



Montgomery County, Virginia

In conformity to an act of the General assembly entitled an act forming a new county out of Montgomery County passed the 12th day of January 1831.

Floyd County, Virginia

Montgomery County, Virginia Will Book 5 page 52:

In obedience of two orders of court to us directed, one from the county court of Montgomery, and one from the county court of Floyd for the purpose of runing and marking the lines between said counties, in conformity to an act of the General assembly entitled "an act forming a new county out of Montgomery County" passed the 12th day of January 1831, we met at the Franklin and Montgomery lines opposite the widow Latrels and proceeded as followth to wit. Beginning on two chesnut sprouts a spanish oak and hickory on the Franklin line, and running S 74 W 94 poles to the widow Lutrels house, leaving said house in Montgomery county, thence S 72 W 1232 poles passing John Thrash's house 72 poles to a chesnut on the top of a hill in said Thrashe's field leaving said Thrash in Montgomery county, thence S 67W 1920 poles part measured and marked and part calculated to the highest point in John Cooper's old place, and cornered on said point, thence S 42 W 1448 poles to whare the waggon road crosses the Laurel ridge, and with the highest part of said ridge, with the meanders of said ridge to the mouth of Brush creek, whare it empties into Little river, and with the meanders of said river to two maples at the mouth of the tan bough branch at the foot of a spur of Mack's mountain, and thence up said spur with a marked line with said mountain, crossing Laurel creek, to the principal Southern range of said Mack's mountain, and with said range to the Grason line. Giver under our hands this fifth day of May 1831.

people come from all over the country to discover precious information about their family trees and history in the Virginia Room

There's a small, quiet place in the city that attracts visitors from all over and tempts them to stay for quite a while. It's the Virginia Room, on the second floor of Roanoke's Main Library. At the entrance is a map, full of pins stuck into nearly every state, plus a number of foreign countries, marking the origins of people who have journeyed to the Virginia Room in search of treasure, personal and otherwise.

What treasure do they seek? Maps. Directories. Census records. Regimental histories. Court records that dish the dirt from a century ago. And a full complement of librarians to help them find what they are looking for.

Customer service is the top priority for Sheila Umberger, acting director of Roanoke's Public Libraries. "Since July [2004], we have made real strides in attracting top librarians," doubling the Virginia Room staff, she says. The Virginia Room is now open the same hours as the Main Library, expanding its availability.

Heading the Virginia Room is newcomer Laura S. Wickstead. As the new Virginia Room librarian, she brings to the position an M.S. in library science, work experience in libraries and a local historical society in Pennsylvania, and a successful track record in grant writing. What sets her apart is her special training at the National Archives in Washington, D.C., where she learned to preserve and repair precious materials and photographs.

Wickstead's team includes associates Brenda Finley and Pam Young, and assistant Alicia Sell. "We love our jobs," says Wickstead. "We all have different gifts. [No matter what the project,] there's always someone who will tackle it." And the projects are diverse. "Genealogy is one of the top two or three hobbies in the United States," says Umberger, "and we have a renowned collection." The curious find the Virginia Room through genealogical guides, online databases, and word-of-mouth referrals. Individuals, couples, and sometimes entire family reunions come to do research. They can also make copies of photos in the Virginia Room's collections.

Authors use the resources, as do students hoping to qualify for scholarships based on ancestry. "There's always something new to do," says Wickstead. "It's not about old stuff and dead people, it's about the lives of the people who come in."

Librarians choose new materials based on the needs of Virginia Room users. In addition to owning every available Virginia census, librarians have noted the migration trends of early Virginians and have purchased census indexes for key Midwestern states to help people follow their ancestors. Much material is donated every year, and it's the librarians' job to create topical vertical files and "finding aids" to help researchers navigate it all.

A variety of programs is available in the Virginia Room, including classes on how to use a special online family history research database to which the library subscribes. A new microfilm reader/printer has a computer attached to it so researchers can save or e-mail what they find.

The Virginia Room got its start in the 1960s, acquiring rare and important materials relating to Virginia history and families. Two collections in particular stand out. The History Channel recently featured one postcard out of the 2,400 in the Virginia Room's postcard collection. The George Davis photography collection includes 14,500 photos and glass plates dating from 1904 to the 1960s. The images include people, places, and "phenomenal scenes of the railroad," says Umberger.

The Virginia Room has one of the most complete collections of books, articles, and documents relating to the infamous Beale Treasure, gold supposedly buried in Bedford County. As in the recent movie "National Treasure," elaborate codes, only partially deciphered, purportedly tell where the treasure may be found. Numerous books, articles, and documentaries by the BBC and others have covered the mystery and, as a result, the library receives so many requests for information that special packets have been developed for treasure hunters.

In a search through the census schedules, it is helpful to become familiar with a few variants of spelling and letter formation. Until the turn of the century, spelling was phonetic, words were spelled as they sounded. To obtain complete use of any index, it is important to anticipate the different possibilities, then to use the index accordingly.

Each scribe had his own pecular style. Nevertheless, it is possible to form some generalities, the study of which will greatly improve the thoroughness of research. The following guidelines are based on editorial conclusions from this 1800 census and should not be taken as definitive statements on early penmanship.

Located near the front of the cemetery, a box wood tree, large about twelve feet high a small gray stone with a square top; also a gray head type illegible tombstone.

Possibly there are many additional burials there in either unmarked graves or small illegible stones. This is a very old and continually used family burying ground of the Poage family. It is said to have been a grant from the King of England prior to the war for Independence.

Elijah Poage b. June 11, 1823-d Feb 14, 1900 Margaret M. Poage Born July 1, 1828-d Feb 4, 1906 (Note: Above are dual tombstones. This is Elijah Poage well known and prominent early farmer, cabinetmaker and undertaker who lived in the large frame house located on Highway 221. This is the house known as the "Old Poage Farm". The cemetery is directly behind this dwelling on the mentioned very steep hill at the edge of the woods in a fenced area.

(Note: The above visible burials seem to be contained in a separate but adjoining section of the cemetery, located on the edge of the woods closest to the old Poage farmhouse. Most of this section was in excellent condition and well maintained, especially the Gregson graves. This section is enclosed by a durable chain link fence.)

Second section:

This portion appears to be most likely within the old Poage farm land, but seems to be outside the chain link fence. It is fenced, but the fence is deteriorating. It adjoins the chain link area.

Third Section:

This section may possibly be on the adjoining tract of land and not actually part of the old Poage family burying ground. A further search, including land records of Roanoke County, Virginia may properly identify former owners. This portion lies on the far side in the heavily wooded area across another deterioration and partially missing fence line. The above portion described herein as "Section Two/or Second Section" lies somewhat in the middle or the larger chain link section and this apparently long time abandoned part. All grave stones seemed illegible except one that possibly had , "E. M. Nov 11, 1848". It is possible other stones had the initial "M". There are two people buried in the other sections by the last name of "Meador" and this possibly is a clue in identifying burials there.

Continuation on "Third Section!"

E. M. Nov 11, 1848 Possibly as many as twenty illegible grave markers, all in a heavily wooded and shaded area of forest.



German man finds out genealogist is a relative

The plane landed three hours late.

But they were waiting for him, with smiles and cameras and four shiny helium balloons.

At 57, Harald Stoelting was finally coming home, to a family he'd never met.

Home, he'd learned over the years, wasn't just a place you lived. It was a place that grounded you, a place where your toes dug into the soil like roots and made you grow. Helped you thrive.

Harald never had that. But on a cool and rainy Saturday afternoon in April, he was about to find it.

After a dozen failed attempts to find his family and a weather-delayed flight from London to Washington, Harald walked into the embrace of cousins.

Into his history.

There were no tears. Only smiles and introductions and pictures.

And then a scurrying to baggage claim so they could get out of the airport and back to Stafford County where the journey would really begin.

A man without a family

On Oct. 8, 1947, less than two years after the Nazis were defeated, a young, unwed mother gave birth to a baby boy in war-weary Germany.

AnnaLisa Stoelting, unable to raise her child, turned baby Harald over to foster care.

Years later, AnnaLisa would tell Harald this much about his birth father: His name was James Clark. He was an African-American World Overcome by the music at Spanish Grove Baptist War II veteran from Virginia, stationed briefly in Bremerhaven. During the mid-1940s, he'd lived with a sister on Early Street in Lynchburg.

It was little to go on.

No one in the U.S., it turned out, knew Harald Stoelting existed.

At 15, Harald wrote to his dad: Dear Mr. Clark, I want you to know I am your son.

He mailed the letter. No response came, but the envelope was never returned.

In 1980, Harald, by then a German merchant marine, was stationed briefly in Chesapeake. On a cold weekend in November, he hopped a Greyhound bus to Lynchburg and found Early Street. For hours, he asked every black person he saw if they knew James Clark.

No one did.

Over the years, Harald would contact the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, the U.S. Army, the Social Security Administration and the Federal Records Center.

But all responded the same way. Without a Social Security number, without a veteran's service number, they couldn't help him.

In Germany, Harald had faced discrimination, as one of thousands of offspring of black American servicemen and German mothers during World War II.

They were called "Brown Babies."

Harald's foster parents died before he turned 20. He never made inroads with his German family. There was no one to call brother or aunt or cousin.

Harald married in 1980 and had two children.

Still, he felt alone, an orphan without footing.

"I was flying," Harald explained, "and not steering."

In 1998 his marriage ended. He loved his wife, but he said he wasn't the husband he should've been.

In the aftermath, he backed off from his search.

"I decided to leave it for a couple of years."

Last year, he was ready to try again. With the help of a friend, Harald discovered the Virginia Genealogical Society's Web site. There, listed as an African-American genealogy researcher, was a

Stafford County woman named Char McCargo Bah.

Maybe she would be his link.

Finding James Clark

His e-mail came on a late afternoon in mid-February 2004.

Char read his story and wondered if she should take on the case. So little information. And James Clark was a common name. What if she couldn't find his family? And what if she found them, and they wanted nothing to do with Harald?

"I didn't want to take him on and have him hurt again," she said.

In Char's more than 20 years of genealogical research, she'd seen it happen.

"Some are success stories," she said. "Some are not."

But Char was drawn to Harald. He shared her only daughter's Oct. 8 birthday. Both Harald and Char's daughter are social workers.

Char had a great-uncle named James Clark, also a World War II veteran.

Wouldn't it be funny, she joked, if they were related?

On a Friday last March--her day off from a government job in Washington--Char traveled to Richmond's Library of Virginia and asked for the 1937 to 1940 Lynchburg city directories.

Char found the rows of red, leather-bound books on the second floor, in the East Reading Room.

She flipped through the first three books. Pages of Clarks. Three James Clarks. None on Early Street.

On to 1940. There, on page 279, was a James Clark who lived at 801 Early St. A "C" by his name meant "colored." An "R" meant he rented.

Char was almost certain she'd found Harald's father. On a whim, she decided to look for her great-aunt, who lived in Lynchburg at the time.

Mary Clark Martin and her husband were on page 95. They also lived at 801 Early Street.

Char screamed. Harald's father and Char's great-uncle were the same person.

That made them cousins. And that meant Harald, at last, would know his family.

Later, at home in Stafford, Char started calling Harald. On the third or fourth try, a sleepy voice answered.

She hadn't realized it was 4:30 a.m. in Germany. Char identified herself and told him the news.

He began to cry.

The research came easily after Char made what genealogists call a "hit."

She got the numbers all those government agencies needed. For a year, she gathered pages and pages of documents and records and a handful of photographs.

James Clark had one other child, a daughter, who died in her teens. He made a career out of the military and worked as a cook, traveling all over the world. He married three times, and indeed, was stationed in Bremerhaven in 1947.

In old age, he'd suffered from diabetes and arthritis. He died in 1987.

The stories would come later, from folks who remembered a funny and exotic and sometimes secretive James Clark.

Now it was time for Char and Harald to meet.

Roots, at last

A week into Harald's visit to America, it was time to travel to Halifax County near the North Carolina line and meet his extended family.

If he'd ever wondered what faith he belonged to, Char told him, he could put that question to rest.

"When you get down to Halifax, you will be Baptist."

Harald, at last, was putting down roots. In just a week, he'd met Char's brother and sister, great-aunts and -uncles and more cousins. A camera around his neck, he went to the Library of Virginia, where, in black and white, he saw his father's Early Street address.

He'd visited the World War II Memorial in Washington. He toured Alexandria's Black History Museum and the Civil War battlefield in Manassas.

Throughout Harald's life, he built an image of how he thought his father would be.

Harald connected with everything African-American. He read James Baldwin and Langston Hughes, studied slavery and and the Civil War and black culture.

On April 10, he attended a four-hour church service at Spanish Grove Baptist Church in Scottsburg, the place his father worshipped as a child and young man.

Ninety percent of the congregation was some close or distant relation to Harald. Those who'd known James Clark recognized his half-German son.

They were the same 5 feet, 6 inches tall. They shared white hair and a slightly receding hairline, the mouth and hand gestures and way of looking off into the distance.

One remembered that, like Harald, James Clark always carried a camera around his neck. He entertained nieces and nephews with "war stories" about flying bombs and near misses in Germany, even though

he'd been there after the war and worked as a cook.

James Clark played loud gospel music on Sundays, a former neighbor told them.

After church, where relatives embraced their newfound cousin or nephew as if he'd never been absent, Harald went to his father's home place.

The house was gone, but an old tobacco barn still stood.

He took a stone and a twig from the land.

Born again

The next day was warm and clear in South Boston, just south of Halifax. Harald and Char and Char's husband, Mumini Bah, walked into Rosa Garden Cemetery.

Somewhere among the headstones and tiny metal funeral home plates lay James Clark.

They walked up and down rows of graves, looking for a plate hidden in the grass. Family members felt certain there was no headstone.

Fifteen minutes into their search, though, a headstone caught Char's eye. She recognized the World War II veteran engraving. Up close, she read the inscription.

James Clark, SP-5. January 10, 1900--May 7, 1987.

"At last, you are resting here," Harald thought. "We can communicate on a different level it is now through our big family."

Two days later, he laid a wreath on the grave. He plans to have a foot stone made on a return trip.

On Harald's flight back to his London home, he felt tranquil.

"I always needed crutches. I was walking with crutches. I think I can just put the crutches in the corner now."

He carried a hundred new photographs and three pages of phone numbers and addresses for his "big, huge, large, vast African-American family."

He felt excited about something else, his future.

While in Virginia, he reconnected with his ex-wife by phone. They'd talked for hours. Harald told her he thought he was finally a grown-up, a man ready to be a real husband.

She wanted to see him. He wanted to see her.

"I am rooted. Now I choose the direction. I am rooted now."

Roanoke Area Local History Reading List

Annotated by John Long, Salem Museum

"Where do I look for info on ___? Is ____a reliable source? Can you recommend a book on ___?" As director of the Salem Museum and the default local historian for the town, I am frequently asked to help genealogists and researchers sort through the resources available. Below is an annotated list of sources on the history of the Roanoke area, which I prepared some time ago to guide the beginner in the right direction. Naturally, the opinions expressed are mine alone.

Early History:

- Kegley's Virginia Frontier (1938). A definitive source on early settlement, now available in a reprint.
- William McCauley: *History of Roanoke County* (1902). Authoritative source which established the study of our local history. Difficult to find except as a non-circulating reference book. Poorly indexed, but with interesting biographical sketches.
- Egloff and Woodward: First People: The Early Indians of Virginia. Includes info on the pre-history of the Roanoke Valley.

Roanoke County:

- George Jack and E. B. Jacobs: History of Roanoke County, Roanoke City, and the N&W Railway. (1912) Also has good biographical sketches and corporate histories.
- Roanoke: Story of County and City. Prepared in the early 1940s by the WPA Writer's Project. Use with care—many inaccuracies.
- Deedie Kagey: When Past is Prologue: A History of Roanoke County. Very well indexed, exhaustive in detail but too little analysis, not without a few errors. Great bibliography, obsessively footnoted.
- Helen Prillaman: *Places Near the Mountains* and *A Place Apart*. Neighborhood histories with interesting anecdotal and genealogical history. Expensive books for what you get—try the library.

Roanoke City:

- Raymond Barnes: *History of the City of Roanoke*. Entertaining but flawed book.
 Some passages racially insensitive; plenty of chronology but little analysis. If you have a copy, get the separate index as well.
- Clare White: Roanoke 1740-1982. Wonderful short history, highly recommended.
- Carolyn Hall Bruce: Roanoke, Past and Present and Roanoke: A Pictorial History. Both interesting pictorial histories, short on text but rich in images.

Salem:

- Norwood C. Middleton: Salem: A Virginia Chronicle. Wonderful book, one of the best written local histories in Virginia. Well indexed but not footnoted.
- John D. Long and Mary Hill: A Town by the Name of Salem: The Past in Pictures. Shorter survey with more photos; not a substitute for Middleton.

- Long: South of Main: A History of the Water Street Community of Salem, VA. History of Salem's main African American neighborhood.
- Guide to Historic Salem. Periodical published by the Salem Historical Society and the Salem Times-Register, with a wide variety of topics. Text of most articles available online through www.salemmuseum.org.

Botetourt:

- R. D. Stoner: Seedbed of the Republic (early Botetourt). A good compendium of info on Botetourt, which covered most of this part of the state.
- Frances Niederer: The Town of Fincastle, Virginia. Interesting survey with good architectural information.
- The Botetourt Historical Society has published several other books and booklets on a variety of subjects. Check their catalog or visit their giftshop at the museum.

Vinton:

 Irma Moseley and Mattie Forbes: Vinton History 1884-1984. Still available through the Vinton Historical Society.

Biography and Special Topics:

- Patricia Givens Johnson: General Andrew Lewis of Roanoke and Greenbrier. Not the most readable book, but the only thing written on this important founding father.
- Patricia Givens Johnson: William Preston and the Alleghany Pioneers. Interesting account of a prominent early settler. Johnson wrote several other books on the early history of the New River Valley.
- Clare White: William Fleming: Patriot. Good book, but may not be accessible for students.
- James Thom: Follow the River. Historical novel, but so engaging it may awaken an interest in the early history of our area.
- Reginald Shareef: The Roanoke Valley's African American Heritage. A pictorial history; not much text or analysis.
- Whitwell and Winborne: The Architectural Heritage of the Roanoke Valley. Very interesting, but now dated. Still widely available and makes a good driving tour.
- Roanoke Valley Historical Society: Roanoke County Graveyards through 1920.
 Good genealogical source; makes a fun day exploring.
- John Hildebrand: Iron Horses in the Valley. Early history of railroads in our area.
- James I. Robertson: Civil War Virginia. Little from our area, but an excellent statewide history. All of Robertson's books are popular with good reason.
- Egloff and Woodward: First People: The Early Indians of Virginia. Includes info on the pre-history of the Roanoke Valley.

The cemeteries of any community are always among its most important cultural legacies. In the local family, church, and community cemeteries our history literally lies buried at our feet. Here we find our pioneer ancestors, our forefathers, and genealogical clues that tell us who we were and who we are.

In and around Salem, there are dozens of cemeteries. Some are obvious and well tended; far more are forgotten, vandalized, or even vanished. The listing below owes a tremendous debt to three prior studies. During the Depression, the WPA made survey of area cemeteries that was far from complete but supplied vital data. In the 1970s, the Roanoke Valley Historical Society (now the Historical Society of Western Virginia) began a project to locate, record, and describe all of the cemeteries in the Roanoke Valley. There efforts resulted in the 1986 book, "Roanoke County Gravevards through 1920." Finally, archaeologist Tom. Klatka of the Roanoke Regional Preservation Office in 2000 authored a major academic study of area cemeteries entitled, "Cultural Expressions of Nature in Sacred Contexts: Documentation of Family and Community Cemeteries in Roanoke County, Virginia." At 607 pages, it can be considered as exhaustive a source as has ever or likely will ever exist. Most of the information below derives from these last two sources, and further detail about most cemeteries may be found in them.

We have concentrated on cemeteries in the current city limits, or ones nearby in the county or Roanoke City with families significant to Salem history. It should be noted that many of these cemeteries are hard to find, on private property, or vanished entirely. It would be advisable to keep this in mind before searching for some of the smaller ones. If you would like more precise directions to any graveyards-on the list, please call the Salem Museum. Other graveyards were certainly missed. Anyone with information about local cemeteries not listed is also encouraged to call the Salem Museum.

Bratton: A small African American burial place with at least 27 graves; 13 marked by field stones and 14 or more unmarked. Off of Wildwood Road, this cemetery was described by Klatka as threatened with development.

Brooks-O'Neal: Another African American cemetery, with approximately 17 graves. Only feet off of Goodwin Road. it is associated with the Brooks, O'Neal, Hill, and Gravely families. Overgrown and threatened.

Brown: This long vanished cemetery was on the grounds of the VA Hospital, approximately where the reservoir is today. It was probably associated with the family of George Brown and his wife Salome Cole, a sister of Susanna Cole, Salem's first landowner.

Brubaker-Huffman: A large cemetery near Hanging Rock with over 100 graves, including members of the above named families as well as Hinchees, Franciscos, and other prominent names from the North County's past. The oldest graves date to the 1840s.

Burwell: Located off of Rt. 419, this graveyard contained the remains of prominent landowner Nathaniel Burwell and his wife Lucy Carter, an aunt of Robert E. Lee, and two children. They were relocated to East Hill in 1984.

Butts: This large, active cemetery with hundreds of graves is located north of Richfield on Rt. 642. It contains many prominent residents of the area, including the grave of Rev. J. M. Humphries, founding pastor of both Locust Grove Methodist Church and Fort Lewis Christian.

Cain: This large African American cemetery is identified by a marker which reads "In memory of George Cain (1823-1918) and Sallie Houston Cain (1850-1938) for their donation of this cemetery to this community. Erected by the Cain Club, 1964." George and Sallie Cain were former slaves who were well known in the community. Other families represented here include the Jacksons, Cannadys, Wingos, and others.

Church Hill: On Palmer Avenue, this well maintained cemetery is administered by South Salem Christian Church. It is one of the largest in town, containing hundreds of intermments.

Denton-Neff: A small family cemetery dating to the 1840s, located off of 419 behind a VDOT storage area. Klatka reports that it was recently enclosed by a fence. Four graves are apparent today; there may be others.

Deverle: The cemetery of this prominent Glenvar area family was moved to East Hill about 1902.

Dingledine: This prominent German family of early settlers owned the area around Lakeside and Conehurst. Some Stoutamires, a neighboring family, were buried there as well. Their graves were moved from there to East Hill.

Dooley-Biankenship: Off of Thompson Memorial near I-81. A recent marker gives the date of 1789 for the graveyard, but it is uncertain from where that date is derived since there are no markers. Oral tradition recorded by Klatka says that there are graves here of Dooley children who perished in a diphtheria epidemic.

Downtown Cemeteries: In the mid- to late- 19th Century, there were two graveyards in downtown Salem; one on Academy Street and one on Calhoun. Affiliated with the Presbyterian and the Methodist churches respectively, they were relocated to East Hill during the 1880-90s land boom when property values skyrocketed. Some of Salem's earliest civic leaders were buried here. Tradition has always maintained that many graves were missed.

East Hill: The first burials here came during the Civil War, when an abandoned Baptist churchyard was employed to inter Confederate soldiers. In 1869, a group of investors established the cemetery, and it has continued to serve the Salem community ever since. Maintenance and

management today is carried out by the city. Best known grave is that of General Andrew Lewis (see adjoining story).

East Hill Cemetery North: In 1868, this plot was purchased by Bernard Pitzer from the estate of Nathaniel Burwell to establish an African American burial ground. It soon became the most prominent black cemetery in town. It is still active but seldom used today. The city maintains it, but many gravestones are toppled or displaced. More than a hundred others are unmarked entirely.

Entsminger: Once located off of Lynchburg Tumpike, this old family cemetery had vanished even before the WPA took its survey in the late 30s.

Freeman: An African-American cemetery containing such family names as Freeman, Hackley, Leftwich, and others. Located north of I-81, there are at least 61 graves here dating from 1910-97.

Garst: The Garst family was (and is) one of the county's most prominent. The first of the line in the valley was Frederick "Indian" Garst, who lies here off of Kessler Mill Rd. with his family. There are approximately 64 graves, including some unmarked. Descendants recently cleared, fenced, and are maintaining the once overgrown and vandalized burial ground.

Grubb: A small family-cemetery off of Keagey Rd. with about 15 graves. The earliest visible is from 1902; the most recent from 1995.

Gum Springs: The Gum Springs section in West Salem/North County was once a thriving African American section. This cemetery has approximately 43 graves, but only one is marked with an inscribed marker: Obadiah Akers, 1905. The rest are marked with fieldstones. Harris: A small family graveyard with about 19 burials, most marked with cement bricks (to replace lost headstones?). Located between 419 and Kessler Mill Rd.

Houtz: The family graveyard associated with the owners of the old Intervale farm. When the area became an industrial park, the cemetery with 11 graves was fenced and restored, but it is highly unlikely that the stones today mark the original graves, since most had been scattered beforehand.

Lewis: Behind a house on Carolina Ave, was the grave of Andrew Lewis and at least one son. They were moved into East Hill to honor the hero.

Mercy House: Richfield Retirement Center began as an indigent care center in the Depression by the name Mercy House Since those who died there often had no families and little money, a cemetery was established on the grounds about 1934. There are a minimum of 71 graves, almost all unmarked.

Parrish: Located off of North Mill Rd., this small cemetery contains graves of the well known Parrish family as well as the Harrisons. Kipps, and Gunters. There are approximately 26 graves variously marked or unmarked.

Romar Drive: Local realty maps show this cemetery; however no trace of it remains today. Any information would be appreciated.

Sherwood: By far Salem's largest and most active cemetery. For its history, see adjoining story.

Trevay-Anderson-Harman: Located off of Dalewood near the Salem/County border, this graveyard has approximately 30 graves carrying the names listed above as well as the Reynolds and Paynes. Trout-Miller: Although well out of Salem in the Cherry Hill area of Roanoke, this old family graveyard, surrounded by a crumbling wall of handmade bricks, is listed because it contains the (now unmarked) graves of George Trout, one of the earliest settlers to the area, and his brother-in-law Michael Miller, after whom Miller Hall at Roanoke College is named. It has been repeatedly vandalized and is very deteriorated. There are at least 43 graves.

Walton-Craig: A small cemetery associated with some very distinguished families, located off of Green Hill Drive on the grounds of one of the valley's oldest houses. Buried here are members of the prominent Walton and Shanks families, and Congressman Robert Craig, after whom Craig County was named.

West Hill: Also called Tank Hill by many locals, this is one of Salem's oldest cemeteries. Here lie William Bryan, William Bryan Jr., and his wife Margaret, who settled in the Lake Spring area about 1748 (their marker though is relatively new, dating from the 1920s). Other notable names include Johnston, Shanks, Griffin, Logan, Tinsley, and many more too numerous to list. The City now maintains this cemetery, and is worth the visit for the spectacular view if nothing else.

White: This cemetery at Fort Lewis was moved recently to East Hill—mostly. See adjoining story.

Wrenn: A small family graveyard with perhaps nine graves off of Locke Rd. Overgrown and neglected.

Zirkle: Once located in the Beverley Heights subdivision, which was the Zirkle family farm, this graveyard has now vanished.

In a couple of weeks, they had absorbed enough moisture that they would lay flat, and are now framed (with acid-free backing and UV glass, of course)

Since they both graduated from high school in 1920 and from college in 1924, these certificates are precious to me.

PLEASE read material over before mailing and double check all dates. (2) GIVE SOURCE OF MATERIAL.
