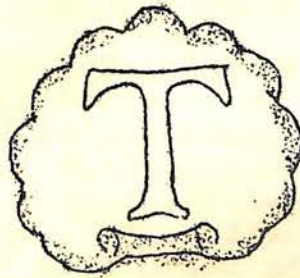

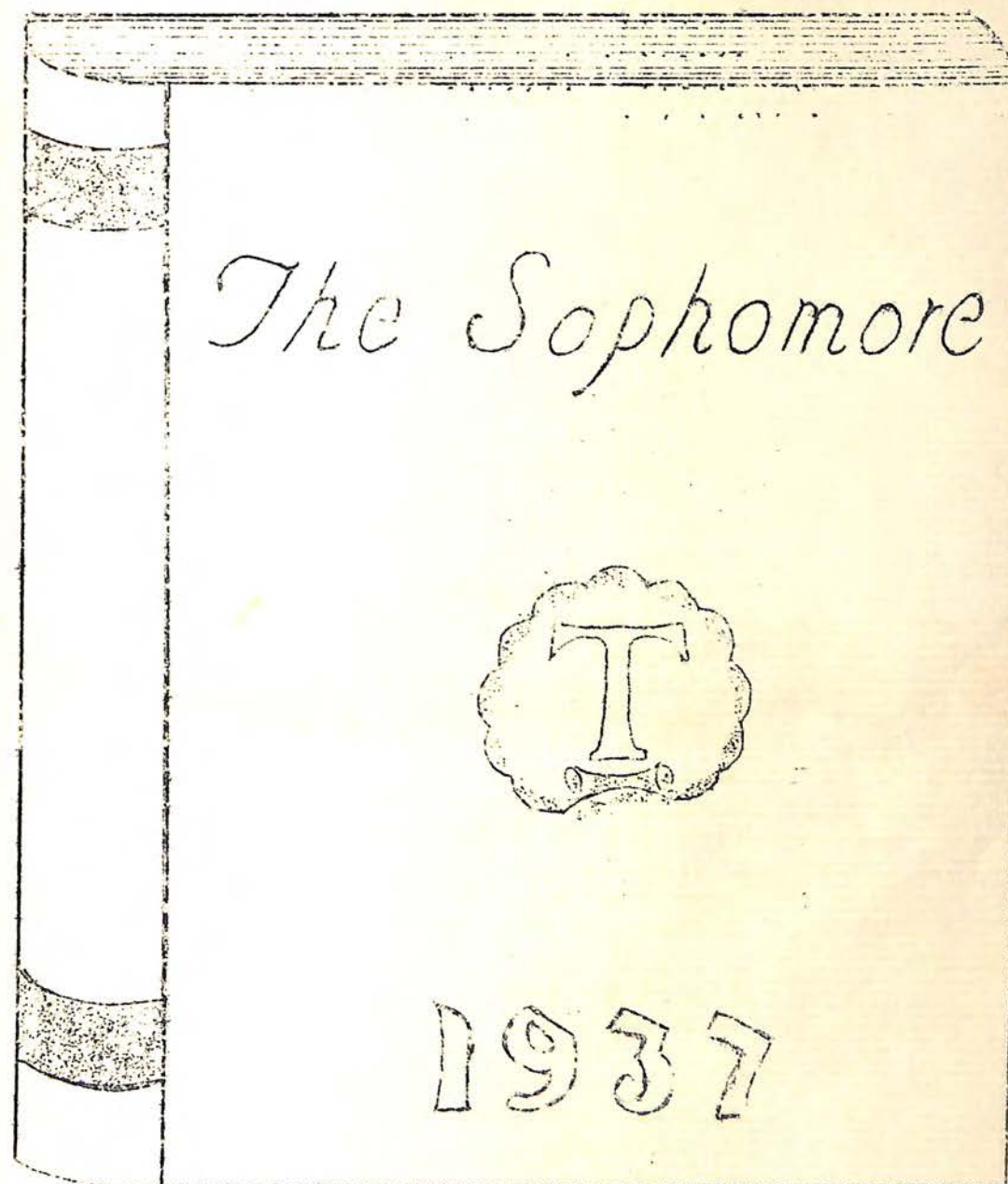
If Lillian wouldn't rob the cradle
