

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Family Bibles Rich Resource For Name Connections

The Virginia Room has a small collection of family Bibles and a growing collection of pages copied from family Bible records. The most well known Bible in the collection is the John C. Brickey Bible, donated in 1983 by J.W. Gonterman Jr. of St. Louis, Mo. John Compton Brickey of Catawba Valley was the original donor. In the past year or so, at least five people have requested copies from the Brickey Bible. The latest inquiry came from Nettie Grimes of Berger, Mo., who has been searching for a connection between her ancestor Lucinda Toadvine and the Brickeys.

Excerpts from the mail exchanges with Grimes show how family research develops. The first mail from Grimes asked copies of all the family record pages from the Bible. She said she had been researching for a long time and had a "very poor copy" of some of the pages from a Brickey Family Ledger. The Brickeys recorded family information in the back of their store ledger I sent Ms. Grimes the Brickey Bible pages and told her I was not familiar with the Brickey ledger she had mentioned. She also asked for information on Comptons. Since she had been looking for year, I was curious how she just now discovered the Brickey Bible. I also promised to look for references for her in the library's several issues of a Compton family newsletter called "Comptonology."

Grimes replied: I had been looking a good while for documentation for my ancestor Lucinda (surname unknown) who had married "some" Wilson (the parents of my Silas Harrison Wilson). I only knew my dad's grandmother had been a Wilson. I finally found her family on local census records. I discovered by census records that her father was Silas Harrison Wilson so I began to trace him on marriage and census records. You can't imagine how many Wilsons there are until you begin to research them. Luckily, I happened onto a fellow researcher, Dianne, who is out of Silas' sister, Mary Minerva Wilson. She was a great help. The census where I began searching was the 1850 Missouri, Crawford County, one and it only had first initials! After determining that the S. Wilson male must be my Silas, I began to look for his M.M. Wilson sister who turned out to be Mary Minerva Wilson.

I had wondered about the 1825 Washington County, Missouri, marriage record of a Lucinda Brickey and Aquilla Wilson. Dianne and I began to piece together Lucinda's family and learned she was so young when she married first, she needed her father's permission. Hooray! His name was on the marriage record (Jeremiah Brickey). Even then, you wonder...is my Lucinda THE Lucinda or not.

We did figure out that Lucinda Brickey married Aquilla Wilson and had several children, and then he died and she married some Odle. We found their children with her on the 1850 Crawford census, with the older Wilson children in the home, too. She was a widow a second time on that census.

Then, we had a marriage record for Lucie Odle marrying a Henry Morris Toadvine. Her children, thank goodness, were with her on subsequent census with the third husband. Then, I found a record that the Lucinda Toadvine was buried in Lost Creek Cemetery in Washington County. I

found her stone broken into three pieces and under briars and yucca plants. It said her name: Lucinda Toadvine . . .Erected by S.H. Wilson for his mother and gave her birth date and age at death. Another breakthrough. Now, I still needed more documentation tying my Lucinda to the Lucinda Brickey of the marriage record.

While I was talking to a man who posts lots of genealogical info online, he mentioned that he had some copies of papers from the Roanoke Library, and he would look to see if my Lucinda was in there. He also had copies of the ledger pages that list Lucinda...her husband Aquilla Wilson...their children...his death...her remarriage to Tompkins Odle and their children. I was so overcome when I learned that news, I wept. The Bible Records helped establish my Lucinda's paternity. Sounds like someone on Montel Williams, I guess.

Oh, another thing my Silas had applied for a Veteran's Pension for injuries from the Civil War. One of the depositions taken was by a notary public that stated Silas had brought in a tattered family Bible with all the children's names in it. The Notary had typed them all down and put them into the deposition and that was the first time I saw Silas Harrison Wilson's children.

His pension papers also listed his second wife, Annie Mercer Montgomery Wilson. Wow, I would recommend getting a man's pension file, too. There in it was the record of his children copied from that old tattered Bible. --Nettie Grimes

Always need more Bible records

Other Bibles in the Virginia Room collection include two Nicoll family Bibles and two Garst family Bibles, along with the original family record pages (in German) from the Moser family Bible. The Virginia Room welcomes the donation of family Bibles or of photocopies of the records pages from the Bible.

Family Bible records are important because they may be the only sources of information available for ancestors who lived before vital records were required by law. In Virginia, there are no vital records before 1853.

If you locate a family Bible you should photocopy or photograph the entire record on permanent (acid-free) paper. Be sure to include the title page and date of publication of the Bible. Be wary of records with dates earlier than when the Bible was printed. If the main title page is missing, look for one in the New Testament.

If no title page exists, look for any publishing information that might help identify the edition of the Bible or ask a reference librarian to help. Also, always store a copy of the Bible records somewhere other than with the book.

CONFIRM ALL RESEARCH

Unfortunately, she had included the documentation I had sent as the documentation on her mistaken information. It made it look as if her information was the documented, correct information! It served as a great reminder to me that we need to be very careful when accepting information from anyone.

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WHERE AND WHAT SCHOOLS

The 3 school pictures which follows were given to me and I would like to know where the schools were located. I had the pictures enlarged and located my aunt, Janie Emily Waskey (1890-1964), in all 3 pictures. She married in 1911 to E D King. Was told that she taught school before her marriage. The Waskey family was living in Shawsville, Montgomery Co, Va. at that time. Postcards, written to her between 1908 and 1910, had these remarks on them "you are training" and "getting ready to teach school by this time". Were the schools in Shawsville or somewhere else? All 3 school pictures were taken by L. W. Stewart, photographer, Cambria, Va. -- now part of Christianburg. The picture of the larger white frame school has the date of Jan. 1909 on it.

If anyone knows where these schools are located, please let me know as I would like to donate them to the proper museum. When the pictures are enlarged, all faces are cleared - easy to recognize.


CONFEDERATE VETERANS REUNION







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The Care and Feeding of a Pedigree Chart

The following definitions are from Webster's Ninth New Collegiate Dictionary. Springfield, Mass.: Merriam-Webster Inc., 1989:

- <u>Ahnentafel</u> "ancestor table" (rough translation from German, not in Webster's)
- <u>Bloodline</u> a sequence of direct ancestors, particularly in a pedigree
- <u>Chart</u> a sheet giving information in tabular form
- <u>Generation</u> a body of living beings constituting a single step in the line of descent from an ancestor
- <u>Immigrant</u> a person who comes to a country to take up permanent residence
- <u>Pedigree</u> a register recording a line of ancestors
- <u>Vital Events</u> recording data relating to lives

A genogram (pronounced: jen-uh-gram) chart is a method of graphically the describing relationships between individuals. Primarily used by mental health experts, this diagram can help identify positive and negative influences surrounding an individual.

Feeding the Chart:

What should be included on a pedigree chart?

- The full name of each person [note, as in most genealogical records, women are listed by their birth name, not their married name]
- Date and place of birth
- Date and place of death
- Date and place of marriage (note that this is the marriage of the individuals on the chart - other marriages of either party are not relevant to the pedigree of the descendant)

Why use a pedigree chart at all? Using a pedigree chart gives a quick, visual summary of ancestry You can see several important things at a glance:

- Where are the gaps?
 - Missing names
 - Missing dates
 - Missing places
- What are the migration patterns?
 - Sites of vital events show where individuals were at specific points in time

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- o Where was I?
 - Use a copy of your pedigree chart(s) as a checklist when undertaking a major review or housekeeping effort. For example, if you discover a great new resource (maybe a new internet search engine), you can check off as you search for each individual to avoid missing anyone or repeating your efforts.
- o Are we related?
 - You can compare notes with new contacts to see where your lines might connect
 - You can easily see whether we have the same basic information on common ancestors to start discussions on the details

As with everything in life, pedigree charts are NOT the answer to everything. Their advantages are also their weaknesses:

- They show limited information
- They show direct line only
- They do not show sources

So, use pedigree charts wisely.

Care of Chart.

Put your completed pedigree chart in a top-loading Mylar (polyester) sleeve for safekeeping. The page will wear out from use if not protected. If you use a 3-ring binder to organize your research, the sleeve can be inserted at the front for easy access.

Make sure you have back-up copies of your pedigree charts, especially if you do not use a software program to store your information. I keep folders for surnames and keep copies of relevant pedigree charts at the beginning of each folder. If I take a chart out of a folder ! put it in a protective sleeve.

Organize your charts. Make a master copy file folder for each chart.

Use pencil.

FUN WITH MAPS

I am currently researching in my home state of Iowa. I grew up there, but have been gone since 1958. While working on my census reports, I found many new Townships which I didn't remember. I guess I didn't pay that much attention to things like that. So, I went to <u>http://www.topozone.com</u> and made a map of my home county of Des Moines County, as well as all the immediate counties around -- Lee, Louisa, Henry, and since Des Moines County falls on the Mississippi River. I also printed some maps of Illinois.

The project took a while, but this was a fun craft. I taped all the pages together, and then taped it to the wall near my computer. When I go into my census reports now, I can check the map, and see where I am. When I find a family member in a census report, I go to the map and mark it with their name and year of census. Each of the Townships are already on the map, I just highlighted them with a colored marker, and also darkened the borders on the counties. This helped my old eyes a bit. When I finished making this map, and found how handy it was, I then went to http://www.mapquest.com and looked up my hometown of Burlington, Iowa. And yes, you guessed right, I made a large street map of it. It's also hanging on the wall. I discovered some interesting things while going through the 1910 and 1920 Census. Since most of the Iowa censuses have added street names, you can trace where your families lived. Did they still remain in the same location over the years or were they constantly moving? I discovered that my mother's (who was only one years old or eleven years old during these two different census periods) family lived in the same place but her first husband lived within a five-minute walk from her family home. Her third husband lived halfway between both of them. Of course they didn't know each other. Her third husband, my father, was married and had a family already. In fact, the home he lived in was two doors down from where I grew up as a child. And today the house she grew up in still stands. I have relatives still living there. I mark my street map also, and I know where most of my relatives lived at the beginning of the 20th Century. They all lived close in proximity --- most of them in walking distance. All were close to the Oak Street Baptist Church that was started by my German ancestors. I'm discovered a lot about my family, things I never knew while growing up, just by making a couple of maps and keeping track of their movements over the years. I wish some of the earlier census reports were as helpful as the later ones. Oh. and by the way, on my large county map, there are also some of the cemeteries listed in the area. I know most of my family was buried in Aspen Grove Cemetery, but I had other family that was buried, near where they lived their last years. I have also marked these on my county map.

I've been in this "business" as a professional researcher, family researcher and teacher for about 37 years now, and I have seen it all!

Here are some examples:

- * A customer who refused to go any further once I connected him to a titled family in England. He wasn't going to have any snobs in HIS family!
- * A customer who refused to believe that her Huguenot ancestors could revert to the "mother church", even after being presented with parish registers, probate files, and pictures of their graves in the Roman Catholic churchyard.
- * I stumbled onto a bonanza of information about a person's maternal line, though I was researching the paternal one. He threw it out with the statement that "females don't count in genealogy."
- * A customer who, when she found out that I needed to know the birth dates of her father, mother, and grandparents, refused to go further. She informed me that if I had to know the family "business" in order to find her family history, to "just forget it".
- * A gentleman believed that his mother had had an affair, and that he was illegitimate. His mother had corresponded briefly with this man after a relative in California suggested it. I found that at the period of interest, his mother was in northern Canada, and that the man was out of the country in the U.S. Navy. He still preferred to believe that this man was his father, and carried his picture (found in his mother's belongings) in his wallet.

Ah well ... it just goes to prove a point ... be very careful in analyzing what you find, especially printed genealogies and family "sources". There are lots of people who alter records for their own reasons. I have heard of original records have being altered, then xeroxed and copies sent to trusting people.

served in the Regular Army for the duration of the war, and received bounty land under the 1812 acts.

It took three trips to the National Archives to uncover the information that has answered so many questions. The first trip enabled me to find all the Dickerson men who had served in the same regiment. At that time I was able to hold their pay stubs in my hand. I learned that they had been paid \$8 a month, and that Reed had given power of attorney to his commanding officer before he died.

At that time I was interested in people living in Floyd County since a neighbor looked so much like my husband's aunts, and we found that she had a Dickerson grandmother who had lived in Floyd County. I would later find that I had held the pay stubs of the great great grandfather we were searching for.

Later information came to me from a relative of our neighbor, Russell Dickerson, of Boone's Mill, Va. A letter had been received in 1923 with information, though scanty, on the young men from Floyd County whose widows, had received bounty land.

Six pages if unindexed Bounty Land Records were brought home from the National Archives by Diane Good. They concerned the applications for bounty land of Griffith Dickerson of Gentry County, Missouri. He was declared a Fraud because of the dissimilarity of his signatures. He signed his name at one time, then signed with his mark, later because of poor eyesight and fraility.

My later visit requesting the same informatioon on the same serviceman unearthed 19 pages if revealing information, not seen by Diane. Rebecca was described as an old lady of 73, of honest simplicity; that she lived 12-15 miles up country from Danville, and that she remembered her husband had two relatives of the same name, but did not know if they were in the war. A statement from Jesse Jones, the minister from West Fork Primitive Baptist Church, who married Griffith and Rebecca, was included. He remembered the marriage in 1801, but he had kept no records. This information completed the picture of these people who lived so long ago.

Mormon Family History

a resource for all

The Family History Library (FHL) in Salt Lake City, Utah is the largest genealogical library in the world. In 1894, the Genealogical Society of Utah was founded to collect and preserve records from around the world used to trace family history. The library created by this society became the Family History Library, which since 1944 has been owned and managed by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

It is the mission of the LDS (Latter-day Saints) or Mormon church to connect families by documenting the dead in preparation for the afterlife. Records collected for this purpose have been microfilmed since 1938 and are the core of the collection. Most of the records date from about 1550 to 1920 and are from the United States, Canada, the British Isles, Europe, Latin America, Asia and Africa. Included are governmental, church, organizational and individual records: church registers, census records, immigration records, military records, land and probate records.

The collection includes over 2.2 million rolls of microfilmed genealogical records; 742,000 microfiche; 300,000 books, serials, and other formats; and 4,500 periodicals. The Ancestral File database contains approximately 35.6 million names that are linked into families. The International Genealogical Index (IGI) database contains approximately 600 million individual names. An addendum to the IGI contains an additional 125 million names. The Pedigree Resource File database contains 36 million names that are linked into families.

Family History Center in Salem

Family History Centers (FHC's) are branch facilities of the Family History Library, of which there are more than 3,700 worldwide in 88 countries. These centers are in LDS churches, often referred to as "stakes," and are staffed by volunteers who may or may not be church members.

Everyone is welcome to use the resources at the centers. Each center determines its own hours of operation so it is a good idea to call ahead and find out about a specific center. There are 32 FHC's in Virginia, most of which are in the eastern part of the state. There is a center serving the Roanoke Valley at 6311 Wayburn Drive in Salem. Phone: 540-562-2052. Hours: Tuesday and Thursday, 10 a.m. - 8 p.m., and Saturday, 10 a.m. -1 p.m.

The obvious advantage of a Family History Center is that you have access to The Family History Library resources without having to go there. This is especially useful for researching ancestors who lived in other states, countries or parts of the world. But do your homework. Take your completed pedigree charts and family group record sheets with you. Know who you want to look for and what kinds of records you need to use. The next step is finding out what is available.

The Family History Library Catalog (FHLC) lists and describes each of the microfilms, microfiche, books, CD's and other records.

The FHLC is available on microfiche or CD-ROM in the FHC, or online at www.familysearch.org.

Search online from home

FamilySearch is the computerized collection of genealogical information created by the LDS church. The search can be by place, surname, author, subject, call number, film/fiche or title. If you have access to the Internet at home you can connect to the LDS site and do your record searching before you visit the center.

Most of the microfilm and microfiche can be borrowed from the FHL. There is a fee (\$3.50 per microfilm roll/\$.15 per microfiche) and this service must be requested in person at the FHC. Borrowed materials are sent from the FHL to the local FHC for your use there. You must use the borrowed items at the center, usually for a lending period of 3 weeks, but most items can be renewed.

You get what you ask for; so if you've requested an Italian marriage document, don't be surprised if it is in Italian rather than English. Do your homework before you order. If you haven't been to a Family History Center, an adventure awaits you. The Family History Centers are wonderful resources.

TIPS TO HELP YOU GET OVER THE BRICK WALL

Every genealogist, at one time or another, has encountered a brick wall in his or her research. When you hit a brick wall it is a good thing to remember that every research challenge allows you the opportunity to grow as a family historian. Every time you get over a brick wall, you've learned a new research technique that you may be able to apply later. Here are some tips to help you along:

o Check for Misspellings. It is always a good idea to remember that generations ago, name spellings weren't standardized and people often spelled their own names many different ways. Also, since lots of people couldn't write, they had other people write things down for them. This, too, resulted in multiple spellings. Even official documents (for example, a census, marriage record, or immigration document) may contain misspellings. In the end, remember to check many different spellings of a name you are having trouble finding record of.

o Take a Break, Then Review What You Already Have. Sometimes putting your research away for a little while will help you see things in a new light when you come back to it. You'll often find new clues or hidden significance in your existing research when you take a step back and reevaluate your sources or reexamine any assumptions that you have made.

o Look for the Person, Not the Name. Sometimes you'll hit a brick wall when you find two people with the same name living in the same area. In this case, only further research will help you determine which one is yours. One way to identify an individual is to expand your research to include his extended family. Why not look for record of your ancestor in documents relating to his siblings or his wife's family? Try to determine if friends or associates mentioned him in their wills or deeds. Perhaps he was active in his community and may be mentioned in a local history. By making your ancestors more than just a name, you not only spice up your family history but also make it easier to trace.

o Make an Educated Guess. When absolutely no records exist, you can often make an educated guess to help further your research along. For example, to determine someone's age when there are no birth or census records available, you may wish to estimate based on that person's marriage date. Generally, in colonial times, girls were married for the first time between the ages of 17 and 21 and boys were married for the first time between the ages of 18 and 21. You'll want to do a little research to determine what the general rule was in your case but you can see how an understanding of some historical demographics can sometimes help you get past a brick wall.

o Ask Your Fellow Researchers for Help. Genealogists are often willing to help each other out and you might be surprised by the amount of assistance you'll receive. Posting a query, for example at www.genforum.com, is a great way to get in contact with other researchers who may be researching the same family lines as you.

FAMILY REUNION, PUBLICATION OF BOOK, NEWSLETTERS, ETC.:

Limited to 60 words, not including your name and address. We cannot edit a full page down to 60 words — so send the notice as you want it printed. These notices will be put in as space permits. Members will be given priority in publishing these notices.

MATERIAL FOR PUBLICATION: We welcome articles, records, etc. for publications. The material when received may not be used in following issue, but in a future issue. If a large amount of material is sent, it may take a while to publish because we try to have a variety of material in each issue. (1) READY FOR PUBLICATION (which the editor loves). Please type using a carbon ribbon or dark ribbon and CLEAN KEYS. Use 8 1/2" x 11" paper, single space, with a minimum margin on ALL sides of 1 inch. Center your title. Be sure to include your name, address, and date (year) on the document. If not typed for publication, please PRINT PLAINLY some articles that have been hand written we have not been able to read, or those that are typed with all caps are difficult to read. PLEASE read material over before mailing and double check all dates. (2) GIVE SOURCE OF MATERIAL. Original documents - where found, type of record, page number, etc., or, if known, who now has the document in their possession. We CANNOT PRINT material from printed sources unless we have written permission from the publisher, which you MUST FURNISH. We must have source of material to give credit to the person who has done the work. (3) DEADLINE for submitting material should be at least two months before date of publication. (4) PLEASE do not send material that you want returned - send a photocopy to us instead. That way it won't get lost, as letters do get misplaced, when passed from one person to another.

SURNAME INDEX: Information will include name (given and sumame), place (location at time of date), Date (birth, death, marriage, or where living at the date given).
