



Foreword . . .



Curriculum

School authorities of Roanoke County have certain requirements which allow the students to specialize in various fields.

There are three different types of courses offered in our school: Academic, Commercial, and General. The fact that three different types of diplomas are awarded is a guidance procedure, rather than one in which different values are placed on any one type of diploma over another.

Students planning to attend college take a college preparatory course leading to the academic diploma. Those interested in preparing for secretarial jobs work toward a commercial diploma. The general diploma offers training in agriculture, shop, home economics, and a diversified occupations program.

The Athletic Field is Lighted

"UPWARD THE GIANTS"

"Upward, Upward, Upward go the long, slender giants, stabbing their brilliant illuminating fingers down out of the cloudy, inky night."

On the night of September 9, 1954 at 7:15 p. m., the lights came on over the Vinton Athletic Field. Their coming, being a much needed asset to this little sportsminded community, was planned for years in advance by the Administration of William Byrd, through the athletic fund; the civic minded clubs of Vinton; The Vinton Lions Club; Vinton Chamber of Commerce; and also by the Roanoke Weaving Company, the Vinton Branch of Burlington Mills, Inc.

At a cost of \$15,000 these lights may seem very expensive, but it is not the pecuniary value by which they will be known, but rather by reputation of being the home of a "bunch of mighty mites" called the William Byrd Terriers. Although we have rejoiced much over these lights, we still shed a tear or two because all of Byrd's fine athletes, also those of the community, that played in the years before this illumination did not get a chance to play under them; but they will take pleasure in seeing games played on the lighted field.

The dedication program for the new lights began with a parade through Vinton by the William Byrd Band. Participating on this program was Mr. P. E. Ahalt, former principal of Byrd, who had worked hard toward this goal.

The main speaker at the dedication was Virginia's first All-American football player, Bill Dudley, who is now associated with the University of Virginia Coaching Staff. He was introduced by Principal C. L. Jennings.

The game was attended by a crowd of about 3,000.

Their motto is: "Let us study, Let us play, Let us pray." They carry out this motto in making education a necessity of life.


BAND BOOSTERS CLUB

The Byrd Echo, the school newspaper, is published every two weeks by a group of hard working students bound together by one big idea—to put out a paper which transmits all of the latest news and coming events of the student body.

Once every two weeks a newspaper staff meeting is held. At this meeting the co-editor gives out assignments to the reporters and columnists. It takes about three or four days to prepare the articles. When they are finished they are given to the typists, who type them into columns. When this typing has been done, the different columns are cut out and pasted to different sheets of paper. This is called making the "dummy". After the dummy is completed, it again is given to the typists, who copy it on stencils. These stencils are run off on a mimeograph machine. The paper is now finished, except for one important step—stapling. Each Friday about three o'clock, several different people take the papers around to all of the classrooms to sell them. This not only shows how much work goes into publishing a school paper, but it also gives to the members of the staff a very valuable experience.

Occasionally, the staff puts out a special issue, such as the Christmas issue and the issue for Seniors.

The staff does not believe in all work and no play, so an outing was held in the spring.

The staff has tried to make the paper as good as possible and they hope that you, the student body, have enjoyed it.

The purpose of the Diversified Occupations Program is to provide vocational education in addition to general education for its members. It helps bridge the gap between school and employment.

Students enrolled in this program spend one-half day at school and one-half

day working in a chosen occupation.

In regular class they study personality, personal progress on the job, labor laws, employer-employee relations, and studies directly related to the specific

occupation.

This year there are 35 students working in the following 17 occupations: baker, banker, cake decorator, checker, dental assistant, displayman, draftsman, foods trade worker, grocerymen, general office worker, postman, printer, retail clerk, service station manager, stockroom men, telephone operators, and textile worker.



Athletic Program

There is the bell, "Gym is next" are familiar words in the classrooms of William Byrd. After students have had several classes they are ready for exercise and games and here at Byrd it is no exception.

The girls get dressed comfortably in white shirts, blue shorts and sneakers. They line up in their squads for roll call. After that comes the exercise: knee bends, jumping-jacks, windmills, touching the toes and other similar exercises. When the weather is suitable, Mrs. Cobb, the Physical Education teacher, directs the students down the hill where they have outside games such as: Soccer-drills, Soccer, Soccer call ball and Softball and then up the hill for shower.

In the winter the girls and boys alternate the days in which to use the gymnasium. On days that they are not in the gymnasium they are in a room in the new addition of the school which has been set aside for the Physical Education Classes. Here in the classroom they hold discussions in safety in the classrooms, automobiles, athletics, homes. They also have movies and discussions concerning the subjects of dating and marriage.

The physical education classes are very helpful to the students in many ways.
