acquaintances on this route, and immediately in the neighborhood, that would use all pains to procure subscribers sufficient to guarantee the offices to the Post Master General, should that or any other course be necessary. I am not versed in the laws of Congress, sufficiently well to speak with certainty; but the people should place a reliance upon their representatives, to obtain for them, at least a reasonable demand, especially within his power and controul—As you, sir, are considered the oracle of your constituents, and the only channel by which a grievance of this kind can be redressed with facility, I hope you will show a manly independent interest in their wrongs, and come forward as you are warned, with that characteristic dignity which distinguishes your personal virtues, and say, that although you have been neglected heretofore, for the future you shall hold a share in my esteem proportionate to your population, your honest virtues, and the latent single gleam of improvement, that is yet in grembryo, but may ripen by my care and attention, into useful political or domestic talents, that may do no discredit to a Breckenridge.

The honest and candid statements above, are written in haste, and perhaps inaccuracies, both as to language and matter may have escaped me, but I am neither a collegiate or a critic, but a plain blunt man of

LITTLE RIVER,
Montgomery County.

The man to whom this letter is addressed, John Floyd (1783-1837), is the namesake of Floyd County. For many years a resident of Christiansburg, he represented the district in Congress from 1817 to 1829. From 1830 to 1834 he was Governor of Virginia. In 1832 he received the eleven electoral votes of South Carolina in the Presidential election. His son, John B. Floyd (1806-1863), also a Governor of Virginia (1849-1852), was Secretary of War for President Buchanan (1857-1860) and a Confederate general. By Breckenridge the writer probably means John Breckinridge (1760-1806), who had been elected to the Virginia legislature from Botetourt County and to the U.S. Congress from Albemarle County, before emigrating to Kentucky, where he achieved prominence as the outstanding champion of the interests of the West, as proposer of the Kentucky Resolutions of 1798 and 1799, and as Attorney General of the United States (1805-1806). Several other members of the Breckenridge/Breckinridge family achieved distinction.

The following was transcribed by Calvin Weddle from a copy made from microfilm at the Pennsylvania State Archives in Harrisburg, PA in 1984. Some of the names were very difficult to read.

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THE SIGMONS OF VIRGINIA

In the early 1700s, many immigrants came to America. The father of Peter Sickman, Sr was among those people who were hoping for better opportunities and land on which they could live and farm in peace. Peter settled first in Henry County, Virginia, in 1785. Part of this area later became Franklin County, and Peter made his permanent home there. He fathered 13 children who intermarried with others who were children of these early, adventuresome individuals who braved this difficult life to carve a niche for themselves in this beautiful virgin wilderness. Among those pioneers are the names -- Hale, Willis, Griffith, Richards, Brumley Shively, Moore, Gibson, Jones, Hill, Foster, Burdette, Adams, Slone/Sloan Peters, Bridges, Wade, Janney, Sledd, Ferguson, Snead, Workman, Brogan, Keys, Winfrey -- to name a few. Two of Peter's children went farther into the wilderness, helping to open the gate to the west, and made their homes in Indiana. Two of his children moved into the Kanawha Valley in the early 1800s and settled in Kanawha County. A grandson and great-grandson settled in Putnam County, having obtained land grants in 1858. Other grandchildren and great-grandchildren went to Boone and Lincoln counties in West Virginia. Des Moines, 26, Feb. 1876

Dear Estill:

I was gratified when I received your letter of inquiry on the subject, that you manifested a wish to know all you could learn of our ancestry and collateral relatives, and cheerfully comply with your request by giving you all I know on the subject which I can now call to mind.

My Grandfather, John McHenry, first lived on the headwaters of the Holston River in North Carolina, where he married Susanna Viney, who was a swede by full descent if not by nativity. A few years after his marriage and when my father was but a child, he removed to Washington Co. Virginia, and settled down some eight or ten miles from the old town of Abingdon where he remained until he died, having raised a numerous family as will see by the sequel.

The oldest son was Andrew McHenry, who was a lawyer of respectable attainments and talents, and died at the Medical Springs which he owned on the Holston River a few miles from the County seat of Scott Co. Virginia. Uncle Andrew had an only son John who died before his father, leaving three children, but I believe that branch of the family is extinct. I have not heard anything about them for twenty five years or thirty years.

Barnabas McHenry, my father, was the second son, was born Dec. 10, 1767, was admitted into the traveling connection as a Methodist Preacher in 1787, and continued to travel and preach on frontier and mountain circuits until in 1793 when he married Sarah Hardin, my mother, in Washington Co. Kentucky. He located in 1795, remained on his land in Washington County. A few years when he left it for five or six years when he returned and lived on it until he and my mother died on the same day, June the 15th or 16th 1833 of cholera, at the same time my two youngest sisters, Sara and Emily, died of the same epidemic. My father was the best educated and most highly cultivated man I ever knew, who had learned all he did know by absorption and the use of the few books a Methodist preacher could carry with him around his circuit from settlement to settlement, and from cabin to cabin in the woods, and was the best man I ever did know. I never heard him speak evil of any man and never saw him in a passion in my life. Of course you know all about our own branch of the family.

Our Uncle Isaac McHenry, the third son of my Grandfather, married and settled in Madison Co. Kentucky, nine or ten miles South-east of Richmond the County Seat, where he lived until his death, and where his oldest son John E. McHenry yet lives (1876). He is a fine intelligent old gentleman, now in his 75th year. Two of his brothers live in Boone Co., Mo. Two of his brothers live in Boone Co., Mo. Andrew about my age, the other I don't know the name of. One of Uncle Isaac's son, Oliver, also settled in the same County and died leaving a son there, so that by this means

you may some day meet with kindreds in that County. The daughters of Uncle Isaac are all dead. One of them left sons in Illinois by the name of Burnett. There is also a daughter, John E. McHenry, (sic) living in Clinton, Mo. married to a man by the name of Stirman or Sherman, I can exactly make out which as the name is written in her father's letter which I have before me.

Uncle Thomas McHenry, the fourth son of my Grandfather, remained in Virginia until about 1817 or 1818 when he removed to Alabama and settled in what was called I think, Catawba Valley. He married a very intelligent and respectable lady in one of the most worthy and respected families in the State. They had ten or eleven sons and one daughter. Uncle Thomas was a farmer and always held a high position as a christian gentleman where ever he lived, and though not an educated man he was a well read gentleman, his limited opportunity considered. He was elected to fill the unexpired term of his brother in the Legislature of Virginia, occasioned by his death, and when my brother visited him in Alab. in 1821 he found him then a member of Legislature of Alabama. He died in 1823 as I have learned from his son Rupert whose letters is before me. In this letter he says: There are six brothers of us still living: four in Arkansas, and one in Texas, and one in Homer, La. Robert, John and Martin H. the three oldest, William and Josiah are the names of the other two. This cousin, Rupert P. McHenry, lives in Ark. but so near the Southern State line that his P.O. is Onion Cross Roads, La.

My Uncle John McHenry fifth son of my Grandfather, as described to me, was perhaps the most handsome and prepossessing of the eight brothers. He was courtly and urbane, in his manners the peer of the best society and the favorite of the "middle classes" so called. He had been principle acting Deputy Sheriff of one of the Southwest Counties of Virginia for some years and his friends run for the Legislature against a gentlemen who had represented the County often and who looked down upon a young plebian who would have the temerity to compete with him. The result was a very animated canvass and election of the young Sheriff over the old Col. Friends and partners on either side were excited and inconsiderate and some unwise partisan prompted a young gentleman, son of the defeated candidate to challenge my Uncle John. The challenge was accepted, weapons, rifles, distance agreed on sixty paces I have heard circumstantial details of what passed on the ground going to show that the young men were not enemies to each other and that neither of them wanted to fight, and conducting to show that my Uncle's friends on the ground were not as careful of his life as they ought to have been. At the first fire the challenging party fell dead, shot through the heart. My Uncle had a slight wound on the side of the abdomen which did not penetrate into the hollow of the body and yet the surgeons let him die. His brothers always had their doubts as to the good faith of the affair. Thus perished two noble and promising young men, cut down in their youth and then in the morning of their usefulness, sacrificed to the barbarity of the Code of Honor.

Uncle William McHenry, sixth son of my Grandfather, was a very active, energetic young man, and in early manhood was clerk and principle manage of the salt works of King & Co. in South West Virginia. He married Miss Paston, a lady of highly respectable parentage and about 1815 he settled at Cumberland Gap or rather about a mile from the top of the mountain in Claibourne County, Tennessee where he kept public house for ten or twelve years. And then purchased the ferry and farm and hotel at the crossing of

Powerlls River three miles further East, and then continued to live until his death. I think he left no sons surviving him. He left some three or four daughters. The oldest, Sarah H. married my and her cousin William Richardson, of whom I will speak hereafter. Two other daughters married in that County, Susan and Louisa. I do not remember the names of their husbands. Susan died thirty years ago, Louisa may still be living.

My Uncles David and Johnathan McHenry, the youngest of the family, were twins; neither of them were married. Uncle David was acting Sheriff of Lee County Virginia about the year 1816 and was shot by a man whom he was about to arrest under legal process. He died immediately and Uncle Johnathan was so overwhelmed and depressed that he seemed to lose all interest in life. They were very handsome men, very much alike in personality, appearance and sympathized with each other in taste and sentiments and principles, and their mutual attachment was truly like David and Johnathan.

I have seen all of the eight brothers excepting Thomas and John, and as far as my memory serves me, it corresponds with what I have heard from others that they were as nearly of uniform figure and size as any eight brothers could be expected to be found. John was full six feet high, of fine commanding presence, while the other seven were five feet ten inches, each weighing about 170 pounds. Their complexion was fair, their hair quite dark, their eyes clear bluish grey and very expressive, a family that you or my boys need not be ashamed of having sprung from.

My Aunt Sarah McHenry, eldest daughter of my Grandfather, married William Richardson in Washington Co. Virginia. She lived and died in the vicinity of my Grandfather's old homestead. She left four sons and one daughter. John, the oldest son when I saw him in the winter of 1818 was married to Miss Orr and living at his father's, but afterwards I learned that he and his brother Nathan moved to Hiwassee valley or purchase not far from the line between Tennessee and Alabama. David, another brother, never married; he live in Knowville, Tennessee, died thirty year ago. William Richardson, when I first saw him, lived with my Uncle William McHenry near Cumberland Gap, and was engaged with him in merchandising. He married Uncle William's oldest daughter, and moved to Jacksborough, Tennessee not far from them. I do not know anything of their family only that the Rev. Frank Richardson of the M.C. Church South was their son.

My Aunt Jane McHenry, second daughter of my Grandfather, married Robert Wallace. They settled in Wayne Co. Kentucky. She survived her husband many years; her sons as far as I know were, John William, Barnabas, Andrew. I have no recollection about her daughter. I learned many years ago that most of the family had moved to Alabama or Tennessee.

My Aunt Susanna McHenry, third daughter of my Grandfather, married Mr. Abraham Funk, a most worthy, honest and christian gentleman, a Pennsylvania Dutchman. They lived in Henry Co. Kentucky about three miles from Lagrange. My aunt died about 1820. They had several children, but beginning at the youngest they all died before their father. My cousin William died, leaving mr (sic) his executor etc.

My Aunt Fraces McHenry, the youngest daughter of my Grandfather married about 1816 to a young gentleman in Southwest Virginia. I have forgotten his name.

March 11, 1876

I commenced this letter several days since but have been interrupted by business and otherwise until to-day I recall and review what I have written and heard of our ancestors and collateral relatives with very profound interest. I am now in the seventieth year and shall very soon join my father's family of which I am the sole survivor, and as I write each word and letter I do so with the consciousness that it will be looked at by my surviving relatives after I am gone and regarded as a Memento of our "OLD UNCLE".

It is to me a sacred delight that as the last of my family of Father, Mother and ten children I entertain any shadow of doubt that they are all now and eternally at rest in the better without the loss of one, and I fully trust in God's grace to meet them there.

I will just add as far as I know or ever heard no act of treachery or falsehood or dishonor or dishonesty was ever attributed to any of our names. Not one of them ever betrayed a trust or was called a coward.

Dear Nephew

I attend a Sunday School just below here most every Sunday evening but as it is somewhat wet this evening I will write you a few more sketches of the history that you are interested in. I received the type written copy of what I wrote you some time ago. I am sorry that I didn't take time to rewrite it before I sent it to you. I could have arranged it much better & not had it so confused as it is. But from now on I think I can write something that will be better arranged than what I have written. I said about the last that I wrote that there was but little war strife during the first year of the war but some leaning towards the union. Your Pa stayed at home till some time in the summer of 1862. It was in that summer that the first hostility commenced. I think about June old Col Menifee and Old Col Sam Salyer who was a militia col went down from Gladeville to Holly Creek, with a few confederate soldiers. I don't know what was the real object of the trip. But news had on before them that they were on the March that way, and quite a number of citizens armed themselves and waylaid them at George's fork right where the Baptist church now stands and fired on them the first shots that was fired in that section that I remember. One man was wounded in the arm and Col Menifee's fine mare was shot through the top of her head. They returned the fire and the ambushers run. After the fight there they went down to your Pa's and dressed the wound. I think they camped there that night and left the next day. In a very short time they returned with some more force and with order to conscript all able bodded men into the confederate service. Menifee claimed to have been in the Mexican war and had lost his leg in that war, but he was a bad man all he cared for was the loot he could get out of it, so when he came back with some men took up headquarters at Holly Creek for a month or so, and mobilized what force he could get. Your Pa joined the force and was made quarter master of the

Battalion as soon as he (Menifee) thought he was strong enough he made a raid over into Ky went down as far as Pikeville robbed stores and private citizens of stock or anything they could get, and returned in a week or so with his booty, took the most of it out abot Castells woods or some place out there and in a fiew weeks got his Battalion together again and made another raid over in to Letcher County Ky and brought out another lot of stock took them out east and sold them as he had done the first lot & turned nothing over to the confederate government I don't think your Pa was with him on his second raid. he did not like the office he then held and he resined and made up his company & was musterd in the service some time in the fall of 62. Was in camp at Camp Banner and Saltville with his company in the latter part of 62 and the winter of 63 some time in that winter he and Sam Newberry reported Menifee to head quarters, which cost Newberry his life and would have cost your Pa his life too if it had not been for the providence of God as I believe it.

I will write you a sketch that may not be much interest to the public, but I am shure it will be of some interest to you and your family. Menifee's robbery over in Ky was like stirring up a hornet's nest. They did not come over with armed force, but in a fiew months the most of the best horses was stolen and taken to Ky. Your Pa had bought a verry fine mare that was sold at our sale after Pa died. She was the only hope that the old strain of horses that had been in our family ever since Pa and Mother was married could be kept up, she was a verry noted animel a bright sorrel with a large bell face any body that ever saw her would recognize her any where she was stollen in the winter of 63. Your Pa heard of her over in Ky by some one that knew her while he was in Camp at Saltville. he got a furlow and went home to make an effort to get her back. It was quite a dangers trip, but he armed himself with a double barrel shot gun and his army pistols, got on the horse he had in the service and went over the mountain. I think she was in Floy Co. when he got near whare he had heard she was he had to pay some one a good sum to get her in his possession. As soon as he got her he started for home the horse he was riding seemed to be some what tired and he stoped to change his saddle and while he was taking the saddle off the horse he was riding Kit rubed the gun down that he had stood up against a tree & it went off and shot him in the ankle. I know you remember the wound well. By getting some help he manged to get home, was taken down with Camp
