

MEMBERSHIP: Active members of the Society will be mailed copies of the "Society's" quarterly, the VIRGINIA APPALACHIAN NOTES (VAN). The VAN is published quarterly, usually in February; May, August and November. Previously these issues were followed by an annual index issue. Effective with the 1996 issue the 'index issue' is being included in a regular issue. Society memberships are on a calendar year basis and those memberships, which are not renewed by January 30, will be deemed as inactive and removed from the mailing list. Single or family memberships are \$20.00; Organization and Library memberships are \$15.00. Members with mailing addresses outside the United States shall add \$10.00 to the above fees and all monies are payable in U.S. currency. Issues of the VAN, 1996 and earlier, are available at a reimbursement cost of \$4.00 each, as long as the supply lasts. More recent issues are \$6.00 each. Bulk mailings of old VANS to one address may be eligible for a discount.

All payments should be made by check or money order, payable to Southwestern Virginia Genealogical Society, Inc. or to SVGS, Inc. and may be mailed to Post Office Box 12485, Roanoke, VA 24026-2485.

THE PERIODICAL SOURCE INDEX (PERSI)

The Historical Genealogy Department of the Allen County Public Library, Ft. Wayne, IN, houses thousands of periodicals. For over six years, the library and its foundation have acquired a comprehensive collection of North American historical and genealogical periodicals. PERSI (pronounced like the name Percy) is the result of this endeavor and the public can now access these materials.

Many libraries now have PERSI--an index by area and family name for all periodicals in its collection since 1847. Yes, 1847. PERSI lists Places and Families in separate volumes from 1847-1985 and from 1986 on they are combined in one volume. The volumes are divided into place, subject and surname index to articles for all publications in the collection. Each volume is divided as follows: US places, (current) county and record type (22 record type designations); Canadian places, province; Other Foreign Places, country, record type; Research methodology, record type; Families, alpa surname.

Once you have found an area or a family name, simply copy the information given: title of article, the name of the periodical, volume, number, month and year. For example:

VAAP (Virginia Appalachian Notes) Vol. 1, #2, April, 1977:
Grayson County, VA Court Order Book 1793-1794

You can request up to six (6) articles per letter for a cost of \$5 each letter and twenty (20) cents per page copied. So order 6 articles at a time and save money.

Send your request to: Allen County Public Library, 900 Webster Street, Box 2270, Ft. Wayne, IN 46801-2270. They will send you a bill. The Library handles requests in a very timely manner.

IN THE VIRGINIA ROOM. . .

joined the SVGS within the last two years, you may have noticed an index of sorts being printed in the VAN. It usually begins with "Continued from..." and ends with "To be continued." Well, this issue of the VAN contains the last installment of "Mitchell's Reference to Map." Many of us are not aware of what this particular map is or how it relates to our genealogical research.

Babe Fowler discovered that a cousin of hers, Geraldine Obenshain, had a book belonging to George Waskey, from whom they are both descended, which was a reference index to a map of The United States published in 1835. After some research, the map was found. The Society purchased the map for the Virginia Room and Babe made a copy of the reference index and began to publish the copy in small sections in the VAN.

I decided to take a look at the map for myself to see what all the hoopla was about. The map is a very clear copy, and according to the title page of the index:

"The whole, in connexion with the map, illustrating the geography, topography, and statistics of the Union, in a more complete and satisfactory manner than has been hitherto attempted."

Let me tell you, this is the most exciting thing I have seen for searching for those elusive early nineteenth century ancestors who do not seem to be listed where we know they were. If you are stumped, take a look at this map. The United States in 1830-1835 was not the same as it is today. "We know that", you say. But the topography was very much like it is today. If you know your great-great-great grandfather Jones bought a farm in New Market in 1833, do you know where that farm should have been? In 1830 there were 16 New Markets in the United States and only 5 of them were in Virginia. That's right there were 5 New Markets in Virginia. So, maybe, you are not so sure after all where that farm was.


Another feature of the map itself that makes it worth taking a look at is that it shows the major roads of the period. Along with this is the listing of the stage routes in the Reference. The combination of these two will allow you to see a "possible" route your family took if they migrated near this time. Even if they did not take the stage, chances are they used the same roads. Keep in mind that travel then took a lot longer than it does now and many times families stopped somewhere along the way for several weeks or even months or to pass the winter.

When you come to the Virginia Room to look at this map and find out where all those other towns with the same name were, bring your copy of the index (from your old issues of the VAN, of course) with you because I suspect a lot of people will be wanting to do the same thing. The Virginia has a full copy of the index just in case you joined after publication of part of it. Also bring a magnifying glass with you. Even though the map is clearly printed, the print is small (the copy of "our neck of the woods"

shown below was enlarged to 150%). Because the map is in six sections, it is not difficult to make copies of the section your are studying, but be sure to ask for assistance to avoid damaging the map. You also might want to read the little history provided in the index of the state in which your own search takes place.

Once you look at the map and make the "connexion" with the index, you will be glad Babe put it here for us.

CONSULTING INDEX TO THE RIVERS.

To ascertain the location on the Map of any river mentioned in the Index, observe the letters opposite to it in the column of reference letters, then find the corresponding letters on the top and sides of the Map; from these pass the eye along the columns due north or south, or east or west, until they intersect: in the square of their intersection, the river sought for will be found.

The first column contains the names of the rivers, the second the ocean, gulf, bay, (or, if a tributary) the river into which they respectively empty. The third column contains the state in which they are situated; in the fourth will be found the reference letters; and the fifth shows the respective lengths, in miles, measured from their mouths, to their remotest sources.

The articles which have the letter M attached to them, will be found on the Supplementary Map of Maine; and those to which the letter F is attached, are on the Supplementary Map of Florida.

The National Genealogical Society Newsletter contains news of what is going on in the genealogy community. It also contains the *NGS/CIG DIGEST* which features the latest information on computer software, tools, techniques and etc. The *NGS/CIG DIGEST* is written by the NGS Computer Interest Group.

Numerous genealogical records contain the names of witnesses to events such as land sales, marriages and writing of wills. In the recent past a rumor has been circulating that the first witness is a relative of the male and the second witness is a relative of the female. THIS IS NOT TRUE. While the witnesses may in fact be relatives, they are not necessarily relatives and certainly not in that order. The witness could be a neighbor, friend or relative.

Researching these witnesses' names is very important. You may uncover information about them that would lead to new clues to your ancestors' past. For instance, emigrants often traveled in groups. Perhaps you would find where the witness last lived, which could (not would) help you discover your ancestor's former home.

Please help dispel this witness-as-relative rumor. However, do use the valuable source of further identification. From *News 'n' Notes* Vol. 28, Number 7 (July 1996), St. Louis Genealogical Society, St. Louis, MO.

ELECTION YEAR BITS AND PIECES

FINCASTLE, Monday, April 16, 1821 ("Herald of the Valley")

The election for Botetourt County, after a warm contest of three days, terminated in the election of Col. Burwell, and Capt. Snider. On the two first days Col. Burwell and Capt. Walker were a few votes ahead, but on the third day they stood as follows.

Doct. Floyd (for congress)	?302
Col. Burwell	373
Capt. Snider	322
Capt. Walker	308

There were various reports circulated to injure the three last named gentlemen, which some would perhaps think were of so simple a nature, that they could have no effect, yet they were credited by many. But Capt. Walker appears to have been most injured; it was stated of him that he had declared he never would vote for a republican. But it is believed he suffered most from a new road being cut through his neighborhood, which imposed a heavy tax on that section of the country. The people insisted on Capt. W's preventing its being done; but as it was of considerable benefit to him, he did not attempt to prevent it being done; and this was the cause of Capt. W's friends not turning out unanimously; and from a misunderstanding of the candidates respecting the number of days the election would last. It was their impression on the close of the first day, that the law allowed four days; and it was asserted by Capt. W that he directed his friends to come in on the fourth day, but it was decided by the gentlemen of the bar, that it could not lawfully continue longer than three days, which prevented Capt. W. from receiving the aid of those of his friends that would have come in on the fourth day.

The election was conducted in the best possible order. The greatest harmony existed between the candidates and people.

Capt. Walker will be again a candidate for the next general assembly.

Will Book 9, p 397, Montgomery County, Va.

In the name of God amen. I, Daniel Hornbarger of the County of Montgomery and State of Virginia, feeling that life is uncertain and desiring to dispose of what goods providence has blest me with, I make this my last will and Testament as follows: Item 1st, I desire all my just debts and funeral expenses paid out of the fund which I may leave or have on Hands. Item 2nd, I will and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth Hawley wife of Crockett Hawley One hundred Dollars in money in addition to what I have heretofore given her. I will and bequeath to my daughter Nancy Hornbarger what money she has in her hands and to be supported and maintained from the plantation as long as she remains single. Item 3, I will and bequeath to the heirs of Peter Hornbarger deceased the tract of land lying in Floyd County, and I desire the same to be rented out until the youngest child arrives at the age of 21 years, and the proceeds to go to the support of his widow and the two children Daniel and Hiram. Item 4th, I give to my daughter Margaret Yingling one negro girl named Charlotte and Fifteen hundred Dollars in money, and her support from the home plantation as long as they can agree and live pleasantly, and no longer. Item 5th, I give and bequeath to my son Parker L. Hornbarger my tract of land lying in the County of Bland, in this State on Hunting Camp Creek and containing about Two Hundred acres, to him and his heirs forever. Item 6th, I give to Mariah Hornbarger, widow of Daniel Hornbarger, One hundred Dollars in money. Item 7th, I give and bequeath to my daughter Patsey Hornbarger what money she has in her possession and to be supported from the plantation so long as she remains single. Item 8th, I give and bequeath to my son Hiram Hornbarger my home plantation with the exception of about one hundred acres to be taken off the southeastern portion, which said hundred acres as I suppose, I give and bequeath to my grand-daughter, Nancy Yingling, the line to commence at two pines at the corner of the Polly Taylor field & running nearly north to two or three black oaks a corner of Crockett Hawley, and with his lines eastward to a red oak and thence with the Inclusive Survey line to the beginning. Item 9th, I give to my son Hiram all the rest of my negroes not heretofore bequeathed and in the event of his death without issue I desire the said negroes to go to my daughters Nancy and Patsey with the exception of a negro girl Ann, which in that event I give to my daughter Elizabeth Hawley. I also (if my son Hiram should die without issue) give to my daughters Nancy & Patsey my home place or as I have bequeathed it to Hiram. Item 10th. I give to Elizabeth Hawley's daughter Margaret Two Cows now in her possession. Item 11th. I desire that my daughters will select four horses together my riding mare to be kept on the plantation. I give to my son Parker two horses, the gray he has always claimed & one other. To Hiram a Horse and Colt he claims. To Margaret Yingling One Horse, her choice of one not above named. To Nancy and Patsey I give my bay mare and Buggy. I desire that the balance of my stock on the place go to my daughters Nancy and Patsey, unless there should be a deficiency to pay the bequests made in money, in that event it is my wish & I hereby direct that my Executor

make sale of the young stock on the plantation to meet the same. I will and direct that my Executor make sale of a tract of land in Bland County near the land bequeath to my son Parker, containing about One hundred and fifty acres, and the proceeds to be equally divided amongst my children as follows: Elizabeth Hawley, Nancy, Patsey, Parker & Hiram and Margaret Yingling. I also direct my executor to make sale of a Fifty acre tract in this County adjoining the lands of John Brown and others and the proceeds to be divided as above. I give to my daughter Nancy & Patsey and my son Hiram all my household and kitchen furniture. And lastly I hereby appoint James M. Wade Executor of this my last will and Testament thereby revoking all other and former wills by me made. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand this 26th day of July 1862.

This last will and Testament of Daniel Hornbarger deceased was presented in Court and proven by the oaths of D. W. L. Charlton and I. W. Montague the witnesses thereto subscribed and ordered to be recorded. And on the motion of James M. Wade the executor therein named who made oath thereto, and together with Floyd Smith and Haml. W. Shields his security entered into and acknowledged a bond in the penalty of \$10,000 conditioned as the law directs, certificate is granted him for obtaining a probate thereof in due form.

WARNING! The National Archives has recommended that no removable self-stick notes be used on any paper that has permanent value. The lab examined 3M Scotch Post-It Notes and AMB brand Note Pads and found that adhesive remained on papers to which the notes were adhered--even when they were removed immediately.

This remaining adhesive could cause important records to stick together or to the files in which they were housed.

In addition, as the chemicals in the adhesive break down over time, they can deteriorate the paper and make printing illegible. The lab also found that the adhesive lifted photocopied images after two weeks of aging and that some of the note paper colors run when wet.

So, take those Post-It Notes off your birth certificates and other important records (unless you have an interest in destroying certain information, such as your birthdate!).

A little action now can help save important records--both at home and in the library--from irreparable damage.

§ 57-38.1

be deemed a Class 1 misdemeanor and any person convicted of such violation shall be punished in accordance with the provisions of § 18.2-11. (1990, cc. 434, 750.)

ARTICLE 4.

Abandonment; Removal of Remains.

§ 57-35.36. Cemeteries owned by localities; good faith effort required prior to interment. — Notwithstanding the exemptions provided for in § 57-35.12, a cemetery operated by a county or city shall keep accurate records of the ownership of cemetery lots and shall make a good faith effort to ensure, prior to interment, that the ownership of a cemetery lot is vested in the decedent's estate or that permission for the interment has been granted by the person holding such ownership. This section shall not apply to lots or cemeteries which are dedicated for the burial of indigents. (1991, c. 614.)

§ 57-36. Abandoned graveyards may be condemned; removal of bodies. — When a graveyard, wholly or partly within any county, city or town, has been abandoned, or is unused and neglected by the owners, and such graveyard is necessary, in whole or in part, for public purposes, authorized by the charter of such city or town, or by the general statutes providing for the government of counties, cities and towns, such county, city or town may acquire title to such burying ground by condemnation proceedings, to be instituted and conducted in the manner and mode prescribed in the statutes providing for the exercise of the power of eminent domain by counties, cities and towns. The court taking jurisdiction of such case may, in its discretion, require the county, city or town to acquire the whole burying ground, in which event the county, city or town may use such part thereof as may be necessary for its purposes and sell the residue. The court, however, shall direct that the remains interred in such graveyard, if possible so to do, be removed to some repository used and maintained as a cemetery. (Code 1919, § 54; 1985, c. 95.)

§ 57-37. Costs of suits, removal and reinterment; how surplus above costs disposed of. — In the event that the proceeds from the condemnation are insufficient to defray the costs of the suit and removal, and reinterment of the remains, then the additional amount necessary therefor shall be paid by the county, city or town instituting the suit. If, after the payment of proper costs, there be any residue, the same shall be paid to the parties entitled thereto, and if there be any parties unknown who are entitled to such proceeds, the county, city or town shall hold such amount in trust for the parties so entitled, but such county, city or town shall not be charged with any interest on such amount so held. If the amount so held is not claimed by or paid to the parties entitled thereto within seven years from the date of sale of such burying ground, or part thereof, then such amount shall pass to and become a part of the Literary Fund of the Commonwealth, as provided by the statute of escheats. (Code 1919, § 55; 1985, c. 95.)

§ 57-38. Exemption from §§ 57-36 and 57-37. — Sections 57-36 and 57-37 shall not apply to any graveyard or cemetery owned by a church, or controlled by trustees, in which sections are sold. (Code 1919, § 55.)

§ 57-38.1. Proceedings by landowner for removal of remains from abandoned family graveyard. — The owner of any land on which is located an abandoned family graveyard, and there has been no reservation of rights in

such graveyard, or where the beneficiaries of any reservations of rights desire to waive such rights, and in which no body has been interred for twenty-five years may file a bill in equity in the circuit court of the county or in the circuit or corporation court wherein such land is located for the purpose of having the remains interred in such graveyard removed to some more suitable repository. To such bill all persons in interest, known or unknown, other than the plaintiffs shall be duly made defendants. If any of such parties be unknown, publication shall be had. Upon the case being properly matured for hearing, and proof being made of the propriety of the removal, the court may order the removal made and the remains properly deposited in another place, at the expense of the petitioner. Such removal and reinterment shall be done with due care and decency.

In determining the question of removal the court shall consider the historical significance of such graveyard and shall consider as well the wishes of the parties concerned so far as they are brought to its knowledge, including the desire of any beneficiaries of any reservation of rights to waive such reservation of rights in favor of removal, and so considering shall exercise a sound discretion in granting or refusing the relief prayed for. (1966, c. 444; 1970, c. 377.)

§ 57-38.2. Proceedings by heir at law or descendant for removal of ancestor's remains from abandoned family graveyard. — Any heir at law or descendant of a deceased person interred in an abandoned family graveyard in which no body has been interred for twenty-five years may file a bill in equity in the circuit court of the county or city wherein the land is located for the purpose of having the remains interred in the graveyard removed to some more suitable repository. The owner of the land, any beneficiaries of any reservation of rights, and all other persons in interest, known or unknown, other than the plaintiffs shall be duly made defendants. If any of such parties are unknown, notice may be given by order of publication. Upon the case being properly matured for hearing, and proof being made of the propriety of the removal, the court may order the removal and the remains properly deposited in another place, at the expense of the petitioner. The removal and reinterment shall be done with due care and decency.

The bill may be filed and relief granted regardless of whether there has been a reservation of rights in the graveyard and regardless of whether the beneficiaries of any reservation of rights desire to waive their rights. In determining the question of removal, the court shall consider the historical significance of the graveyard and the wishes of the parties concerned so far as they are brought to its knowledge, including the desire of any beneficiaries of any reservation of rights, and shall exercise sound discretion in granting or refusing the relief prayed for. (1990, c. 562.)

§ 57-39. Proceedings for removal of remains and sale of land vacated. — When the owners of a graveyard, or the trustees of a graveyard left in trust, by reason of the infancy or the disability of any of them or by reason of their being numerous or partly unknown, or of the residence of any of them being unknown, cannot or cannot conveniently unite in making disposition of the same, any one or more of such owners or trustees, or, in any event, any county, city or town of this Commonwealth, if a private graveyard or pauper's graveyard (potter's field), which has been dedicated for such use either by written instrument, or by use by the public for such purpose, be within the boundaries thereof and the private graveyards be not connected with any church or church property and said graveyards be in a condition of neglect or disuse, or in the case of a pauper's graveyard is in a condition of neglect, or disuse, or is located in a location which is inappropriate for its continued use

as a burial ground, may file a bill in equity in the circuit court of the county or in the circuit or corporation court of the corporation wherein the graveyard is located for the purpose of having the remains interred in such graveyard removed to some more suitable repository, and the land thus vacated sold and the costs of removal and interment and the costs of suit including reasonable attorney's fees paid out of the proceeds of the sale. To such bill all owners of the graveyard or any person having a right therein, and in the case of a pauper's graveyard the dedicator thereof, his heirs or successors in interest, if known, and if not known, such unknown parties shall be made defendants by the name of "person or persons unknown who may be the owners, heirs, or successors in interest of the unknown dedicator of the pauper's graveyard which is the subject of this suit," other than the plaintiffs shall be duly made defendants.

The bill shall show the title of the land, the interest of all parties, so far as known, and the reasons why relief is sought and that it is practicable. And upon the case being properly matured for hearing, and proofs being adduced of the propriety of the removal, the court shall have power to have the removal made and the remains properly deposited in another place, and to make sale of the grounds vacated by the removal and to have the costs of removal and reinterment, including the costs of the new place of interment, and of putting it in all respects in suitable condition and erecting upon it suitable memorials and the costs of the suit paid out of the proceeds of the sale.

Such removal and reinterment shall be done with due care and decency. But, unless the bill be filed by a city, town or county, the court shall not order such removal and reinterment until due and sufficient guaranty be given it that the proceeds of sale of the grounds proposed to be sold will be sufficient to meet all costs that may be incurred unless some party to the cause or other person gives due security to make good any deficit.

In determining the question of removal or sale the court shall consider as well the wishes of the parties concerned so far as they are brought to its knowledge as the proofs, and so considering shall exercise a sound discretion in granting or, refusing the relief prayed for, except that in case the bill be filed by a city, town or county, the court shall be guided by considerations of public welfare.

The court may distribute any surplus of the proceeds of sale according to their rights among the owners of the ground sold or the parties entitled thereto, and in the case of the sale of a pauper's graveyard wherein the original owner, his heirs and successors in interest are unknown, or there has been a dedication of said land for pauper's graveyard, the court, after the due consideration, upon application of the county, city or town may permit the proceeds of the sale to be utilized for other public uses of a charitable nature including the purchase of land for parks, public offices and other municipal uses including the construction of buildings thereon.

No graveyard to which there is no right-of-way except over or through some person's land shall be sold hereunder without the consent of such person. (1946, p. 407; Michie Suppl. 1946, § 58a; 1968, c. 83.)

§ 57-39.1. Improvement of abandoned and neglected graveyards. — When the owners of any private graveyard, not connected with any church or church property, abandon the graveyard and allow it to fall into a condition of neglect and disuse, so that it is unsightly and thereby lessens the desirability and value of adjacent land, and the owners fail or refuse, when requested by the owner of adjacent land or when requested by the local governing body of the county, city or town wherein the private graveyard is located, to remedy such condition of neglect and put the graveyard into suitable condition, then any owner of adjacent land or the local governing body may file a bill in equity in the circuit court of the county or city wherein the graveyard is located, for

the purpose of requiring the graveyard to be placed in a suitable condition. The owners of the graveyard or any person having a right therein shall be made defendants to such court proceedings.

The court shall not enter an order requiring the owners of a graveyard in which a grave or entombment right has never been sold to improve it or place it in a suitable condition. However, after hearing the evidence the court may allow the petitioners, at their own expense, to improve the graveyard and place it in suitable condition and may also require bond to ensure that the petitioners will not injure or remove any tomb, monument, gravestone, grave marker, or vault without having first obtained court approval. Acting pursuant to court order, the petitioners may thereafter enter upon the land and improve the graveyard and place it in suitable condition. The costs in any case involving a graveyard in which a grave or entombment right has never been sold shall be paid by the petitioners.

In any case involving a graveyard in which a grave or entombment right has been sold, the court shall determine whether the owners or petitioners shall pay the costs of improving the graveyard and may require bond to insure against injury or removal of any tomb, monument, gravestone, grave marker, or vault without court approval. (1950, p. 91; 1986, c. 55; 1990, c. 675.)

ARTICLE 5.

Acquisition of Abandoned Lots in Certain Cities.

§§ 57-39.2 through 57-39.7: Not set out.

Editor's note. — This article, providing for the acquisition of abandoned cemetery lots by the city, corporation, association or trustees owning the cemetery, and applicable only in cities having a population in excess of 180,000 but not exceeding 300,000, was added to the Code by chapter 264 of the Acts of 1962. In furtherance of the general policy of the Commission to include in the Code only provisions having general and permanent application, this article, which is limited in its purpose and scope, is not set out here, but attention is called to it by this reference.

Attention is likewise called to Chapter 111 of the Acts of 1964, which amended §§ 57-39.2 through 57-39.7, so as to make them also applicable to any town in any county which county

has a population of not less than 21,950 nor more than 22,100; Acts 1986, c. 414, which amended § 57-39.2 to make this article applicable to any city with a population in excess of 180,000 or any town in any county having a population of not less than 24,500 nor more than 25,600, or having the urban county executive form of government, and amended § 57-39.7 to delete a reference to annual care; and Acta 1986, c. 118, which amended § 57-39.2, so as to make this article applicable to any city, the article having formerly been applicable to cities having a population in excess of 180,000, and amended § 57-39.3 so as to provide for filing of a bill in equity in the circuit court, such bills formerly having been filed in the circuit, corporation or city court.

Each query should include name, dates, and location to identify the problem. Please CAPITALIZE surnames - is it Mary Smith JONES (single) or Mary SMITH JONES (maiden & married name). Do not abbreviate, we will. If not typed, please PRINT — some written queries we have not been able to read. Queries for non-members are 5¢ (cents) per word not including your name and address. Queries must be received prior to the 1st of the month preceding publication.

FAMILY REUNION, PUBLICATION OF BOOK, NEWSLETTERS, ETC.:


Limited to 60 words, not including your name and address. We cannot edit a full page down to 60 words — so send the notice as you want it printed. These notices will be put in as space permits. Members will be given priority in publishing these notices.

MATERIAL FOR PUBLICATION: We welcome articles, records, etc. for publications.

The material when received may not be used in following issue, but in a future issue. If a large amount of material is sent, it may take a while to publish because we try to have a variety of material in each issue. (1) **READY FOR PUBLICATION** (*which the editor loves*). Please type using a carbon ribbon or dark ribbon and CLEAN KEYS. Use 8 1/2" x 11" paper, single space, with a minimum margin on ALL sides of 1 inch. Center your title. Be sure to include your name, address, and date (year) on the document. If not typed for publication, please PRINT PLAINLY — some articles that have been hand written we have not been able to read, or those that are typed with all caps are difficult to read. PLEASE read material over before mailing and double check all dates. (2) **GIVE SOURCE OF MATERIAL**. Original documents — where found, type of record, page number, etc., or, if known, who now has the document in their possession. We CANNOT PRINT material from printed sources unless we have written permission from the publisher, which you MUST FURNISH. We must have source of material to give credit to the person who has done the work. (3) **DEADLINE** for submitting material should be at least two months before date of publication. (4) **PLEASE** do not send material that you want returned — send a photocopy to us instead. That way it won't get lost, as letters do get misplaced, when passed from one person to another.

SURNAME INDEX: Information will include name (given and surname), place (location at time of date), Date (birth, death, marriage, or where living at the date given). "WASKEY, William Christopher - Montgomery Co, VA - 1900-10 death" If this data takes more than one line or the spouse is included on the same line, it will count as two names. The limit is 10 names. The surname index is published in the August issue.
