CHANN HEINRICH GOTTFRIED PABST 1809---- 1895

by great-grandfather, Johann Heinrich Gottfried PABST, was bern in Baden-Baden, Germany the 11 June 1809. All information I have comes from family records. I have no record of his parents, but he was one of eighteen (18) sons, and we know there was one sister, Rowenia, who came to America with her husband, George WENTZEL.

A man born in Germany gave this information. "The PABST family were highly skilled people; some were locksmiths; some were gold and silver smiths; some were jewelers; some were brewers and some were weavers of fine cloth. They were hearty, healthy, hard working people; domestic, full of good nature and musically inclined."

My ancestors were weavers of cloth for many generations, but my great-grandfather didn't like weaving at all. In fact he disliked it so much that he took a sharp knife and cut all the webbing out of the loom. His father, who did not believe in whipping children, to punish the boy for his rebellion, said, "In this family children obey their parents, but because you have rebelled aganist the family tradition, I will apprentice you out to a locksmith." This he did.

Johann liked this work and became very proficient, and having an inventive mind he began working on a combination lock. When he had perfected it he gave it to the Emperor. It was so intricate that he had to show the Emperor how it worked. The Emperor was so pleased with the lock and wanted to reward Johann. He asked him if there was anything he could do for him. Johann had been dreaming of going to America, so he asked for and received permission and passage for himself and his brother Frederick to come to America.

One of his daughters said that he came over here when he was 21 years old. If so, they came in 1830. They landed in port of Baltimore and great-grandfather worked on the Baltimore Railroad for a while. This same daughter said that he boarded with a family in Baltimore and that the man's wife fell in love with Johann, so he left to keep from getting into trouble. He then came to Gainsborough Va. which was a small settlement in the center of what is now Roanoke.

Johann did not like the way people pronounced his name so to make it so it would be pronounced the way it was in Germany, he changed the spelling and he became John Henry Godfrey PCBST. He later dropped the John, and was known as Henry G. POBST. Pabst is German for Pope and came from the so-called "Mystery plays" which were popular throughout all Europe in the middle ages. They were nearly always Biblical and ecclesiastical in form and motif. Often those who took part were surnamed, by their neighbors, with the name of the part they played, therefore, a person playing the part of a pope in the play became known as PCPE in English, or FABST in German.

Henry's brother Frederick, who came with him, and his brother Christian who came later also changed the spelling of their name.

Frederick and his wife, Elizabeth MORGAN settled in Warren County, Ohio. They had nine children. 1. Frederick; 2. Susan; 3. Esther; 4. Jacob; 5. Mary; 6. David; 7. Mathias; 8. Felix; 9. Lydia.

Christian PCBST came to America in 1852, his wife had died in Germany. He had one son, William Augustus Adolphus, and they settled in Big Lick. William Agustus Adolphus married Frederica Christina ISCHCRN. They came from Germany on the same ship. Her parents died in Germany and she lived with a German Doctor in Roanoke until her marriage. Adolphus and Frederica had seven children. 1. Lewis, a jeweler, went to BigStone Gap; Va. 2. Henry William, settled in Tazewell, Va. 3. Sallie Catharine, married Sam HOCVER; 4. Charlie Adolphus, was a jeweler in Pulaski, Va. 5. Alice married Alexander Marrs and #2 Lester Wingo 6. Joseph D. went to Wytheville, Va.; 7. Virginia Marie. (Information on Christian POBST from Memoirs of H. Claude FOBST)

Henry G. POBST married Sarah Betts STOVER- 15 Sept 1839. She was daughter of Michael STOVER and Elizabeth SOLONBARGER or (SOLLENBARGER_SULLENBARGER) Michael was son of Rev. William STOVER and Christina Miller, and Rev. William was son of Bishop William STOVER and Judith SHAEFFER, both born in Switzerland.

Henry G. POBST died 4 August 1895 and Sarah Betts died 19 May 1901 and both are buried in The Brubaker Cemetery in N. W. Roanoke.

IT'S THE LAW

Virginia Statutes Pertaining to Cemeteries

- S 15.1-511. <u>Appropriations for the upkeep of certain cemeteries.</u> Any county may make appropriations in such sums and at such times as to the governing body of the county may seem proper, for the care and upkeep of any cemetery of cemeteries in the county wherein free burial space is provided.(Code 1950, S 15-17; 1962, c. 623.)
- 8 10.1-2305. Permit required for the archaeological excavation of human remains. -A. It shall be unlawful for any person to conduct any type of archaeological field investigation involving the removal of human skeletal remains or associated artifacts from any unmarked human burial regardless of age of an archaeological site and regardless of ownership without first receiving a permit from the Director.

B. Where unmarked burials are not part of a legally chartered cemetery, archaeological excavation of such burials pursuant to a permit from the Director shall be exempt from the requirements of **SS** 57-38.1 and 57-39 of the Code. However, such exemption shall not apply in the case of human burials within formally chartered cemeteries that have been abandoned.

C. The Department shall be considered an interested party in court proceedings considering the abandonment of legally constituted cemeteries or family graveyards with historic significance. A permit from the Director is required if archaeological investigations are undertaken as a part of a court-approved removal of a cemetery.

D. The Board shall promulgate regulations implementing this section that provide for appropriate public notice prior to issuance of a permit, provide for appropriate treatment of excavated remains, the scientific quality of the research conducted on the remains, and the appropriate disposition of the remains upon completion of the research. The Department may carry out such excavations and research without a permit, provided that it has complied with the substantive requirements of the regulations promulgated pursuant to this section.

E. Any interested party may appeal the Director's decision to issue a permit or to act directly to excavate human remains to the local circuit court. Such appeal must be filed within fourteen days of the Director's decision. (1989, c. 656.)

10.1-2211. Disbursement of funds appropriated for caring for Confederate ceme-8 teries and graves. - A. At the direction of the Director, the Comptroller of the Commonwealth is instructed and empowered to draw annual warrants upon the State Treasurer from any sums that may be provided in the general appropriations act, in favor of the treasurers of the Confederate memorial associations and chapters of the United Daughters of the Confederacy set forth in subsection B. Such sums shall be expended by the associations and organizations for the routine maintenance of their respective Confederate cemeteries and graves and for the graves of Confederate soldiers and sailors not otherwise cared for in other cemeteries and in erecting and caring for markers, memorials, and monuments to the memory of such soldiers and sailors. All such associations and organizations. through their proper officers, are required after July 1 of each year to submit to the Director a certified statement that the funds appropriated to the association or organization in the preceding fiscal year were or will be expended for the routine maintenance of cemeteries specified in this section and the graves of Confederate soldiers and sailors and in erecting and caring markers, memorials and monuments to the memory of such soldiers for

and sailors. An association or organization failing to comply with any of the requirements of this section shall be prohibited from receiving moneys allocated under this section for all subsequent fiscal years until the association or organization fully complies with the requirements.

B. Allocation of appropriations made pursuant to this section shall be based on the number of graves, monuments and markers as set forth opposite the association's or organization's name, or as documented by each association or organization multiplied by the rate of \$5.00 or the average actual cost of routine maintenance, whichever is greater, for each grave, monument or marker in the care of a Confederate memorial association or chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy. For the purposes of this section the "average actual cost of care" shall be determined by the Department in a biennial survey of at least four properly maintained cemeteries, each located in a different geographical regeion of the Commonwealth.

(Not typed: A long list arranged by counties and cities showing the names of organizations and cemeteries with the number of graves, monuments and markers set forth.)

C. In addition to funds that may be provided pursuant to subsection B, any of the Confederate memorial associations and chapters of the United Daughters of the Confederacy set forth in subsection B may make application to the Director for grants to perform extraordinary maintenance, renovation, repair or reconstruction of any of their respective Confederate cemeteries and graves and for the graves of Confederate soldiers and sailors. These grants shall be made from any appropriation made available by the General Assembly for such purpose. In making such grants, the Director shall give full consideration to the assistance available from the United States Department of Veterans' Affairs, or other agencies, except in those instances where such assistance is deemed by the Director to be detrimental to the historical, artistic or architectural significance of the site.

D. Local matching funds shall not be required for grants made pursuant to this section. (Code 1950, § 2.1-206.1; 1977, c. 242; c. 1978, c. 726; 1979, cc. 19, 151; 1980, c. 672; 1981, c. 537; § 10.145.11; 1984, cc. 412, 750; 1985, cc. 263, 267; 1986, cc. 120, 385; 1988, cc. 310, 891, § 10.1-812; 1989, cc. 656, 711.)

- S 18.2-125. <u>Trespass at night upon any cemetery.</u> If any person, without the consent of the owner, proprietor or custodian, go or enter in the nighttime, upon the premises, property, driveways or walks of any cemetery, either public or private, for any purpose other than to visit the burial lot or grave of some member of his family, he shall be guilty of a Class 4 misdemeanor. (Code 1950, § 18.1-181; 1960, c. 358; 1975, cc. 14, 15.)
- 8 18.2-126. <u>Violation of sepulture.</u> If a person unlawfully disinter or displace a dead human body, or any part of a dead human body, which has been deposited in any vault, grave or other burial place, he shall be guilty of a Class 4 felony. (Code 1950, 8 18.1-243; 1960, c. 358; 1975, cc 14, 15.)
- S 18.2-127. Injuries to churches, church property, cemeteries, burial grounds, etc.; penalty. - Any person who willfully or maliciously commits any of the following acts is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor:

(1) Destroys, mutilates, defaces, injures or removes any object or structure placed within any church or on church property, any tomb, monument, gravestone, or other structure placed within any cemetery, graveyard, or place of burial, or within any lot belonging to any memorial or monumental association, or any fence, railing, or other work for the protection or ornament of any tomb, monument, gravestone, or other structure aforesaid, or of any cemetery lot within any cemetery; (2) Destroys, removes, cuts, breaks or injures any tree, shrub, or plant on any church property or within any cemetery or lot of any memorial or monumental association;

(3) Destroys, mutilates, injures, or removes and carries away any flowers, wreaths, vases, or other ornaments placed within any church or on church property, graveyard, or other place of burial; or

(4) Obstructs proper ingress to and egress from any church or any cemetery or lot belonging to any memorial or monumental association.

This section shall not apply to any work which is done by the authorities of a church or congregation in the maintenance or improvement of any church property or any burial ground or cemetery belonging to it and under its management or control and which does not injure or result in the removal of a tomb, monument, gravestone, grave marker or vault. For purposes of this section, "church" shall mean any place of worship, and " church property" shall mean any educational building or community center owned or rented by a church. (Code 1950, § 18.1-244; 1960, c. 358; 1975, cc. 14, 15; 1982, c. 561; 1983, c. 579.)

We can better appreciate our cemeteries if we know the laws under which they operate. Expect other statutes to be printed in VAN during this year. You should consult your attorney for interpretation if you need more information.

This is the "old" Cecil Cemetery, not to be confused with Cecil Chapel Cemetery. Take exit 31 (Pulaski), go under the underpass, Hwy 81, turn left on FO47 (North) to state road 672, cross Claytor Lake (New River) to 693, turn left to 669. You will pass Cecil's Chapel, continue on toward the lake, bear to the left at the fork and cemetery is nearly right on the lake, fenced in. It was last cleaned in 1986 and badly in need of cleaning now. Pulaski Cty, Va.

CUNNINGHAM FAMILY

The Cunningham Family is listed in Douglas Peerage -- Vol. I, p 632. Warnebald, the progenitor of this family, settled in Glengarnock or Cunningham as a vassal under Hugh Moreville, Constable of Scotland, who died in 1162, and from whom he obtained the Manor of Cunningham, which comprised the Church and a greater part of the parish of Kilmaurs. He turned from a common vassal to a valued leader of Hugh Moreville's army. From these holdings Warnebald received the right to assume the name of Cunningham. Glengarnock or Cunningham Castle still stands in the edge of the Garnock river, two miles north of Kilbirnie, Scotland. It was sacked in the early times by the Danes.

Through the force of arms and general striving, the family made itself one of the fore most clans of Scotland, and this clan, until recently headed by Sir William Montgomery Cunningham, is still strong and active. Harvey de Cunningham, family tradition holds, fought at the battle of Largs in 1263 and there by earned a confirmation the following year from Alexander II.

In 1321 Hugh de Cunningham got lands of Lamburton from Robert the Bruce and thereafter a series of marriages moved the family ahead. Hugh de Cunningham's grandson, Sir William Cunningham married the heiress of Danly and his grandson, Sir Alexander Cunningham was created Lord of Kilmaurs about 1462 and Earl of Glencairn in 1488. Robert, 2nd Laird of Kilmaurs, was deprived of his father's earldom, but it was revived for his brother, Cuthbert, 3rd Laird of Kilmaurs.

Various members of the Cunningham family clan played parts in the exciting and colorful life of Mary, Queen of Scots, and it was that regal lady who lifted one branch of the family into a feudal barony. Alexander Cunningham, 5th Earl of Glencairn, was one of the most prominent and active members of the family, being one of the promoters of the Reformation of Scotland. He stopped the advance of Mary, Queen of Scots, with a force of 2500 volunteers.

There are two coat of arms registered to the Cunninghams. The oldest, of Glencairn, has for it's central figure, a fork and on each side a coney or rabbit. The crests are a crown and a unicorn. The motto is "Over, fork Over." The other or latest coat of arms has the fork and the unicorn as crests and the same motto, but instead of coneys or rabbits at the sides, one side has a soldier with a spear and the other side has a farmer holding a fork.

In connection with the name Cunningham, it was variously spelled as Conyngham, Cuningham, Kinnickum, Cuninghame, and Cunningham. The old Anglo-Saxon spelling was Cyningham, meaning King's Home. The family was prolific and by the time that the King of England demanded their allegiance to him as head of the Church of England, their numbers were wide spread throughout England, Ireland and Scotland.

The people of Scotland were Presbyterians, with a deep religious character and extremely conscentious. Their material accomplishments as pioneers, adventurers, traders, statemanship, literature, and in finance showed them to be the peers of any of the peoples of the world. The Presbyterians of Scotland were persecuted by the English when they refused their allegiance to him as head of the church. The persecution was so great that many of the Scots were tortured and slain under the so called heresy laws of the time. Thousands immigrated to northern Ireland to lands previously devastated by the English. In the mid 1600's and early 1700's many came to America. The first to come settled in the Boston area, and those in the 1700's settled in Virginia and were the ancestors of the West Virginia families.

A Listing of the Early Pertinent Cunningham Families

Alexander Sunningham (1498-1579) married Mary Robinson in 1528. She was a Scot. Their son

John Cunningham (1529-1602) md 1566 Sarah Wallace, a Scot. Their son

Joseph Cunningham (1568-1637) md 1605 Nancy Blessington. She was Irish. Their son

David Cunningham (1607-1691) md 1651 Rachel Bruce, a Scot. Their son

Alexander Cunningham (1653-1749) md 1701 Rebbeca Burns, a Scot.

Alexander's sons were the progenitors of nearly all of the early Cunningham families of Virginia, West Virginia, Pennsylvania and Ohio. All these sons came to America in 1752, except Joseph. He held a trusted position in the British government. He visited relatives in America immediately prior to the Revolution. His son, John, stayed here and was active in West Virginia affairs.

The Children of Alexander Cunningham:

Hugh Cunningham (b 1708) md 1729 Nancy O'Neil (b 1728) Irish.

Robert Cunningham (1713-1784) md 1734 Catherine Sinnet; she was Irish.

Joseph Cunningham (1721-1801) md 1744 Elizabeth Harris, a Scot.

David Cunningham (1721-1799) md 1751 Angeline Wilson, an Irish woman.

James Cunningham - half brother to the above sons of Alexander. Was a Revolutionary Veteran. Served with brother David.

These sons of Alexander left relatives in the counties of Marion, Monogalia, Harrison, Ritchie and Braxton in (West) Virginia and through out the Ohio Valley.

Hugh, his brothers and their families immigrated to Fairfax County, Virginia. They entered this country by the Potomac river. The County was formed by the Fairfax family. Other settlers in the neighborhood

were the Culpeppers, the Arlingtons, and the Spotswoods. Family lore notes that these early families employed the Cunningham men as traders and business emissaries in the prioneer trade. Robert Cunningham was an employee of the Hudson Bay Company.

The Cunninghams did not stay as a family unit in colonial Virginia. By 1775, at the start of the Revolution, they were scattered through out the colony, mostly living on the fringe of civilization, the frontier.

Hugh Cunningham, son of Alexander Cunningham and Rebecca Burns. He was born in Dublin, Ireland, in 1708. The date and place of his death is unknown, but in all probability was either Hardy county where he lived or in Shannandoah county where his eldest son, Adam, resided. Hugh married in 1728 Nancy O'Neil. Their children:

Adam Cunningham (b 1730) md Rachel Morgan Ephraim Cunningham (b 1732) Benjamin Cunningham (b 1734) William Cunningham (b 1737) Edward Cunningham (b 1744 - d 1800) md Sarah Price. Thomas Cunningham (b 1748 - d June 2, 1826) md Phoebe Tucker. Walter Cunningham (b 1749) 1/md Hannah ____; 2/md Ann Randall. The daughters, Rachel, Mary, Darcus, and Elizabeth, married in Ireland

and there is no record of their coming to America.

Hugh Cunningham of Kentucky and the Battle of Blue Licks

There was a Hugh Cunningham at the Battle of Blue Licks. Just exactly who this man was is in question. For years he was listed (mistakenly) as killed in the encounter. He was also listed as being the son of Alexander Cunningham and being born in Ireland in 1708. He was also 74 years of age and no record of his migration to Kentucky. I do not believe he could have pursued the British and Indians for 44 miles through the wilderness and fought in one day, at his age.

I have recently received information that the Hugh involved was a much younger man, being born ca 1744 and dying in 1820 in Lincoln county, Kentucky. His will was probated in Dec. that year, leaving each of his sons Thomas, James, and John a third of his estate. A grandson was also named. It is thought that his wife's given name was Elizabeth.

There is further records of this Cunningham family in Fayette and Woodward counties of Kentucky. John, son of Hugh, had a son William N. Cunningham who came to Indian and settled near Martinsville (Vigo County?)

The conclusion arrived at, is that the identity of the Hugh of Blue Licks should be established to refute the premise of Norman Festus Kendall's contention that the Hugh involved was a predecessor his, mainly Hugh Cunningham born in 1708. I do not believe that he left the locale of his home in or near Fairfax County of Virginia. The records of his sons, that I have found are in Harrison, Hardy and Shanandoah Counties. Perhaps the Hugh of 1708 also did there.

From his (Mr. Blech) letter: The second complication is our inability to find much on Hugh Cunningham and his four sons; William, Benjamin, Walter and Ephraim. On his other three sons, we have quite a great, the 250 pages

July Monday 28th 1856

Morgan T. Lipps Clerk of this court having appointed Edward J. Culbertson as his deputy whereupon he came into court and took the several oaths prescribed by law.

Andrew J Dotson was appointed as crier for this county, came into court and took the several oaths prescribed by law.

Andrew J Dotson who was duly elected sheriff of this county came into court executed his bond with security according to law, and severally took the oaths prescribed by law.

The Court doth recommend to the Executive David Jessee and John Robinson, as fit and proper persons, to be commissioned to execute the office of Coroner within this County.

William B Aston, William J. Dickenson, Patrick Hagan, A. W. Smith, John Stalard and Augustis F. Henderson, who have been duly licened to practice the law in the courts of the Commonwealth on this motion, have leave to practice in this Court: and thereupon they took the oath of an attorney, and the oaths prescribed by law.

Ordered that Jeremiah Bolin sen'r be released from paying County levy. Ordered that Andrew Boling be exempt from paying County Levy and caputation tax.

Ordered that John Baker be exempt from paying County Levy and caputation tax Joseph C. Wells, John Gill<u>ia</u>m(?), Jeremiah Boling, John N. Buchanan and Robert McCoy, who having been returned elected as Overseers of the Poor, for the County, came into court and severally took the oaths prescribed by law, to wit: the oath to support the Constitution of the United States, the oath of fidelity to the Commonwealth, the oath prescribed by law, against dueling and the oath office.

The Court next preceeded to layoff the County in School Commissioners Districts, whereupon it was agreed that the County should be divided into five Districts, which Districts should coinside with the magisteral District and numbered just as they are.

The Court preceeded to the appointment of School Commissioners. Whereupon Isaah Jones was appointed School Commissioner for the first Dist. (?)Ch's F Bond was appointed School Commissioner for the second Dist. Adam G. Robinson was appointed School Commissioner for the third Dist. Stephen H. Senter was appointed School Commissioner for the fourth Dist. Robert P Dickenson was appointed School Commissioner for the fifth Dist.

Ordered that the Courts for the County of Wise be held in the Baptist Church at Gladesville, untill a new Courthouse can be built. therefore the said Baptist Church is adopted as the Courthouse for Wise County.

Ordered that the Clerk's Office be kept in a smal house a few feet west Charles F. Bond's store house whereupon the said house is adopted as the Clerk's Office for the County of Wise at the present.

July Monday 28th 1856

Ordered that Russell County jail be adopted, as the jail for this County untill one can be erected at this place.

Ordered that the sheriff of this County furnish the Clerk of this County two hundred dollars of the first money that he collect of the County levy to pay for the Books for the Courts of this County and the carriage on them but should the

sheriff fail to furnish said amount within time to pay for said Book; then this Court authorizes said Clerk to borrow said money untill the Sheriff can collect said amount and pay it over.

Ordered that the Clerk have two good writing desks or tables furnished, one large press and a sufficient amount of stationary for the use of the Clerk's Office all of which shall be paid out of the leavy of this county.

Ordered that John Bickley be appointed Commissioner of Roads for the west end of this County who came into c__t and tuek (sic) the Several oaths presc'd(?) by Law

Ordered that Nehemiah Henderson be appointed Commissioner of Roads for the East end of this County, who came into court, and took the several oaths prescribed by law.

Ordered that Morgan T. Lipps, Charles F Bond and William H Dean be appointed as building committee to superintend the building of the new Court House for Wise County, and they are to let the plan be known and led the job to contract to the lowest bidder, at the next August court, requiring of the contracter bond and security for the completion of said Court-House within the time and manner agreed upon, and report these proceedings to the court.

Ordered that the New Court-House be built of hewn logs, said house is to be thirty feet square, 2 stories high, the uper story to be divided into the rooms, it is to be covered with shingles, the cracks are to be pinted with lime, also 2 good brick chimneys with 2 fire places in each chimney. said House is to be set on the back part of the public Square.

Ordered that the court be furnished 20 codes of Virginia, 20 Mays's Guides, 20 Magistrate's recording book and 20 Acts for 1852-3 1852 & 1854.

Ordered that the minutes of this Court be made up in a good Order book and signed at the term of this Court by the presiding Justice

Ordered that a levy of one dollar and fifty cents be tax on each tithable in the county and collected by sheriffs for the year 1856.

Ordered that two Courts of Issue and 2 quarterly courts be held in this County, and that they be held at the August and March terms.

Ordered that court be adjourned till tomorrow morning 9 O'clock

John Creich(?) is appointed surveyor of the road from the forks of the road above his house to the end of Dulaney Bolin's precinct.

Ordered that Dulaney Bowlin be appointed surveyor of the beginning at the end of John Creich's precinct and terminating at James M Gibson's House.

Tuesday July 29th, 1856 (con't)

DEADLINE for submitting material is the first of the month previous to (3)the month of publication -- by Jan 1 for the February issue, etc. Please do not send material that you want to keep - send a xerox copy to (4) us instead. That way it won't get lost, as letters do get misplaced. GENEALOGICAL QUERIES: Each member is entitled to 1 - 3 free, 60 word query
