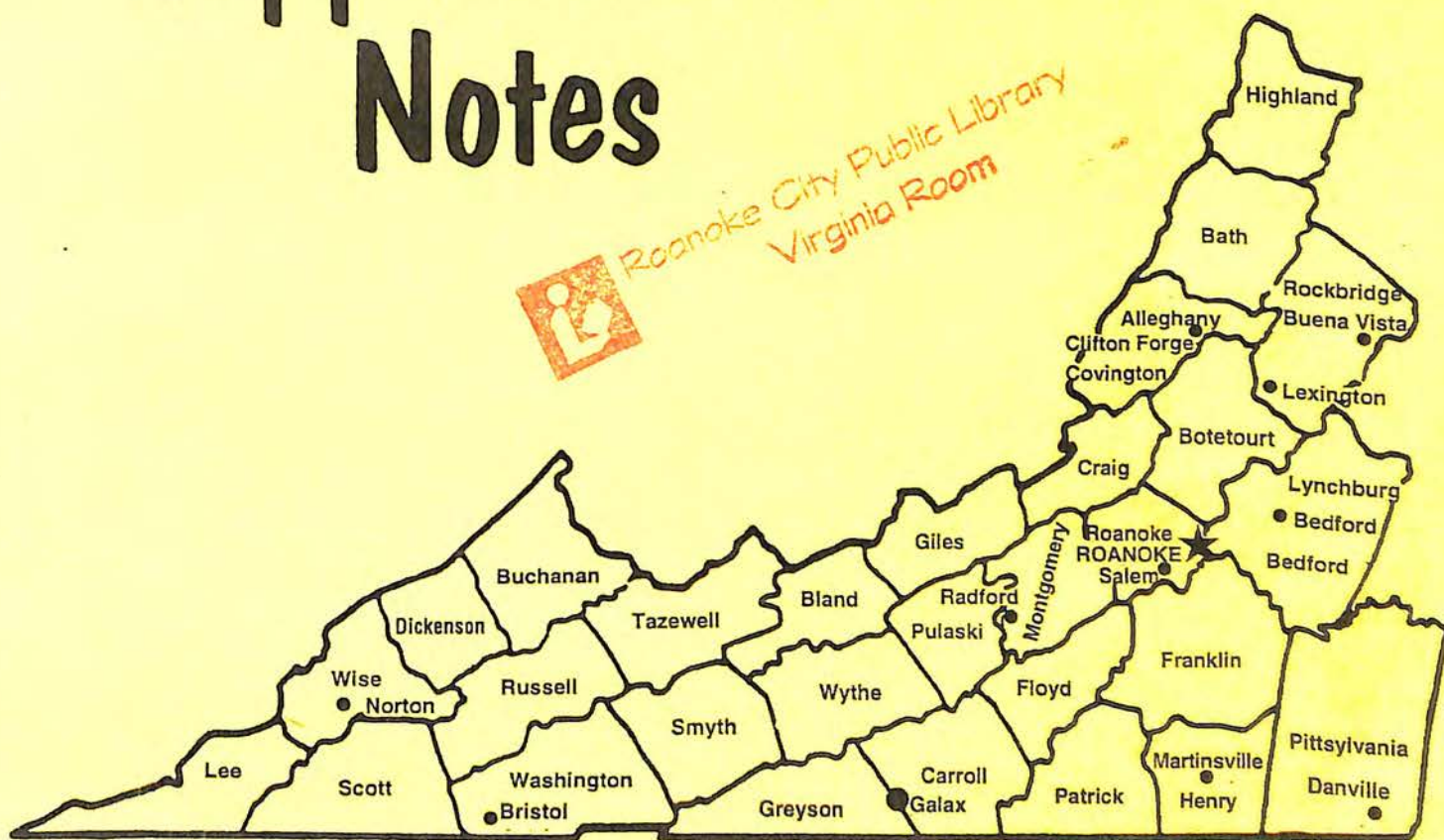

MEMBERSHIP: Each SVGS member will be mailed a copy of the "Society's" quarterly, the VIRGINIA APPALACHIAN NOTES (VAN). The VAN is usually published in February, May, August, and November. The annual index will be included in the November issue of the VAN for that year.

Society memberships are on a calendar year basis and those memberships, which are not renewed by January 30, will be deemed as inactive and removed from the VAN mailing list. Single or family memberships are \$20.00; Organization and Library memberships are \$15.00. Members with mailing addresses outside the United States shall add \$10.00 to the above fees and all monies are payable in U. S. currency. Issues of the VAN, 1995 and earlier, are available at a reimbursement cost of \$4.00 each, as long as the supply lasts. More recent issues are \$6.00 each. These prices include postage. A bulk mailing of old VANs to one address may be eligible for a discount.

TRIBUTE TO CHIEF LIBRARIAN OF THE VIRGINIA ROOM, CAROL TUCKWILLER

As announced in my President's Message earlier in this issue of the VAN, we report to our members and readers that our long-serving Chief Librarian of the Roanoke Public Library's Virginia Room is retiring as of the 1st of February 2000. Carol first came to RPL in 1969, and it was not long afterward that she realized how important it would be to gather the historical and genealogical books and materials into a single collection and location. So it was that early in the 1980's, Carol was single-handedly responsible for re-organizing the collection and locating it in the Library's south addition to the building on Jefferson Street in Downtown Roanoke.

For those readers who do not know, the Virginia Room is the major Southwest Virginia regional historical and genealogical research collection south of Charlottesville and west of Lynchburg. As members of the Southwestern Virginia Genealogical Society, we depend on this collection for most if not all of our family history and genealogical information. While it specializes in Virginia and especially Southwest Virginia sources, it contains major references from our bordering states as well. After 6+ years of researching this collection, I am constantly amazed at the scope of materials contained in the Virginia Room. It is not enough to merely search the computer for specific needs, but you must browse the room itself for wonderful but perhaps overlooked materials. One member recently told me they had been researching in the Virginia Room for many years but only recently took a look at some of the oversized reference materials and found something they had been searching for and wondering about for years.

And that has been the incredible value of Carol Tuckwiller...she knows EVERYTHING that is there...it is only up to us researchers to ASK HER for what we are looking for, and she will either find it there immediately or lead you to another location where to look. I remember very clearly when I first arrived in Roanoke from Oregon in April 1993 on a job-hunting trip. I could not pass up visiting the Virginia Room at RPL to see what they had, and on my arrival there, Carol recognized I was a visitor (but soon a resident) and immediately took me under her wing and asked me my specific research goal(s) for that particular visit. She then took perhaps half a minute and gathered up half a dozen references and brought them to me at my table. WHAT A GAL! I have observed many times since then that she treats EVERYONE like this—like she is their "personal guide" to what is requested. I know of no other librarian in any library I have visited who makes the researcher feel like a VERY IMPORTANT PERSON right from the start.

This SVGS President, Board and Committee members, as well as all our other SVGS members and researching colleagues will sorely miss Carol and her expertise. Her successor and the Virginia Room staff members Brenda and Ann (plus numerous others who have and will continue to help there) will carry on without her, of course, but Carol will go down in history as the ONE GAL IN SOUTHWEST VIRGINIA WHO MADE AN INCREDIBLE DIFFERENCE TO THOSE OF US RESEARCHING IN THIS AREA. Praise to her for a job very well done, and we wish her all the best in her further endeavors.

World War I Draft Applications

Prior to the US's entry into WWI (approx. 1917-1918) every male between the age of 18 and 40 was required to register for the draft. The information found on the card was provided by the individual himself. The registration cards vary in information depending on the individual draft board. But by and large the cards include

The full name of the person (this means first, full middle name, any additional middle names and last name); the current address of the man; his age; his birthdate (some include his place of birth); whether he is a US citizen or a naturalized citizen (some ask if his father was a naturalized citizen and his father's race); his race; his occupation, where he is employed (name of employer); address or location of employment, name and address of his next of kin; some cards ask if the man is married or single and how many people he supports. The card is signed by the draftee. On the back of the card his physical description is noted: Height is broken down by short, medium, tall although some cards give the actual height in feet and inches; Build by slim, medium, stout although some cards list actual weight along with the build; color of eyes and hair; any deformities or injuries are listed (such as one arm missing, blind in one eye, etc); the name and address of the draft board and the date.

When these original cards were transferred to the East Pointe NARA branch the LDS spent about 3 years microfilming these cards. There are hundreds and hundreds of boxes and the LDS opened one box at a time and filmed them - in state order. However, within each state the cards were filed by draft board, not by county or by draftee. This makes the searching of the microfilm difficult to say the least.

The good news is that the Friends of the National Archives took each box after it was filmed (and checked) and sorted all of these thousands and thousands of cards into - state and then COUNTY order and then in alphabetical order by surname and put them in new boxes. The Friends deserve all the kudos we can give them for this monstrous task.

So ... rather than spending hours and hours searching the LDS microfilm you can order copies of the original cards from NARA. if you know the county your ancestor lived in between 1917-1918.

In your letter be sure to say you want copy(s) of the WWI Draft application Cards. Include the name of your ancestor and his race, the state and the county. If you want copies of ALL of the cards with a given surname, ask them the cost of the copies and send a SASE for them to let you know the copying cost. In your letter be sure and say you want a copy of the FRONT and BACK of the card. Be sure to send a SASE for the return of your copies.

Dear Friend;

Here at Cumberland Gap National Historical Park we have the unique opportunity to meet and share with numerous genealogy enthusiasts from all over the world. In their excitement they often relate to us stories that have been handed down through the generations of their ancestors who traveled the Wilderness Road and came through the Cumberland Gap. We soak up every word of their history and often use some of their stories in our interpretation of the lifestyle of the late 1700's, early 1800's. In all of the excitement that surrounds each recounted history there is a cold dark void that is always lurking in the background. What about the thousands, indeed the hundreds of thousands, of untold stories, of the still unknown pioneers, the mothers, fathers, and babes?? Unfortunately there was no one keeping record of those first settlers that came through the Cumberland Gap.

Today at this very spot of hallowed ground there is an exciting plan taking shape. A plan to restore the Gap to the way it was 200 years ago and to reestablish the Wilderness Road. Upon the opening of this restoration, you will be able to actually retrace the footsteps, and experience the exact emotions, of your very forefathers as they saw and traveled through this gateway to their future.

As we are awaiting congressional funding, we do not know the exact date that this project will be complete, but we are already preparing for that wonderful day. Though 200 years late we are compiling, name by name, that very list that we have often hoped for. On the day of the opening there could be no greater joy for a genealogist than being part of the remaking of this history, a recreation of the great migration with reenactors who quite possibly may share the same name, the same mannerisms, even the same appearance of those who originally came here. The only difference might be the lone candle carried by each participant with its flame burning in memory of that special pioneer that is truly a part of your history. We would love to have you as a part of this celebration and be able to add the name of your ancestor to "The List of Names." This will also be a wonderful networking tool in the search for the "untold stories."

This county was formed from Bote-
tourt in 1838, and lies in the Roanoke
Valley, the Blue Ridge forming its east-
ern boundary, with Botetourt on the
northeast and Montgomery on the
west, Floyd and Franklin on the
south, Bedford on the east, and Craig
on the northwest. The surface is
broken, but the lands are very
rich, and yield large crops of
all the staple products, principal of
which are wheat and tobacco. This
county, in common with all the others
in this section of the State, is famous
for its fine pasturage, and since the ex-
tension of the Shenandoah Valley road
to Roanoke City a new impetus has
been given the raising of cattle, horses
and sheep, because of furnishing a di-
rect and quick means of transportation

to the large markets of the North. The mineral deposits, the chief of which is iron, are very valuable, and extensive machine and iron and steel works have recently been established at Roanoke, the former, in the construction of passenger and freight cars, giving employment to 1,200 hands, and the latter working to its full capacity of 100 tons of pig iron per day. The mineral springs of which there are several, enjoy a high reputation for the medicinal properties of their waters. Of these the Roanoke Red Sulphur and Botetourt take precedence.

Salem, the county seat, is a beautiful and prosperous village on the north bank of the Roanoke river and on the line of the Norfolk and Western R R, 178 miles southwest from Richmond. The place is steadily growing in importance as a business centre, and with its fine natural advantages and the railroad connections soon to be consummated at this point by the extension of the Valley railroad, is destined to become a populous and highly prosperous city.

Owing to its delightful location, Salem has become very popular as a summer resort, and its society during the summer months is greatly augmented by visitors from the more southern localities.

Roanoke College, one of the younger, though one of the most flourishing institutions of learning in the State, is located at Salem. It is a Lutheran institution, and its system is the regular college curriculum. It has also a normal course of teachers of public schools, a select one for a mere business education, and a preparatory department for training boys for the college classes.

Roanoke, formerly Big Lick, on the Norfolk & Western railroad at the southern terminus of the Shenandoah Valley road, is the principal town of Roanoke county. Its growth from a village of a few hundred three years ago to a city to-day of 6,000 inhabitants is unparalleled in the history of Virginia towns. There are extensive work shops here, where the connecting Norfolk & Western and Shenandoah Valley roads have their great engines and handsome coaches built. The streets, stores and dwellings are lighted with gas, and there are large water-works, which furnish an abundant supply for the various purposes. The area of the county is 298 3/4 square miles, 191,118 acres and the average assessed value of the land is \$18.09 per acre.

This county, formed from Augusta and Botetourt in 1778, is one of the largest, most populous and flourishing in the State. It is situated in the Valley of Virginia, with Augusta and Bath on the northeast and northwest, Botetourt and Amherst on the southwest and southeast; Nelson on its eastern centre and Alleghany on its western central part.

The lands through the central portion of the county are very fertile and highly improved, but those on the eastern and western borders, being mountainous, are sparsely settled and comparatively but little cultivated. The mineral deposits in this county are very rich, iron ore of great purity abounding in various sections, and a number of mines and furnaces being profitably operated.

The mineral deposits include, besides iron ore, manganese, kaolin, baryta, ochre, limestones of a lithographic character, and furnishing marbles of superior quality, especially that in the neighborhood of Craigsville, and in the northeast part of the county, unsurpassed in beauty and variety for "inside work."

On James river, two miles above the mouth of North river, a limestone furnishing a first-class hydraulic cement is found. At the mouth of North river sand of the finest quality for making glass has been discovered.

Tin mines are being opened on Irish creek, in the South Mountain, about 8 or 10 miles from Vesuvius and Riverside stations on the Shenandoah Valley railroad.

The railroad facilities in this county for travel and transportation are extraordinarily good. The Chesapeake and Ohio Railway passes through the western part of the county, with a branch from Goshen Depot to Victoria Furnace mines, near the Rockbridge Alum Springs. The Valley branch of the Baltimore and Ohio runs from Staunton through the entire length of the county to Lexington, where it connects with a branch of the Richmond and Alleghany Railroad leading from Lexington along North River to Balcony Falls, where it intersects with the trunk line of the Richmond and Alleghany, which runs through the southern part of the county along James River. The Shenandoah Valley Railroad extends entirely through the county from northeast to southwest, along the western base of the Blue Ridge Mountains.

The scenery in many portions of Rockbridge is very grand and picturesque, and the county contains many points of great interest to the traveler and pleasure-seeker, among which may be mentioned the Natural Bridge, so famous as being one of the greatest natural curiosities in the world, and from which the county takes its name. Handsome hotels have recently been built at this place and first class accommodations can now be had for 400 guests. The mineral springs of the Jordan Alum, Rockbridge Alum, Cold Sulphur, Wilson White Sulphur and Rockbridge Baths, all popular places of resort, are in this county. Superior bass fishing is found in the James river from the mouth of North river up to Clifton Forge.

Lexington, the county seat, is on North river in the centre of the county, surrounded by wild and beautiful scenery and fertile country. It is the seat of the Virginia Military Institute and of the Washington & Lee University, two of the most eminent institutions of learning not only of the State but of the country. The remains of Generals Lee and Stonewall Jackson lie buried here.

A branch of the Richmond & Alleghany Railroad extends from Balcony

Falls, up North river to Lexington, a distance of twenty miles. Lexington is also the present terminus of the Valley Branch of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad. Riverside station, the nearest depot on the Shenandoah Valley Railroad, is within seven miles of Lexington to which point there is a daily line of hacks.

The area of the county is 639 square miles, or 408,961 acres, and the land has an average assessed value of \$8.93 per acre.

FROM WHERE I SIT

Forms! Genealogists use many many forms in their pursuit of elusive ancestors. There are pedigree charts, family group sheets, research logs, correspondence logs, census forms, research check lists, ancestor tables, and on and on. But invariably, a researcher finds there is some information needed in his or her research that does not fit on any published form. Many researchers resort to scribbled notes on various pieces of paper; some use notebooks. However, some invent forms of their own to handle such information.

If you have invented such a form, one you have not seen in any "how-to" book, I invite you to share your form or forms with other members of the Southwestern Virginia Genealogical Society. Send me a copy of your form(s) along with a brief explanation of how it works and what it does for you. I will publish them in future issues of the VAN as space permits. I reserve the right to eliminate duplicates (great minds think alike, etc.) and to make the final decision as to which ones are published. However, I will try to publish as many as I can.

To start the ball rolling, I am sharing a form of my own called "Surname Summary". It is a form I felt I needed to keep all the surnames in my family in one place for easy reference. It is a nine-column form with spaces for:

1. Surname
2. First Person - Given name (notice it is always a female)
3. Dates - These are the dates this first person lived - 1914 - 1991, etc.
4. AHN # - The Ahnentafel number for this first person (this makes finding her on the family tree easier)
5. Pages - Page number on the family tree
6. Married Surname - This connects her to the rest of the tree
7. Area - This pinpoints the location in which to search.
8. Gens - I have labeled each successive generation with a letter of the alphabet. I am "A", my parents are "B", my grandparents "C", etc. This helps me know how many generations I have of this particular family.
9. Blank - Refers me to the notes at the bottom of the page.

The Surname Summary allows me to carry pertinent information on twenty surnames on one page. It goes in my notebook that I carry to the library (or wherever I am doing research). My current count of nearly 100 surnames (my direct line only) fits on five pages. One final note: I always use pencil on this form because it is constantly changing.

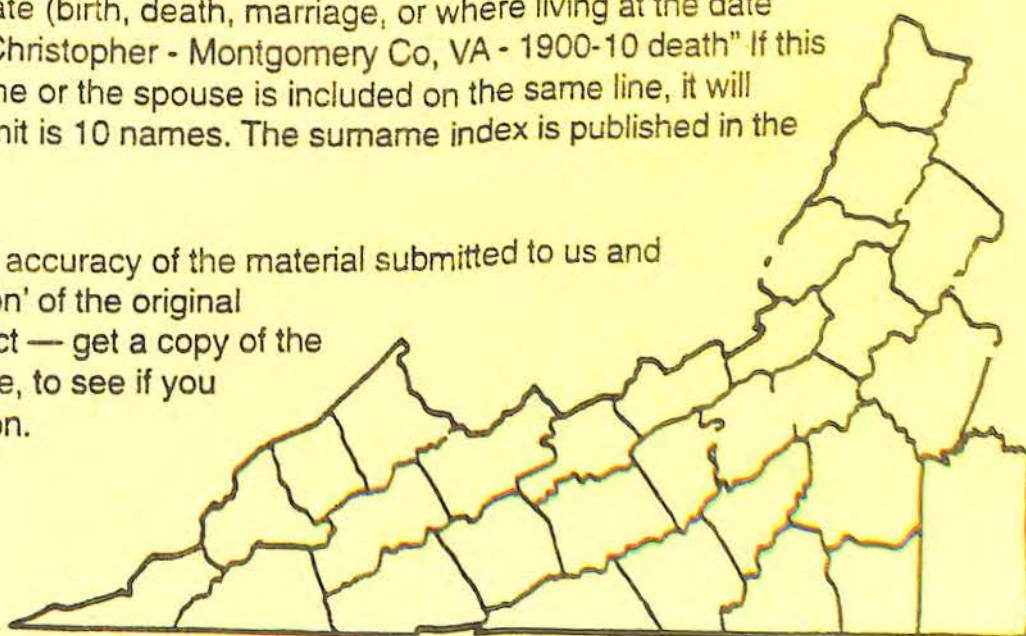
